Canadian Aviators Land Safety in North

New Blue Sky Laws For British Columbia Are Mooted

Thirty-Two Lives Are Lost As Heavy Storm Rages in British Isles

Naval Tug Sank at Ushant Light and Twenty Drown; Communication Interfered With

LONDON, Jan. 13 .- Thirty-two persons lost their lives in a terrific storm which swept England last night, twenty victims being members of the crew of H. M. S. tug St. Denny which sank north of Ushant Light. Five men from the vessel were rescued. The wind reached a velocity of 125 miles per hour at Eastbourne. Falling trees were responsible for most of the land casualties. London and other large centres are practically isolated as far as wire communication is concerned. Fears are expressed that the entire scope of the calamity has not as yet been revealed entirely.

This Is Only Condition Under Which Lord Beaverbrook Will Support Ex-Premier Baldwin

LONDON, Jan. 13.-Lord Beaverbrook is prepared to serve under the leadership of the Conservative party of Ex-Premier Stanley Baldwin if the leader will adopt a platform of free trade within the Empire which Beaverbrook is now earnestly encouraging.

Beaverbrook makes this statement in a letter to the Morning Post and at the same time threatens to oppose any parliamentary candidate, no matter what his party, if he is an opponent of the Empire free trade policy.

The Post, in a discussion of Beaverbrook's plan, suggests that Beaverbrook should go to Canada and see whether the Dominion is favorable to such a policy. He is urged to assure himself whether the Dominion is willing to grant free entry from British manufacturers in return for advantages in the British market over agricultural produce from outside the Empire.

HAS BAD FIRE

Loss as Result of Conflagration in New Brunswick Town Placed At \$250,600


