Victory Loan Final Returns Show \$673,199,590 Subscribed

British Columbia well to the Fore with \$35,000,000; Outline of where money will go; G.T.P. to cost \$15,000,000.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
TORONTO, November 18.—Final figures for the Victory Loan have been received here giving a grand total for the Dominion of \$673,199,590. This is made up as follows: Ontario, including Toronto, \$454,624,500; Quebec, including Montreal, \$161,102,200; British Columbia, \$35,000,000; Alberta, \$16,181,090; Saskatchewan, \$20,000,000; Manitoba, \$40,452,000; New Brunswick, \$19,750,000; Nova Scotia, \$28,000,000; Prince Edward Island, \$3,000,000; city of Toronto, \$146,379,500; city of Montreal, \$126,102,700.

OTTAWA, Nov. 18.—The loan just consummated in Canada brings domestic borrowings since the war to the total of over two billion dollars.

Heavy Borrowings.
"When it is estimated that every cent of Canada's borrowing prior to the war was made in foreign markets, some idea of the vastness of the loans floated within our own boundaries since then may be gained," said the Minister of Finance. "The success of the present loan exceeded expectations. To sum up, I estimate that during the next twelve or eighteen months, including unforeseen capital expenditures or further expenditure that may be provided by Parliament, it will be necessary to arrange by borrowing, including the present Victory Loan, sums aggregating from \$650,000,000 to \$800,000,000. Unless the financial conditions abroad improve very materially, these amounts will have to be obtained from the Canadian people.

Allocation of Loan.
"Expenditures which the amount raised by the present loan are intended to meet, partly at least, include \$529,122,445 provided for under capital account in the estimates for 1919-20, to which must be added \$15,000,000 to cover interest and deficits on the Grand Trunk Pacific; \$125,000,000 for credits to Great Britain and allied countries; \$5,000,000 for Halifax relief, and \$25,000,000 for housing. This makes a grand total of \$669,122,445.

HALF MILLION VICTORY LOAN

District Subscribed Liberally, Each Point Exceeding Quota Very Considerably.

The Prince Rupert district has subscribed over half a million dollars to the Victory Loan. The district figures are \$522,900, exclusive of Anyox, which reports \$250,000. At the last report Anyox had \$250,000, but probably the amount is higher by now.

There is another subscription expected to arrive in the mail tomorrow which may raise the Prince Rupert district to \$537,900. Every point in the district exceeded its quota and the whole district made a very good showing. Japanese in Prince Rupert subscribed \$10,000 and the Chinese \$6,000. TIFF DENTON BREAKS BILLIARD RECORDS

CLEVELAND, November 17.—The world's records at three-cushion billiards were broken on Saturday in the billiard tournament held here. Tiff Denton, of Kansas City, scored fifty points in 35 innings, breaking the previous record of the same number of points in 36 innings. Denton also made the world's highest run record by scoring 17 points in the fourteenth inning.

YUDENITCH RESIGNS RUSSIAN COMMAND

LONDON, Nov. 17.—General Yudenitch has resigned command of the Russian Northwestern Army following his defeat by the Bolsheviks and the capture of a good part of his army.

STRIKERS AND STEEL WORKERS DISAGREE

Youngstown, Ohio, Nov. 17.—Minor clashes between strikers and steel workers occurred here. Six thousand men filled the streets near the mills.

Steamship Service B.C. with Australia

Four Freighters to be Put on by Canadian Government with Vancouver as Headquarters as Soon as Boats Ready.

VANCOUVER, November 18.—For the purpose of inaugurating a steamship line to Australia and New Zealand from Vancouver, under the auspices of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine and for studying the possibilities for establishing a service to South America and other parts of the world R. G. Vasghal, superintendent of Canadian Government Merchant Marine and assistant to the president of the Canadian Northern Railway, is in the city.

A line to Australia and New Zealand will be established almost immediately or just as soon as the ships are available. Four ships will start on this route with the intention of giving a monthly service. Other services, such as to South Africa or the Orient, will be established as soon as there is a reasonable prospect of business offering.

PREMIER E. C. DRURY OF ONTARIO FAVORS IMPORTATION REFERENDUM

TORONTO, November 18.—Premier Drury expressed himself in favor of the Ontario Government holding a referendum on the question of the importation of liquor into Ontario. When asked if the voters of Ontario would be called upon at the next election to vote under the proportional representation system, Mr. Drury said: "I should say it was altogether probable that at the next Ontario election the present system will be superseded by the one you have mentioned. Most certainly there is room for electoral reform in this province."

WESTERN FUEL CO. THREATEN TO CLOSE DOWN

Objection Taken to the Canadian Government Embargo on Shipments from This Country.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
VICTORIA, Nov. 18.—(Noon). The Western Fuel Co. may close down its mines at Nanaimo if the Canadian Government persists in placing an embargo on British Columbia shipments of coal to the United States, it is announced by officials of the company. The Western Fuel and representatives of other companies have been in conference here and they declare the embargo will work a hardship on the B. C. mines. They have promised Ottawa officials that if export is permitted they will undertake to see that local consumers are supplied.

NEW COMPANY STARTS TO SHIP FRESH FISH

Sea Products Co. Buys up Catches of Boats at Fish Sale Today

The Sea Products Co. which has just begun fish handling in this city bought their first fish for fresh shipping this morning. There were only two boats, the Liberty and the Neilson, in and the new company bought both catches. The National Independent Company are taking care of the fish at the government dock as the Sea Products Company have not their plant ready for icing just yet. The Liberty sold her catch of 55,000 lbs. at 16.1c and 12c, while the Neilson sold 15,000 lbs. at 15.8c and 10c.

No More Help For Anti-Bolsheviks

Lloyd George says Other Countries better able to Help than England; Unable to Continue Financing.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
LONDON, Nov. 18.—Premier Lloyd George, speaking in the House of Commons during a debate on Russia, dwelt on the complexity of the Russian problem. "In whichever direction we go," he said, "we are marching into fox."

Returning to the general question of Russia, the Premier referred to the operations of Admiral Kolchak and emphasized the organization difficulty of England helping Kolchak. "There are other countries," he declared, "better able to help Kolchak than we. These powers are next door. I do not wish to be considered as criticising, but if there has been failure it is not our fault."

The Premier declared that with Great Britain's own burdens, it was quite impossible to go on financing a civil war in Russia indefinitely. "Our own country is our first concern," he said, "and there is no surer road to Bolshevism at home than financial bankruptcy. We have contributed more to anti-Bolshevik elements in Russia than France, Japan and America put together. I boast of that because it was an obligation of honor for us."

Lloyd George admitted the accuracy of the report that France and England were in agreement to withhold further supplies from Russia because it was impossible to burden French tax-payers.

No More Help
LONDON, Nov. 18.—(Noon). The London morning newspapers express disappointment with Premier Lloyd George's statement regarding Britain's policy towards Russia.

The girls of the Public school met the High school and in a very tight game were defeated by the score of 1-0, the only score being on a penalty. If this class of playing is going to be kept up by the girls the series that will be played this winter will prove very interesting.

The game played last night was a very even one and the next will be watched with keen interest. A. M. Macdonald, superintendent of schools, refereed the game very satisfactorily.

COAL PRICES UP

Western Fuel Co. of Nanaimo Increases Charge a Dollar a Ton.

VICTORIA, Nov. 18.—The price of coal in British Columbia was increased a dollar a ton by the Western Fuel Co. of Nanaimo today. This brings the price here to \$12.50 a ton.

CAR ACCIDENT

Wind Blew Car Almost off Roadway This Morning.

The Ford delivery auto of the Central Cash Market met with an accident this morning when a gust of wind caught it and, skidding it on the slippery street, blew it nearly off the roadway. Fortunately, it was stopped before it got entirely over. The accident took place on Fourth Ave. near McBride in front of Geo. White's house and had the car left the roadway altogether a nasty wreck would have ensued. There is a steep grade off the side and the road is built on a hillside. No one was hurt but the springs over the front wheels were broken and the rear wheel bent.

NICK GURVICH LIQUOR CHARGE

Pleads Not Guilty and Trial Resolves Itself Around Difference Between Brandy and Rye.

This morning Nick Gurvich, of Fraser street, was charged with having liquor in his possession in a place other than a private dwelling. The evidence for the prosecution was all heard and the trial was adjourned till Thursday morning to allow analysis to be made for the benefit of the accused.

Constable Adams testified that he went to Mr. Gurvich's rooming house with a search warrant and on stating that he was looking for liquor the accused showed him a bottle of liquor which he stated was obtained from a local drug store labelled brandy.

Constable Adams said that when he got the bottle it did not contain brandy but was decidedly rye whiskey. On making further investigation the constable found two smaller bottles on the premises containing liquor. C. H. Orme gave evidence and said that the bottle produced in court was the same as he had sold the accused on prescription but he could not swear as to whether the contents were whiskey or brandy as he had sold. Chief Vickers tasted the contents and without hesitation said it was rye.

The accused then gave evidence. He said the present contents of the bottle were exactly what he had got from the drug store. He asked that brandy be got from the drug store and comparison be made. On this comparison he was willing to be found guilty or not guilty. He knew nothing about the two smaller bottles. They may have belonged to roomers. Adjournment was taken in order to make the comparison.

A despatch from Ottawa to Vancouver says that Hon. C. G. Ballantyne expects to call for tenders for two new steamers to go on the triangular run connecting Vancouver, Victoria and Seattle...

There is not a word in the report or an intimation of any kind that Prince Rupert is to be included in the activities of the Government. Perhaps the despatch was sent out especially for Vancouver and Victoria readers and, therefore, this port was not mentioned.

Associated Board of Trade for District.

Prince Rupert has a great deal in common with other parts of northern and central British Columbia. There is a community of interest which is worth cultivating. In the southern interior they found out that they could do more by uniting than by working as little individual communities.

There are such centres as Stewart, Alice Arm, Prince George, Vanderhoof, Hazelton, Smithers, Telkwa, Terrace, Port Essington and one or two points at Queen Charlotte Islands that would benefit a good deal from the publication of a nicely illustrated booklet dealing with the country.

A good organizer is what is needed to line up the different points and show the need of concerted action. In unity there is strength.

Rupert Did Well In Victory Loan.

Prince Rupert made a very creditable record in the Victory Loan subscription. The canvassers did excellent work and the people generally responded nobly.

There has been some criticism of the cost of advertising the loan. The total amount spent in advertising is something like \$300,000, or .06 per cent or three-fifths of a mill on every hundred dollars.

WANT BATTALION RE-ESTABLISHED

City Council Unanimously Favors
102nd Being Started in Home City.

ALD. BARRIE BRINGS IN RESOLUTION TO THIS END

Before the council meeting adjourned last night, Ald. Barrie brought in a motion that the Minister of Militia be communicated with and that it be recommended to him that a unit of the 102nd Battalion be re-established in this city. He pointed out that the battalion had been largely recruited in Prince Rupert and had been called the Northern B. C. Battalion. The motion was seconded by Ald. McMeekin.

The mayor gave some particulars regarding the original formation of the gallant battalion and felt that Prince Rupert was entitled more than any other place to hold the flags and colors of the regiment.

The battalion had originally consisted of 80 per cent northern B. C. men but after getting overseas had been reinforced by Ontario men with the result that an Ontario city was now trying to get the re-established unit. Not only did Prince Rupert want the battalion but the feeling was general all over the province that this city was entitled to it. Major Matthews, of the Imperial Oil Co., Vancouver, who had been an officer in it, was, for one, strongly in favor of Prince Rupert getting it.

Ald. Rochester said that this was a good move and Prince Rupert had first claim to a re-established 102nd battalion.

The motion was carried unanimously and the Minister of Militia will be communicated with.

"SPITE FENCES" EXIST IS SUGGESTION MADE

Discussion on Alderman Perry's Fence Amendment Takes Funny Turn.

On Ald. Perry bringing in an amendment to the fence section in the city bylaws, Ald. McTae informed him that the Board of Works already had some new regulations in view, especially regarding garage construction. They were now obtaining advice from the underwriters and other cities on these questions and he suggested that the regulation of the fence bylaw be left to be dealt with along with these others. Alderman Perry said that he was quite willing to have it dealt with in this way.

There was considerable discussion on the matter, suggesting spite fences and neighborly disputes. Ald. Kirkpatrick asked why a person could build a house over six feet high if they could not build a fence any higher. Mayor McClymont replied that sometimes fences were built for other reasons than use, but houses cost too much to be built for spite. Fences sufficient to keep people from looking into their neighbor's back yards would have to be perhaps fifteen or twenty feet high and very amusing looking structures.

FORGERY CHARGE AGAINST PRISONER

Marvin Allen Awaiting Trial for False Pretences Now Further Accused.

Marvin E. Allen appeared before Magistrate McMordie on another charge this morning. Besides the charge of obtaining money under false pretences for which he is committed for trial and is awaiting hearing before Judge Young, the accused was this morning charged, before Magistrate McMordie, with forgery. The forgery charge was adjourned till Thursday morning at 10 o'clock when, it is understood, further adjournment will be asked for. L. W. Patmore is appearing for the accused.
