Coal Miners and Operators Confer Over Wages and Hours

Unyielding Position on Both Sides Impossible, Says Secretary Wilson in Opening Conference; May Continue for Several Weeks

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
WASHINGTON, November 15.—The demands of the coal miners for a thirty-hour week and a sixty per cent increase in wages and the unyielding position taken by the operators were both alike declared impossible by Secretary Wilson in opening the conference to try and settle the dispute yesterday. The conference was held at the instigation of the United States Government, who, through the courts, secured an injunction against the leaders of the strike restraining them from continuing it and ordering that it be called off.
Several proposals were submitted and it is estimated that the sessions may continue for several weeks. One thing is sure, however, and that is that there must be concessions on both sides.

SMALL GROUPS ARE LIKELY TO BE SWEEPED AWAY

Nationalists of France Look for Big Majority in New Chamber.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
PARIS, Nov. 14.—The indications are that in the parliamentary elections to be held on Saturday the small groups which have heretofore existed in French politics will be greatly reduced or swept away and that the new chamber of Deputies will be composed of only two parties known as "Right" and "Left."
The nationalists claim they will have more than 400 members. Making this party will be a coalition of the various elements which, it is claimed, will have an aggregate of about 200 seats.
Registration of candidates for the election has officially closed and they number in all 2,800 for the 624 seats.

HINDENBURG REFUSED ADMISSION TO HOUSE

Students Refuse to Allow General to Enter Reichstag.

BERLIN, Nov. 15.—Pan-German students yesterday refused to permit Field Marshal Hindenburg to enter the Reichstag building to testify before the subcommittee which is investigating the war responsibility.

LONDON, Nov. 14.—The Bolsheviks were overthrown at Brest Litovsk, according to an admission made in Soviet wireless despatches. The Red army in Siberia, it is announced, has captured 90,000 tons of grain.
HELSINGFORS, Nov. 14.—The Baltic States Conference is advised that Finland will aid General Yudenitch with 30,000 troops in a new attack on Petrograd. This may end the ecort of the Baltic States to treat with the Bolsheviks.

LONDON, November 15.—The formation of a coalition ministry in Hungary headed by Count Julius Wolosceitz and including Former Premier Frederich and with Count Casky as Foreign Minister, is reported in a wireless despatch received here. There seems to be every indication now that Hungary may settle down to a stable government since the Bolshevik element is no longer in control.

PARIS, Nov. 15.—A Budapest despatch says that the Roumanian troops began evacuating that city yesterday morning, the National Army holding the bridgehead as they left. The evacuation was complete by ten o'clock and the National Army was occupying the city and was in complete command of the situation.

GRATUITIES QUESTION IS UP IN AUSTRALIA

Prince Rupert Buys Bonds for \$233,000

Secretary Douglas Sutherland Hopeful that Quarter Million Will Be Subscribed Before Midnight, when Campaign Closes

Up to noon today Douglas Sutherland, secretary of the Victory Loan Campaign for this city, was able to report subscriptions amounting in all to \$233,000 and a number of reports had not been received at that time. He said he was very hopeful that before midnight they would have secured a quarter of a million. That was their aim. Every effort is being made by the canvassers and the local result is much better than was expected.
Port Simpson reports having raised \$13,350 and Hazelton \$37,100. Other places have not yet sent in their records. The mayor's office on Third Avenue, opposite the Grand Trunk ticket office, will be open until late tonight so that anyone wishing to purchase bonds may do so before the close.

Bitter Feeling in Washington State.
 The feeling against the I. W. W. in Washington state seems to be very bitter and there seems to be cause for the bitterness. The firing on the men in the Armistice parade was certainly a dastardly act and seems to have been one of the results of a brooding over imaginary grievances such as the I. W. W. encourages.

While admitting that there is much that is wrong and unequal in the Government of the country and in the apportionment of the wealth of the world, better conditions cannot be obtained by such means as the Washington I. W. W. adopted. Any man or body of men that becomes mentally soured, loses its usefulness to the community. There is nothing to be sour about. If there are real grievances there are constitutional methods for righting wrongs.

It must be remembered that under any kind of government there will be wrongs and injustices. Anyone who has had to do with labor organizations will admit that what they do is not always right and that they are not any broader in their outlook than other people. As a matter of fact they are human individuals just like the rest of the community and make mistakes and are just and unjust, right and wrong proportionately as often as those whom they look on with distrust.

There is such a thing, however, as getting a wrong attitude towards life. Any group of men that has a perpetual grouch against the whole world and that sees nothing good except in those individuals who are in their own particular little groove, become a menace to the community. We have often been told that there is such a thing as religious mania and that in the days of ignorance this mania was the cause of untold crime. There is also political mania. The party or group that sees no good outside its own little political faith is in a bad way.

Victory Loan Closes Tonight.
 The Victory Loan subscriptions close tonight. There is no time to dally. Anyone inspired with a desire to help the nation carry on, should call at the office at once and buy as many as possible. Anyone desiring a good investment should do likewise.

It is a particularly easy way of being patriotic, to buy bonds that pay good dividends. Five and a half per cent with the best security there is, should appeal to everyone. Good terms are offered on the purchase so that there is little excuse for anyone not taking a few bonds at least.

Should Jellicoe Come to This Port.
 Should Admiral Jellicoe come here, there will be a spontaneous outburst of enthusiasm from the people of the port. Jellicoe is a representative of the greatest fighting force in the world and he is one of the greatest men of that great force. The city would doubtless go the limit in making him welcome.

Should such a thing happen as that the New Zealand should come here, there will be not only the Admiral, but also the officers and crew of the big cruiser to welcome. This should be borne in mind in any steps that are taken to give expression to the communal attitude toward the navy.

In Victoria and Vancouver there were varied activities. Receptions and lunches and dinners and balls were held, all with the purpose of conveying to the visitors the feeling of gratitude and confidence which the nation feels to and in the navy.

PRINCE RUPERT TO QUEENSTOWN

War Chariot Completes Loading Here and Sails for U. K. via Panama Canal.

After spending four days here loading one million feet of spruce lumber for the United Kingdom, the big Goughlan freighter War Chariot left the local wharf at 6 o'clock last evening. From here the big boat goes to Vancouver, where she will take on a few more thousand feet of lumber to complete her cargo. After spending two days at that port she will proceed to Queenstown, Ireland, calling en route at Panama and Newport News to take on coal at the bunkers. It is estimated that she will reach Queenstown about six weeks after leaving Prince Rupert. The crew will probably spend their Christmas at sea, but should be in Ireland for New Years. At Queenstown the boat will receive further orders from her operators, the Raeburn & Darrell Co., as to the disposal of the cargo of building material. This lumber is very badly needed in almost every European country and they are crying to Canada to supply the demand.

The War Chariot is modern as well as a new vessel, all her appointments being strictly up-to-date and along the lines of latest ship construction. The officers' quarters are commodious and well fitted and the crew's accommodation is proportionately improved over the old vessels in the tramp trade. The crew's quarters are equipped throughout with steam heat, sanitary toilet systems and the sleeping sections are entirely apart from the messes. More consideration for the accommodation and care of the crews is a feature that is entering largely into all modern ship construction.

A feature that has just recently been adopted by shipbuilders and is embodied in the War Chariot is the placing of sailors' quarters aft on the vessel rather than in the fore-castle, as has been the recognized custom for so many years. One reason for this change was that it materially ensured the lives of men from almost instantaneous destruction when mines were struck during the war.

Captain Barney Johnson will be in charge of the navigation of the War Chariot on her southbound trip, taking her through the inside passage. After the vessel has passed Victoria her navigation will be in charge of her regular officers, Captain Dalziel and Chief Officer Joss. Her officers are all old country men, who were specially sent out to take her over. The most of her sailors and firemen were signed on at Vancouver. Wireless operator O'Regan is out from the Emerald Isle for the first time and is having a great time acquiring western ways and getting used to Canadian customs. The entire complement of officers and men, who will take the ship on her long voyage, numbers forty-three.

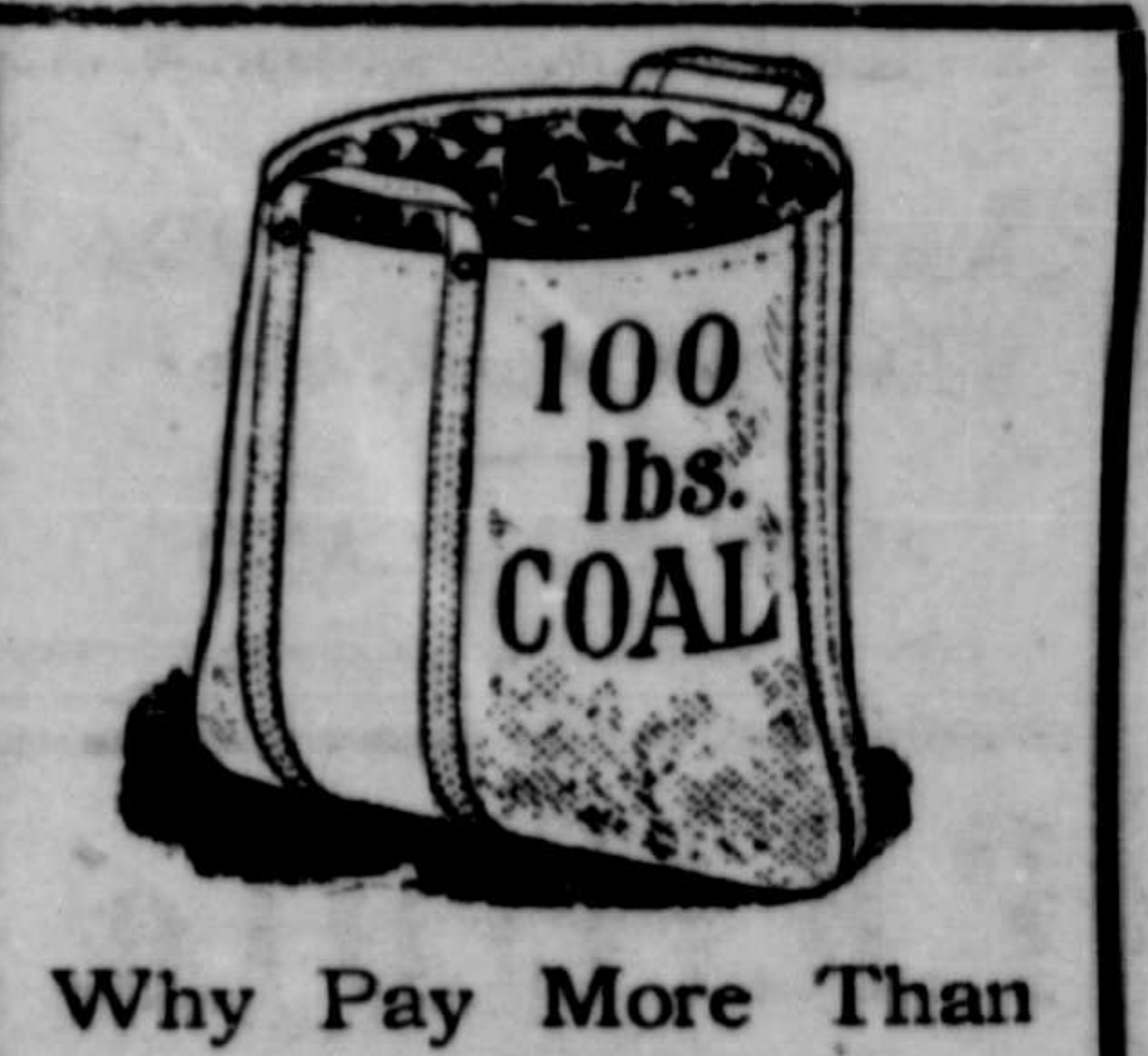

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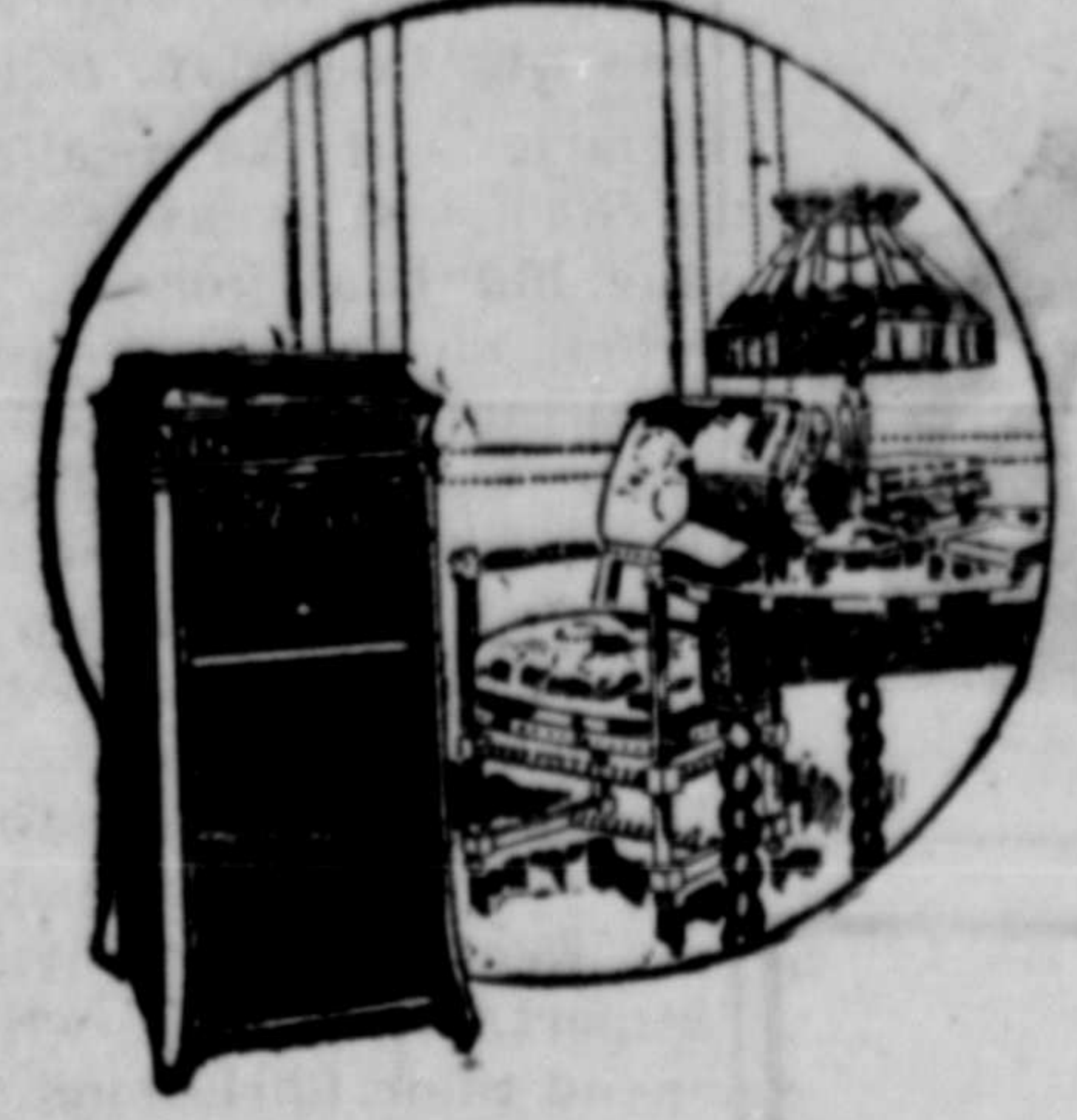

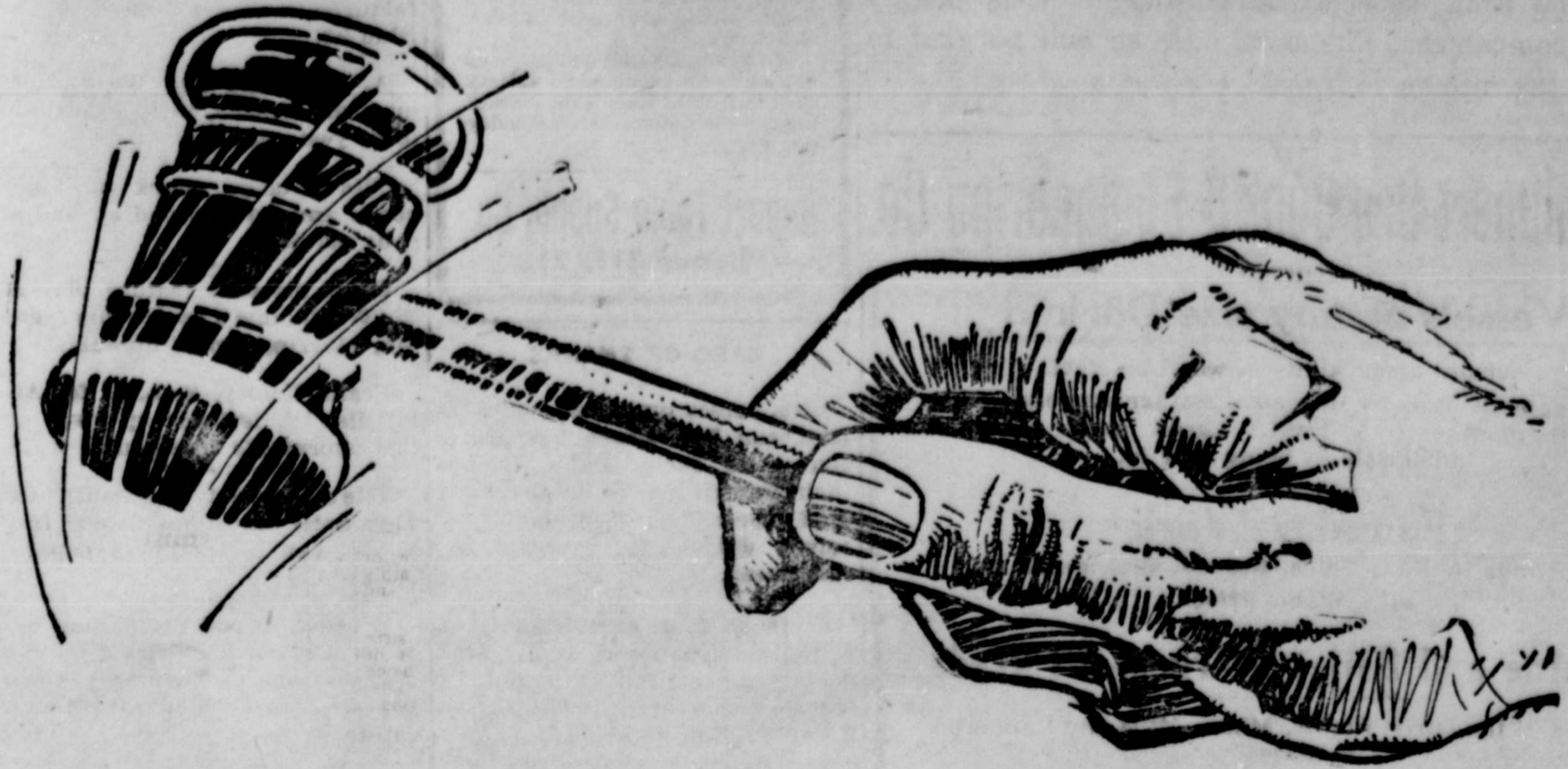
