## Tolmie Government, Heading Fast For Ruin, Is Strongly Condemned By Liberal Chief

KAMLOOPS, May 31:-Strong condemnation of the Tolmie government was sounded by T. D. Pattullo, newly elected provincial Liberal leader, in his first public speech following his elevation.

"The Tolmie government has shown and still is showing bitter partizanship through the civil service, the new Highway Act, by the appointment of a three-man liquor commission and the setting up of a political machine the like of which has never before been seen in the country," he declared.

"From the first day of the present regime, the Liberals went to frips with it. We have wrestled with them for two sessions now and we won't let them go until we have dragged them to the mat," Mr. Pattullo promised.

Lack of Color at Ceremonies In Ottawa When Governor General Delivered Speech Closing Final Session

OTTAWA, May 31:-The Sixteenth Parliament of Canada passed into history last night. Shortly before 11 o'clock the Governor General delivered a speech which brought the fourth and final session to a close. Without delay, an order-in-council dissolving Parliament was approved as a prelude to the issuance of writs for the general election. Thus, by a brief margin, Canada will be enabled to go to the polls on July 28 next. The closing ceremonies lacked some of the color which is ordinarily associated with the opening and final functions of Parliament.

# FISH DUTY

American Ports Are Open, However, to Receive Marine Products From Foreign Vessels

In spite of suggestions to the contrary that might have been made, American ports are still open to receive fish from Canadian or any other foreign boats but a treasury decision that has been forwarded recently by the United States customs department, with the approval of A. W. Mellon, Secretary of the Treasury, to collectors of customs and others concerned. indicates that there is to be a tightening up on the collection of duty for fish so landed.

Following is the text of the order dated at Washington, April 28:

"The question has recently been presented to the department whether fish and other marine products taken by foreign vessels or vessels owned by aliens domiciled within the United States may be ! admitted to entry free of duty. The statement is made that at some ports fish caught on the high seas by aliens are admitted free.

"It appears from the records of the department that it has been the practice at most ports to assess duty on fish brought into the United States from the nigh seas in foreign vessels and the department in a letter addressed to the collector of customs at New Orleans, La., dated March 22, 1926, held that fish brought into the United States m foreign vessels were subject to duty, notwithstanding they were not imported from any foreign country. 
