Centralia Shooting by I.W.W. Was Planned Beforehand, Says One of Men Who Surrendered

Westry Everett, who was Lynched, was Leader of Gang, and all Expected to be Killed; Raids on Radicals Continue all Along Coast.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
CENTRALIA, WASH., Nov. 17.—The Industrial Workers of the World planned the Centralia shooting three weeks before Armistice Day, according to an alleged confession made by L. Roberts, a confessed I. W. W., who surrendered himself to the officers following Tuesday's shooting, in which bullets from the guns of radicals killed four former United States soldiers who were marching in the peace parade.

The confession said the I. W. W. expected the hall would be attacked on Armistice Day and that all radicals who took part in the shooting expected to be killed.

According to Roberts' statement, Westry Everett, the lynched I. W. W., apparently directed the movements of the radicals, as he sent Roberts and others to Seminary Hill near the scene of the shooting with advice to "shoot when they shoot or when we heard shooting."

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 17.—Raids on the Industrial Workers of the World and other radical organizations, as a result of the killing of four former soldiers at Centralia last Tuesday, continued up and down the Pacific coast and as a result scores of radical prisoners are in custody. Some face charges of criminal syndicalism and some of inciting to riot, and yet others of pregnancy.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 17.—A number of former service men, said to be mainly members of the American Legion, broke into the I. W. W. headquarters, cut and bruised with clubs three men and wrecked the place before the police responded to the riot call.

FUEL SCARCE IN CANADA

Fuel Controller Again to Take Charge of Rationing, Owing to Prevailing Conditions.

COAL COMING IN FROM UNITED STATES

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, Nov. 17.—According to reports received here, only the most economy with the bituminous coal reserves in Canada will enable the various industries dependent upon coal to keep running all winter. The production of bituminous coal in the United States will not be normal for a month, perhaps longer, as many miners are refusing to return to work.

The coal received by Canada from April 1 to October 31 was 600,000 tons, only 70 per cent of the amount received during the same period last year. Not a ton has come in since November 1. In view of the critical situation the Government has requested the fuel controller again to assume charge of the fuel rations.

C. P. R. BLOCKED BY MUDSLIDE

Roadmaster Killed and Many Injured Yesterday.

Yesterday the debris was fairly well cleared up when a second slide engulfed the workers. Roadmaster John Holland of Mission is dead and half a dozen others are seriously injured.

The parties chose a rather unpleasant time for their trip and experienced extremely rough weather on the return trip. They started for home on Friday but had to turn back. Getting under way on Saturday it took 7 hours to do the 40 miles and some of the hunters say that all they saw outside the harbor was white spray as the boats were plunging wildly in the storm. They were all pleased with the bags of game but were very glad to get back to the comforts of home.

Over \$500,000,000 For Victory Loan

British Columbia makes Good Showing But Figures are not Yet Final; Prince Rupert \$320,000

TORONTO, November 17.—It is anticipated at Victory Loan headquarters that a total of \$500,000,000 or even better will have been reached when the final figures are announced tonight. The summary prepared Sunday at midnight by the chairman of the Dominion business committee gives \$509,545,313 as the grand total available.

Men Given Share in Management of All British Railways

Scheme Outlined by Secretary of National Union of Railwaymen Who Expresses Hope Agreement Will Be Accepted.

LONDON, November 17.—James Henry Thomas, general secretary of the National Union of Railwaymen, outlines the plan of the British Government to give the men representation on the joint board of management and expressed the hope that the agreement would be accepted.

"The Government proposes," said Thomas, "that the railways shall be managed by a joint committee of executives on which the workers would have three representatives with powers equal to those of the general managers."

The plan would also create a joint board composed of five members of the railways and five delegates of the locomotive men and the national union of railwaymen, to negotiate all matters concerning conditions of service. Any dispute arising would be referred to another body of twelve, comprising four representatives of the railways, four appointed by the men and four delegates to look after the interests of the general public.

FAMED BARITONE KIEV ORDERED EVACUATED

Excellent Program by Symphony Orchestra—Third Appearance Before Crowded House.

Before another crowded house at the Westholme Theatre, the Prince Rupert Symphony Orchestra gave its third public performance last night. Before the time set for the opening number all the eight hundred seats in the theatre had been filled and the doors were closed, turning away a number equal, probably, to those in the house. Those who were unable to hear the recital missed one of the greatest treats that music lovers of this city ever had the opportunity of enjoying. The orchestra showed a great improvement, both in technique and expression, over their last appearance three weeks ago.

The feature of the evening was the singing of Frederick Taggart, the Scottish baritone, who had come north from Vancouver especially for the occasion. The audience had expected to hear wonderful and artistic singing but before Mr. Taggart had sung his first few lines they knew that he would exceed all their expectations. His voice is full and clear, his delivery is sympathetic and overflowing with elocutionary expression and every word is as plainly understandable as if spoken.

The Program. Mr. Taggart's repertoire included humorous as well as serious selections and he was particularly well received in the former. Miss Ellet handled his accompaniments very ably. Mr. Taggart opened with the prologue from "I Pagliacci" and gave Tchaikowsky's "Forest" as an encore. The two humorous numbers, "Wi a hundred pipers and a' an' a'" and "Up from Somerset" delighted the audience. His other numbers were "Scots wha hae," "Friend o' Mine," and "Annie Laurie." The mixed quartette consisting of Mrs. William Millar, Miss King, R. Higgins and W. Clapperton rendered "Tell her I love her so" in a very sweet manner and were applauded. Stewart Steele played "The Message" as a trombone solo with great ease, accompanied by Miss Edmonds.

The opening number of the program was Sousa's march "The Thunderer" played very effectively by the orchestra and they closed with the Intermezzo from "Cavalleria Rusticana" which was well rendered. Insurgent Army of 70,000 Men Operating in Rear of Denikine.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—General Denikine has given orders for the evacuation of Kiev, the Ukrainian press bureau announced. The Ukrainians, it was asserted, cut Denikine's communications. The eastern coast of the Black Sea from Yelenshik to Sochy has been seized by an insurgent army of 70,000 men operating in the rear of General Denikine, under the Bolshevik leader on the southwestern Russian frontier, according to a wireless despatch from Moscow. Soviets have been formed, the despatch adds.

Expert Opinion. Seen after the concert Mr. Taggart was very complimentary in his remarks on the Prince Rupert Symphony Orchestra. He said that for its third public performance the organization did splendidly. When the rough edges have been smoothed off and they have gained more experience in public playing the aggregation will be a credit to a city many times the size of Prince Rupert. What is required now is the same perseverance that must have prevailed so far to raise the company to its present excellence. Mr. Taggart was unstinted in his praise of Conductor Harvey's energy and unselfishness and wondered if the people of the city appreciated what an asset the city had in a man who was willing to work so generously for the advancement of art and amusement in Prince Rupert. He was deserving of every encouragement and recognition.

Speaking for himself after being congratulated Mr. Taggart said that he had had a busy two days since he arrived in town and was rather tired. He said that he had not sung as well as usual but he hoped to come back to Rupert soon and sing again before he left for Scotland next year. He has seen the most of the town during his stay here and had made many acquaintances.

Before the closing number Mr. Harvey made a few remarks and asked for better financial support on the part of the public enjoying the concerts. Nobody made anything out of them and it was the desire of the organization to be able to meet its due expenses.

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RECOVERY OF PROVINCE FROM BAD CONDITION

Summary of Conditions Made by Finance Minister John Hart At Victoria.

THE REVENUE AGAIN EXCEEDS EXPENDITURE

VICTORIA, Nov. 17.—When the present administration took office in the waning days of 1916 British Columbia's financial condition was anything but an inspiration for a new government. It was suffering from the effects of a program which had failed to take into account a period of commercial depression. Moreover, the obligation of war imposed exactions that added to the general embarrassment arising out of a depleted treasury. While these are facts well known to the people of British Columbia it is interesting to note the progress that has been made and now recounted in an official summary just authorized for publication by the Hon. John Hart, Minister of Finance in the Oliver Government.

The Legacy.
In his general review of the situation Mr. Hart points to the fact that at the end of the fiscal year 1915-1916 the late Government found itself facing the necessity to negotiate a loan of \$2,000,000. But the proceeds from this—all the cash on hand on March 31, 1916—and all the revenue received during the eight months to November 30, 1916, except a very small balance, were expended. In other words, the debt of the province was enlarged to the extent of \$2,000,000 with current and accrued liabilities amounting to \$4,068,986.68 not shown on the books at that date. The balance on hand, therefore, when the present administration took office did not exceed \$154,577.62, and out of that amount it was promptly discovered \$100,086.37 represented the deposit to the account of the province in the Bank of Vancouver, then in liquidation. That is to say, all the cash in the treasury at that time was \$54,488.25 with which to meet not only the liabilities already mentioned, but also a payment six weeks later of nearly one million dollars as interest on the bonds of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway Company.

Succession of Deficits.
It is a matter of public record that there had been a succession of deficits and spending in excess of revenue, which had increased the public debt by \$12,000,000 from 1914 to 1917, and there were also very heavy overdrafts at the Canadian Bank of Commerce both on current and special overdraft accounts. From this period the minister takes his review up to the time he took office in the summer of 1917 and refers to the fact that it was necessary to obtain the loan of \$4,000,000 to meet pressing deficits left by the previous administration. It is also noted that the best rate at which the Government could borrow at that time was 7½%, and on that account it was thought well to wait for a more favorable market. Early in 1918, however, the financial needs of the province were taken up with the Dominion Government and a loan obtained from Ottawa amounting to \$3,000,000 at 6½%, on the understanding that the money would be repaid at the earliest opportunity. In addition to this a further million dollars were borrowed at a little over 6%.

Gradual Recovery.
The loan from the Dominion Government was effected in June, 1918, and immediately applied to the liquidation of the province's indebtedness to the Canadian Bank of Commerce on account of old deficits. Just prior to this the Premier and Mr. Hart had gone east, and from what they saw and heard of the money market it was deemed a favorable opportunity to float a loan for \$2,000,000, 6% ten-year gold bonds. The highest bid of four, however, was 94.78 for \$500,000 with an option on the balance at the same figure. This would have meant an interest charge of a little under 6%, but it was not considered a good enough offer. In consequence no bids were accepted. Nevertheless in the months following, Mr. Hart emphasizes, financial houses from time to time volunteered bids; none of which were looked upon favorably; but in all of which there was evident a grow-

ing confidence in the management of the affairs of the province and a gradual improvement of the market. Early this year the minister became convinced that the credit of the province had been so far re-established and the market so greatly improved that it was an opportune time to negotiate a loan. And on calling for tenders for \$3,000,000 5½% twenty-year bonds a bid of 99.32—almost par—resulted. With the proceeds of this loan the Dominion Government was repaid and the reduction in interest, as between 6½% paid to the Dominion and a shade over 5½% on the new loan, represented a very considerable saving to the province.

Reaching a Surplus.
The financial operations of the fiscal year 1917-18 showed, in place of a deficit which had marked years of previous administration, a surplus of net revenue over net expenditure of \$483,196.87. The minister points out, moreover, that for the purpose of assisting soldier settlement and furthering employment for returned men, authority was given by the legislature at its last session for loans aggregating \$3,000,000. Tenders were called for this amount in July, the term of the bonds being ten years and the interest rate 5%. The price obtained works out at 5.56%, which compares remarkably well with loans obtained by the Dominion and other provinces about that time.

"We ought to be able to make more of the real oneness, which, thank God, is already ours, the oneness, both in faith and in potential action, of all who can and do kneel to Christ as their living Lord. We want to dwell upon and foster the power of that fellowship for united impact upon the world, or penetration of the world, at an hour so inexpressibly difficult as this. That need not, it will not, interfere with complete loyalty to the distinctive truths, which in our smaller circles

within the Church of God we conscientiously hold dear."

"The corporate life which belongs definitely to our own Churchmanship claims our whole-hearted allegiance. But that allegiance acquires an element of peril if it becomes so disproportioned as to obliterate or mar our loyalty to the larger whole, the Christian fellowship, the God-guided life and energy of all who profess and call themselves Christians."

The League is just now at work preparing circulars calling upon prospectors and mine owners to send in their samples with minute particulars of their mines, and another circular to mining engineers and probable mining investors stating the reliable character of the mining information that is to be found at the League bureau. We do hope to have by far the best chamber of mines in the province, and will undoubtedly have it in time, but I feel confident Mr. Riel could materially aid our movement with practical suggestions, and have therefore pleasure in inviting him to call at the Free Miners' League—No. 621 Second Avenue.

RECOVERY OF PROVINCE FROM BAD CONDITION

present Government took office the collection of income tax was not regarded in a very serious light. The wastepaper basket invariably received the tax bill and little or no attempt was made to enforce payment, either of arrears or of current charges. Investigations since then, the minister observes have demonstrated that in addition to this thousands of persons never have been assessed on income. On that account one of the first things Mr. Hart did was to appoint special collectors in the larger cities to comb in all tax arrears and especially income tax. The poll tax, too, was made collectable at the same time, the assessors in all districts being instructed to bring their rolls to date in the case of all persons liable for income tax. The result is shown in an increase in the collection of income tax from \$296,804.75 in 1916-17 to \$670,683.25 in 1917-18. The arrears of general and school taxes at the end of 1916 aggregated over \$4,000,000, running as far back as . . . During 1917 the special collectors gathered in arrears to the tune of \$353,511.83 and, in 1918, \$175,076.20.

Mr. Hart points out, too, that by the employment of special auditors greater uniformity is shown to have been obtained in the making of income tax returns, while this part of the work of the taxation branch has been instrumental in adding to the rolls a large amount of taxable income at a cost of under two per cent. on the extra revenue.
