Famous Plane Adds Another Accomplishment to Its Great Record — Ocean Hop Made Under Favorable Auspices

HARBOR GRACE, June 25:-Capt. Charles Kingsford-Smith and his three companions, having successfully accomplished a trans-Atlantic flight from Baldonnel Airdrome, Ireland, landed here safely in the famous plane Southern Cross at 5:22 this morning. They hopped off from Baldonnel early yesterday morning and encountered good flying conditions which allowed them to make the trip in about 23 hours' time. They had waited for several days at Baldonnel before hopping off because of adverse weather reports. The Southern Cross will be flown from here to New York.

Praise From an Opponent

The smaller and partisan Tory newspapers are busy blaming the Liberal Government for the unemployment situation in Canada today, though the economists tell us it is worldwide and less in Canada than in any other country.

The Vancouver "Province" (Conservative) is fair enough to raise its voice with the economists. It says in an editorial:

"It would be foolish of course and manifestly unfair to attempt "to hold Mr. King and his government responsible for the financial "and commercial depression of the present summer. The depression "is world-wide, the dullness is the dullness of an economic dip "which affects not only Canada but all the principal trading coun-"tries of the world."

And further, the same editorial has this to say of the record of the Liberal Government:

"It has reduced debt and taxation, it has put the national "railways on their feet, it has returned the natural resources to the "western provinces, it has helped the Maritimes, it has encour-"aged foreign trade, it has increased Canada's prestige abroad."

And in a clever "dig" at Mr. Bennett's billingsgate and lack of self control in his public addresses, has this to say of Mackenzie King's dignified appeal to the electors of Canada.

"One may disagree with Mr. King's premises in his arguments, "one may dispute his conclusions, but one must concede that in "this keynote speech he showed that he has the proper conception "of the dignity of the office he holds, and that he credits the people "of Canada whom he was addressing with intelligence and a real "interest in public affairs."

It is refreshing to receive a compliment of this sort from the pen of a political opponent, and it should serve as a just rebuke to the leader of the Tory party who has so far forgotten the amenities of public life as to subject the Premier of our country to low and vile abuse.

New Development in Telephony Demonstrated on C.N.R.

TORONTO, June 25:- For the first time in the world's history, an address to an important convention, where the speaker's voice registered perfectly while he himself rushed away from the convention in a Canadian National Railways train, travelling 50 miles an hour towards Montreal, was made

in Toronto last night. J. C. Burkholder, chief engineer of the Canadian National Telegraphs, spoke to the annual dinner of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers on the subject of "train telephony" and held a short conversation with Mr. Sissons, vicepresident of the institute, while he remained seated miles away from the banquet in a parlor car of a Canadian National Railways train en route to Montreal.

Mr. Purkholder's method of addressing his audience was a perfect example of the topic on which he spoke, the car from which he made his address was the "St. Peter," which is equipped for telephoning to and from a moving train.

At 8:15 sharp a voice came through a loud speaker at the head table, "telephone call for Mr. Sissons. Is Mr. Sissons there?" "Mr.
