

Dr. Adam Shortt Explains Choice of Ontario Capital in 1841

OTTAWA, April 4:-Probably no Canadian has delved more into the political history of Canada than 6.00 Dr. Adam Shortt, who for years Long before Dr. Shortt joined the .25 each year in close research work in .02 the life of Lord Sydenham, first .15 governor-general of the United Provinces of Upper and Lower Canada, contains an interesting statement with regard to the reasons why Kingston was selected by the governor as the seat of government in 1841.

He states that there were five places whose claims were canvassed-Quebec, Montreal, Kingston, Toronto and Bytown (now Ottawa). The latter was eliminated almost at once, for although remote from of defence and in winter time was shut off from regular communication with Britain. The final choice lay between Montreal and Kingston. From the point of view of defense Kingston was safer. As regards communication with Britain, Montreal was nearer in summer and Kingston in winter, via New York. Montreal was the larger and more important city, he ted for the whole province. Judged from the existing requirements their claims were about equally balanced, but having regard to the future development of the country Kingston had undoubtedly the advantage. Moreover, Lord Sydenham frankly confessed he considered it desirable the capital of the province should be removed from the doctors such as filled the Montreal district and had already created trouble. 

## CANNERIES **GETREADY**

Ninety Plants to Be Operated This Season on Coast-Preparations in Full Swing

Preparations for the season's activities at canneries on the British Columbia coast are now in full swing. Ninety canneries will be operated this summer and already machinists are either on the job at the plants, or en route.

Every day parties leave here on coastwise steamers for points along the west coast of Vancouver Island and on the mainland from Vancouver north to the Alaska boundary.

It is estimated that 2000 men have already left. The cannery hands will soon be clearing, and when the plants are in full swing there will be about 20,000 people, including fishermen, employed.

On the United States side hundreds of employees of salmon canning plants are preparing to sail for Alaska. By noon Wednesday 775 passengers will have departed from Seattle to work in the northern canneries, it is reported.

The exodus started Friday, when 440 passengers sailed on board ss. Alaska. Crews for canneries at Tenakee, Drier Bay, Valdez and Shepard Point were aboard the vessel.

At 9 a.m. Tuesday ss. Alameda will sail with crews for canneries at Quadra, Kasaan and Todd. She will carry 240 passengers.-Vancouver Province.
