SAFETY OF BURKE PARTY IS ASSURED

COUNCIL EXPLAINS RELIEF PLANS TO PUBLIC AT MEETING

Plane Was Undamaged and Tied To Beach; Occupants Had Left And Are Believed to Be Safe

May Have Gone Out In Search of Food - Two Pacific International Planes Held at Telegraph Creek Still By Adverse Weather

Latest word received through the Government Telegraphs from Atlin announce that Pilot E. L. Wasson of the Treadwell-Yukon Co. made an examination yesterday of Capt. E. J. A. Burke's plane on the small lake, fifty miles from Wolf Lake, and found that the machine was undamaged, a successful forced landing having evidently been made.

FIRED ON IS CLAIM

Protest to Be Made to United States In Connection With Seizure of Liquor Laden Boat

PROVIDENCE, Nov. 26.—Complaint may be made to the Canadian government that the British motorboat Good Luck, captured with five hundred sacks of liquor on board off Block Island last Sunday, was fired upon and struck by at least one one-inch shell and machine gun bullets and was rammed by the coastguard destroyer Porter.

BIG TOLL OF 'QUAKE

Two Hundred and Fifty Known to Be Dead In Japanese Disaster

TOKIO, Nov. 26.—The death toll from today's earthquake in Izu Peninsula reached 250 tonight when reports from nearly all districts were compiled. One hundred and fifty two were injured. Six hundred and forty-five houses were destroyed and nearly 5000 buildings were seriously damaged.

There are 223 known dead in the Izu region and 27 in Hakone district. It is estimated that 30,000 people are camping out in shelters.

CHANGES IN IMMIGRATION

President Hoover Expresses Views In Agreement With Senator Reed of Pennsylvania

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—More selective and flexible immigration laws were held by President Herbert Hoover yesterday to be needed. The chief executive's immigration views were expressed as being in general agreement with those recently announced by Senator Reed of Pennsylvania.

Reed proposed stopping of all immigration from both quota and non-quota countries.

Financial Man Visiting City

NO RESULT IN SEARCH

Planes Had Good Day Yesterday and Made Best of Auspicious Weather

On Graham Island

No Word As to Fruits of Operations By Three Planes in Country Around Ketchikan

With ideal weather conditions prevailing, Flight Lieutenant Phinney and Flying Officer Dunlap got in six hours' flying apiece yesterday in the search for Pilot Robin Renahan and his two companions, who have been missing for over four weeks, but without success in finding any trace whatever of the missing flyers.

Leaving here, the Air Force machines proceeded immediately to Graham Island. After they had searched the north end of the island, a stop was made at Massett where it was found that the residents had already been on the look-out for wreckage although none had yet been found.

On their return from the islands, Flight Lieut. Phinney and Flying Officer Dunlap made another examination of the Dundas Islands and then proceeded to Portland Inlet. Phinney then flew over Warke Canal while Dunlap came down the coastline. The day's operations were completed with an inspection of the country just behind the city and island.

Despite an apparently impending change in weather, the government flyers left at 1:30 a.m. today to check up the area between Butedale and Lowe Inlet. That country has not yet been covered in view of (Continued on Page 4.)

Provincial Cabinet Is Making Plans to Put Beer Sale Here On New and Improved Basis

VICTORIA, Nov. 26.—Three plans for the putting of beer sale in British Columbia on a new basis are under investigation by a committee of the cabinet, it is stated in authoritative circles. The proposals are:

First, importation of beer from other provinces for sale in liquor stores and beer parlors in competition with the British Columbia product.

Second, granting of brewing licences to one or more outside firms so that they may manufacture beer here in competition with existing breweries.

Third, the establishment of a government brewery to insure that British Columbia breweries manufacture beer of quality and at a price satisfactory to the government.

WAITING FOR NEWS

May Be Some Time Before Anything Further Is Heard of Capt. Burke

While the whole outside world anxiously awaits confirmation of radio reports that Capt. E. J. A. Burke and two companions, whose plane was located in the Frances Lake district north of Atlin on Monday, are alive and well, prospects are excellent now that they are safe. The fact that a good landing was made indicates this.

It might take quite a time to find Burke, however, as he and his companions may by this time be a long distance from where they deserted their plane.

PULP MILL IN ALASKA

Huge Projects Planned By United States to Meet Canada's Newsprint Monopoly

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—United States plans to break the virtual newsprint monopoly of Canada through the establishment of a power and paper plant in Alaska are before the federal power commission.

Last August the commission considered applications for licences to construct two such projects to cost approximately \$30,000,000.

The potential pulp production in Alaska is estimated at a million tons yearly by forest service experts.

WORKLESS INCREASE

Over Twenty-Eight Thousand Persons Joined Ranks of Unemployed Last Month

OTTAWA, Nov. 26.—The Canadian army of the unemployed received 28,367 recruits during October, it is shown in Dominion Bureau of Statistics reports based on information furnished by every large industrial firm in the country.

The bureau places the number of men and women employed on November 1 at 993,817 as compared with 1,022,184 on October 1.

The decline in employment, the bureau said, is greater than the average recession reported between October 1 and November 1 during the past 10 years.

New Building Nearly Ready

Government Liquor Vendor's Block At Third Avenue and Second Street Nearing Finish

Fishing touches are being put on the new government liquor vendor's building on the northeast corner of Third Avenue and Second Street, the painting of the exterior having commenced this morning. The interior is also nearing completion and it will only be a matter of a short time now before the building is ready for occupation.

Large Public Meeting Gives Tacit Approval to Proposals For Unemployment Work Here

No opposition to the two bylaws to be voted on Friday developed at the meeting of ratepayers held in the council chamber last night. There was a large attendance, even standing room being at a premium. Those present listened patiently to explanations given by the mayor and aldermen, asked a few questions and then adjourned. It seemed to be an almost unanimous gathering in favor of the bylaws.

In opening, Mayor Orme explained the object of the meeting. There were approximately 400 unemployed in the city many of whom were residents and married people with families. Work had to be found for these and advantage had been taken of an offer from the government. The two pieces of work provided for in the bylaws were designed to give a maximum of employment at a minimum cost.

If the men were hungry they had to be fed, the mayor said. It was better to give them some useful work so that they might retain their self-respect, rather than make them the recipients of charity. If the bylaws did not pass the cost of providing for the unemployment would have to come out of next year's revenue.

Fred Wesch asked if the \$1600 provided by the governments had to be repaid. The answer was that it would not.

Mr. Wesch: "Is it true that if the bylaws are defeated the city cannot claim the money from the government?"

The Mayor: "That is the situation." Frank Hart said he was satisfied with the road bylaw but not with the sewer. He told of incidents in connection with his own sewer payments.

The engineer explained that this was a main sewer and would have to be built by the city anyway. While the cost would be higher under the relief plan the work done would prove useful.

Alderman Macdonald explained that the council had expected a larger sum from the government for relief work but had been disappointed. The aim of the city council was to take care of the unemployment. They were faced with a more acute condition than had been seen here before in many years. The council had acted in the best possible manner. One reason for choosing Eleventh Avenue was because it cost as much to maintain the avenue at present as it would to make the payment on the improvements.

In reply to a question the engineer stated that every man on this work would have to do as much as he was able. Any man who lay down on the job would have to get out right away.

The Best Proposal

M. P. McCaffery suggested that the only way to take advantage of the offer of the government was to undertake this work, which was mostly labor. He had looked over the city and come to the conclusion that this was the best proposal. This (continued on page 5)

HARROWING EXPERIENCE

Sitka Hunting Party Club to Surf-Beaten Rock For 48 Hours and Saved Lives

JUNEAU, Nov. 26.—Forty-eight hours of tenacious clinging to a rock which was pounded and battered by surf after their launch had been smashed on the rocks when returning from a hunting trip saved the lives of Theodore Kettleton, superintendent of the Alaska Pioneers' Home, Dr. J. Hogins, Alfred Tilson and Hugh Frederickson, all of Sitka.

The members of the party were rescued Sunday morning from the surf-beaten rock by the passing motorship Estebeth and taken to Sitka.

ELECTION UNLIKELY

Government Has No Intention of Bringing On General Contest For Several Years

VICTORIA, Nov. 26.—Asked if the nominating convention at Burns Lake by the Omineca Conservative Association indicated a general appeal to the country following the next session of the legislature, Premier Tolmie answered in the negative. The action of the Omineca Conservative Association was purely a local affair, the Premier said. He added that there was no thought of holding a general election for several years.

SHOT BY OFFICERS

Ray Sutherland, Killer of Prohibition Officials, Taken Dead In Oregon Woods

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 26.—Ray Sutherland, aged 67, of Marcola, Ore., slayer of two prohibition officers several months ago, was killed in a gun battle with deputies yesterday.

The officers, who had been trailing Sutherland for 11 days, finally surrounded him in timbered hills between Oak Ridge and West Fir east of here.

Sutherland elected to shoot his way out instead of surrendering so lost his life in the bargain.

### MOTOR CAR IS PAYING

Tourist Trade Has Become Great Industry in Canada—Far Cry From "Oldest Inhabitant's" Memories

TORONTO, Nov. 26:—"Quite a lot of cars with American licenses goin' through this year," said the oldest inhabitant, as he whittled a soft piece of pine in the sunlight of an autumn day. "Seems to me, there are also quite a few with Canadian licenses," he continued. "I remember well, not so many years ago, when a 'furrin' car was quite a curiosity—and now, well, just watch those licenses." He checked the passing cars off. Michigan, New York, Indiana, even an occasional California motor passed. One stopped every few

minutes as the tourists shopped. Then away it went again.

And this, according to the very unromantic and prosaic figures compiled by Prof. Kenneth W. Taylor, M.A., economist of McMaster University at Toronto, is the source of one of Canada's greatest industries.

Addressing a group of business men recently, Prof. Taylor outlined the growth and importance of tourist traffic. The traffic had increased enormously in the past 10 years, he said. In 1920, 2,279,000 visitors spent altogether about 7,500,000 days in Canada—and also spent about \$84,000,000. In 1925, however, approximately 8,000,000 tourists spent \$22,500,000 and \$187,000,000. This figure rose steadily, until in 1929, an army of 16,000,000 tourists invaded the country. They spent 40,000,000 days, and the amazing total of \$300,000,000. No other important industry in Canada has shown anything

like such rapid and consistent growth, Prof. Taylor said. Substantial annual increases in the number of visitors are almost certain to occur. "We may, I think, look forward to an annual influx of between 20,000,000 and 25,000,000 and possibly 30,000,000 visitors before the close of the next decade," he said.

#### Leading Industry

In 1929, in dollar value of business, the tourist trade was exceeded only by field crops, iron and steel, construction, railway and textile industries. It ranked well ahead of mining, lumbering, milling, meat packing, fishing and other staple

lines. It was greater than the value of our entire exports of wood, wood products and paper, and was within 10% of our grain products exports. Last year, the tourist revenue was equal to one quarter of Canada's export trade.

In that year, tourists consumed over 4,000,000 pounds of butter; 18,000,000 pounds of meat; 4,000,000 dozen eggs, and other commodities in like proportion, Prof. Taylor said.

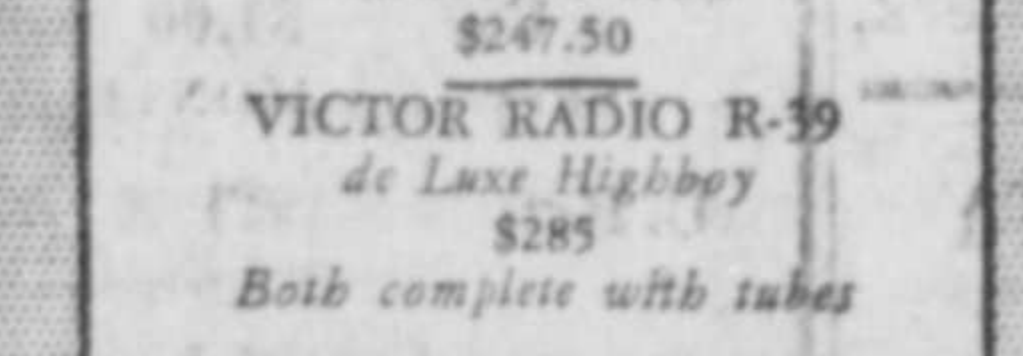
