Post Office Employees Very Poorly Paid.

For several years past the employees of the post offices throughout the country have been trying to secure adequate recognition of their services. Again and again the inadequacy of their pay has been brought to the attention of the Department but with no effect. Postmaster General Blondin sits tight and nothing is done. An attempt was made this year to influence the ministers, and a promise was given that the salaries would be increased and the increase would date from the beginning of the year. The Senate amended the bill, however, and there will be no change until April next and then the change will be so small that it will be hardly worth mentioning. The post office employees are recipients of a war bonus supposed to make up for the increased cost of living, but even so the remuneration is so low that these public servants find it purchase of Licence X 1676, to cut 3,574,most difficult to live. 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Rupert as Centre For District Mails.

At present Vancouver is the mailing centre for the whole of the coast of British Columbia. Mail subsidies are paid to boats plying in every direction to and from that port. It is the mail clearing house for almost every point, with the exception of Prince Rupert.

It was proper that the only terminal point on the coast should have been made the mail distributing centre. There was for years no other centre. Now, however, a new centre has arisen. Prince Rupert is the centre of the northern and central districts District Forester, Prince Rupert, B. C., but as yet the post office authorities hardly know it. Mails from ber, 1919, for the purchase of Licence > this district are still going to Vancouver and mail subsidies are being given to boats plying past Prince Rupert to enable them on Fisher Channel, Range 3, Coast District to carry mails to Vancouver.

The next logical step will be to have the mail subsidies for this part of the coast given to vessels that will ply to this port. Rupert, B. C. It does not matter what company is given the contract, the schedules should be so arranged that the mail is distributed here and should go by the most direct route to the east. The rise of Prince Rupert as a distributing centre has made necessary a readjustment. There must be such from time to time. Unhappily the post office is run on lines which make it hard to secure
