RUGGED NORTH RETAINS ITS SECRET

TOLMIE STILL NEGOTIATING WITH CANADIAN RAILWAYS

No Further Trace Is Found of Captain Burke and Comrades; Renahan Is Also Missing Now

Nothing Heard of Coast Flyer Since He Passed Over Alert Bay on Wednesday En Route to Rescue of Atlin Aviator

VANCOUVER, Oct. 31:—The rugged country north of Atlin still holds tight the secret of the fate of Capt. E. J. A. Burke and his two companions—Emil Kading, mechanic, and Bob Martin pioneer northern prospector—who have been missing since October 11 when they left Liard Post some three hundred miles north of Atlin on their return flight to the latter place. Considerable anxiety is now being felt for them.

NO WORD OF PLANE

Two Companions Reported to Be Coming North With Robin Renahan

Although inquiries have been made from all the wireless stations along the coast, there is no word of the Washington-Alaska Airways plane piloted by Robin Renahan which left Vancouver on Tuesday for Atlin to join in the search for Capt. E. J. A. Burke, missing Atlin commercial flyer. It is reported that Frank Hatcher, Seattle air explorer and Sam Clerf, prospector, are coming north with Renahan. The supposition is that Renahan may have run into bad weather and tied up in shelter before continuing north.

TERRORS IN CHINA

Country With Millions of People Doomed For Many More Years to Recurring Tragedy

SHANGHAI, Oct. 30:—A tragic picture, eloquent in its simple presentation of the bare facts, of North China's flood and famine stricken millions, is presented by C. A. Pao in the "Chinese Nation," Chinese review. He gives three reasons for the conditions, geographical, economical and political. And he adds that although the constant famines and floods have their geographical and economic background, "the unscrupulous militarists and corrupt officials have to share half the responsibility for the deplorable plight of the suffering masses in the north."

Both China and India have been historically known as the lands of famine. Of late India has been fairly well developed in both irrigation and transportation thus greatly reducing that catastrophe, while China has seen only a little improvement in her famine prevention system and is still struggling under periodical famines and droughts, causing appalling suffering to the population. The most frequent catastrophes visiting China are floods, droughts and locusts. Sometimes a prolonged drought is immediately followed by a flood and at other times locusts descend upon the harvest simultaneously with a drought, resulting in a disastrous famine in the affected districts. Earthquakes are not infrequent in the northwestern provinces, which also has a very damaging effect on the agricultural enterprises in the affected regions.

Famine Serious The northwestern provinces are still suffering under a serious famine, says Mr. Pao. Since 1927 droughts and locusts frequently visited the north, until now nearly all northern provinces are affected, especially Shansi, Honan and Kansu. According to reports from famine relief associations, the affected northern provinces are Honan, Shensi, Kansu, Shantung, Hopei, Suiyan and Chanar. In Honan one half of the province is in the grip of famine; Shensi is suffering as a whole, and Kansu has 65 districts out of a total of 78 districts affected, while Shantung and Hopei are undergoing a famine as well as a disastrous flood as a result of the overflowing of the Yellow River in Shantung and the Tachingho and Yungtingho in Hopei.

Kansu has a total population of 10,000,000 half of which are victims of famine, the same report states. About 300,000 people died last year of banditry, exposure and starvation, while an average of 2,000 people are reported to be dying daily in the affected regions. More than 1,000,000 people are reported to be in a destitute condition and they are compelled to feed on barks and grass roots. In Antinghsien alone, which used to be a city of 60,000 people, the population has dwindled to 3,000. Shensi has a total population of 10,000,000 people, of which 7,150,000 are now affected by famine. Of this number 780,000 have fled from the province.

Ontario Deputy Minister at Loss to Account For Impulse to Steal Dress

TORONTO, Oct. 31:—Hon. J. D. Monteith, minister of labor, announced today that James H. Ballantyne, deputy minister of labor, who was arrested last night on a charge of theft in connection with the removal of a dress valued at \$15 from a local lingerie store, had been suspended from the post. Ballantyne, after being arrested, was released on \$200 bail. "I don't know what made me do it," Ballantyne said today. "I cannot explain why the impulse came on me. I had more than \$200 in my possession at the time. Some kind of mental aberration which is not explainable prompted me to do this. It is regrettable but it is true."

WON FIRST DIVISION

MacDonald Government Defeats Amendment of Radical Socialist Group

LONDON, Oct. 31:—The MacDonald government scored an easy victory today in the first division of the new Parliamentary session, defeating a Labor left wing amendment to the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne by 156 to 11. The amendment humbly regretted that the Speech from the Throne contained no proposals making for a Socialist reorganization of the industry of agriculture, banking and import and export trades and for a more fair distribution of national income.

ENDING OF CONFERENCE

LONDON, Oct. 31:—The Imperial Conference is speeding up. Indications at a meeting of heads of delegations this afternoon were that the conference would probably conclude about November 7 or 8.

Canada May Find Wheat Market In France; Revision Of Treaty Now In Existence Is Possible

LONDON, Oct. 31:—Canada is casting around for new markets for her wheat. Conversations have been opened, it was learned today, which will probably lead to a revision of the trade treaty between France and Canada. France, hard hit by United States tariffs, is anxious to retain and, if possible, extend her markets in Canada. While official circles preserve the strictest silence, it is understood that France has made an approach to the Canadian delegation at the Imperial Conference with a view to opening formal negotiations.

Pacific Great Eastern Surveys Are Defended By Premier In Speech

Says He Is Hopeful That Canadian National or Canadian Pacific Will Take Line Over As Part of Peace River Coast Outlet

NORTH VANCOUVER, Oct. 31:—Declaring that surveys conducted along the line of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway had benefitted the province through discovery of new resources, Premier Tolmie, speaking in support of Jack Loutet, Conservative candidate in the North Vancouver by-election campaign, said that the government will continue its efforts to dispose of the line to the Canadian trans-continental railways. He added that, as soon as Premier Bennett returned from the Imperial Conference in Vancouver, facts secured in the surveys during the past summer would be placed before him. Then a conference would be held with E. W. Beatty of the Canadian Pacific Railway and Sir Henry Thornton of the Canadian National.

OCTOBER HALIBUT

Total Landings 2,899,000 Pounds as Against 2,952,000 in Same Month Last Year

Halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the month of October this year total 2,899,000 pounds which shows very little difference from the same month last year when landings totalled 2,952,000 pounds. American landings for October this year amounted to 2,477,000 pounds showing a slight increase over 2,460,000 pounds last year while the Canadian total for the month this year is 421,000 or a decrease from 492,000 pounds in October, 1929.

According to an estimate of assets given in a report presented to the meeting, secured creditors will be paid off in full and the balance left will be sufficient to pay unsecured creditors about one-fourth or one-third of the amount due them.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

There may be some truth in the opinions of the so-called "optimists" that the present state of trade is due to the mental attitude of pessimistic people, says "Canadian Insurance" in an editorial article. But it would take a lot of close argument to persuade the heads of a financial institution with several million dollars invested in western farm mortgages that that is all the trouble with the world. Some part of the trouble in Canada is due to the Wheat Pool being greedy and getting stung through guessing wrong. The other part is simply and solely due to the fact that there is too much food in the world for the people who are working and can afford to buy it. When the unemployment situation eases up, then more people can buy more food and the prices of farm produce will slowly rise. Now unemployment is a chronic condition in almost every country of the world. It becomes bad periodically. It is worse now because of the dislocation of trade due to the war. We cannot have the greatest war ever known and the greatest "boom" in stocks ever known without the consequent greatest depression ever known. If all the unemployed today were properly fed there would be little depression in the farming industry. That they are not properly fed is due to man's inability to understand that they ought to be fed. The best remedy is unemployment insurance. That would simply mean that when trade is bad as it always will be bad periodically till the world comes to an end, that the wealth of a nation is being divided up a little by means of insurance, so that unemployed people can eat properly, like other people. Personally, we have no patience with those people who assume that unemployment insurance is going to encourage laziness and other evils. All men are lazy and have "evils" in some degree or other and the richer classes are probably the worst in this respect.

The present industrial and financial system has developed the world at a greater pace than ever before and the fluctuations in trade are necessarily of greater violence. It is up to the leaders therefore to recognize the facts of the permanence of unemployment and "fluctuations" and remedy them by insurance just the same as other "fluctuations" are covered by insurance. Men insure their lives because they are uncertain whether death is going to cut them off before their allotted span. They insure their property against the ever present risk of fire. We have yet to hear a good argument why unemployment insurance should not be as useful as other systems of insurance. It is difficult to arrange. It is full of pitfalls and social problems. But if all the unemployed today were in receipt of support to keep them properly fed, housed and clothed, by no stretch of the imagination could the social problems then be equal to the problems confronting rulers and business men today.

There is plenty of food in the world. Yet millions are starving and trade is bad and the heads of financial institutions are worrying themselves into their graves over their possible losses in investments. The trouble clearly is not that Mother Nature is not bountiful enough. It is simply that man made organizations of systems to get all the food to all the people is not as efficient as it should be. This is worth more reflection than it is likely to receive.

Our opinion is that farming prosperity will come back. We can't grow too much if all the people are to be properly fed.

HIGHLIGHT ON HISTORY

LONDON, Oct. 31. (By Thos. T. Champion, Canadian Press Staff Correspondent.)—It is a far cry nowadays of course to the time when Lord Lansdowne was Governor General of Canada. Later he became viceroy of India. Later still he was War Secretary (at the time when the South African War opened) and ousted this office for the still higher position of Foreign Secretary. Naturally therefore the biography of this eminent statesman written by Lord Newton and just published is a work of the highest importance.

Lord Lansdowne was governor general from 1883 to 1888. One learns from his biography that he accepted the Canadian office with considerable reluctance. What turned the scale in deciding him to go to Canada was his financial position. On his father's death he had succeeded to a debt amounting to a million and a half dollars, besides heavy charges on his estate. The Scotch property passed to his mother. The Bowood estate (in Wiltshire) provided practically no net income, while the imposing rent roll of the Irish properties showed signs of alarming shrinkage. All the more alarming because the Land League had singled him out as an adversary whom it was particularly important to crush.

"Before the start (says his biographer) he received several warnings from Sir John MacDonal and others that the Irish-American Fenians would probably make an attempt upon his life, and the ingenious Land League circulated a statement in Canada that none of the Lansdowne tenants could marry without his consent."

Fine Reception
However we find that he wrote home to his mother in glowing terms of his reception at Quebec. Of Rideau Hall Lord Lansdowne wrote: "This seems to be a very good and comfortable sort of house. Some of the furniture is very hideous."

It is interesting to note Lord Newton's remark that "the position of governor general at the period was very different from what it is now, when the post involves little but ceremonial duties." All the same Lord Lansdowne liked the social functions less than the political duties. It seems hardly credible, continues Lord Newton, but Lord Lansdowne had not been a full year at his post when he received an urgent appeal to come home and vote on a party question in the House of Lords. This was in connection with the Finance Bill of 1884. Further, Lord Lansdowne admitted to his mother that he was "very near doing this in all seriousness."

"It is difficult to understand the frame of mind responsible for a request of this nature," continues the biographer, "which seems to display an unfathomable want of sense of proportion." Lord Newton adds that he was himself at the Paris Embassy at the time, and well recollects how Gladstone also attempted ("fortunately without success") to induce Lord Lyons (the ambassador) to come over and vote for this particular bill.

Lord Lansdowne's term as governor general came to a premature end, because Lord Salisbury offered him, rather hurriedly, the position of Viceroy of India. Of the retiring governor general's review of his term of office Lord Newton remarks:

Colonial Relations
"Discussing the subject of more intimate relations between the colonies and the Motherland, he thought there was room for great improvement in the matter of Imperial Defence, but he would sooner trust to the spontaneous action of Canada to provide an adequate number of men than to secure a couple of regiments by forcing a hard and fast bargain on the Dominion. In dealing with the problems of Imperial Confederation, his tone was warning rather than encouraging. It was a magnificent experiment, the results of which could not be proclaimed with confidence at present, and he counselled, in preference, concentration upon the internal development of the country."

At a later stage of the biography Lord Newton refers at some length to the Alaska Boundary matter, which arose when Lord Lansdowne was Foreign Secretary. "There is no reason to believe," says Lord Newton, "that the (English) Cabinet put any pressure whatever upon Lord Alverstone, nor was there an occasion to do so, since the Canadians did not attempt to conceal their dissatisfaction at what they considered to be his pro-American attitude.—The decision, as might have been expected, caused intense irritation in Canada, where the moral was drawn that Canada ought to possess the right of treaty-making and public indignation was chiefly directed against Lord Alverstone."

NEW MANAGER OF BANK HERE IS WAR HERO

F. A. MacCallum, who is to be the new manager of the Bank of Montreal here, is a native of Hartland, N.B., and began his banking career in 1902 with the People's Bank of Halifax, which three years later was amalgamated with the Bank of Montreal.

During his service in the Great War he was mentioned three times in dispatches and was decorated with the Distinguished Service Cross by His Majesty, the King, for his bravery at the naval attack on the Germans at Zeebrugge Harbor in 1918.

Upon his return from the war in 1918 he was appointed accountant at the Regina, Sask., branch, later serving in the same capacity at Victoria. In 1925 he was made manager of the Armstrong branch, and two years after was transferred to Prince George, whence he now comes to assume his new duties at Montreal.

Mr. MacCallum takes a keen interest in golf, hockey and yachting and while in Montreal was captain of the Hudson Yacht Club, Hudson, as well as secretary of the Montreal Bankers' Hockey League.

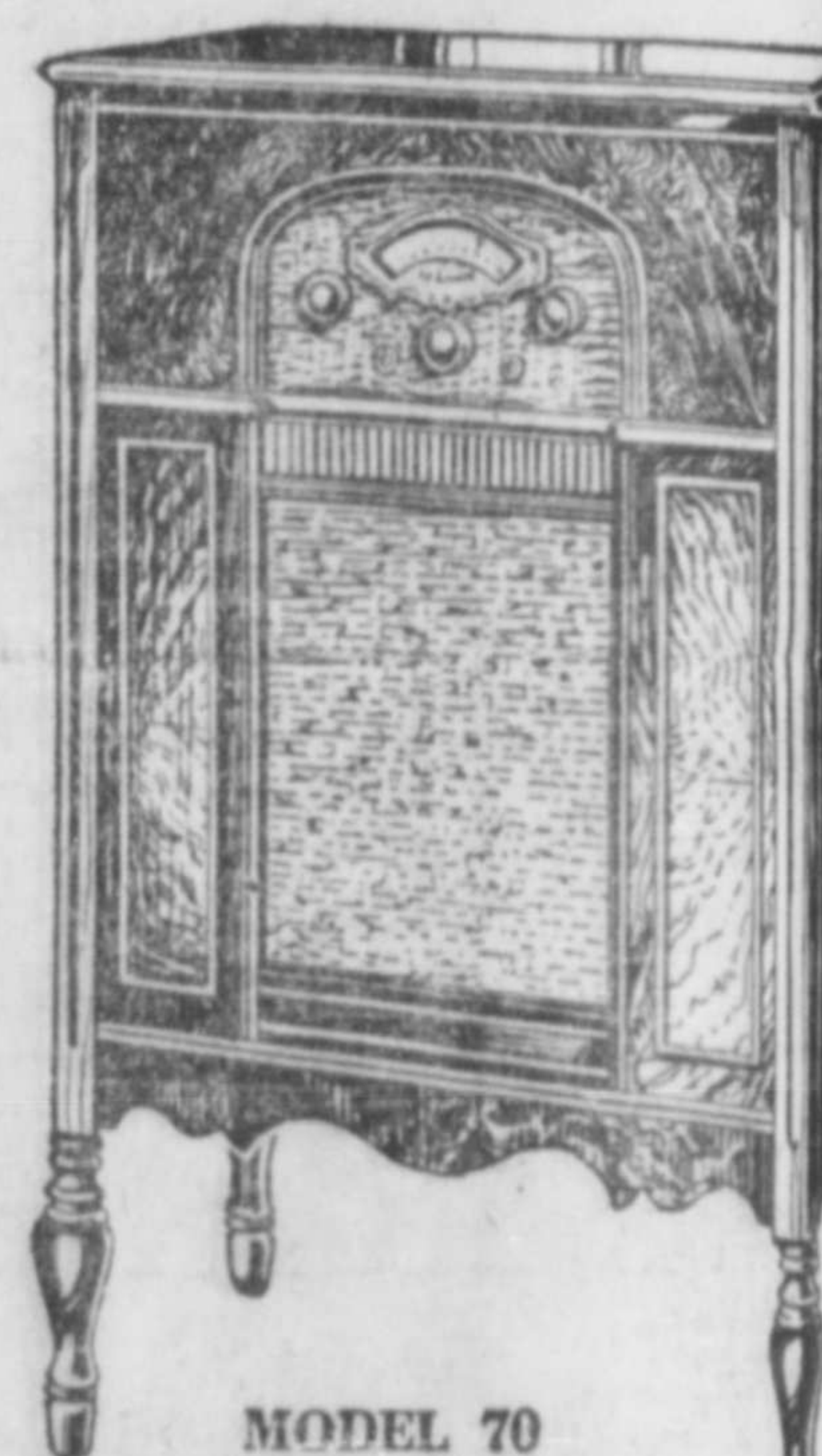

Tells About Power Company and Its Work

Lee Gordon, Purchasing Agent, Speaks at Rotary Club on Costs of Providing Power

Showing that the money paid to a public utility corporation is paid out very largely in local services, Lee Gordon, purchasing agent for the Northern B. C. Power Company, gave a very interesting address at the luncheon of the Rotary Club yesterday afternoon, his subject being "The Consumer's Dollar."

One of the interesting statements was that, owing to the large amount of money involved, the cost of capitalization was of necessity very heavy in a hydro-electric plant. Also he mentioned that, while the stock of a merchant turned over several times in a year, the turnover of a power company occurred only once in several years.

Of necessity the provision of power was monopolistic for if it were otherwise the costs would be higher, and the selling rates also higher. What was required was a fair rate for the service rendered and this could only be granted when there was no duplication of services.

Mr. Gordon then went on to tell in detail some of the costs of operation of the local plant. This included taxes, operation, mainten-

ance and the creation of a fund for extension or the insurance of sufficient stability in the company to enable them to secure money for extensions.

The manner in which the expenses piled up proved somewhat of a surprise to Mr. Lee's audience. They were also interested to know that in a steam plant only one fourth of the latent power was utilized whereas in hydro-electric 90% was saved.

At the conclusion Mr. Gordon was thanked for his address by President S. D. Johnston.

Next week there will be no luncheon but the ladies will be guests of the members in the evening.
