# EMPLOYMENT STABILIZATION URGED

## Railway Workers Make Many Suggestions For Remedying Situation

**Favor 40-Hour Week With No Reduction In Pay, Fewer Apprentices, Elimination of Helpers and Other Changes**

WINNIPEG, June 7:—The Canadian railways will be called upon to revise their entire general and financial structure in order to secure greater stabilization of employment as a result of decisions made at a convention of Division No. 4 of the railway employees department, American Federation of Labor, which concluded its sessions here yesterday. In an effort to overcome irregularity of employment, a schedule of proposed changes was drawn up.

The suggestions included a 40-hour week with no reduction in wages, reduction in number of apprentices and lengthening of their period of apprenticeship in harmony with a shorter week, gradual elimination of helpers, two weeks' holidays with pay each year and employment of a minimum force during periods of depression.

## GREAT INTEREST IN THE CRUISER SPRINT

### General Election Will Cost Canada Two Million Dollars, Highest in Dominion History

OTTAWA, June 7:—Jules Castonguay, chief electoral officer, estimates that the coming general election will cost the federal treasury \$2,000,000, the highest cost on record. He said that there would be 20,000 polls throughout the Dominion and that it would average from \$20 to \$30 to man each poll. Preparation of the voters' lists containing 4,000,000 names will cost about 25c per name when enumeration, registration, revision and printing of the lists is completed.

LOS ANGELES, June 7:—The California Supreme Court yesterday ordered the release on bail of Alexander Pantages, millionaire showman, who is in the county jail, pending action on an appeal against his one to fifty year prison sentence for the criminal assault of Eunice Pringle, young dancer.

Letter Read at Chamber of Commerce Meeting By Captain Barney Johnson

A letter from Capt. Barney Johnson read at the Chamber of Commerce meeting last night stated that he found the Deputy Minister of Marineaverse to spending a large sum in putting a lighthouse and fog signal on Bonilla Island but they would agree that a light on Bitterworth Rocks and a lighted buoy to the westward of the Warrior Rock group would assist in safeguarding navigation. All these matters had been discussed with the department by Mr. Brady.

The marine department did not think the time ripe for preparing the Heate Straits for deep sea traffic. They, however, had practically decided to place radio beacons on Cape St. James, Langara Island and Triple Islands. ## BOYS WENT OVER DOCK

Two Lads Drowned Last Night in Tragedy at Campbell River

CAMPBELL RIVER, June 7:—Thrown from a bicycle, on which they were riding, over the edge of the government wharf here, Bert Masters, aged nine, and Graham Clark, aged 14, were drowned last night. The bodies have not been recovered.

Witnesses say that one of the boys was riding on the handle bars when the wheel struck a guard rail and pitched the two boys into the water, the swift tide carrying them far beyond their depth before help could reach them.

VANCOUVER, June 7:—George Black has decided to contest Yukon riding again as Conservative candidate and will be leaving next week for the Yukon to inaugurate his campaign.

## TESTS ARE BEING MADE

Radio Telephone May Be Means of Linking Prince Rupert With South in Near Future

At the meeting of the Chamber of Commerce last night, a letter was received from J. Hamilton, vice-president and general manager of the B. C. Telephone Co. at Vancouver, acknowledging a letter received from the chamber in regard to the possibilities of Prince Rupert being linked up with other sections of the province by long distance telephone.

Mr. Hamilton said he fully appreciated the desire of the chamber to increase communication facilities in view of the prospective industrial development in Prince Rupert and district and his company was equally anxious to establish telephone communication with them.

The manager stated that arrangements had already been completed for experimental tests by radio telephone to connect with their system, he hoped as far north as Prince Rupert, and he was fully confident that some practical connection would be established as a result.

## ALBERTA ELECTION

Farmers Have Most Candidates in Field—Four Acclamations Are Anticipated

EDMONTON, June 7:—With nominations closing Monday for the Alberta provincial elections, it is expected that there will be four acclamations. Of a total of 138 candidates named, the United Farmers of Alberta have 47 for 53 ridings; the Liberals, 35; the Conservatives, 22; Labor, 11, and Independents, 26.

# TO DEAL WITH EMPLOYMENT

Suggestions of Western Mayors to Go Before Dominion Conference, Premier Says

VANCOUVER, June 7.—Although the Dominion authorities will not appoint a representative to attend the conference of western mayors in Vancouver on July 9 to discuss unemployment, Premier King has telephoned Mayor Malkin his assurance that any representations or suggestions that may be made from this conference will be considered at a Dominion-wide employment meeting after the general election. The Prime Minister said that the post-election conference would be representative of the leading municipalities, provincial govern-

ments, industrial interests, labor organizations and others. "It is very pleasant to have this assurance," said Mayor Malkin, "for it means that there is an established link between this meeting and the Dominion conference."

# CAPTAIN MISSING

Capt. W. H. Gillen, Veteran Coast Shipmaster, Believed to Have Met With Accident or Foul Play

VANCOUVER, June 7.—Fears are entertained that Capt. W. H. Gillen, well known Arctic shipmaster, may have met with a fatal accident or foul play. He is the master of the Hudson Bay Co.'s auxiliary schooner Old Main No. 2 and has not been seen since Tuesday of this week when he left his ship to make a purchase at a store nearby. He had \$500 on his person. It is feared that he may have tripped and fallen into Burrard Inlet or met with foul play.

# EVIDENCE IS GIVEN

Solloway, Mills Did Not Buy Stock Ordered By Clients, Chartered Accountant Testifies

CALGARY, June 7.—Evidence that the house trading account of Solloway, Mills & Co. Ltd. correspondent with the net short position of the firm in a large number of stocks and that numerous purchases and sales which had been confirmed to clients had not actually been filled on the stock exchange but had been balanced in the house account constituted the testimony of Kenneth Morrison, chartered accountant witness, yesterday at the trial of I. W. C. Solloway and Harvey Mills, stock brokers, facing charges of conspiracy.

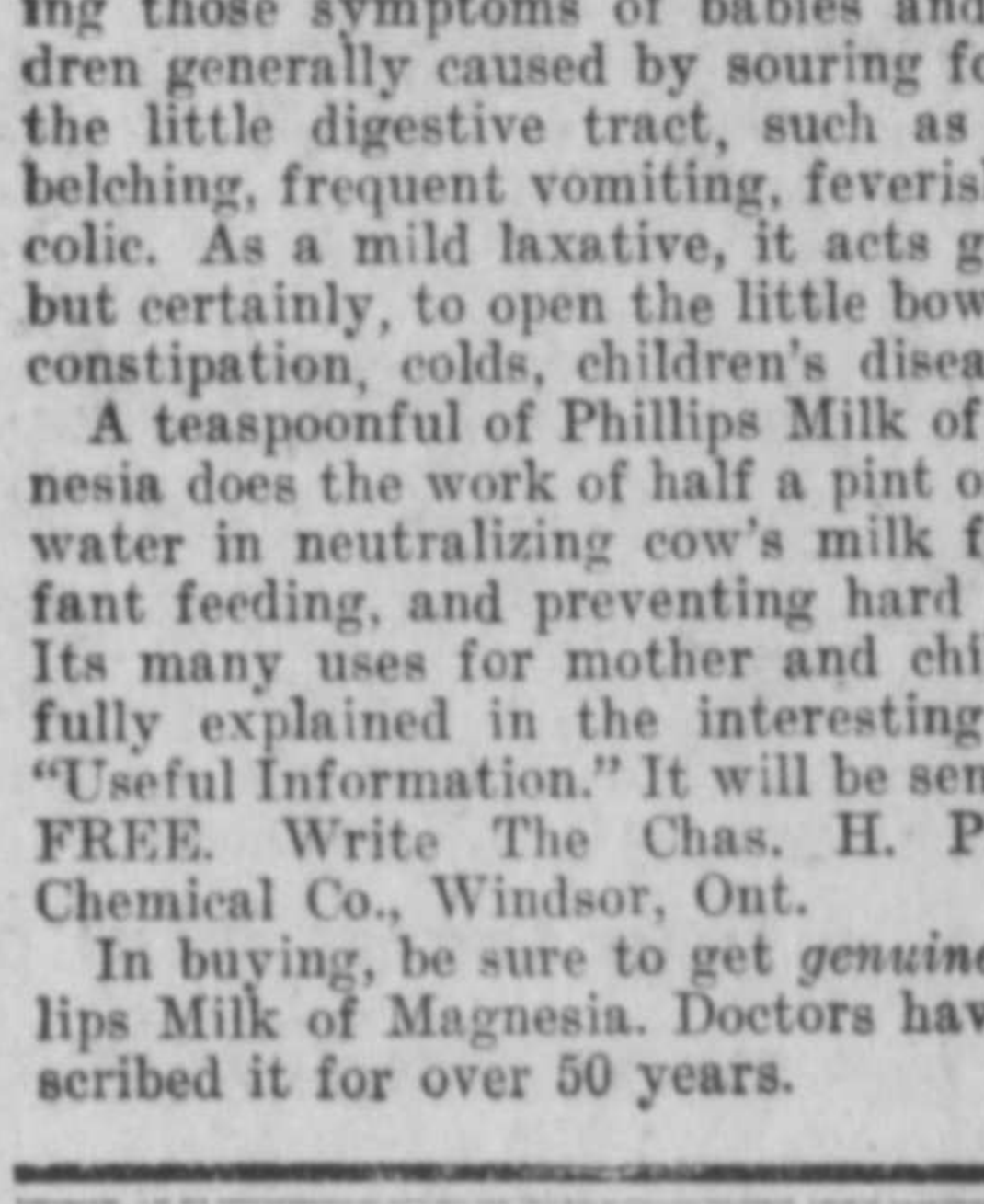

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## WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Trollers Are Having Good Spring—Union Oil Co. to  
Have Tank Supply Barge—Halibut  
Landings

May is the big month of the year for trolling operations in Prince Rupert district and this year the fishermen have had, if anything, better success than average. In fact, it is asserted by some that this spring has been a better one for the trollers than for several years past. For some weeks the spring salmon have been generally plentiful and weather good for fishing, these being the two most important factors in success of trolling or otherwise. After a good month practically throughout May, strong south-east winds have come up early in June and caused suspension of fishing for a few days since the first of the week. Cohoes as well as springs are now beginning to appear on the lines.

The success of operations applies to the Stephens Island, Dundas Island, Warke Canal and Skeena River areas in the immediate vicinity of Prince Rupert. At North Island, on the north end of the Queen Charlotte Islands, the run is very fair while it has been a bit slow in gaining proportions at Hippo Island, on the west coast of the Queen Charlotte Islands, although a few fishermen were active there. In the vicinity of Prince Rupert many of the trollers have been making \$20 a day. The price has been around 15c and 10c per pound.

The Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., as usual, has its camps at Warke Canal and Dundas Island with regular packing services to those points as well as to the Skeena River, North Island and Hippo Island. What with importations from Alaska as well, the Cold Storage has been handling a large amount of salmon recently. From Stephens and Dundas Islands, the Narbethong, Capt. Bert Wearmouth Viner, Capt. Jimmy Thomas, and boats of Flewin & Brown and Capt. Johnny Clausen are engaged in packing to Prince Rupert in addition to the Cold Storage boats. Flewin & Brown and Clausen are also packing in from Warke Canal.

The Bruce I, Capt. Brandy Newell, is packing from Hippo Island and Capt. Bert Tingley from North Island to the Canadian Fishing Co. at Butedale.

If not today, H. N. Brocklesby, who has been spending almost a year in Montreal taking up post-graduate work at McGill University, will be back tomorrow from Vancouver where he has been paying a brief visit with his parents following his return from the east. Mrs. Brocklesby and family accompany him.

The Pacific Salvage Co. has chartered the speedy power boat "23" from the National Airplane Lumber Co. for the summer and will use the vessel in the service across the harbor to the Salt Lake. The Naas River, which did the service last year, is now on the Taku River, having been renamed Taku River.

### Princess to Islands

Pacific Salvage Co.'s big power tug Salvage Princess, Capt. Frank Tyler, left last Sunday for Lawn Hill, Queen Charlotte Islands, to get a scowload of telephone poles for delivery to the city. Having been delayed by heavy weather during the past few days, the Princess is expected back by the end of this week.

Capt. Joe Klipp has had his fish packer Laurel Point in port lately from the Skeena River. The engine has been receiving an extensive overhaul from the Star Welding and Machine Works.

The local branch of the Union Oil Co. is expecting from Vancouver shortly a 100-foot 40,000-gallon steel barge which will be operated

out of here during the salmon canning season supplying fuel stations along the coast from Tallheo Cannery, in the Bella Coola district, on the south to Arrandale on the north including Butedale, Claxton, Inverness, Humpback Bay and Wales Island. The barge will be handled by a power tug which will also be brought from Vancouver. George H. Smith of the local branch of the company will be in charge of the barge.

The Union Oil Co. is installing a new 40-foot float and gangway at its local wharf. The float will be equipped with two oil metres and will increase the company's capacity for fueling boats simultaneously from the local station.

Mrs. Peevers of this city has recently joined the staff of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station.

Hardly settled after returning at the first of the week from Montreal where he attended the annual meetings of the Biological Board of Canada and the Royal Society, D. B. Finn, director of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, was away again on Thursday night of this week, this time on a trip to the West Coast of Vancouver Island to visit the pilchard reduction plants. He will go through to Victoria and board a steamer there for the West Coast, doing some of his travelling while there on seaboats. He expects to return to Prince Rupert in about 10 days time.

D. McKay of the Departure Bay biological station, near Nanaimo, arrived here on Wednesday of this week and will be here for a month or two or for as long a period as may be required to investigate crab spawning habits. Mr. McKay is doing this work in view of differences of opinion as to when the crabs actually spawn and between what dates the close season for their catching should be applied.

### Halibut Landings

Halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the 1930 season up to and including June 6 totalled 8,452,100 pounds as compared with 10,894,250 pounds at a similar date last year. The total for Canadian landings was 2,741,300 pounds as against 3,112,550 pounds and for American, 5,710,800 pounds as compared with 7,781,700 pounds. The two weeks lost at the first of the season, together with the fact that unfavorable weather has prevailed a good deal of the time during the past spring on the fishing grounds are the two principal factors contributing to this year's decrease in landings. It is not expected that the present season will be able to come up to last year in volume of landings, particularly in view of the fact that the season may terminate this year on November 1 or two weeks earlier than last year.

During the week, up to yesterday landings totalled 751,300 pounds of which 233,300 pounds was from Canadian boats and 518,000 pounds from American. The price situation during the week was just about average. The high bid for Canadian fish was 12.1c and 6c which the Atli received for 7,000 pounds and the low 10.4c and 6c paid the W. T. for 4,500 pounds. The top price for American halibut was 13.5c and 7c which the Onah and Thor received for catches of 10,500 and 5,000 pounds respectively, and the low, 10.4c and 6c paid the Venture for 24,000 pounds.

An interesting announcement was made by the B. C. Packers Co. yesterday that they had acquired the Port Edward cannery on the Canadian National Railway and Porspo Harbor, about eight miles east of Prince Rupert, from the Skeena River Packing Co. under an exchange deal whereby the Pacific American Fisheries (parent company of the Skeena River Packing Co.) takes possession of Point Roberts cannery near Victoria. Port Edward cannery is one of the largest and best equipped canneries on the Skeena River. Its acquisition consolidates the position of the B. C. Packers as the largest canned salmon producer on the Skeena River and further reduces the list of companies operating at the mouth of that stream.



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## SUMMER MINING

Local Owners Retain Unabated  
Confidence in Central Interior  
Properties

(By L. S. McGill, Smithers)

With the advent of summer weather in the mountains many small operations are now under way for the season. The outstanding feature of this year's mining activity throughout the whole of Omineca mining division is that, while outside capital is not coming in for reasons prevailing throughout the continent, yet the local owners have not slackened off their activity in the least and they are opening up a large number of prospects with unlesened confidence in the future.

In the Babine Range across the Bulkley Valley from Smithers the Rainbow Group is being actively worked by the local syndicate of Smithers men headed by James Wright, president of this branch of the Chamber of Mines, who own it outright. Present development is directed towards the opening up of the remarkably good find of copper-silver ore made last September, just prior to the visit to Smithers of the Hon. W. A. Mackenzie, minister of mines. He was much interested in examining specimens brought in from the then recent discovery. At present a small crew is driving a drift tunnel on this vein, and is encountering most favorable results. At 10 feet from the portal the tunnel has a full face of ore and is being pushed ahead as rapidly as the resources of the owners will permit.

Mathew Sam, the full-blooded Indian prospector, and his associates, are working hard on the Jack Rabbit Group, a gold property, near Topley. They are now driving a cross-cut tunnel to intersect at depth ore showings which assayed .72 oz. in gold in the upper workings. They have driven 37 feet of tunnel in the last few months and cut one vein of copper ore, previously unknown, having a width of one to two feet. They estimate having another 10 or 12 feet to drive before reaching the vein which is their objective.

On the Golden Eagle Group, formerly optioned to Topley Silver Mines, a deal is pending on this as well as on the adjoining Topley Group of Mathew Sam.

### Grandview Group

Tom Riley and associates, discoverers of the Grand View Group, near Milk Creek, at the head of the West Fork of the Telkwa River, are working at present opening up the very fine showings found by them in June of last year.

Stuart F. Campbell and Grover E. Loveless are doing further work on the gold-bismuth discovery made at the Glacier Gulch Group, Hudson Bay Mountain, last November. This is only two miles from Lake Kathryn railway station and a quarter of a mile from a motor road. In gold it contains values up to \$14 per ton and in bismuth up to 11.8 per cent. It is one of the most remarkable of finds in the Omineca mining division in recent years.

Alex. S. Miller has work in progress at the Cascade Group, four miles from Smithers, which was carried on all winter. Good results are reported.

Alex. ("Yukon") Chisholm is at work on his Yukon Group, overlooking Lake Kathryn station.

Development is under way on the Mayflower Group, Hudson Bay Mountain, directed towards opening up on the Mayflower side of the boundary line between them and the high grade galena and gold ores exposed last fall by Duthie Mines Ltd., on the Canary claim of the Humming Bird Group. Already this vein has been traced across the line into the Mayflower Group, only a short distance from the Duthie work, and is being continued to show the width and character of the ore.

The Mamie Group, owned by Alrich Estate, is being surveyed as a preliminary to crown granting by the owners.

Donald C. Simpson is continuing his work on the Victory Group, near Duthie Mines, and is getting very good results.

Work is being done on the Rocher de Boule copper property under the direction of W. S. ("Duke") Harris,

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with a view to resumption of active mining.

Work on the Emerald Group, Sibola section, by the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co., which was carried on throughout the winter, has now been enlarged to the summer scale. Three tunnels have been driven on the main property, the lowest and most recent of these being now in a thousand feet. H. C. Hughes, whose mauling by a grizzly bear at this property last summer, attracted attention in all parts of the continent, has gone back again to be in charge of the work.

Another Consolidated crew has gone to work at Driftwood River, northwest of Takla Lake, on a copper prospect said to be of great size. Other Consolidated work is being carried on this season far up the Finlay River, near its head-waters, where claims were staked both last year and the year before.

### On Ingenika

W. R. Wilson & Sons have resumed summer operations on the Finlay and Ingenika River properties held by them. Among these are holdings at Ruby Creek and vicinity, at the most northerly point on the Finlay. A party is now on its way from Prince George to that most difficult point.

Atlas Exploration Company also has claims under development in the Peace and Finlay River sections. Most of these were located last year.
