Huge Prehistoric Creature Of Strange Characteristics Found In Ice Near Cordova

CORDOVA, Alaska, Nov. 25:-A giant amphibian lizard-like creature has been found encased in ice on Glacier Island, reports from Valdez, near the island, said today. The creature was forty feet long, and its fur was in perfect condition. The tail measured sixteen feet, the head six feet and the body twenty feet in length.

The body is believed to have been preserved since prehistoric times in the ice on the upper reaches of the Columbia Glacier and the ice coffin, it is assumed, gradually worked its way to the sea.
