LONDON, April 3.—The naval conference here yesterday decided to adjourn the proposed plenary session until next week when it is hoped that their plans will be matured for some definite arrangement which may be incorporated in a five-power pact.

STAMP TAX IS UPHELD

Chief Justice Morrison Dismisses Test Case of Miller, Court & Co.

VANCOUVER, April 3.—Validity of the federal stamp tax on transfer of stocks and bonds has been upheld in the Supreme Court by Chief Justice Aulay Morrison who, in a test case, dismissed the appeal of Miller, Court & Co. Ltd. from a decision of Magistrate Henry C. Shaw which imposed a fine of \$100 upon the brokerage firm for failing to affix stamps as required.

Unemployment In the States Before Congress

WASHINGTON, April 3.—The question of unemployment is still agitating the minds of congressmen here. A bill now before the Senate fathered by Senator Wagner provides for the expenditure of \$154,000,000 to be devoted to creation of public buildings as emergency measures in case such action should be necessary.

Of several other bills dealing with unemployment, that to provide for a national clearing house is the most important. It is pointed out here that Canada has her employment bureaus through which information can be secured as to employment conditions in all parts of the country, but it is proposed to go even farther than that here. The exact terms of the bill have not yet been stated.

GIANT OF OLD N. S.

Ancient Poems Tell of Famous Giant Angus of Englishtown

He lived in Englishtown, St. Anne's Bay, Cape Breton, and has been dead a long, long time, says a Sydney, N.S., paper. He was born on one of the Scotch Isles and came to Canada when three years old. He was nearly eight feet tall; he weighed 480 pounds and was one of the strongest men known in all history. There is a brother of his still living on the old McAskill farm at Englishtown and he has some of his brother's clothing that he is pleased to show visitors.

Two big men can button themselves in the giant's vest and I have seen an 80-pound boy almost buried out of sight in one of his boots.

One of his feats of strength, the one "The Song Fishermen's Union" likes best, is told in the following "Come All Ye."

(A 'Come All Ye' is the old-fashioned form of telling a story in rhyme.)

He wasn't a giant,
He wasn't a freak;
Just a braw Scotch laddie,
Humble and meek;
Reared in the North,
Where the winds are strong
And nature's toughness
Makes folks shun wrong;
He loved to work,
He loved the kirk,
And for a bit of fun
He wouldn't shirk.

To this big handsome boy
A plow was a toy,
And a stump that two oxen would
back at,
He would yank out at ease,
Then fall on his knees
And thank God for his strength,
For his farm, for his trees.

Turned the Tables

(Long Rory suggested that they "take some fun off Angus" and ask him to help them haul the big fishing boat up the shore. The idea was that they should all perk away and upset Big Angus at the other end, into the sea.)

The wind winged their whispering
to Angus
And he smiled as he waded to
help,

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TROOPS STILL
HERE IN 1854

Fear of the United States Led to
Increase in Kingston
Forces in 1861

KINGSTON, April 3.—Some time ago a discussion arose as to when the Imperial troops were withdrawn from Canada. One writer intimated it was as early as 1854, but this is incorrect. Imperial troops were then withdrawn from Canada for service in the Crimean War, but some of those who survived were

returned and still others were sent out from England.

An aged resident of Clayton, N.Y., John Bazinet, who lived in Kingston as a lad, told the writer he recalled Imperial troops marching back from the Crimean War and parading over the old Catarqui bridge to Fort Henry, opposite Kingston, in 1857. This fort was the home of the Royal Artillery in those days. Dominion Archives records show that the last Imperial troops to leave Kingston, after it had been decided that Canada would supply its own soldiers to do garrison work, was a battery of Royal Garrison Artillery which left here for England in the autumn of 1870. The Imperial gov-

ernment presented the Canadian government with all military lands and fortresses it had maintained since the days of the French regime.

Records show that in 1854, the year the Crimean War broke out, the 54th Regiment of Foot, now the 1st Battalion of the Norfolk Regiment, relieved the 54th Foot prior to October, 1854. In 1855 the 9th Regiment of Foot, was relieved by the Royal Canadian Rifles, recruited from Imperial Army men whose time had expired and therefore, wholly Imperial in composition.

Parade Strength

A parade statement on file in the

Ottawa Archives, dated Nov. 1, 1835, gives the strength of Imperial troops stationed at Kingston as follows:

- Royal Artillery, 14 other ranks.
- Royal Engineers, 1 officer.
- 16th Regiment of Foot, 1 other rank.
- 54th Regiment of Foot, 1 other rank.
- Royal Canadian Regiment, 15 officers and 398 other ranks.
- Staff clerks, 1 other rank.
- Total strength, 17 officers and 413 other ranks.

In 1861, owing to "The Trent Incident," and the danger of war with the United States, Imperial forces in Canada were largely augmented.

The official record shows a full battery of Royal Artillery, with other Regulars, was stationed at Kingston for a time, that city being so close to the United States border.

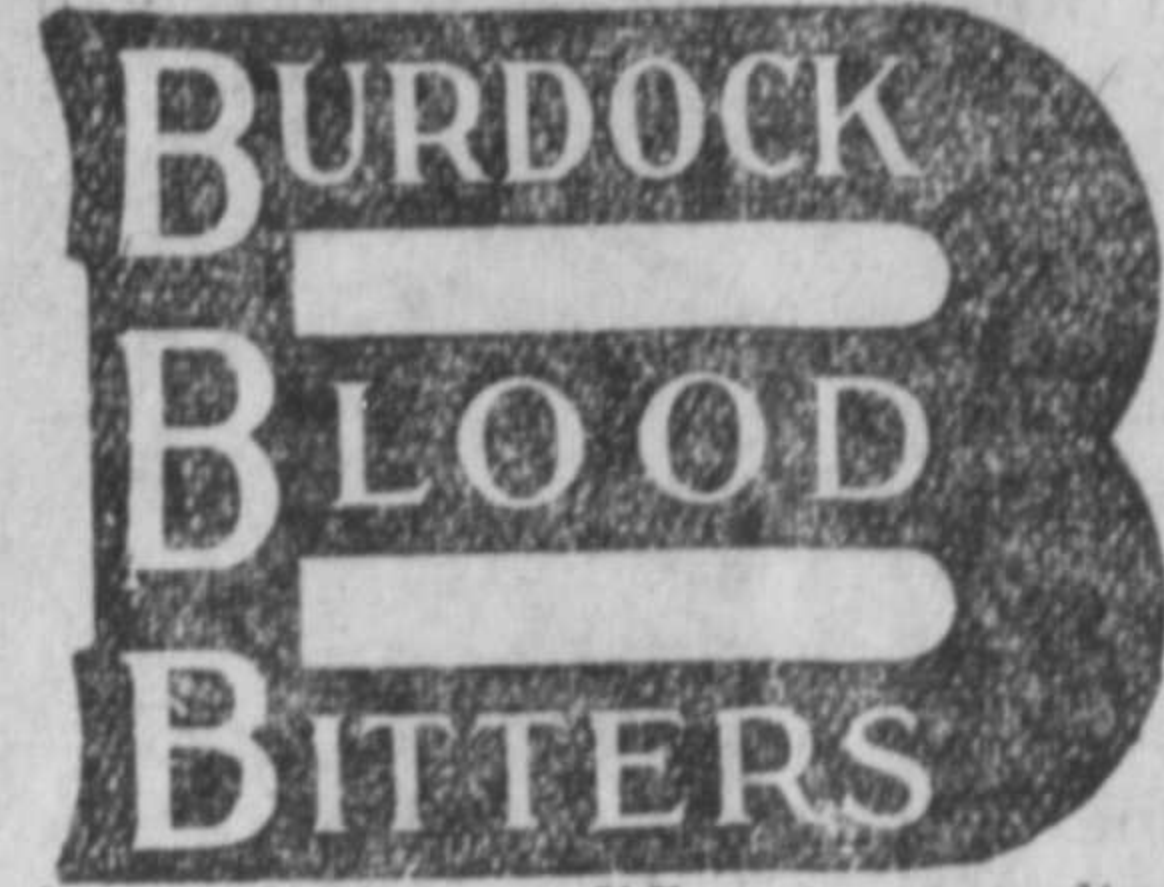

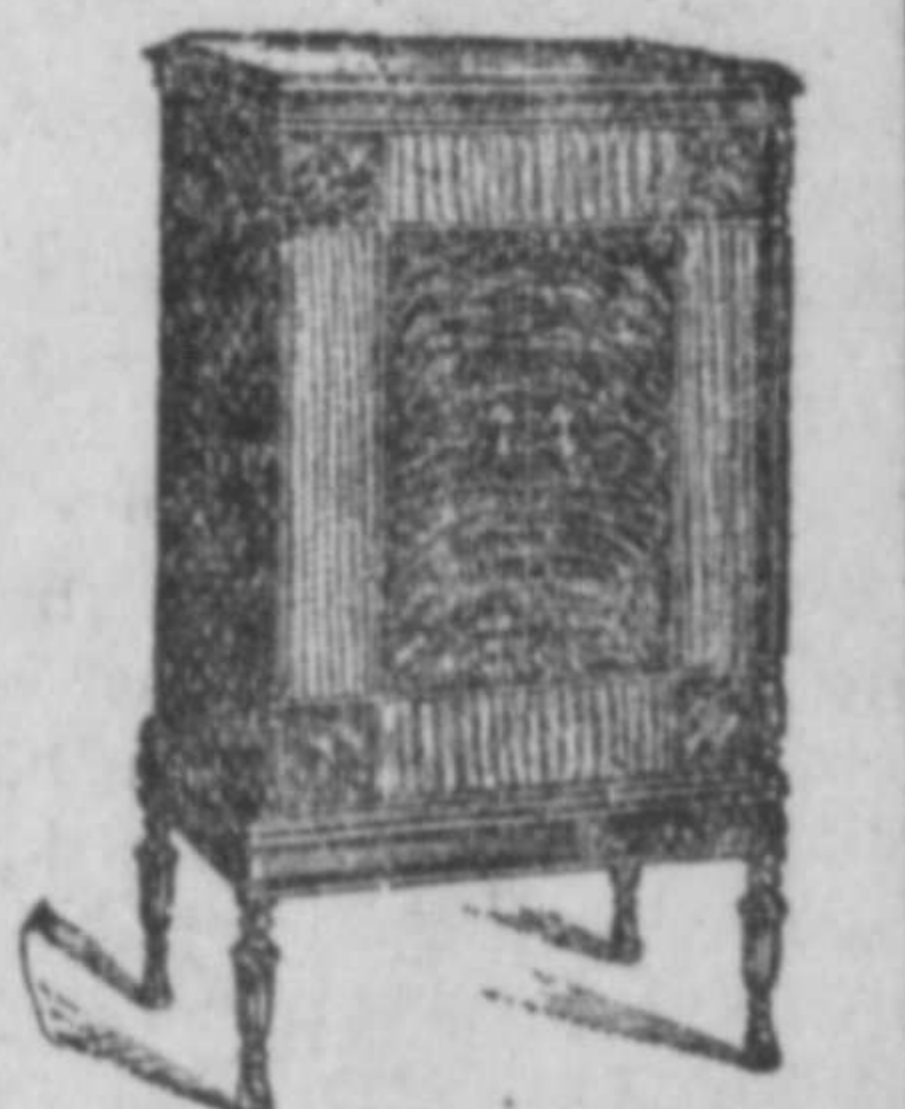

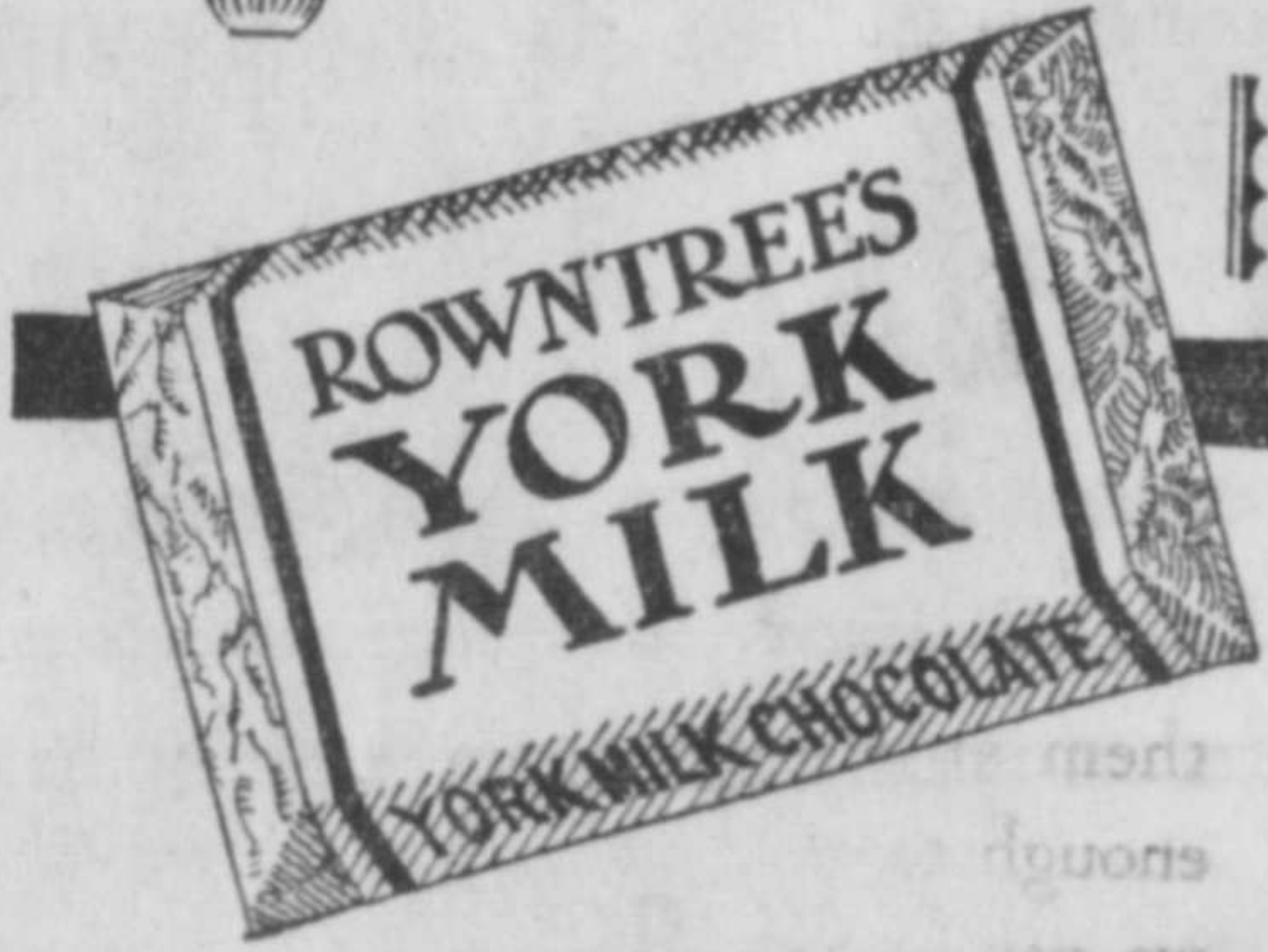

AIR MAIL INCREASES

New Service on Prairies Proving Very Popular

WINNIPEG, April 3.—Air mail out of Winnipeg has been increasing at the rate of four or five pounds every day, in the mail carried over the prairies, according to W. Lee Brintnell, operating manager of Western Canada Airways in a recent interview here. He stated that business houses were starting to use the air mail, and a considerable amount of mail which was stamped for air travel was coming from the eastern provinces.

The success of the prairie air mail was shown in the fact that little more than a week's operation the new service was being patronized to a greater extent than any of the air mail services in Eastern Canada, Mr. Brintnell said. He attributed this in large part to the realization of the saving in time that could be effected over the long distances covered by the air mail service over the prairies.

No passenger service is operated

in connection with the carrying of mail by aeroplane and up to present no definite plans for conveying passengers on the aeroplanes have been made, according to the officials of the Canadian Airways. It is possible, however, that the question of conveying passengers will be considered in the near future.

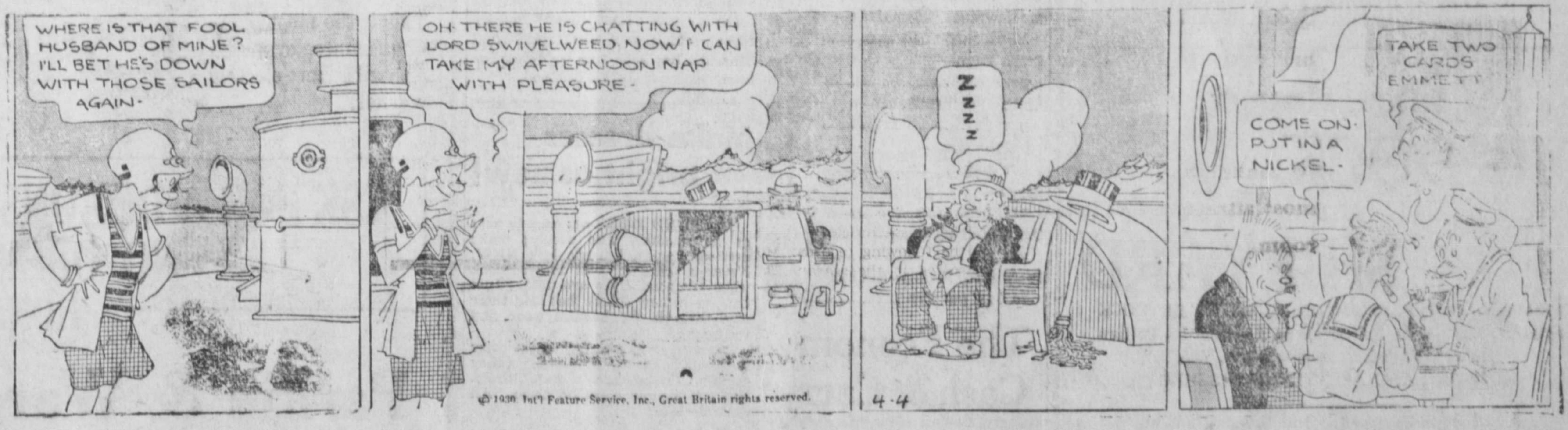

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PRESS MEN WILL MEET IN ENGLAND

Plans for Imperial Press Conference Include Many Important Events

LONDON, April 3.—Plans for the entertainment of the delegates to the Imperial Press Conference which is to be held in London beginning June 3, attended by prominent newspaper men from Canada and other parts of the British Empire, as the program was outlined by the president of the Empire Press Union, Major Hon. John Ascar, M.P., chairman of the Times publishing company at the recent annual meeting of the union, include a week in London, a week in England outside the metropolis, and a week in Scotland. The party will attend a reception of the King and Queen at Buckingham Palace.

During the week in London the visitors will be entertained at the Houses of Parliament, and at the Royal Academy. There will be a government reception at Hampton Court Palace, and visits will be paid by the delegates to several industrial centres and places of historic interest.

The London program will include a banquet at Guildhall over which the Lord Mayor, Sir William Alfred Waterlow, will preside; a luncheon given by the Empire Parliamentary Association in Westminster Hall, with the Speaker of the House of Commons in the chair; a dinner by the Royal Empire Society to bring the delegates in touch with ex-Governor Generals, Viceroy and High Commissioners; dinner by the Empire Press Union, and other dinners and luncheons. There will be visits to the Derby, to Ascot, to the Aldershot Tattoo, and to naval, military and Air Force displays. There will be a government reception at Hampton Court, at which the Premier, J. Ramsay MacDonald, will receive the delegates and there will be private week-end parties which will take the visitors into the country from June 14 to 16.

To Liverpool

In the second week the delegates will be taken to Liverpool and the industrial districts around Bradford and Doncaster to see something of the conditions in the textile and coal mining worlds. They will visit Warwick Castle and will spend a morning at Stratford-on-Avon.

During the third week the party will go to Scotland, stopping on the way for a few hours at Coventry where they will be shown something of mass production. The Lord Provost of Edinburgh has expressed a wish to help in every way he can to make the visit in Scotland a memorable one for the visiting press men.

In connection with the Conference sessions in London the delegates will be enabled to see something of the leading statesmen and to hear their views on important questions. With this subject two sessions will be devoted to the government and one session to each of the opposition parties. Prime Minister MacDonald has promised, if possible to address the opening session on Tuesday, June 3. Lloyd George, former prime minister, will give an address on June 6, and former Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin will speak on June 25. There will be four other sessions, at which the delegates will discuss communications, cables, wireless, the air mails and other matters, such as newspaper production and advertising.
