LONDON, April 14:-Rt. Hon. Philip Snowden, chancellor of the exchequer, presented his budget this afternoon to a crowded House of Commons. He estimated that expenditure for 1930 at \$3,909,000,000 and that, on the exsting basis of taxation, revenue would be \$3,698,000,000. Thus the difference which had to be made good was \$211,-200,000. The chancellor informed the House that safemarding duties would be allowed to expire at their fixed date and would not be renewed. 

SATISFACTORY RESULT

While the conference at London on naval armaments has been somewhat protracted and the results have not been what some people expected, the result on the whole, seems to have been fairly satisfactory. At any rate there has been a lot of plain talk and the most powerful nations in the world now understand each other better than ever before, which is a step in the right direction.

In any case naval reduction must come slowly. It would cause a lot of trouble to change things all at once. Men would be thrown out of employment and hundreds of industries now depending on the navy would be put out of

Now, fair warning is being given that reduction of world navies is likely and preparations will have to be made to meet the situation industrially.

ALWAYS SOMEONE INJURED

No matter how beneficent a law may be there is always some one injured by it. Changes always hurt. It is impossible to make any reform without some person feeling the pinch. Even the building of a new post office here would hurt some one temporarily and so might the erection of a C.N.R. Hotel. Yet it is impossible to stop improvements for fear of the minor consequences. The benefit of the whole community is the first consideration.

DE VALERA BUSY

The leader of the republican party in Ireland is raising money in the United States to start a daily newspaper in Dublin. At present the newspapers in that city are not campaigning against the government. They represent the people who are satisfied. It is realized that without a big campaign it will be futile to try to stir up the people of the country.

But why stir up the people? What is needed in most countries is not the inflammable journalism that stirs up people to make changes by means of distorted reports but the sane journalism that gives the news without bias.





Dominion of Canada Income Tax Returns DUE APRIL 30th

ACT PROMPTLY—

Accept the help offered by Income Tax Inspectors

and Avoid Penalties

Every person who during the year 1929 had an income, from any source, of as much as \$1,500, if single, or \$3,000 if married or supporting a family, is required to make an income tax return.

If you are situated as above described, failure to make this return by midnight, April 30th, together with cheque or cash for at least 25% of amount of tax, will render you liable to a penalty equal to 5% of the total tax payable. (Limit of penalty \$500.)

To avoid incurring this penalty, obtain NOW, from your postmaster, or from the Inspector of Income Tax in your district, the necessary forms and make your returns at once. These forms are as follows:

For Individuals other than Farmers and Ranchers.

For Farmers and Ranchers only. For Corporations and Joint Stock Form T2 Companies.

Each form contains in itself instructions for filling

By making your return by April 30th you gain in two ways: First, you avoid penalties for delay.

Second, you qualify yourself for the privilege of paying in instalments.


