



The loading platform at the mill is 380 feet long and has tracks on either side of it. The track at one side will be used for empties and on the other side for DAY WORK WANTED - Mrs. To Chonokonnone the full cars. The length at each side provides for the placing of nine cars which is the capacity of the barge. There will, thus, be no difficulty in dealing with the empty cars and the loaded ones. On the arrival of a barge with empty cars they will be pulled up on one side of the platform and the full ones immediately brought down, so no time will be spent waiting. It is expected that ten trips will be made a month and at the rate of nine cars a trip this will mean ninety carloads may be handled monthly.

Cost \$150,000.

It is estimated that the total cost of installing the new system will reach close to \$150,000, but this amount will be saved in short time by the lessened cost of handling and shipping to say nothing of the saving that will be effected by the lessened damage which always arises with handling. It will be much more satisfactory to load shipments at the plant and have them go direct to the consignees than have them handled here as at present. Shipments will be untouched from the time they leave the big mill until they arrive at the station of the consignee.

Lessened Handling Cost.

The plan of using car ferries is an innovation in northern waters, although common in the south and east. It is anticipated that the new system will prove very successful and it is very probable that other big industria: plants in the district will follow the lead of the Whalen Company. Besides lessened cost it means quicker and more efficient delivery and handling. In every way it is advantageous to the shipper and the consignee and while it will cut down longshore work here it will, no doubt, tend to increase the amount of product passing through.
