WOMEN MISSIONARIES ARE MURDERED

UNEMPLOYMENT RELIEF LAUNCHED IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

British Subjects Victims of Latest Atrocities Committed In Central Chinese Province By Bandits

Miss Edith Nettleton and Miss Eleanor June Harrison Are Put to Death Following Failure of Negotiations For Ransom

PEIPING, China, Oct. 3.—Messages reaching the British consul at Foochow today said that Miss Edith Nettleton and Miss Eleanor June Harrison, British missionaries, who were captured last July at Chunghan in Northern Fukien Province, had been shot. The executions followed failure of protracted negotiations for their release in the course of which the bandits cut off one of Miss Nettleton's fingers as a dire reminder of death threats if the ransom money of \$100,000 was not forthcoming.

VANCOUVER IS COMING

First Minister of Bennett Government to Visit Prince Rupert Also Due Soon

Lieut. W. Hume, R. C. N. V. R. has received word that H. M. C. S. destroyer Vancouver will arrive at Prince Rupert on October 6.

The Chief of Naval Staff will arrive from Ottawa on October 7 and will embark in H. M. C. S. Vancouver and leave the same day for Skidegate, returning to Prince Rupert on Friday, October 10, and remaining until Monday, October 13.

The Honorable the Minister of National Defence will arrive and take passage on H. M. C. S. Vancouver to Esquimalt, arriving there on October 14.

The minister will take passage on H. M. C. S. Vancouver from Victoria to Vancouver on Saturday, October 18.

Hon. D. M. Sutherland is Minister of National Defence.

Russia Is Starving Her People To Ship Wheat; Possible That Peasants May Not Stand For It

WINNIPEG, Oct. 3.—With two of the five years set apart for their great agricultural experiment already passed, the Russian Soviet Government is planning a tremendous effort to lay their produce before the purchasing powers of the world, during the next 12 months, according to N. C. Greene, world traveller and foreign correspondent of the Christian Science Monitor, who passed through Winnipeg over the lines of the Canadian National Railways en route to Vancouver where he will spend the winter.

Mr. Greene, who has just returned to America after an extensive visit to the Soviet Republic, expressed his opinion that "although Russia is exporting a tremendous volume of wheat, she is practically starving her rural population to do so. The line between actual necessity and starvation is so finely drawn," said Mr. Greene, "that it is just a question whether Russia can continue on the rationing of her peasant population, sell her wheat, and with the money so gained, mechanize her agricultural industry so that next year a still larger amount of wheat can be sold, or whether the rural district will crack under the strain of long hours and hard labor, coupled with insufficient food, and make it necessary for the Soviet Government to turn back some of the wheat now tick-

ETOP TO DEMONSTRATE USES OF CANADIAN FLOUR AND ASSIST IN SALE

OTTAWA, Oct. 3.—In an effort to develop markets for Canadian wheat, the Dominion government has appropriated a sum of money to be used in practical demonstrations of the use of Canadian flours for baking purposes. The demonstrations will take place first at different points in the United Kingdom and subsequently will be expanded to European countries.

KETCHIKAN BRIDGE AND HOUSES SWEEP AWAY BY TORRENTS

KETCHIKAN, Oct. 3.—Stedman Street bridge and three cottages were washed out yesterday when torrential rains swept Ketchikan Creek, which flows through the town, on the rampage. The downpour continued last night and the creek is mounting to new high levels.

SEPTEMBER WET MONTH

Total of 9.53 inches of Rain Recorded—Was Good Deal of Sunshine As Well

September, with 9.53 inches of rain, was the wettest month so far this year in Prince Rupert. It was much wetter than September last year when there was only 1.04 inches of rain. During the month just past there was 121.7 hours of sunshine as compared with 177.6 hours in the same month last year.

Details of September weather as announced this morning by C. A. Mores, Djeby Island, Dominion meteorologist, were as follows: Sunshine, 121.7 hours. Rainfall, 9.53 inches. Maximum temperature, 76 on September 8. Minimum temperature, 38 on September 22 and 24. Highest barometer at sea level, 30.24 on September 18. Lowest barometer reading at sea level, 29.35 on September 26. Greatest daily rainfall, 2.53 inches on September 16.

So far this year there has been both more sunshine and more rain in Prince Rupert than during the first nine months of 1929. The sunshine so far this year has aggregated 1183.14 hours as compared with 1087.7 hours in the same period of 1929 while the rainfall is up from a total of 45.85 last year to 50.97 inches so far this year.

BENNETT ON TRADE

Imperial Conference to Come to Grips With This Problem Early Next Week

LONDON, Oct. 3.—The Imperial Conference will come to grips with the problem of Empire trade early in the coming week, Canada playing the leading part, Premier Bennett will lay before the conference his proposals for co-operation in Empire trade and he is now busy working the scheme out in detail. The scheme represents considered views to which he referred in his opening speech of the conference.

REGISTRATIONS NOW RECEIVED

Householders and Licence Holders May Get on City Voters' List This Month

This being the month of October, householders and licence holders may register with City Solicitor E. F. Jones for the municipal voters' list which will be used at next January's civic election. The first person to register as a household or licence holder this year is Einar Larsen, well known local fisherman. Registrations will be received up to October 31.

BORROWING BY CANADA

Dominion Government to Place \$100,000,000 Issue in United States Market

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—The Herald Tribune says it understands arrangements for the largest foreign government bond offering to be placed in the United States market this year are virtually completed by a banking group who will make public soon the offering of a new issue of \$100,000,000 of Canadian government four per cent bonds maturing in 30 years.

The transaction, which is to be confined to the United States and Canada markets, would place the Dominion government in funds for important refunding operations late this year and next.

OTTAWA, Oct. 3.—Officials of the department of finance today declined either to confirm or deny a news despatch from New York intimating that negotiations had been completed for a new issue of Canadian government four per cent bonds amounting to \$100,000,000.

LOG SCALE INCREASE

The timber scale in Prince Rupert district for the month of September this year aggregated 26,570,633 board feet as against 17,622,679 board feet in the same month last year. Production of poles, piles, ties, etc., in the central interior, however continued to show a heavy falling off.

During September this year pole and pile production totalled 509,276 lineal feet including 488,870 lineal feet of red cedar and 20,406 lineal feet hemlock, Cordwood and shingle bolts totalled 778 cords.

The production in September this year included 6,002 fir ties, 1,874 hemlock and 96,197 jack pine.

HUGE DAM FOR PEND ORELLE

VICTORIA, Oct. 3.—The West Kootenay Power & Light Co. will harness the hydro-electric powers of the Pend Orelle River with a dam nearly four hundred feet high, the greatest of its kind in Canada, it was learned yesterday.

Premier Tolmie Asks Municipalities What Assistance Is Needed

Aid to Be Given In Work to Be Carried On—Unorganized Districts Are Also to Be Taken Care Of

VICTORIA, Oct. 3.—The provincial government prepared yesterday to provide early unemployment relief in British Columbia. After receipt of the federal government's relief regulations, Premier Tolmie issued formal invitations to municipalities all over the province to inform the department of public works immediately what assistance they will require in conducting relief work. Meanwhile, the government is preparing to start public works in unorganized districts and will negotiate direct with the federal government for assistance.

TO TAKE CHARGE OF ARMY CORPS ON NAAS RIVER

Capt. Kenny, former local Salvation Army officer, arrived in the city on the Princess Mary this morning from Rossland, where she has been stationed for the past few years, and will proceed Sunday night on the Catala to Canyon City on the Naas River where she will take charge of a new Army corps and native school which has been opened there. Staff Captain Joseph Acton, who is expected here on Sunday afternoon from Wrangell, and Adjutant William Kerr, local commandant, will accompany Capt. Kenny to Canyon City to conduct the opening of a new army hall there.

Capt. Kenny is accompanied here by Miss Jessie Weeks of Winnipeg who will reside with her at Canyon City.

TROLLER IS CONDEMNED

Admiralty Court Judge Delivers Judgment in Case of Boat May, Seized Off Rose Spit

Mr. Justice Archer Martin, in Admiralty Court, has delivered his judgment in the case of the American troller May which was seized by the fishery patrol off Rose Spit last summer, ordering the craft condemned.

Decisions are still reserved in the cases of three other American boats which were seized off Rose Spit.

Hansard Report of Hanson's Speech In House Advocating Tie Cutting For Unemployment

Recently in the House of Commons, Olof Hanson, M. P. for Skeena, advanced the suggestion that the railways of Canada might place advance orders of ties in order to help alleviate unemployment. Press despatches told of Mr. Hanson's speech but very briefly. The following from Hansard is an official account of it:

Mr. Hanson (Skeena): I do not think, Mr. Chairman, that this is the time to deal with the hours of labor because this special session has been called for the purpose of providing employment. I want to direct a suggestion to the Prime Minister which I believe would provide considerable employment. Our Canadian railways from time to time are buying considerable quantities of material which is necessary for the maintenance of the railways. If they would buy hand-made material, which is equally as good as machinery-made material, whenever they can get it for the same price, it would result in providing much more work.

Mr. Woodsworth: I rise to a point of order, Mr. Chairman. There is a definite amendment now before the chair providing for certain labor provisions, and I submit that we ought not to get away from that and take up another matter altogether, as I believe the present speaker is doing.

The Chairman: I think the point of order is well founded. I am afraid the house will agree with me that the rules have not been always followed in this discussion. I think the hon. member is not speaking to the amendment at all.

PENALTY FOR NON-PAYMENT

The city council at its meeting Wednesday night decided to ask for the abolition of the fifteen per cent penalty for non-payment of taxes and ask that the penalty be set at something between fifteen and five. Nanaimo city is asking for reduction to five per cent.

The penalty for non-payment is imposed for the purpose of inducing people to pay their taxes on time so that the city may not have to borrow money to carry on the necessary work. If some do not pay others must pay more to allow the work to proceed, the rate being set that much higher to provide for such a contingency. Under present conditions taxes are coming in well and people are making an effort to pay up regularly. If a change is made there is no telling what may be the result.

It is claimed that in Ontario the rate is five per cent but five per cent means much more to a person in Ontario than it does in British Columbia. Money is not valued in this province as it is anywhere else in the Dominion. The people look at things differently.

It is hardly likely that the legislature will agree to reduce the penalty to five per cent because the members understand the situation, but there is a possibility that it will be reduced to something like ten per cent, and that may be a good thing. If there is hardship without corresponding benefit in the present system, then it should be changed, but if the benefits are not commensurate with the disabilities no change should be made.

RAILWAYS GIVE WORK

Good news arrived from Ottawa Wednesday when it was announced that the railways would provide for ten thousand men during the winter on construction and improvement work. That is a pretty good start in the employment campaign, but a great deal more will be necessary. Provision must be made so that none will go hungry as a result of lack of employment.

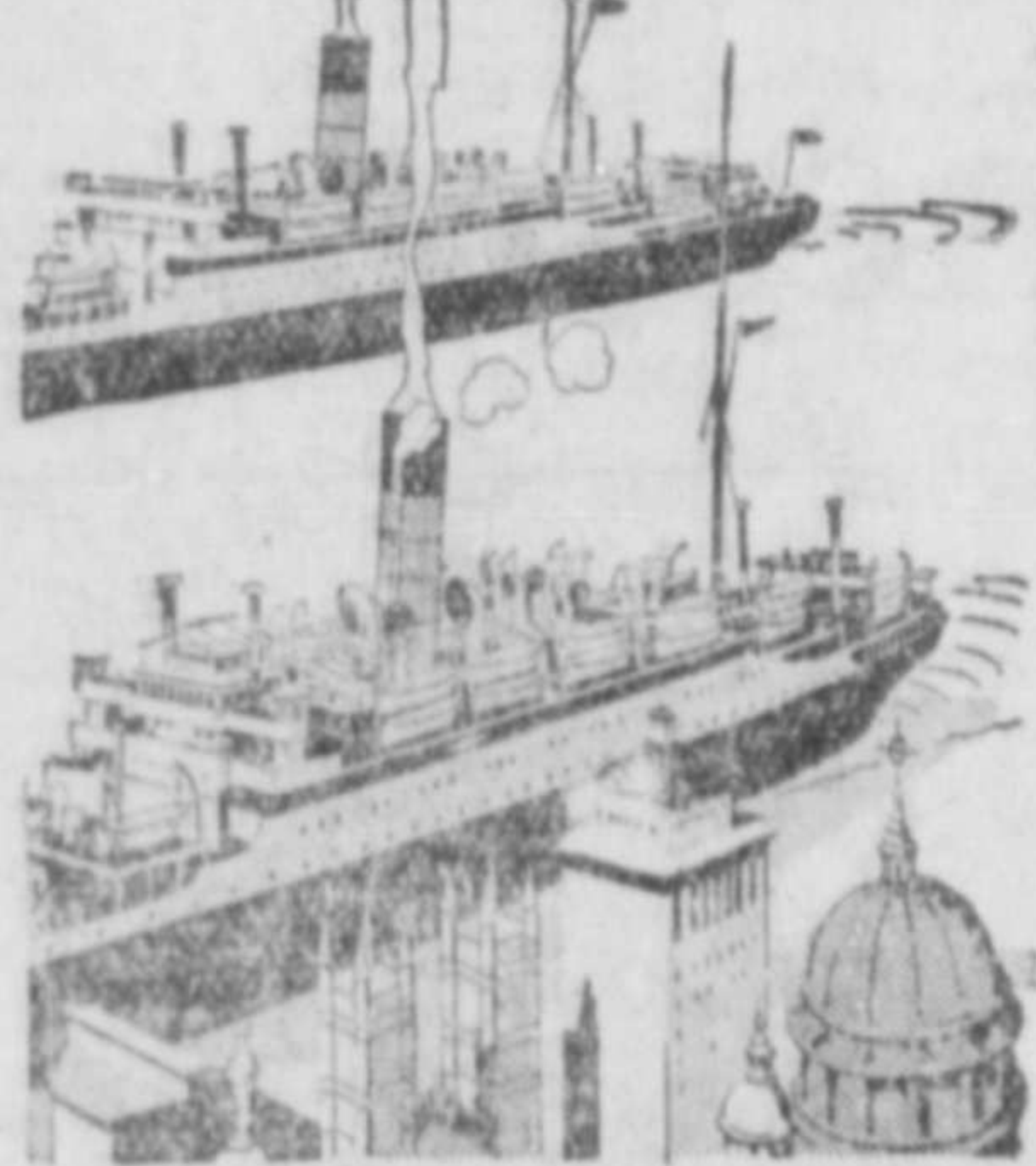



Hansard Report of Hanson's Speech In House On Tie Cutting

(continued from page 1)

Chairman, that if the railways would buy material of the same quality and quantity, but hand-made, it would give four times as much employment as machinery-made materials.

Mr. Mackenzie (Vancouver Centre): I submit, Mr. Chairman, that the hon. member for Skeena is making a very practical suggestion which I am sure the Prime Minister will appreciate.

The Chairman: If the house consents.

Some hon. Members: Let him go on.

Mr. Hanson (Skeena): By employing hand labor to take out ties and bridge materials the Canadian National Railways and the Canadian Pacific Railway could employ four times as many men as they now employ on that work. I would further suggest that these materials be procured from those sections of the country where there are established settlers, and that the settlers who are settled along these lines of railway should have the privilege of working on these contracts.

Mr. Maléolm: I think the suggestion of my hon. friend from Skeena is worthy of consideration. I am glad to know from the minister of railways that some thought is being given to this plan. I would submit to the minister of labor and his labor friends that what the hon. friend for Skeena says is most true. This session was called, not to argue about hours of labor, but to assist the government in finding employment for men who are out of work. The question of hours of employment and labor conditions is really too big a subject to deal with at this special session of Parliament, especially at this time when the Prime Minister and his colleagues are anxious to get away. The hon. member for Skeena, who has just spoken, and I am glad that the chair gave him the privilege of speaking, is the first member, born in a non-English speaking country, who has ever occupied a seat in this chamber. He is a practical man of Scandinavian birth and knows what he is talking about. He points out that if this government would ask the Canadian Pacific Railway and the Canadian National Railways to lay out ten million ties each, which would not be their whole year's supply, by hand labor, 8,000 men would be given employment for 100 days, and the employment would be spread from Vancouver to Halifax. It is a practical suggestion, and I am glad to know that the minister of railways is considering it. I am speaking on behalf of my hon. friend from Skeena, who explained his thoughts to me today. All the government would have to do would be to assure the Canadian Pacific and the Canadian National that the government would provide the interest charges for the extra time the railways had to carry this stock of ties. If the work were done in the woods forty men would be employed instead of ten as employed in a mill, and a better tie would be supplied. The government is to be congratulated on receiving the practical suggestion of my hon. friend from Skeena. The committee would be better employed in assisting the government by practical suggestions because, after all, to find employment is the real object of this session than by discussing the treaty of Versailles.

Conductor W. D. Moxley, who has taken over the run between Smithers and Prince George for the winter, came into town on yesterday afternoon's train from the interior for a brief visit at his home here.

Rev. Alfred Wilson Visited Native Home in England and Attended United Church Council

Rev. Alfred Wilson, pastor of First United Church here, returned to the city on yesterday afternoon's train after an absence of two months.

During his absence, Mr. Wilson spent a glorious three weeks visiting his native home in Devon, Eng. He crossed the Atlantic on the way over on the steamer Ausonia and came back on the Ascania. The weather was fine on the ocean both going and coming. Indeed, the return trip was almost a record for lack of fog at this time of year. Even the trip through the Straits of Belle Isle was favored with clear weather.

Returning to the city, Mr. Wilson stopped off at London, Ont., where he attended the general council meetings of the United Church of Canada.

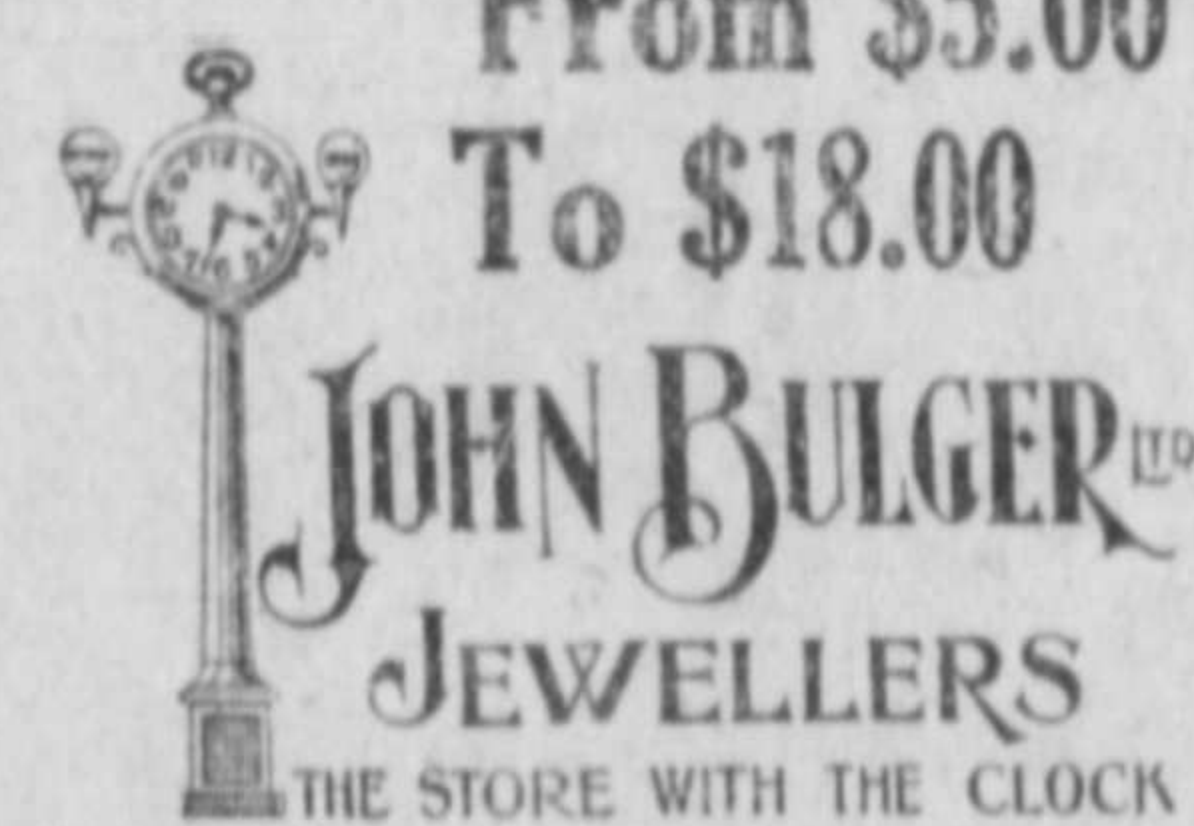
