

Liberal Candidate Had Substantial Lead Over Brady in This District

Conservative Member of Last House Was Defeated In Most Polls of Riding—Prince Rupert Gives Grit Majority of Over Two Hundred

With practically all the more important polls reported, the majority of Olof Hanson, Liberal candidate for Skeena in the federal election, over J. C. Brady, Conservative, stood today at 853, one of the largest leads ever piled up in a federal contest here. It became apparent early last night that Mr. Hanson was to be the winner, for the city of Prince Rupert, itself, rolled him up a majority of over two hundred. Most of the largest points in the riding also gave him majorities and successive polls as they reported
