T. D. Pattullo Points Out Duty of University of British Columbia In Inspiring Address Before Vancouver Canadian Club

VANCOUVER, April 17:-The University of British Columbia should be made into a centre for the spreading of "the international trans-Pacific view" is the opinion of T. D. Pattullo, provincial Liberal leader, expressed in an address before the Canadian Club here yesterday. "We must remember," said Mr. Pattullo, "that British Columbia is only a portion of the British Empire facing the Pacific from the east. We must contemplate our relations with the Pacific and realize that the responsibility is upon us to play a worthy and an important part. We must have an international trans-Pacific view. For this the University of British Columbia must be culturally responsible."

Mr. Fraser then proceeded to explain the system of marking report cards by means of the letters, A, B, C, D, E. A-Excellent, B-Good, C-Very Fair, D-Fair, E-Poor. Ranking was obtained by means of the "normal curve." In an average class of say 40 pupils the top 5% or two would rank A; the next 20% or eight would rank B; the middle 5'0% or 20 would be average grade pupils and would rank C; the next 20% or eight would be slightly below average and would rank D; while the bottom 5% or two would rank E. If a child's report card contained C as the rank in any subject, the parents should not feel discouraged as this was the ranking of the middle 50% of the class or the average grade pupils. The rank C was further modified by marking those pupils tending towards B as C plus, and those pupils tending towards D as C minus, while the middle average pupils were marked simply C. At the conclusion of the address W. W. C. O'Neill and Miss M. Shiell moved a vote of thanks to the speaker and many parents expressed their pleasure at listening to an address of so much practical value and interest. Mrs. C. E. Cullin, accompanied by Mrs. D.
