

Suddenly a crash and a roar of water. The vessel lurched crazily. Those who rushed to the deck saw the ship was sinking fast, a ghastly hole torn in her bow where a whitetoothed iceberg had sunk its fangs. Seventy-two lives were lost in this major sea disaster of the roaring Klondyke days. Davy Jones claimed as his own the fortunes mucked from the hills that went

down with the ship. Lured by the tales of the gold in the vessel's strong boxes and safes, many men have tried to reach the Islander. For five years Wiley has worked to perfect the diving bell that served to bring the first "find" to the surface. Several times he headed expeditions to the site of the sunken ship only to meet with

Each time he learned new lessons and returned home to improve and add new features to the bell, which is a bent, egg - shaped castiron diving chamber operating a claw-like arm through watertight joints. REDISTRIBUTION

If the constituency of Omineca is to be eliminated, as and 7c. suggested, there will be a great deal of resentment shown in the interior of this province. The Lakes country is one of the most important farming districts in the province and with Vanderhoof and Burns Lake forms a very important unit. This was recognzed by the previous government and as a result they were given separate representation. It is to be supposed that strong protests will be made against the proposed change.

It will be remembered that a change was made by the previous government in Esquimalt and it was charged against them that they were trying to eliminate Hon. R. H. Pooley, the present attorney general. Now it is said that an effort is being made to eliminate the former attorney general, who is at present member for Omineca. If this is correct, the effort is likely to fail, just as did the former effort of the other party.

NELSON WIDE AWAKE

"Upon the Dominion census must depend the redistribution of seats.

"It is said that opinion in Victoria is opposed to an increase in the number of members of the legislature. There is no objection to leaving the number of seats as at present, always providing that to fix the number of members at 48 the present number, would not result in further increasing the power of the large centres at the coast, which already possess power out of proportion to the number of representatives they send to the legislature.

"The interests of the interior sections of the province must be protected, no matter whether there is an increase in membership in the legislature or whether it remains at

"In various parts of British Columbia there are local circumstances to consider in redistribution. One example is Nelson. It would be more satisfactory if the Nelson riding included parts of the adjacent territory which at present belongs to other ridings. Nelson is very deeply interested in the development of this adjacent territory, and the people living close to Nelson have a very obvious unity of interest with those of the city.

"If Nelson had originally been a combination of urban and rural riding, many of the present road problems, for example, would not have for long existed.

"The matter is one which will receive a lot of consideration by the government, but it should also be gone into very fully by the people and the public bodies of the various ridings in the province, so that Victoria may be informed as to what a majority of the people desire."
