Members of I.W.W. Are Being Arrested in Several Cities

Seattle and Tacoma Police Gather in many and Carry off Tons of Literature Following Firing on Parade at Centralia.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

CENTRALIA, WASH., Nov. 13.—The cities of Western Washington joined Centralia today in arresting members of the Industrial Workers of the World and raiding their headquarters following the firing on the Armistice Day parade here. Twenty-two men and one woman reported to have radical beliefs have been placed in jail here.

In Seattle 14 men and tons of literature have been taken to police headquarters.

The Tacoma police arrested 34 men and seized a quantity of radical literature.

MINE WORKERS' APPEAL IS WITHDRAWN

Miners Seem to Have Accepted Government's Assurances; Pittsburgh Men Still Out.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 13.—The United Mine Workers of America, contrary to previous announcements, have decided to withhold appeal on the ruling of the Federal court in the injunction proceedings which resulted in calling off the strike of coal miners.

It has generally been believed that regardless of developments the miners would fight the case in the courts to the last ditch and attorneys for the coal workers announced yesterday that the appeal would be filed within two or three days. However, the chief counsel for the mine workers organization stated that the outcome of the conference of miners' representatives and the coal operators with Secretary of Labor Wilson in Washington on Friday would determine whether the case is carried further. The council have thirty days in which to file their appeal.

The decision is taken to indicate that they have accepted the government's assurance that the right to strike but was solely to prevent violation of the Levy Act.

Many Still Out.

PITTSBURG, Nov. 13.—Despite the recalling of the strike order the miners of this district are showing no inclination to go back to their work. In this feeling they seem to be supported by the workers in the Central and Western Pennsylvania coal fields.

K. P.'S LOSE FIRST GAME

St. Andrew's and Oddfellows are Winners at Whist last Night.

In the whist drive last night the Knights of Pythias lost to the St. Andrew's Club team and the Valhalla suffered another defeat at the hands of the Oddfellows. Next week's games will be between the Sons of Canada and the Oddfellows, while the Sons of England will meet the Valhalla players.

GREAT TRADING ON WALL STREET

Two and a Half Million Shares Changed hands Yesterday.

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—In yesterday's demoralized stock market the sales amounted to 2,550,000 shares. Of this total 800,000 changed hands in the last hour. General Motors made a perpendicular descent of 68 points to 280, the latter quotation representing a loss of 126½ points from the maximum of the preceding week.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—Approximately \$80,000,000 will be released to help local enterprise throughout the country as a result of the panic in the New York market yesterday. Government officials say today. Experts believe the orgy of speculation is over and they predict a drop in call money.

LOCAL HOTEL MAN GETS FINE OF \$200

Nine Charges and Nine Convictions in Police Court Today.

Peter Black was found guilty of having liquor in his possession on Monday last and was fined \$200 in the police court this morning.

Wm. Hoskins and Fred Auriol Indians, were fined ten dollars each for assaulting an old man, J. P. Harrigan. The victim appeared in the police court with his nose in a rather sad looking state of injury. Fred Auriol was given another ten dollar fine for being drunk and disorderly.

Wm. Campbell, Jack Bell, Hilmer Wang and Ed. Campbell were all fined ten dollars each for being drunk and disorderly. Wang forfeited his bail of \$15 and left on an American fish boat during the night. Ed. Campbell, due to some misunderstanding with the officers, had resisted arrest, but as he had a good record and Officers McGlinchy and Duff did not press the charge he was let off with the one fine.

The adjourned case against Joseph Hadyn for having liquor in his possession other than in a private place was up for hearing. After five witnesses, Mrs. Nation, Constables McGlinchy and Duff, Alex. Scott and accused had been heard he was fined \$50.50. He readily pleaded guilty to the possession of liquor but was afraid that the supplying charge would be pressed, so the evidence was taken. A complaint had come from a rooming house down town and two constables went to investigate. On arrival at the rooming house they met accused who had a bottle of whisky in plain view so he was pursued. In trying to get away he fell down the stairs and when he got to the street he threw the bottle on the rocks. However, when Constable Duff picked the bottle up there was still liquor in it.

REDS CAPTURE KOLCHAK MEN

Four Remaining Army Corps Taken by Soviet Army.

LONDON, Nov. 13.—Bolshevik wireless despatches state that between November 3 and November 10 the Reds captured four remaining army corps of Kolchak troops and two division staffs. All officers refusing to surrender, were shot by their own troops.

Premier Lenine in a letter to Turkestan communists says the restoration of communication between Soviet Russia and Turkey will "open the way for a struggle against universal imperialism headed by Great Britain." The message hints at operations in British India.

SAYS MONTENEGRO IS USED BADLY

LONDON, Nov. 12.—In the House of Commons Ronald McNeill, Unionist, attacked the Government for the treatment of Montenegro by the Entente in refusing self-determination and countenancing persecution at the hands of Serbian troops who have appropriated 70 per cent of the food sent for the use of Montenegro.

TWO ACCIDENTS IN LOADING BIG BOAT

Two Men Struck With Lumber Are in General Hospital; Painful Injuries.

The second accident at the big lumber steamer War Chariot happened last night when a piece of lumber fell and, striking Fred W. Reich, fractured the bone of his foot. He was immediately taken to the general hospital where the bone has been set. The first accident happened on Tuesday afternoon when a swinging piece of lumber struck Robert Robertson, cutting his head and face rather severely. Both men are making good recoveries, although their wounds are very painful.

Port Essington May Win Big War Trophy

Has already Subscribed \$41,000 toward the Victory Loan and is Running Anyox Close; Local Purchases \$210,000.

It seems to be a close run between Port Essington and Anyox for the big prize of the gun trophy in the Victory Loan campaign which closes on Saturday night. Essington reports that they have collected \$41,000, which is considered wonderfully good for a place that size. The general opinion seems to be that they have a good chance to win the big gun.

Prince Rupert now has subscribed about \$210,000 and a big effort is being made to bring it up to a quarter of a million before Saturday night. There should be a good deal more collected here yet before the close.

A competition has been arranged in this city between the Chinese and Japanese residents. A special flag is being given to either or both if they reach \$5,000 and it is expected that both will get a flag, but which will raise the largest amount is uncertain.

The mayor, who is chairman of the Victory Loan Committee, says that he will have his office open each night this week until 11 o'clock to enable anyone wishing to purchase bonds to do so. This week will be the last chance to get bonds at par and it is confidently expected that they will be selling at a premium soon.

BIG CONVENTION OF WOMEN'S INSTITUTES

TORONTO, Nov. 12.—More than one hundred thousand women are represented in the Federation of Women's Institutes of Canada who are holding a convention in this city. The president, Mrs. Arthur Murphy (Janey Canuck) is in the chair and has charge of the proceedings. The federation put itself on record as in favor of taking the initiative in the formation of an international federation by asking the women's institutes of Great Britain to join the project.

Wonderful Work of British Submarines

Capt. Barney Johnson Tells Canadian Club of Underseas Service During War and Advises Canadians to Take Interest in Sea.

The luncheon tendered to Capt. Barney Johnson, R.N., D.S.O., on board the S. S. Prince George yesterday by the Prince Rupert Canadian Club was unique in that it was held on board a sister ship of the one Capt. Johnson formerly commanded before he went overseas for the great adventure.

Judge Young presided and the dining-room of the ship was filled almost to capacity.

Captain Johnson told of the different grades of submarines and of the purpose of each. They were driven on the surface by diesel engines and when under water were propelled by electric power. He explained the process of diving. At the beginning of the war a boat could sink to a depth of 20 ft. in two minutes, but as the war advanced they learned to do the same in one minute and the record time was twenty seconds.

Opening of War.

The British submarines put to sea before war was declared and remained off Schelling. Then, when fighting commenced, they took positions in Heligoland bight off the German rivers. They were later pushed back by the enemy mine fields but they patrolled the lanes.

The captain told of the torpedoing of a light cruiser under curious circumstances by the E-9 which had been lying on the bottom but came up just in time to sight her. At one time they were told to refrain from attacking German ships outward bound, but to report their presence and try to get them on their return. He also told of the sinking of the Westfalen and the hitting of the Vondertan by Captain Turner with the E-23 and the subsequent reporting of their presence by wireless on an aerial kite.

Reprimanded.

In some unaccountable manner Capt. Barlow in one of the Montreal-built H boats found himself near Heligoland when he should have been ninety miles away on patrol. He sunk a German submarine and escaped from thirty-five depth bombs. He reported to the Admiralty and as a result the British destroyers were fitted with thirty depth charges each instead of four as formerly, as it was clear that they were not as effective as was thought. In spite of the immense service of this experience to the Admiralty Lieut. Barley got a severe reprimand from the Lords of the Admiralty for being out of his position.

Off Irish Coast.

Besides his experience in the North Sea, Capt. Johnson saw service off the coast of Ireland, their first work being to discover the route of the enemy submarines when taking positions. He told a story of a submarine where the crew had felt the boat strike against a mine and one of the crew exclaimed: "Hoch the bloody Kaiser; another dud."

Captain Johnson spoke appreciatively of the work of the submarine engineers. He told of wonderful repair work done at the bottom of the sea. He also spoke appreciatively of the work of Sir Richard McBride in purchasing two submarines in Seattle for the protection of this coast. He suggested that the club get Capt. Roberson to tell them of the "mystery ships" some day. That officer had been torpedoed twice.

Sea Sense.

In conclusion the captain said he hoped when the next war came Canadians would be prepared to take their part both on sea and land. The security and prosperity of the Empire depends on her being mistress of the seas, not only in war vessels but in merchant marine. Canadians should develop a "sea sense." They should be familiar with the building and operating of vessels and should send their sons to sea. "The sea

is a clean life," he said, and there was no danger of being accused of being profiteers there. Canada would not be a strong link in the Empire until she showed a real interest in sea matters.

HUNGARIANS HELD ON BOAT

Refused Landing by Returned Soldiers and Mounted Police Come to Rescue.

KELOWNA, B. C., Nov. 13.—A party of about thirty Hungarians from Moosejaw with their household effects are held aboard the C. P. R. steamer on Okanagan Lake, as the returned soldiers of the district refuse to allow foreigners to settle here.

The party was first refused a landing on Monday and Mounted Police were sent to the scene from Vancouver, but the Hungarians refused to land, stating that threats had been made against them and they would stay on the steamer unless accompanied ashore and given the protection of the Mounted Police.

LABOR MAYORS ARE ELECTED

Hull, Leeds and Manchester Each Has Proletarian at Head; Lady at Stalbridge.

LONDON, Nov. 13.—Sixteen labor mayors have been elected throughout England and Wales, including Hull, Leeds and Manchester.

The first lady mayor in this country was elected at Stalbridge. Conservative mayors are in a large majority yet. There are 148 as against 112 Liberals elected.

Post Office Employees Very Poorly Paid.

For several years past the employees of the post offices throughout the country have been trying to secure adequate recognition of their services. Again and again the inadequacy of their pay has been brought to the attention of the Department but with no effect. Postmaster General Blondin sits tight and nothing is done.

An attempt was made this year to influence the ministers, and a promise was given that the salaries would be increased and the increase would date from the beginning of the year. The Senate amended the bill, however, and there will be no change until April next and then the change will be so small that it will be hardly worth mentioning.

The post office employees are recipients of a war bonus supposed to make up for the increased cost of living, but even so the remuneration is so low that these public servants find it most difficult to live. This condition is not peculiar to Prince Rupert. It obtains everywhere throughout the Dominion. We cannot expect good service if we are not willing to pay a decent wage.

Rupert as Centre For District Mails.

At present Vancouver is the mailing centre for the whole of the coast of British Columbia. Mail subsidies are paid to boats plying in every direction to and from that port. It is the mail clearing house for almost every point, with the exception of Prince Rupert.

It was proper that the only terminal point on the coast should have been made the mail distributing centre. There was for years no other centre. Now, however, a new centre has arisen. Prince Rupert is the centre of the northern and central districts but as yet the post office authorities hardly know it. Mails from this district are still going to Vancouver and mail subsidies are being given to boats plying past Prince Rupert to enable them to carry mails to Vancouver.

The next logical step will be to have the mail subsidies for this part of the coast given to vessels that will ply to this port. It does not matter what company is given the contract, the schedules should be so arranged that the mail is distributed here and should go by the most direct route to the east. The rise of Prince Rupert as a distributing centre has made necessary a readjustment. There must be such from time to time. Unhappily the post office is run on lines which make it hard to secure changes. It is to be hoped that the Dominion Government will see to it that adjustments are made from time to time with a view to giving the best possible service in this department.

Capt. Barney Johnson At Canadian Club.

The Canadian Club was fortunate in having as their guest of honor yesterday Capt. Barney Johnson, D. S. O., of the Royal Navy. While the captain in his address told nothing about himself, his native modesty forbidding that, yet he gave his hearers an insight into the work of the submarine service during the war. He also spoke of the need of Canada cultivating a sea sense, in order that she may take her place and do her part in the sea defences of the Empire.

Capt. Johnson was familiar with his subject and he was talking to friends. He chatted pleasantly and his address was thoroughly appreciated, because he spoke with authority as one who knew.

BY-LAW NO. 10.
A BY-LAW OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT TO PROVIDE FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF A SCHOOL BUILDING IN THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT, AND TO CREATE A DEBT FOR THE PURPOSE OF COMPLETING SAID BUILDING, AMOUNTING TO THE SUM OF ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$150,000.00).
WHEREAS the Board of School Trustees for the School District of the City of Prince Rupert have submitted an estimate requiring the City Council to supply the money necessary to build a school, the amount of such estimate being the sum of One Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars, (\$150,000.00).

AND WHEREAS the City Council does not deem it advisable to raise the said sum out of the annual taxes raised for School purposes under the Municipal Act, and it has been determined that this By-law shall be passed and submitted to a vote of the ratepayers, under the provisions of Section 145 of the Municipal Act, Chapter 52, 1914, as amended by Section 25 of Chapter 46 of 1915 and Section 33 of Chapter 44 of 1916.

AND WHEREAS, for the purpose of paying for the said School, it will be necessary to incur a debt to the extent of \$150,000.00.
AND WHEREAS the City intends to issue Serial Debentures to raise the said sum of \$150,000.00, payable in thirty (30) years from the date of coming into effect of this bylaw, and bearing interest at the rate of Six (6) per centum per annum, AND WHEREAS it will be necessary to raise each year during the period of thirty (30) years, by special rate, the sums set out in the schedule to this bylaw, for the payment of principal and interest of said debt.

AND WHEREAS the value of the whole rateable land and improvements of the Municipality according to the last revised Assessment Roll, being the roll for the year 1919, is \$21,051,580.00.
AND WHEREAS the whole debt of the City of Prince Rupert, not including for local improvements and school purposes, is \$869,676.36 which is not twenty (20) per centum of said assessed amount.

AND WHEREAS this bylaw cannot be altered except by the consent of the Lieutenant Governor in Council.
THEREFORE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT, ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. It shall be lawful to grant to the Board of School Trustees of the City of Prince Rupert, the sum of \$150,000.00 for the purpose of erecting a school, and for the purpose of raising the said sum to issue Serial Debentures to secure the sum of \$150,000.00, such amount to be payable in Annual Installments of the amount and at the times respectively set forth in the Schedule hereto.

2. For the purpose of paying for the said School hereby authorized it shall be lawful for the said City of Prince Rupert to create a debt to the amount of \$150,000.00, which debt shall be payable in thirty (30) years from the date when this bylaw takes effect, for which debt Serial Debentures may be issued to be secured as hereinafter mentioned.

3. The Mayor and Treasurer of the City of Prince Rupert may, and they are hereby authorized and instructed to sign, and to cause to be sealed by the Corporation to each of the debentures hereby authorized to be issued.

4. The said debentures shall be in denominations of not less than Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) each, and shall be payable at the Bank of Montreal, at Montreal, Canada, or, at the holder's option, at the office of the Bank of Montreal in the City of Toronto, Canada, or New York City, New York, U.S.A., or at the City of Prince Rupert, Canada.

5. Each of the said debentures shall bear date the 1st day of December, A.D. 1919, and such debentures shall have annexed thereto coupons for the interest thereon at the rate of Six (6) per centum per annum, payable half yearly on the 1st day of December and the 1st day of June, in each year, the first payment to be due on the 1st day of June, 1920.

6. The said coupons shall be deemed to have been properly executed by each one of the said debentures if each one of them is signed, stamped, printed or lithographed thereon the names of the Mayor and Treasurer of the said City of Prince Rupert, each coupon shall be numbered in accordance with the number of the debenture to which it is attached.

7. All debentures issued under this bylaw shall be numbered consecutively, no matter when issued, beginning with the number one (1).

8. The principal of the said debentures shall be payable on the First (1st) day of December in the years and amounts set out in the Schedule to this bylaw.

9. For the payment of the debt hereby authorized and the interest thereon there shall be raised and levied in each year during the currency of the said debentures, the annual sums set out in the Schedule to this Bylaw.

10. The total annual sums for interest and payment of the debt referred to in the preceding section shall be raised and levied in each year during the currency of the said debentures by a rate sufficient therefor on all the rateable land or rateable land and improvements within the Municipality.

11. The said debentures when issued, sold or hypothecated, and any coupons thereon attached shall be deemed to be valid and binding charge upon the said City of Prince Rupert.

The Central Labor Council, O. B. U., had its regular meeting on Tuesday night. The council voted \$100 to aid in the defence of union members now on trial in Winnipeg. Subscription lists are also going out for this purpose. A committee was appointed to organize a Women's Auxiliary to the Council. It is intended to make this a permanent organization.

A delegate asked for a ruling on the position of persons holding cards in both the A. F. of L. and O. B. U. The following ruling was made after some discussion: "That no delegate be seated on the Central Labor Council who holds an official position in the A. F. of L." This will probably not affect private members of the A. F. of L.

The committee who were looking into the matter of getting a pool table for the hall was discharged. It was decided that the attendance of the meetings was getting so large that a table would be in the way.

The assistant secretary was instructed to write to the City Council drawing its attention to the dangerous condition of the plank road leading from Third Ave. E. to Cow Bay. This was most dangerous and the request was made that it be either repaired or closed.

BASKETBALL PLANNED TO COMMENCE SOON

Meeting to be Held Friday When Schedule Will be Drawn for Season.

The Prince Rupert Basketball Association held a meeting on Tuesday evening and arranged for a general meeting of all those interested to take place on Friday. The general feeling of the meeting was that the schedule should be drawn up at once and the games started. With that in view all organizations intending to enter teams are asked to be represented at the next meeting as the schedule will be drawn up then with only those teams included which have entered up to that time.

F. W. Moersch was elected secretary-treasurer and has already taken over the new duties. The teams that are expected to enter are Sons of England, Sons of Canada, Drydock, Commercial Travellers, and St. Andrew's.

Sport Briefs

Lou Marsh, writing in the Toronto Star, says that rough tactics in athletics should be rewarded the same way as rough tactics in the streets are. He says it would do some rugby and hockey players good if they were given good stiff jail sentences for some of their dirty work.

The Edmonton Arena is causing considerable worry this winter. It happens that a big aeroplane has been placed on the floor of the rink as it has been found to make an excellent aeroplane. In the meantime the owners of the machine do not want to remove it while the skaters want the rink flooded for the winter sport. COUNTY COURT CASES HEARD BY JUDGE

Georgetown Lumber Co. Awarded \$91.59 Against C. K. Ytreberg.

Court sittings were continued before Judge Young yesterday afternoon. There are a number of cases yet to appear when the solicitors have them ready for hearing. The Marvin E. Allen case over the issuing of worthless checks is pending while more evidence is being secured. The date for the hearing has not yet been set.

Yesterday afternoon the action of the Georgetown Lumber Company versus C. K. Ytreberg was concluded. The plaintiff company was awarded \$91.59 after certain allowances had been made for the defendant. The original claim of the plaintiffs was for \$200. The action arose over a sale of lumber.

The case of J. Fred Smith vs. Mrs. D. Rutten also came up. The plaintiff is a merchant of Port Clements and the defendant is a married woman resident of Massett. The action arises over the sale of a stove which the defendant claims was not the same as described to her by the plaintiff at the time of sale. The plaintiff denies the allegation and states that after the first sale for twenty-five dollars, he had had chance to sell the same stove for sixty dollars but said that he was not going to stand the \$15 loss. Thus he is suing Mrs. Rutten for the price of the stove. Whoever wins the case the costs and expenses are going to be heavy, as they include a lot of travelling expenses between here and the islands as well as solicitor's fees.

CRUDE OIL FROM THE PEACE RIVER COUNTRY

President of Imperial Oil Company Says Discoveries are Promising.

Edmonton, Nov. 13.—President O. Stillman, of the Imperial Oil Company, is here with his party touring the Northwest on his private car. He is inspecting oil possibilities in the country and states that geologists employed by his company have made most promising discoveries in the Peace River block. He asserts that it is apparent that northern British Columbia and Alberta are destined to become immense factors in the production of crude oil in the near future.

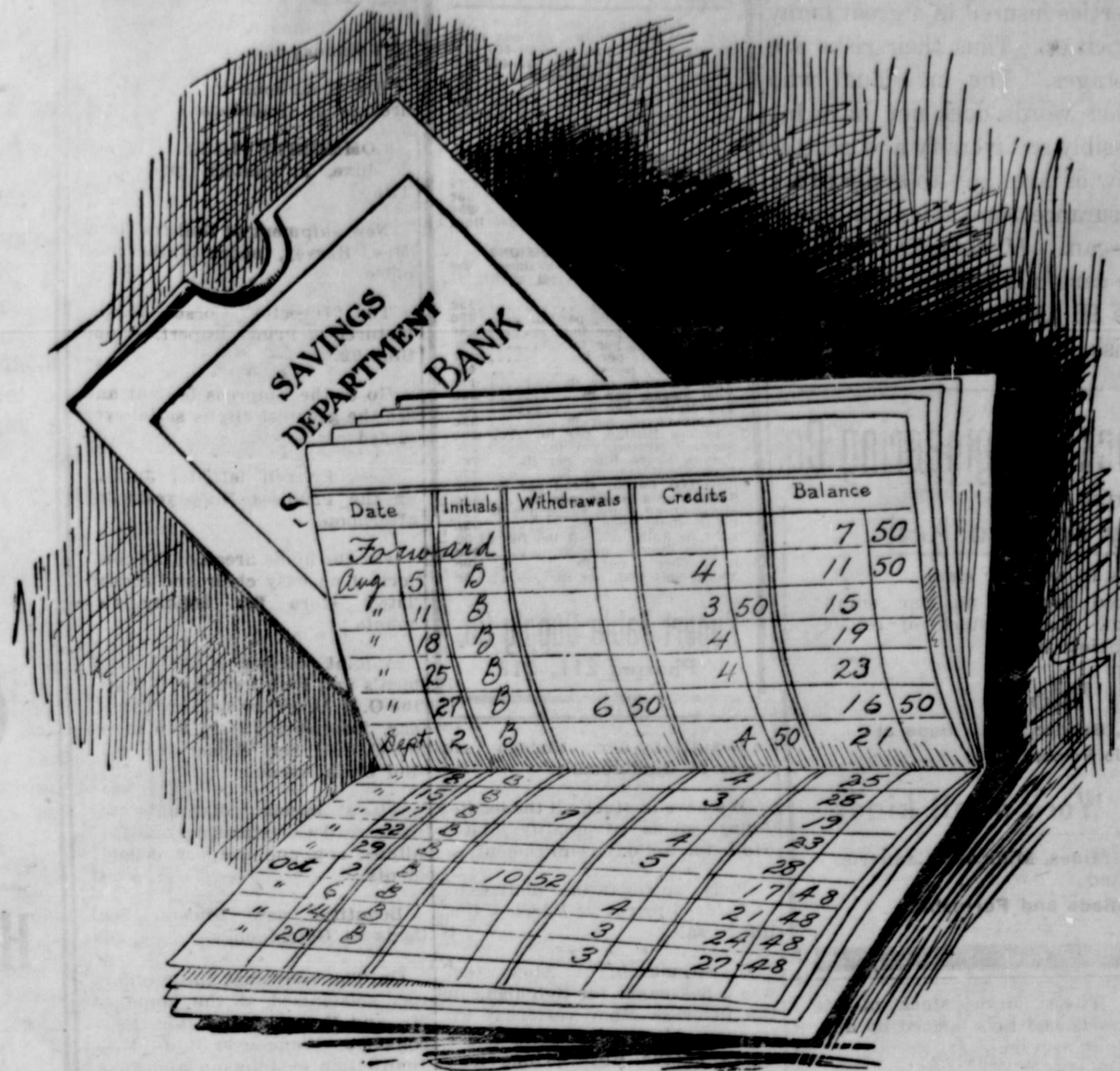
