Brady's Personal Agent Will be Charged if Hunt Case is Proceeded With


L. W. Patmore Declares In Court Today That Conservatives Did Exactly What They Charge Liberals With Doing

In the police court this morning before Magistrate Mc-Clymont when G. M. Hunt was formally charged on information laid by G. R. Dawes with contravention of the Elections Act, L. W. Patmore, acting for Mr. Hunt, demanded particulars of the charges against his client, stating in what way he had contravened the act.

Mr. Patmore also stated that if the case were proceeded with he would have an information laid against one of Mr. Brady's agents, appointed under Mr. Brady's own hands, who to his knowledge took the same oath that Mr. Hunt took in connection with the voting of one of the men from the Prince George.

W. E. Fisher appeared for the prosecution and on his application the case was adjourned for eight days.

ILLEGAL PRACTICES AT ELECTION

Editor, Daily News:-

There has been considerable talk around town by an unsportsmanlike element of the Tory party that the Liberals won this election by illegal methods.

Let me say in reply that everything the Tories point to as irregular was duplicated by their own side, and they also indulged in illegal practices which the Liberals never attempted.

One glaring example is where they illegally appointed more than two agents for one polling booth in order to vote people who could not have otherwise voted. Under the Elections Act each candidate is entitled to have two agents only at each polling booth. At Seal Cove Mr. Brady appointed four, the two regular agents from the city and two other out-of-town voters, who were not entitled to vote here, and who merely presented their papers, voted and immediately left never for one moment even attempting to engage in the duties of an agent. The two original agents from the city remained all day at the booth and the others should never have been allowed to vote, and a more illegal manner of obtaining votes could not be imagined.




