CONSERVATIVES SWEEP INTO POWER

Bennett Followers Will Have a Working Majority in Commons Over All Other Party Groups

Liberal Defection in Quebec Largely Responsible For Turnover—Whole British Columbia Coast Swings to Grits—Ian Mackenzie Elected

TORONTO, July 29:—Yesterday's federal election was full of surprises. In many ways it recalled the 1911 campaign when the Laurier Government went to the country on the Fielding budget of reciprocity and was beaten by the defection of the Liberal bloc in Quebec which returned 27 Conservatives. Yesterday the government went to the country largely on the Dunning budget of increased preference to Great Britain and Quebec returned 24 Conservatives. Hon. R. B. Bennett

R-100 IS COMING ON

British Dirigible Left Cardington, England, This Morning on Flight to Montreal

LONDON, July 29:—The British dirigible R-100 started its flight to Montreal from Cardington at 3:45 this morning.

Squadron Leader R. S. Booth is in command of the R100 and there are five officers, thirty-two men and seven passengers aboard. The course is via North Ireland, Greenland, Newfoundland and along the St. Lawrence River to Montreal.

The R 100 was out to sea this afternoon off the northwestern tip of Ireland. The dirigible was running into adverse winds but everything was proceeding excellently.

PREFERENCE IS FAVORED

Stanley Baldwin Also Urges Establishment of Imperial Economic Body

BRIGHOUSE, Yorkshire, July 29:—Furnishing assurance to the Dominions that Great Britain would not remove trade preference, the establishment of an Imperial body to consider economic and industrial issues was advocated by Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin, the Conservative leader, in a speech here.

OTTAWA, July 29:—Premier-Elect R. B. Bennett today issued the following statement: "The policy of the Conservative party has been accepted by the people of Canada as the instrument of national development. The fact that every province of the Dominion has contributed to the result will sustain the new government in the task that lies before us. This Dominion-wide expression of confidence ensures the solidarity of government which is at this time essential and manifests the determination of the people of our country to cherish and maintain national unity for victory, at the cost of unity, would be in truth an overwhelming defeat of the purpose for which our party stands."

Liberal Candidate Had Substantial Lead Over Brady in This District

Conservative Member of Last House Was Defeated in Most Polls of Riding—Prince Rupert Gives Grit Majority of Over Two Hundred

With practically all the more important polls reported, the majority of Olof Hanson, Liberal candidate for Skeena in the federal election, over J. C. Brady, Conservative, stood today at 853, one of the largest leads ever piled up in a federal contest here. It became apparent early last night that Mr. Hanson was to be the winner, for the city of Prince Rupert, itself, rolled him up a majority of over two hundred. Most of the largest points in the riding also gave him majorities and successive polls as they reported increased his lead. By the time all

polls have reported, it is expected that he will have well on to or in excess of the 1000 majority which was predicted for him two or three weeks ago by campaign workers. Polls remaining to report are mostly those that are not in telegraphic or telephonic communication with the city.

CITY IS DOOMED

Changsha, Capital of Hunan Province, Being Ransacked by Reds

SHANGHAI, July 29:—Changsha, the capital of Hunan Province, apparently was doomed today as Communists burned and looted their way through the city. Foreign gunboats were forced to withdraw due to the lowering of the river level.

Foreign property worth millions of dollars has thus been left to the mercy of the Reds.

Foreigners Fly From Hunan Capital As Communist Hordes Pour Into City

SHANGHAI, July 29:—Foreigners fled aboard British, United States and Japanese gunboats at Changsha, capital of Hunan Province, yesterday as Communist hordes poured into the city. The Reds are reported to have looted and burned a part of Changsha.

CHARGE IS LAID

**THE ELECTION**

The election is over and Hon. R. B. Bennett will be the new Prime Minister in place of Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King. It is to be assumed too that the policy of the government will change from one of Imperial preference to that of high tariff, although there may be some delay in making the change. The people of the country have decided this, although Prince Rupert was against it.

The change is a momentous one for the country. Mr. Bennett is a capable man and will hold the new position with dignity and honor. He will have the privilege of attending the Imperial Conference in the fall and along with his new cabinet will decide what attitude Canada is to take at that gathering.

It is much too early to consider cabinet possibilities. Two of the men who undoubtedly would have been in it were defeated at the polls and it may be difficult to provide seats for them. It is to be assumed that Dr. Manion will be in the government but many almost unknown men will of necessity be there. Most of the nationally well known Conservatives had retired from public life.

**PRINCE RUPERT'S MEMBER**

Prince Rupert's new member is Olof Hanson, known to everyone. We congratulate him on winning the seat. While it is unfortunate that he will be in opposition, he will undoubtedly use that tact for which he is noted and see that Prince Rupert interests do not suffer. His majority was a wonderful one, greater than even the greatest optimist in his party could have expected. It was a great tribute to the man and to the men who conducted the campaign.

J. C. Brady, the defeated candidate, drops out for the present. He fought a good fight and his abilities should command for him a position more permanent and possibly more lucrative than that of member for Prince Rupert. Political life is precarious at the best and is nothing on which to depend for a livelihood.

**LET US LOOK FORWARD**

This is the time to forget the election and all the differences that went with it. Let us turn our eyes to the future, to the upbuilding of the city and forwarding of her interests. After all, individual and community effort is what counts. It seems as if a community could never act as a unit politically but it may well act with cohesion on any other question.

It is to be hoped that the election result will not affect the standing of the C. N. R. Hotel or any other matters in which we are vitally interested. It is best to assume that everything will work out well for us.

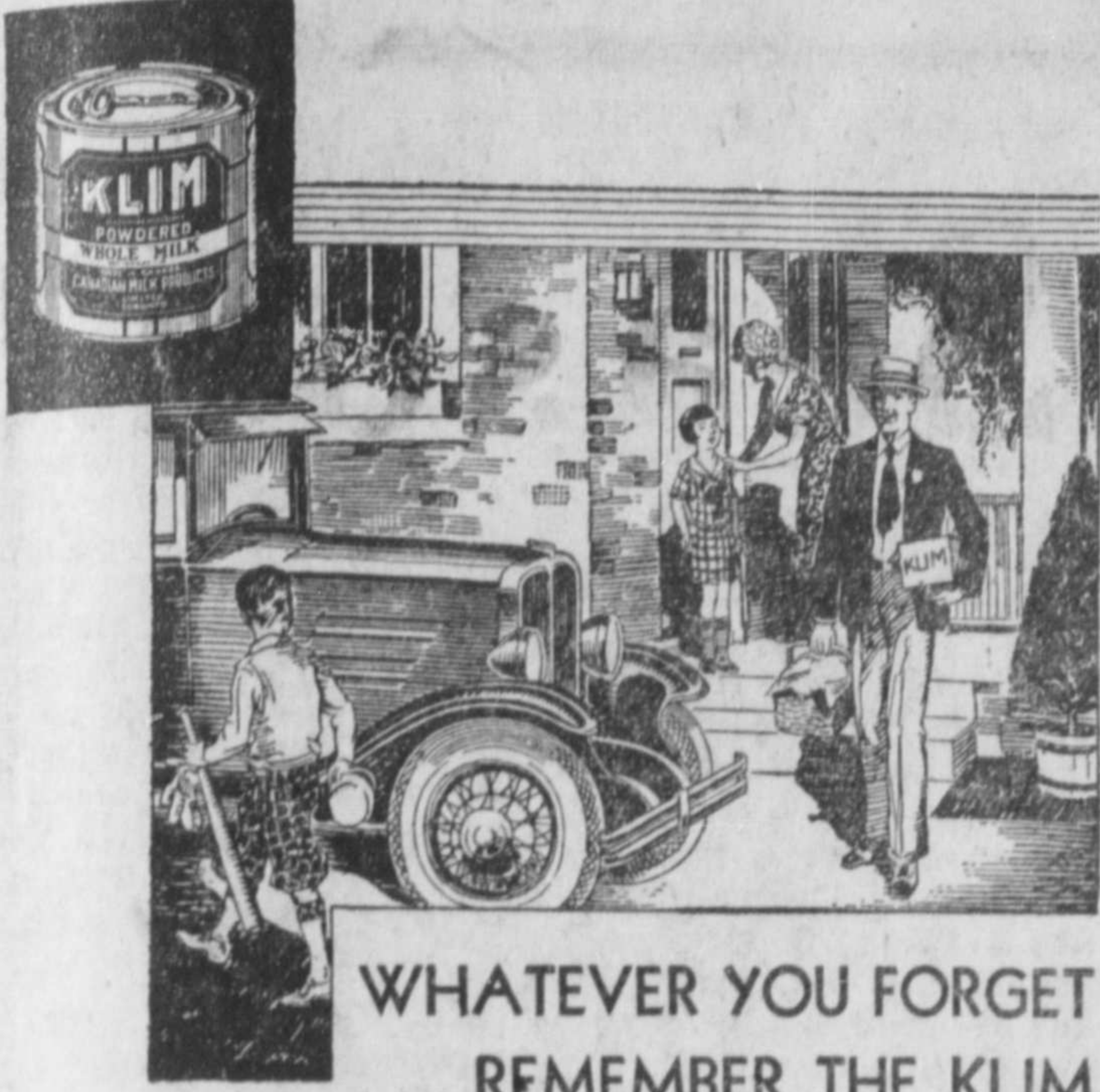

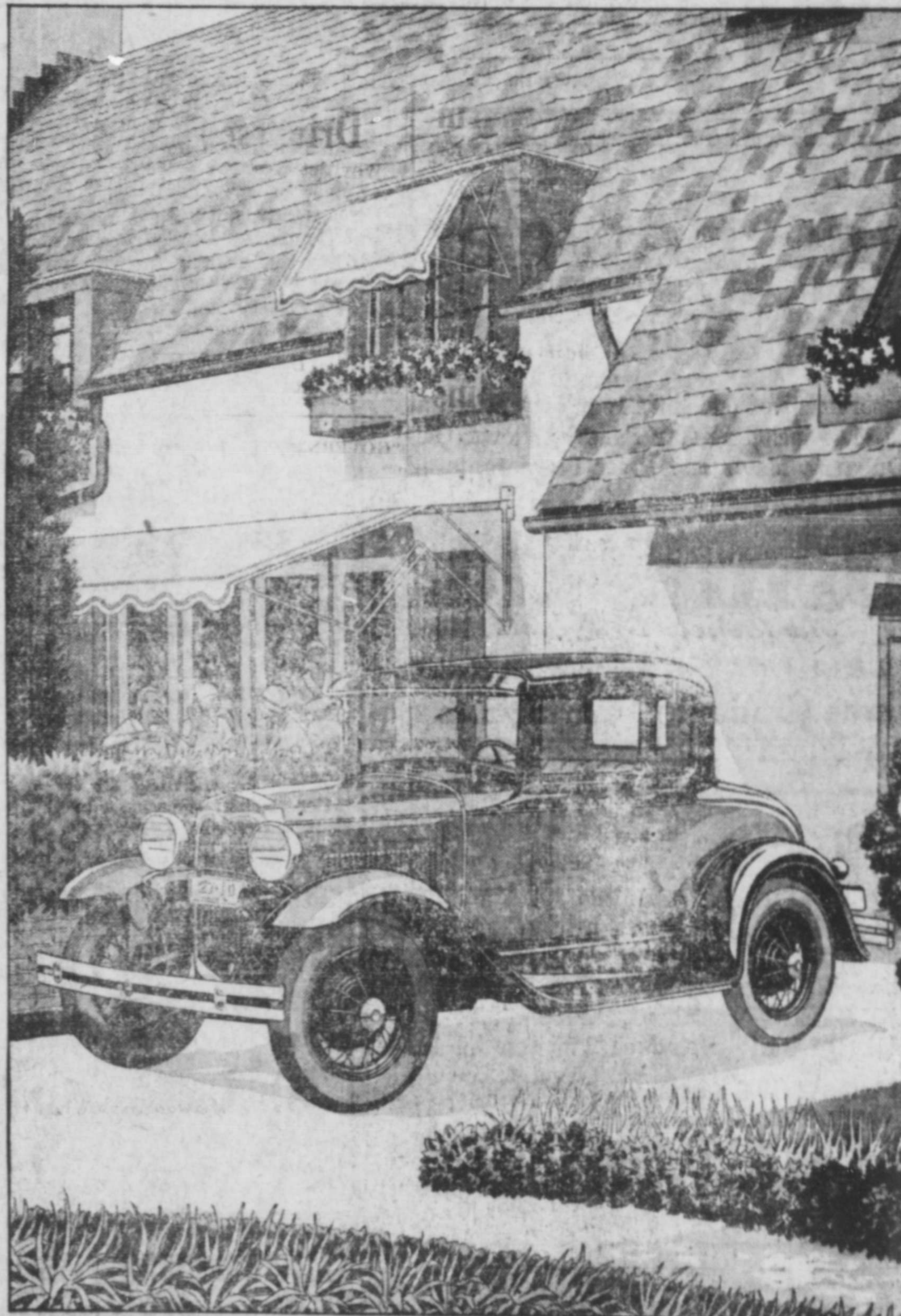

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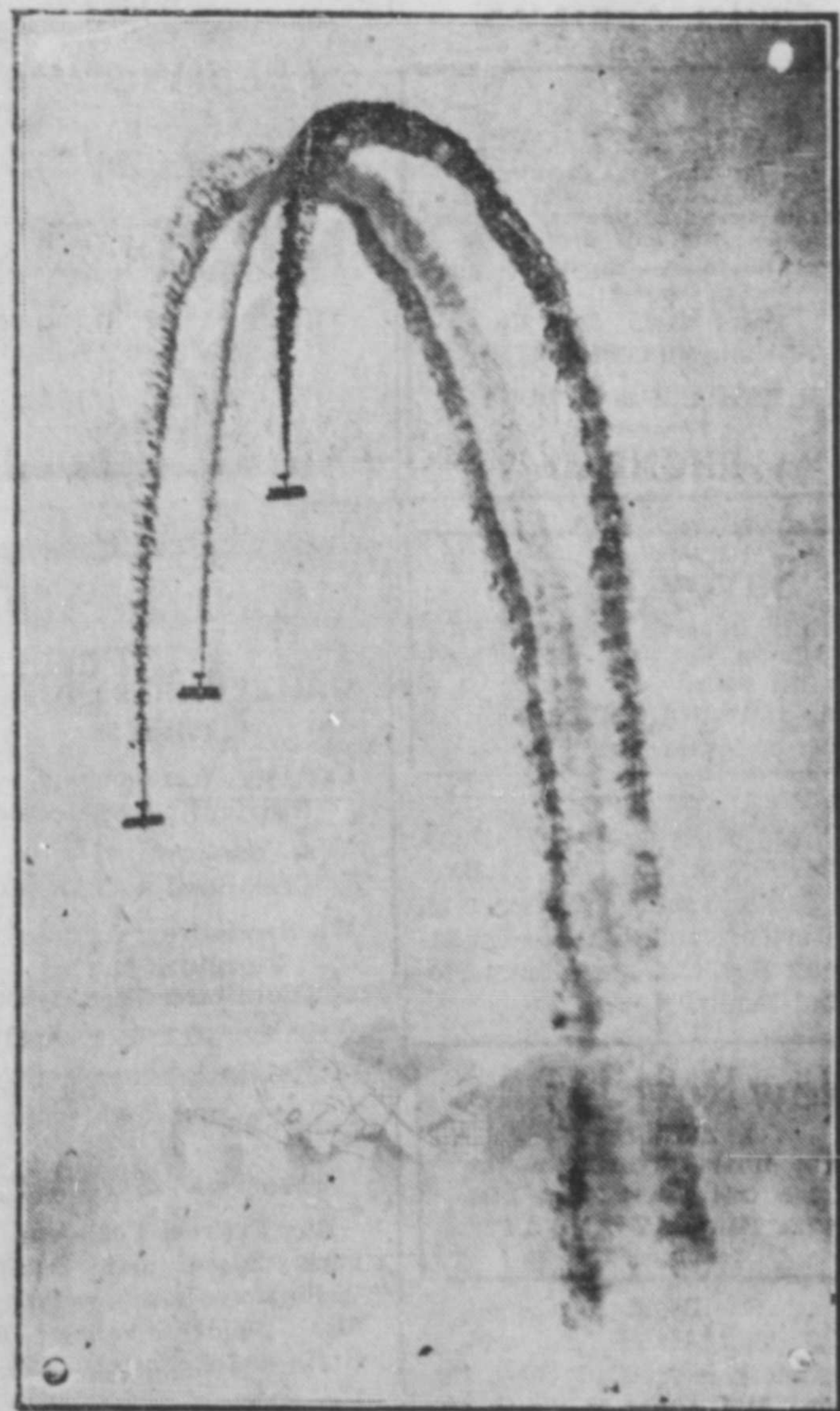
