BOMBAY, May 5:-Mahatma Gandhi, Nationalist leader, whose arrest for being the prime mover in the civil disobedience campaign has been frequently predicted during the past week, was taken into custody yesterday at the village of Jalapur.

LONDON, May 5:-Rt. Hon. Wedgewood Benn, Secretary of State for India, today told a questioner in the House of Commons that, following the arrest of Mahatma Gandhi, the authorities were in complete control of the situation in India.

WINNIPEG, May 5:-Practically all points throughout the prairie provinces report the land holding sufficient moisture to insure rapid germination but cool weather and frosty nights have been prevalent, with the result that nearly all points feel the need of warm weather to promote growth, according to the first crop report of the agricultural branch of the Canadian National Railways. Many points in the park belt areas of Northern Saskatchewan and Alberta report an increase of acreage over last year. However, it appears as if the increase of acreage seeded to wheat will not be greater than a year ago, as the new land is mostly being seeded to coarse grains.
