ANOTHER BUDGET AMENDMENT MADE

New Iron and Steel Schedules Objected To By The Progressives

Position of Agriculture and Labor Not Considered, 'Tis Said—Conservatives Expected to Support Government

OTAWA, May 9.—W. R. Fansher, Progressive for Last Mountain, Saskatchewan, yesterday moved a sub-amendment to the Conservative budget amendment stating that it was to be regretted that more effective consideration had not been given to the position of agriculture and labor but that, on the contrary, changes made in iron and steel tariff schedules would result in increased cost with respect to all structural work and machinery of production and, further, that the best interests of Canada would be served by a more substantial increase in the British preference, particularly as affecting textiles and other articles of similar character.

When it comes to a vote, it is expected Conservatives will unite with the government against the sub-amendment.

New Halibut Treaty, Holding Additional Fishing Rules, Is Signed By States and Canada

OTTAWA, May 9.—A treaty between Canada and the United States for the purpose of securing preservation of the halibut fisheries in the North Pacific Ocean was signed today in the office of Prime Minister Mackenzie King. Mr. King signed on behalf of Canada while B. R. Riggs, United States charge d'affaires, signed for the United States. The new treaty has grown out of the halibut treaty signed at Washington in 1923 and brings into effect important recommendations made by the International Commission

FREE TRADE DEAD ISSUE

Stanley Baldwin Says He Will Restore All Safeguarding Duties Snowden Has Removed

SHEFFIELD, Eng., May 9.—"There is not a single duty of which Mr. Snowden is now depriving the manufacturers of this country when he removes safeguarding duties that we shall not have the greatest pleasure in putting on again the moment we return to power," Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin, Conservative leader, said last night here when he opened his campaign for Home and Empire. "Events of the last year have washed away for all time the last foundations of the fortress of free trade in this country," proclaimed Mr. Baldwin.

Olof Hanson Is Attending Funeral of Brother Bert

Word has been received in the city of the death of Bert Hanson, pole operator, at Kamloops. He is a brother of Olof Hanson of this city who is expecting to arrive at Kamloops Sunday in time for the funeral which takes place Monday.

John Hanson of Cedarvale, another brother, is already at Kamloops. The deceased was a single man and lived at Smithers in the early days.

WILL PROSPECT FOR SUMMER HERRING

Government Has Made Grant To Aid Search For Fresh Fish Bait

Sum of \$1500 Per Month For Three Months to Pay For Operation of Boat Secured Through Instrumentality of Olof Hanson

Through the instrumentality of Olof Hanson, who has recently been at Ottawa, arrangements have been made whereby the federal department of fisheries will expend \$1500 a month for three months for a boat to go into waters adjacent to this port and prospect for herring for summer bait for the halibut fleet. It will also be ascertained if herring can be obtained during the summer for Scotch mild curing. Both gill nets and seines will be used in the prospecting operations.

The Canadian Halibut Vessel Owners' Association for a long time has been agitating for a boat to be used in prospecting for summer herring and news that one is to be provided has been received with considerable gratification by that organization. There are believed to be good summer herring in the neighborhood of the Queen Charlotte Islands.

BANDITRY TERRIBLE

Whole Town in China Wiped Out With Fifteen Thousand Slaughtered

SHANGHAI, May 9.—Climaxing China's unparalleled banditry in recent months, 15,000 Chinese of Yung Yang in Honan Province were killed on April 23, according to unconfirmed reports reaching here today.

The dispatches state that the looting, burning and killing lasted four days. The town was obliterated and nothing left of it but ruins.

BOAT SINKS TOTAL LOSS

Capt. George Ness' Packer C. and N. Founders After Sudden Explosion

Reporting the loss of his well known fish packer C. and N. in Ogden Channel not far from Oona River following an explosion about noon on Wednesday, Capt. George Ness reached town today with Capt. Ed. Johnson aboard the troller Moose.

The explosion occurred very suddenly and without any manner of warning and was so severe as to stun Ness and throw his companion clear through the pilot house window on to the deck. Recovering themselves, the two men took to a dinghy and stood by for two hours, not leaving their vessel until it had sunk a total loss in the deep water of Ogden Channel. Then they rowed to Oona River whence the trolling boat brought them on to town.

When the accident occurred, the C. and N. was being brought by Ness from his fox farm home at Kitkatla Inlet to Prince Rupert to be outfitted for the coming season's packing operations. The vessel was built two years ago by Ness at Kitkatla Inlet, was 48 feet long and powered with a 30 h.p. Eastern-Standard engine which was formerly used by Dr. W. T. Kergin in one of his power cruisers.

The C. and N. was insured.

The gunwale and part of the deck of the vessel was submerged as the boat went into the water, washing McGill off. The body was recovered an hour later.

THE DUNNING BUDGET
(Winnipeg Free Press)

Anyone can see that politically the Dunning budget is a highly successful performance. It gratifies the desires, secret or expressed, of aggregations of citizens who, added together, constitute a great majority of the people; the voice of the protesting minority—there will, we venture to say, be such a minority—will hardly be heard amidst the chorus of applause.

Of course there is not any suggestion of retaliation in the tariff. Has not Mr. Dunning proclaimed that it is wholly free from any suggestion of this spirit? Nevertheless Mr. Dunning, avoiding all idea of retaliation, and wholly in furtherance of Canadian interests, has managed to give Uncle Sam a series of pokes in the eye that will leave the optic somewhat discolored. This appeals powerfully to a sentiment, universally prevalent throughout Canada, of deep resentment at the contemptuous indifference to the interests and wishes of the Canadian people displayed during the past year by the tariff makers of the United States.

Reports, official or otherwise, of the United States, issued in the last few months have abounded in congratulatory observations upon the range and value of the Canadian market for United States goods. The latest report of this character was the analysis of United States trade made by the United States Chamber of Commerce for consideration at the annual convention in Washington. "Exports to Canada last year," the chamber's report points out, "neared the billion dollar mark, totalling \$948,501,000, while imports from our neighbor to the north amounted to \$504,277,000, making a total foreign trade of nearly \$1,500,000,000. This means that, with an estimated population of only 9,797,000, every man, woman and child in the Dominion had an interest in our foreign trade amounting to \$148." A market at the door of this value, one would think, should be worth preserving; but in all the tariff discussions of the past year in Congress, if there has been a single speech made by any Congressman or Senator suggesting that some regard should be paid to Canadian feeling, it has missed our attention. Instead there has been an inquisition into the state of Canadian-American trade for the purpose of extirpating every little trickle of trade that offered competition with a domestic interest. The story of how the tariff boosters in the Senate set about exterminating the little million dollar trade in maple sugar was told the other day in these columns, action in this direction being obtained by representations, supposed to be official, which were not true. This sort of thing has rankled in the minds of Canadians, and they are frankly delighted that there has been an answer in kind. Moreover, it is probably true that the average Canadian is willing to pay something, if necessary, for the gratification of feeling that, notwithstanding the abjuration of retaliation, a shrewd blow or two has been delivered. This may not be business, but it is human nature; and there are times when human feeling will have its fling with prudential considerations locked in the closet.

Alex McRae Re-Elected President

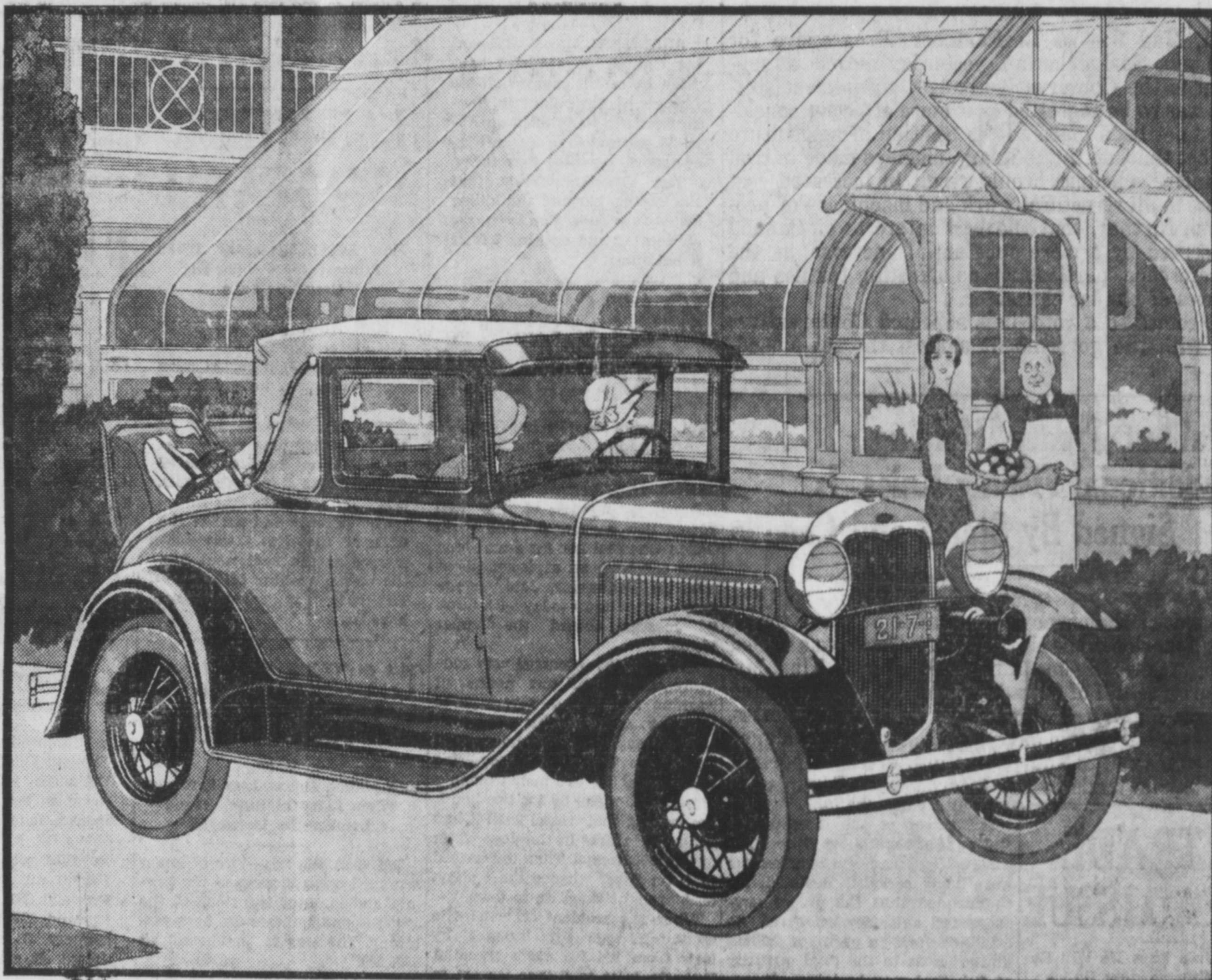
The Prince Rupert Rod & Gun Club held its annual meeting last night in the City Hall and elected officers for the coming years as follows:

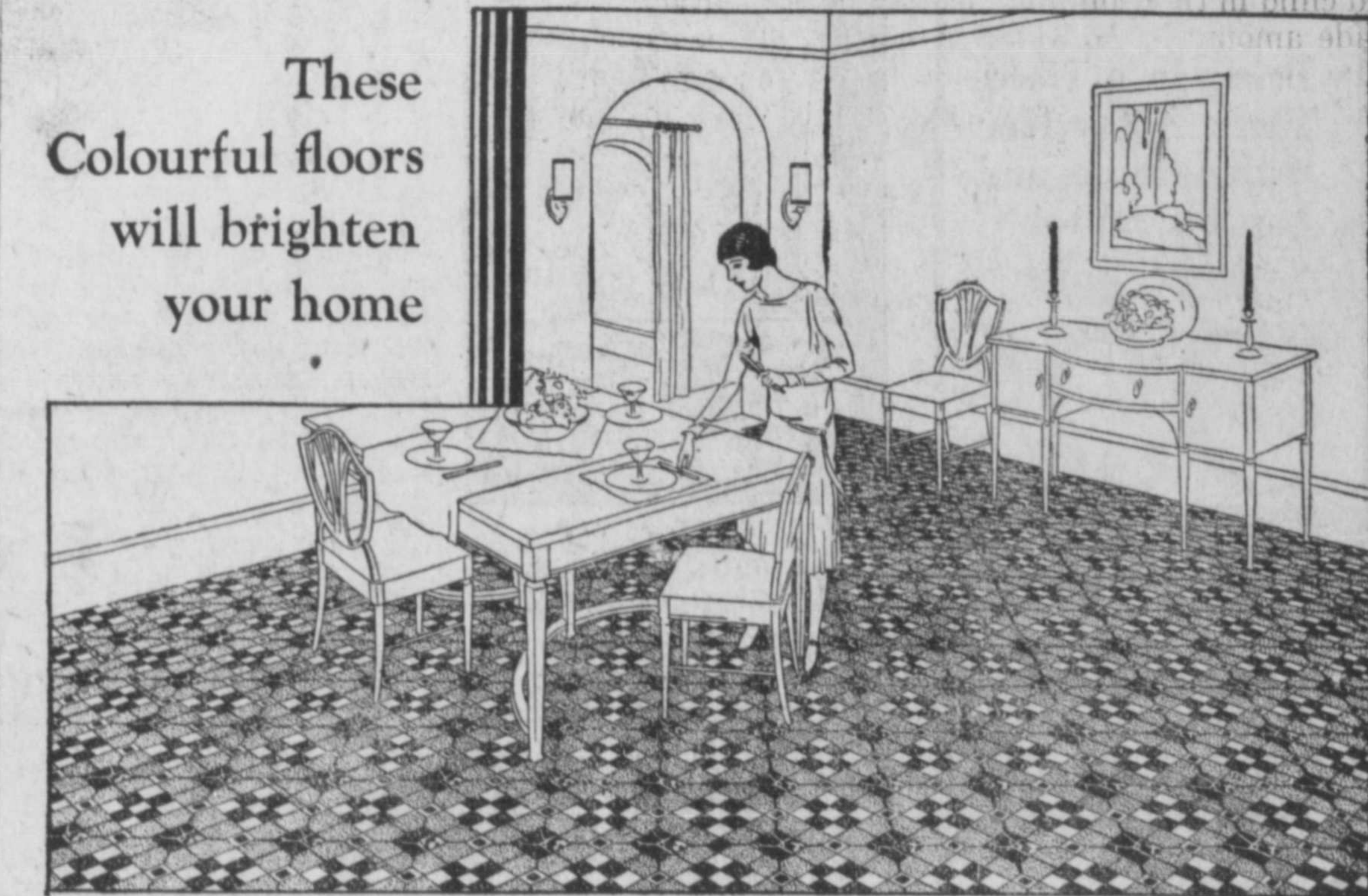

HINTS FOR GARDENERS

THE FIRST FLOWERS

The first flowers to go in will be those very hardy sorts like Cosmos, Petunias, Poppies and others which naturally seed themselves. Sprinkle the seed around lightly and do not cover to a depth of more than three times the diameter of the seed and a little later if the weather shows real signs of warmth, sow seeds of more tender flowers such as Zinnias, Marigolds, Nasturtiums, Etc., can go in, although the very enthusiast should bear in mind that sowing seeds ahead of time does not always mean plants ahead of time. It is well, of course, to get things in promptly but better results are obtained from late planting than too early. Then, too, the case with vegetables there is an advantage in successional sowings with certain flowers so that the blooming period will be spread over as long a season as possible.

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Underprivileged Children Are Discussed By High School Head In Interesting Rotary Address

"Lloyd George has said: 'You cannot make an A-1 nation from a C-3 people.' Likewise, you cannot expect the best results without the best teachers. This is absolutely fundamental. The community's first aim should be the building up and maintenance of a first class teaching personnel. Good schools with poor teachers are much like good autos with poor engines." So spoke D. H. Hartness, principal of King Edward High School, in addressing the Prince Rupert Rotary Club at luncheon yesterday. Mr. Hartness' subject was "The Underprivileged Child," a topic upon which he spoke in very interesting and constructive manner.

Mr. Hartness cited five factors in the matter of underprivileged children: first, natural heritage of health; second, natural heritage of ability or brightness; third, home conditions, fourth, more broadly, environment, and fifth, teachers and facilities at school. Speaking of the natural heritage
