CLIFF FALL WAS FATAL

ANYOX, Nov. 14: - Another Thanksgiving Day tragedy here was the death of Robert Lukkanen, an employee of the Granby Co.

In company with two other men, Lukkhanen left Anyox Monday morning for Hastings Arm to hunt goat. The party had climbed about four thousand feet up a mountainside when a tree, blown down by the gale, caught Lukkanen and pushed him over a cliff, the fall resulting apparently instant death. After having made unsuccessful efforts to get the body back up the mountainside, the two other men covered up the remains with their coats and returned to the beach, only to find that their boat had been smashed by the storm.

When the hunting party failed to return to town. Clarence Dresser went out and, after taking the two ment of the beach, returning to Anyox. A party of eight men was then formed by John A. Anderson, road superintendent, and went out to recover the body which was found on Tuesday night and brought here on Wednesday morning.






