Parliament Passes the Two Prohibition Bills and Then Prorogues Until Next Year

Considerable Debate of Amendment to Canada Temperance Act Providing for Plebiscites to Decide Question of Incorporation of Liquor into a Province.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, November 11.—The Government's two prohibition bills were successful in running the gauntlet of the Upper Chamber before prorogation of Parliament yesterday afternoon. The bill to amend the Canada Temperance Act by making provision for provincial plebiscites on the petition of the Legislature to decide on the matter of the importation of liquor came in for most criticism. The amendment to defer criticism until next session was negated by a vote of 18 to 12. Senator Ross moved the six months hoist for the second Government bill to amend what is known as the "Doherty Act," by holding that liquor may not be manufactured for use in contravention of the laws of the province making it possible to prosecute the sender as well as receiver of liquor illegally shipped. The vote on this amendment was 15 to 12. When the Senate reassembled after the noon recess, Sir James Loughheed introduced the supply bill amounting to \$62,000,000, which passed. Business in the Commons was practically concluded at noon and the House suspended until 3. On reassembling it found that the Prohibition bills were not yet through the Senate so a further suspension was declared. It met later and formally prorogued at 5 p. m. At the morning session of the House of Commons a supply bill was passed providing for the spending of \$62,000,000 mostly on soldiers' re-establishment. Naval Policy. Ernest Lapointe of Quebec East asked if Admiral Jellicoe was coming to Ottawa to settle the naval policy or if the Government already had one, wister was to approve. Mr. Doherty replied that the Government would settle Canada's naval policy and Parliament would approve it. Admiral Jellicoe's suggestions, however, would undoubtedly be of good value in determining upon a naval policy.

PLAN TO SETTLE FERTILE LAND OF INTERIOR

Meeting to be Held Next Monday at Vancouver to Discuss Matter.

Winnipeg, Nov. 11.—J. Bruce Walker, director of publicity in the Dominion Department of Immigration, and R. C. W. Lett, colonization agent of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, who have returned from a trip along the G. T. P. as far as Prince Rupert, report that a meeting is to be held next Monday at Vancouver to form a farm land settlement organization to assist in placing settlers on the splendid lands available in the Bulkley, Nechaco and Skeena valleys and other territory tributary to Prince Rupert. Mr. Walker stated that large numbers of cattle were being brought from Alberta to central British Columbia for winter pasturage.

IRISH AGITATOR IS ARRESTED IN STATES

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—James Larkin, the famous Irish agitator who figured so strongly in labor troubles in the old country, was arrested Saturday night in this city. He was today arraigned in the police court today on a charge of criminal anarchy. He is held on a \$15,000 bail.

MORSE CREEK FOR SKATING

Delegation Asks City to Put in Dam to Make Pond for Citizens.

A delegation consisting of W. O. Fulton and J. W. Nicholls, from the Athletic Association, met the council last night. Mr. Fulton explained that at a meeting of the Athletic Association last night it had been decided to ask the city to fix up the Morse Creek dam for skating. The Association could not afford the expenditure as all their funds were being used up in fitting up the gymnasium. They asked that the city do this as the expense would probably not amount to \$100. It was moved by Ald. Berrie, seconded by Ald. Perry, that the matter be left in the hands of the mayor.

STEPPED IN FRONT OF AUTOMOBILE AND LEG WAS BROKEN

Yesterday afternoon at 4:10 while on his way to school, little Allan Cross, aged 10 years, was run down by an automobile on Sixth Ave. near McBride Street and his leg was broken. Walking behind Matt Videck's big coal truck the youngster stepped out when the truck stopped and walked right in front of the Pioneer Laundry delivery car coming in the opposite direction. He was knocked down before driver Sid Hamblin had an opportunity to stop. Immediately the driver of the laundry wagon took him to the General Hospital and informed his father, H. T. Cross, inland revenue officer, of the accident. The father asked that he be brought to the home on Fourth Avenue West and Hamblin took him there. Report was then made to the police. The boy is reported to be resting easily today although he suffered severely yesterday afternoon and last night.

STOOD STILL TWO MINUTES

All Industries Ceased in Great Britain This Morning.

LONDON, Nov. 11.—All England stood still for two minutes this morning in commemoration of Armistice Day. Telegraphs, telephones and industrial plants ceased, and ships cut off their engines at sea. PARIS, Nov. 11.—Armistice Day passed quietly except for special masses at the churches. Foch attended mass on behalf of the war orphans at the Invalides Chapel.

COLONEL PECK ON GRATUITIES

Considers Matter Not so Important As Pensions for Widows and Disabled Men.

SAYS NO BRIEF FOR UNION GOVERNMENT

Colonel C. W. Peck, V. C., member of Parliament for this district, addressed the local Great War Veterans' Association last evening on the Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment question. President Simon V. Duff was in the chair. "I suppose the first question you would ask is why am I here instead of at Ottawa," said the colonel. "I was called suddenly west by the sudden illness of relatives. It was expected that Parliament would have been over by this time, but the G. T. P. bill has delayed it. However, it would have made little difference had been there, as the report of the Parliamentary Committee on the question in which you are so vitally interested was adopted and Major Andrew's amendment to have the report go back to the committee was defeated. I would have voted against the report and for the amendment.

The Vital Point.
"I think that you give the matter of gratuities too much importance in your discussion and understanding of this question. The most vital point is the pensions for widows, children and disabled men, then comes the matter of vocational training. These should be kept foremost in view. They are questions that affect the country in general as well as the returned men and are of greater importance than the gratuity matter.

No Mollycoddling.
The colonel read the speech he had made in the Commons on this question. He had said that the soldiers wanted no mollycoddling but that they did demand a square deal. A Royal Commission would have been the best plan and there could have been a scientific readjustment of gratuities and increase of pensions.

Mr. McNeill, secretary of the Dominion command, had ably presented the case for all the soldier bodies except Flynn's organization. However, Col. Peck was not satisfied with the finding of the committee. He felt that they were not in sympathy with the soldiers.

No Brief for Government.
He stated that he held no brief for the Union Government, but he could not forget that it had been the friend of the soldiers in the fall of 1917 when the Canadian forces were standing with their backs to the wall at Ypres. Col. Peck said that it was his opinion that if the soldiers were to get a square deal they must have a soldier party in the Commons. Both parties are playing for the support of the soldiers. He had not supported the soldier candidate, Barnard, at the Victoria election because he did not like his ideals.

A few questions were then asked the colonel. He said that nothing could be done personally about the re-establishment problem. The country could be thrown into a general election but he would not favor that at the present time. On being asked if he would support a soldier party the colonel replied emphatically in the affirmative. Personally the member was not in favor of any truck or trade with Germany and he thought that this was the opinion of the Unionist Government. At the close of the meeting three hearty cheers were given for Col. Peck.

Coal Strike Called Off by Mine Workers

Solemn Warning Given Leaders Yesterday that all Power of States would be used Against Them.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
INDIANAPOLIS, November 11.—At 4:10 this morning the general committee of the United States Mine Workers decided to obey the mandate of the United States court and recall the strike order affecting 425,000 bituminous coal workers.

WASHINGTON, November 11.—Solemn warning was given the United Mine Workers of the United States yesterday afternoon by Attorney-General Palmer that resolutions of conventions and orders of organization officers are not above the law. He described the strike as a plain violation of federal statutes. Speaking on the authority of the Government he stated emphatically that all the power of the United States of America would be used to enforce the mandates of the United States court.

INDIANAPOLIS, November 11.—Bituminous coal miners union officials have deposited with the Federal Court officials an order rescinding the order to strike issued on October 15 and have called on all union men to return to work, declaring that their duties as citizens of the United States to obey the law came before their duty to the coal miners' union.

General reports indicate that the order to return to work will be observed with few exceptions. WASHINGTON, November 11.—Secretary of Labor Wilson announced that he would call the coal operators and miners' union officials together for an immediate conference to negotiate an agreement for wages which the operators had agreed to accept of the miners rescinded the strike order.

OFFER TO TAKE CITY BONDS TO PAY FOR WORK

J. R. Morgan, Ltd., Make Proposal To City in Connection with Road Construction.

The matter of permanent street surfacing was again the subject of discussion at last night's council meeting. A letter was read from J. R. Morgan, Ltd., contractors, offering to take on the city street surfacing work and accept city 6% bonds in payment. This letter had been written to the city council as a result of the mayor's address to the Board of Trade, in which he had stated that financing the street surfacing schemes would be one of the main difficulties. In a conference that he had had with the Spitzer-Roerig Co., of Toledo, who floated the city bonds, he had learned that these people still held \$300,000 of Prince Rupert bonds which had been unsold. They were prepared to float smaller bond issues such as the school, Section 2 bridge, water and light extension bylaws, but they were not in a position to make offers on bigger ones.

The mayor went on to say that in the permanent street surfacing problem the city was getting up against a stone wall. He advocated some general scheme of taxation to pay for these improvements whereby all the property holders in the city would share the costs of improvements which were a benefit to them all. The mayor expressed himself as very pleased with the Morgan offer and that it looked good to him. However, it was getting late for the present council to be taking on big matters like this. The engineering staff was working on plans for a graded thoroughfare from the city to Seal Cove by the shortest and easiest route. On suggestion of Ald. Rochester the mayor is to select a committee of aldermen today to go over the situation with the city engineer and make plans for a new system of graded streets.

ANYOX REACHES \$250,000 TODAY

Exceeds Quota for Victory Loan; Hazelton is Doing Well.

A special to the Daily News this morning stated that Anyox had subscribed a quarter of a million dollars to the Victory Loan already, thus exceeding its quota. Vancouver yesterday issued an appeal to everyone to come to the aid of the country by purchasing bonds. The value of small investors taking all they can on terms or otherwise was emphasized. British Columbia has already passed its quota of \$17,147,800 and is well on for the twenty million mark. WAGES OF SIN IS DISCUSSED BY PHYSICIAN

Dr. Ernest Hall of Victoria Startles Victoria Audience With Facts and Figures.

Illustrated by pictures that were startling to the uninitiated and bristling with astounding facts and figures, the address given by Dr. Ernest Hall of Victoria before the Child Welfare Association on Thursday afternoon, was one to occasion and encourage and stimulate in a great degree deeper investigation of social conditions on the part of all who were in attendance, says the Victoria Times.

Bacon Before Babies.

"It is not pleasant to discuss the wages of sin," said Dr. Hall in speaking on "The Relation of Social Disease to the Child," but for the education of the parents present he would like to crowd into one-half hour; the experience he had gained in a half of a century. "France is waking up, the Mother Country has appointed a National Birthrate Commission, but with Canada hogs are still at a premium and bacon placed before babies, and will remain so until the Canadian public is awakened by a thundering cry of race extinction."

"Canada has been losing prospective citizens for the last 25 years at a rate greater than the total death rate of the war." This terrible loss occurred, according to the speaker, through vice and carelessness. In reading from the report of the British Royal Commission the speaker quoted Sir Rider Haggard to the effect that unless a great change happens, the western races will within two centuries be submerged by a great influx from the East. The body politic was suffering from a disease which was laid at the door of everything from "poverty to poodles," but the real underlying causes were not touched upon in newspapers and colleges. The doctor declared that from his own experiences, gathered in the hospitals, "nature's bookkeeper" and from authoritative statistics, the evil of what was "pleasantly termed social disease," is at the bottom of the misery.

Greater Than the Hun.

The greatest enemy that the Allies had to fight was not the Hun, but venereal disease. Not that the soldier was more immoral than the average man—the speaker was convinced to the contrary—but that the rigid examination of men from all classes of life revealed astonishing facts to the public which medical men have known for years.

President Wilson had said the war was fought to make the world safe for Democracy. The speaker urged that the world be made safe for posterity. "We have no right to expend the vitality which belongs to our children. The visiting of the iniquity of the fathers upon the children unto the third and fourth generations does not extend to the fifth because nature kills off the fifth. It is her way of teaching."

In giving statistics, the doctor stated as the experience of one medical authority that 92 per cent. of the operations upon women could be laid at the door of the scourge of our races. That blindness, rheumatism, heart disease, epilepsy and myriads of other evils were largely due to social diseases was corroborated by facts and figures.

"I have been twice denied the privilege of speaking before the teachers of Victoria," said Dr. Hall in giving an illustration of the lack of responsibility toward the child in the public schools of today. He urged parents to tell their children the truth of life and to do away with the false methods of handling the most vital of all subjects.

The remedy for prevalent evils, he concluded, lay in education, so that the children would not grow up in ignorance and "our people perish from a lack of knowledge."

Interesting Discussion.

In the discussion which followed, the questions were asked why the medical men, knowing the facts as stated by Dr. Hall, had not long since taken some stand, and had they ever tried to get any legislation which would prevent the spread of social disease. Dr. Hall answered that not within his knowledge had the doctors of Victoria or Vancouver tried to effect any such remedial measures.

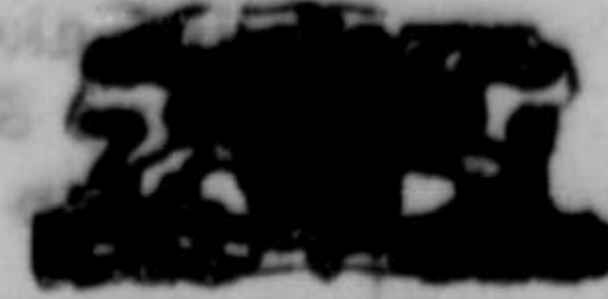

'WAR CHARIOT' ARRIVES TO LOAD LUMBER

Will Take 1,000,000 feet of Aeroplane Spruce From This Port to United Kingdom.

Yesterday afternoon the big steamer War Chariot arrived and tied up at the G. T. P. lumber wharf where she at once commenced to load aeroplane spruce. She will be here about four days if the weather is good and then will return to Vancouver before sailing for the United Kingdom for orders.

The War Chariot is the second of the big government steamships to come here for lumber. The first was the War Company, this boat being an exact duplicate of the other. She is an 8,800-ton vessel, built by John Coughlan & Sons at Vancouver, and is slightly longer than the vessels being built here by the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co. She is being operated by the Monarch S. S. Co. of Glasgow and is now being painted with the Monarch colors.

On her trial trip the vessel made slightly over 12 knots, the average contract speed being eleven and a half knots. While everything aboard is new and has to be adjusted just as with all new vessels, the War Chariot made a successful run north and the officers expect she will make the U. K. in sixty days from Vancouver. The only part of the vessel they condemn wholeheartedly is the American windlass which they characterize as "no good."

The Cargo.

The War Chariot already has taken on nearly 2,000,000 feet of lumber at Vancouver, 900,000 feet at Chemainus and she will load approximately 1,000,000 feet here. If there is any space left she will complete her cargo at Vancouver. The officers on the steamer were sent out from Glasgow recently to take charge of her and they are nearly all Glasgow men. Captain Dalziel is in charge, with Mr. Joss as first officer.

The War Chariot was brought north by Capt. Barney Johnson, a former resident of this city and the hero of the North Sea submarine service, who is taking advantage of the stay in town to renew old acquaintances.

SMITHERS

The work on the new town hall here is going on apace. Although the weather is rather cold for outside work the carpenters are making good progress and the building should be finished in the course of three weeks. It is a large structure and will fill a need. The crush in the Telkwa Hall at the last Barbecue dance was a fair example of how badly some large hall is needed in the district.

The oil house in the railway yards was consumed by fire last week. It is a fortunate thing that the fire confined itself to the oil house and did not catch the adjoining tank.

In a fire that lasted about ten minutes the G. T. P. car repairers' cabin was completely destroyed last Saturday. The house was steeped in oil so its destruction was quick and effective. The fire was confined to the cabin, although the coal shed got a scorching. One of the engines from the yards finally put the fire out by playing streams of water on the flames.

After working all summer putting roads and trails three of the government crews have broken up on account of the cold weather. The men from Burns Lake, Hudson Bay Mountain and the Harvey property roads have all come into town for the winter.

Wm. Boyer has bought out the entire transfer business of Thos. Herlihy who has built the outfit up from a little team of black horses to one of the biggest businesses of its kind in the interior.

W. S. Henry, agent for Ford cars in Smithers, commenced the building of a large warehouse and storeroom here on Monday last. The order for 1920 models for the local agency amounts to two cars.

Mrs. E. E. Orchard has recovered from an operation she recently underwent in Vancouver and is expected home soon.

CONTRACT FOR ATHLETIC ASSN. DRESSING ROOM

Tenders Received at Meeting Last Night—A. T. Broderick is Treasurer.

SUM OF \$1,665 BEEN ALREADY COLLECTED

At a meeting of the Prince Rupert Amateur Athletic Association held in the Board of Trade rooms last night the tenders for constructing a new dressing room in the basement of the Agricultural Building were received.

The complete work includes the erection of a chimney and the building of a stairway to connect

with the main hall. Work on this will commence at once and be pushed through to completion. The contract includes fifty lockers.

President McMordie was authorized to get tenders at once on a heating plant, the contract for which will be let by the Board of Directors just as soon as possible.

Permanent Officers.

W. O. Fulton, the association solicitor, reported incorporation complete and the temporary officers and board of directors were all confirmed in their positions with the exception of G. P. Tinker who resigned on account of press of other duties. A. T. Broderick was chosen treasurer and Mr. Harris secretary.

The chairman of the various collecting committees reported, the total amount subscribed so far amounting to \$1,665, with the

Grand Trunk employees yet to hear from. It was pointed out that at least \$2,000 would be needed in all to make the place useful.

An account has been opened at the Union Bank and anyone wishing to subscribe to the fund or to take out membership cards may pay the money to Mr. Broderick, the treasurer, or to Mr. Harris, acting secretary of the Board of Trade.

At last night's council meeting a letter was read from Theo. Coltart as agent for the General Company for the Manufacture of Water Pipes. In the letter it was announced that this Belgian company was again prepared to take orders for cast iron pipe and water distribution accessories. This company had been out of business during the war. The letter was filed for future reference.

VICTORIA ADOPTS HOUSING SCHEME

After several attempts to unload the housing scheme on to the Provincial Government, Victoria has at last adopted it. The returned soldier societies put pressure to bear and many citizens favored going ahead with the scheme. It was on several occasions referred to committees by the council and side-tracked in other ways.

74 PER CENT TAXES PAID THIS YEAR

At last night's council meeting in connection with the reading and passing of the city warrant book, the mayor remarked that this year had been the best year since 1912 for the collection of

taxes. Already 74 per cent of the taxes were paid. This was a very promising showing and indicated the confidence of the property holders in the future of their city.

The new city tractor, which will be given a trial with a view to buying, will be in the city in 30 days. Such was the information given in a letter from Shakke Co., of Vancouver, by whom the machine is being supplied.

The recommendation from the Utilities Committee to make a concrete floor under the fire hall where the city truck is to be stored was adopted by the City Council last evening.

JELICOE HAS A BUSY TIME

Makes Technical Examination of Esquimalt Harbor as a Naval Base.
