AUCTION OF FISH

Cold Storage Pays \$1200 For 30,000 Pounds Frozen Stock of United Pacific Fisheries

Plant Sale Delayed

Claims of \$4,000 to Be Satisfied—Large Crowd at Bidding

At an auction sale held by Sheriff S. A. Nickerson at the Fish Exchange yesterday afternoon for the purpose of satisfying the claims of creditors of the United Pacific Fisheries, which for a while at the first of the season endeavored to handle halibut on a co-operative basis, some 30,000 pounds of frozen fish—20,000 first class and 10,000 second—was bought in by the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co.

Although an offer of \$50 for a winch had been bid by the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., it was decided, at the request of one of the creditors, to postpone for two weeks the auction of machinery and equipment in the warehouse which had been prepared by United Pacific for the handling of halibut.

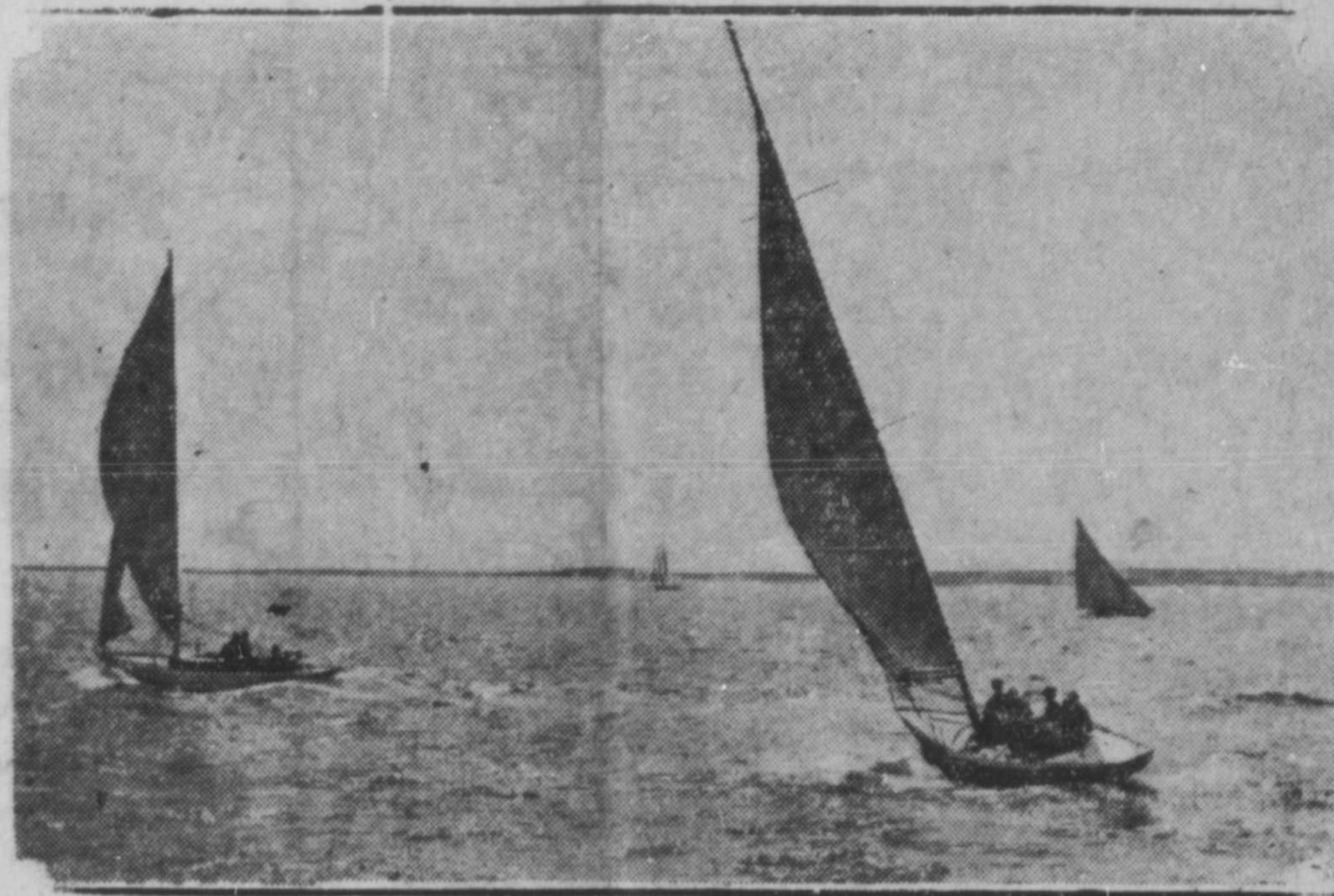

NAUTILUS CROSSING

Sir Hubert Wilkins' Submarine on Atlantic en Route to North Pole

NEW BEDFORD, June 5.—The submarine Nautilus, with Sir Hubert Wilkins' North Pole exploration party on board, left at 11 o'clock last night to cross the Atlantic Ocean to Bergen, Norway, en route to Spitzbergen where the final base will be made before dashing under the ice to the North Pole.

Before leaving Cape Cod, the Nautilus ran final tests with complete satisfaction.

As the Nautilus proceeds across the ocean, the Graf Zeppelin is being prepared at Friedrichshafen, Germany, for its trip to the North Pole to keep rendezvous with the submarine.

RECORD IN BOND SALE

Oversubscription of United States Issue Set Up New Record

NEW YORK, June 5.—It is claimed in Wall Street that the oversubscription within three days after announcement of Secretary of the Treasury A. W. Mellon's \$800,000,000 United States government bond issue was a record over-subscription for the country and, possibly, for the world.

RAN AMOK ON VESSEL

YOKOHAMA, Japan, June 5.—Running amok shortly before the steamer Empress of Canada docked here today from Vancouver, Graciano Bilas, Filipino steerage passenger, stabbed two Chinese members of the ship's crew to death and wounded 29 others.

Ship's officers, with armed revolvers, finally cornered Bilas and placed him in irons. He will be given trial on arrival in Hong Kong.

Giant German Flying Boat Lands on Coast Of Brazil Last Night

Had Good Passage Across at Rate of 160 Miles Per Hour; Engines Functioned Perfectly; Will Make Tour of Cities on Atlantic Coast

PERNAMBUCO, Brazil, June 5.—The giant German flying boat DO-X reached the coast of Brazil safely last night after its crossing of the Atlantic Ocean from Cape Verde Islands, it was announced here.

The DO-X, after a rest here, will probably visit other South American points before proceeding to New York and elsewhere on the United States coast.

NATAL, Brazil, June 5.—The German seaplane DO-X arrived here at 2:10 p.m. today from Fernando Noronha Island, Brazil, completing its trans-Atlantic voyage. Today's leg consisted of 200 miles. The enormous ship landed at Fernando Noronha last night, completing a 1400-mile flight from Porto Praia, Cape Verde Islands. Thirteen persons are on board.

DEMANDING OUTLET

Prince Rupert might do well to make a final plea to the Federal government to commence work this year on the Pacific outlet to the Peace River as a means of putting the unemployed to work. If some such national enterprise is not started there will be a bad outlook for the coming winter. If, on the other hand, a few thousand men were employed in railway building, the country would be getting real value for the money expended, the men would retain their self-respect and the whole country would benefit.

That argument is wholly apart from the fact that with wheat at its present price it is impossible for the Peace River farmers to raise grain at a profit. To give them a direct outlet to the coast by the most feasible and direct route would be worth more to the farmers of the Peace than to give them a bonus of five cents a bushel on their grain.

REPORTS FROM RUSSIA

Reports coming from Russia are many and varied. While one apparently authentic story gives details to show how lovely is everything the next pictures conditions as awful. As a matter of fact, more of the stories are correct than most people think. The country is very large and conditions vary with the districts. Conditions are not consistently bad or consistently favorable. It is a country being made over and it will take many years to make it over. Considering the opportunities and the opposition it has received there is no doubt the Soviet has done wonders. If the rulers of that country could only get away from the obsession that they must save the world from capitalism they would get along very well. As it is much money which should be expended at home is spent in missionary effort and often it is of a kind to bring the country into dispute. However, one must not judge Russia by its missionaries any more than Canada can be judged by her missionaries. They are not usually representative men.

MONOPLANE OR BIPLANE

British Air Ministry Will Make Strenuous Tests With Specially Built Craft

LONDON, June 5.—For many a day on airfields the world over, manufacturers, pilots and others interested in the maximum efficiency of aircraft have argued as to whether the monoplane or biplane is the most effective type of construction. A monoplane has but one wing, while a biplane has two. The answer should be found soon now for the Air Ministry has decided to make a practical test of both types.

Two medium sized air-liners, one a monoplane and the other a biplane, have been ordered. Each will carry the same load and the same engine power. Scrupulous care is being taken to ensure that the only important point of difference between the two machines shall be the structure of the wings and control surfaces. Cabin accommodation, arrangement of the cockpit, provision for wireless and passengers' comfort, luggage space—all are identical, and the three engines are located in each machine in precisely the same relative positions.

Built of Metal

Each machine is built entirely of metal except for the fabric covering of wings and tail unit, and will have exceptionally comfortable seating room in a large saloon cabin for 10 passengers. Including luggage, the pay load, comprising passengers and baggage, will be approximately one ton.

Comparison of the design figures show interesting variations in performance, weight and dimensions. The monoplane has considerably the greater span, total wing area being almost exactly the same in both machines. Both ships weigh about four and a half tons with full load on board, the monoplane being a few hundred pounds heavier because wings and tail unit weigh more than in the biplane.

The air ministry intends to put these two craft through a series of strenuous comparative tests, in land plane and seaplane form, which will probably include experimental flights on the established airways. The result should certainly be a decision as to which type of flying machine is most efficient as a medium sized air liner. During the war, tiny fighting triplanes were tried out but this form of construction was not greatly successful, and none of the three-wingers are being built now.

Work on the new bridge across the Nechako River is being rushed so as to prevent a tie-up of traf-

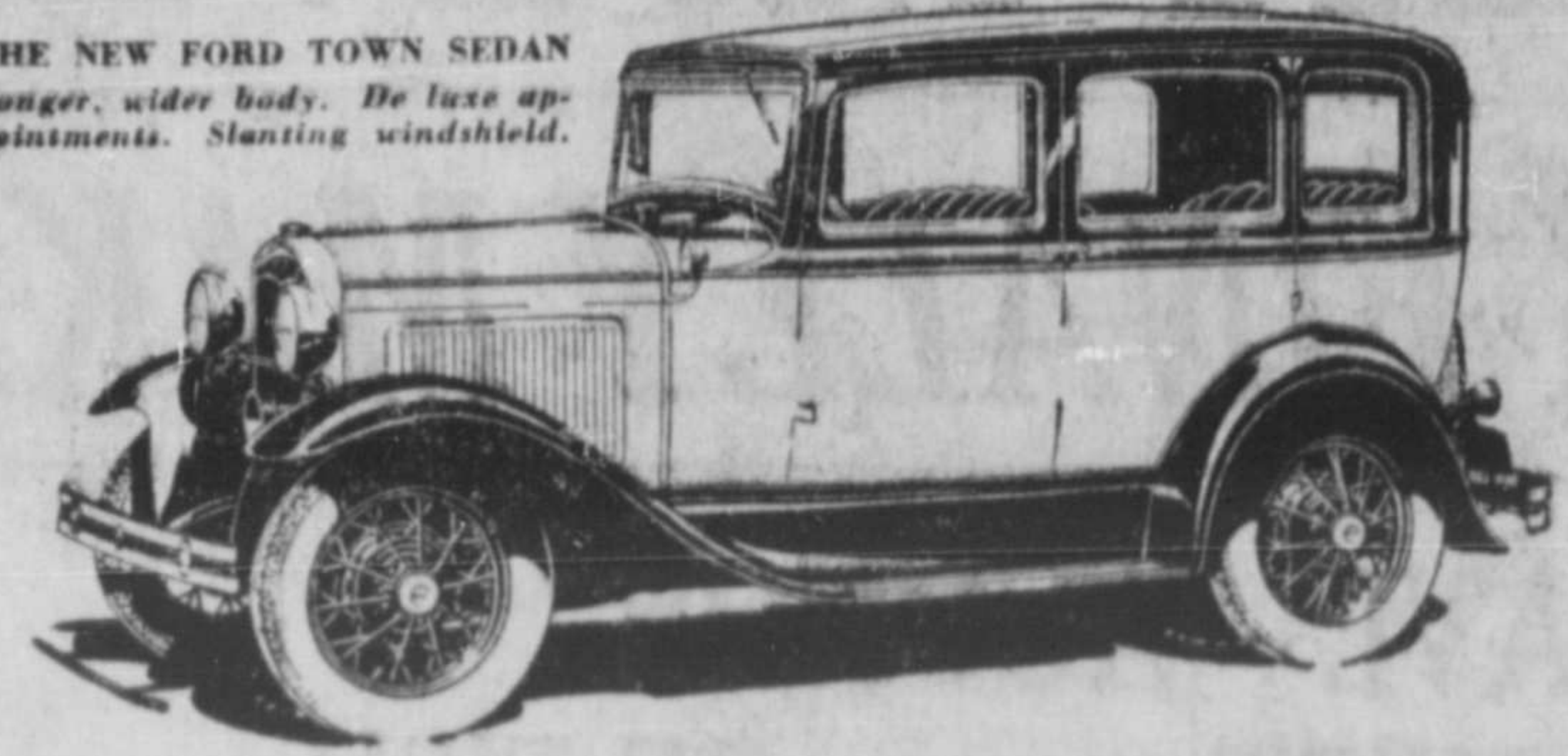

But after all have felt blue about it there is the sunshine following, which tells of the possibility of the entire force located at Prince Rupert being shifted east to Smithers. Which is something!

They tell us, too, that Mr. Tobey's office may be abolished and this would bring the necessity of finding another job for Mr. Tobey. That's bad. It's hard to see Mr. Tobey on a chain line or Mr. Gray clouting spikes, or things like that.

But meantime the rumors are flying up and down the mountain division, and an air of expectancy hovers over all classes of workers. Nothing official has been received here, and the basis for the stories is believed to come from newspaper reports of drastic economies which must be effected by Sir Henry Thornton and his staff in their management of the government system.

However, it all leaves us wondering what, if anything, will happen, and when.

NEW YORK, June 5.—George M. Lott and John Van Ryn of Philadelphia and Francis X. Shields and Freddie Wood have been named Davis Cup representatives for United States against England. Lott and Van Ryn are already overseas while Shields and Wood are leaving today.

USE SMALL SEAPLANES

Britain's Attempt at Third Victory in Seaplane Race Will Be Made With New Type of Ships

LONDON, June 5.—Two tiny little seaplanes, each bearing the somewhat ordinary appellation of "S7," will carry the Union-Jack in the Schneider Cup Races, emblematic of the seaplane championship of the world, on September 12. And each of the tiny speedsters will, by the time they are ready for the race, have cost Great Britain many thousands of dollars.

The two ships, Supermarine monoplanes, are being built for the contest alone. In them will be embodied all the lessons learned by airplane and engine designers in preparing for previous contests, and one of them seems likely at the moment to prove itself the fastest vehicle in the world. Whispers of 400 miles per hour are in the air. Quiet and confident members of the "high speed squad" which will pilot the two machines lend strength to the rumors.

Three Contestants

This year, only Great Britain, Italy and France will participate in the contest, and as yet little is known of the latter two countries' entries for the race.

The British team is at Calshot at present, undergoing the special training necessary to fly the fast machines. Six different types of fast airplanes are being used for the practice. Three of them are pure speed craft built primarily for participation in the Schneider contests of 1927 and 1929. They are the Gloster IV biplane of 1927, modified since the contest at Venice that year to make it more suitable for practice flying; the Supermarine S5 monoplane, winner of the 1927 event; and the Gloster VI built in 1929. The other machines are Fairey service biplanes on floats; oldest of them being the justly celebrated "Flycatcher" for several years the standard shipfighter of the Fleet Air Arm and nowadays the high speed pilot's usual introduction to seaplane fighting. The other Fairey craft are a "Fleetwing," two seat fleet fighter, and a "Firefly," single seater, both of them comparatively new machines which in their respective classes are among the world's fastest and most efficient airplanes.

Members of the high speed crew are enthusiastic about their chances. Physically and mentally, they measure up to the finest type of British airmen. No attempt is made to impose rigid dietary or other restrictions on them. They are simply expected to keep fit. Smoking is almost entirely given up, and alcohol is usually dropped.

DOOM OF BIG FIRS

Will Not Last More Than Twenty Years Minister Believes

VICTORIA, June 5.—Within 20 years the only big Douglas fir trees in British Columbia will be found in parks, according to Hon. Nels Lougheed, minister of lands and for many years prominent as a logger in this province.

"If our export trade in Douglas fir continues to expand as it has in recent years, the doom of the big trees will be even earlier," Mr. Lougheed predicted, adding that 15 years was probably not a too liberal estimate.

Mr. Lougheed stated that plans were being considered to expand the export trade in hemlock, cedar and pine, by interesting foreign timber buyers in varieties which can satisfactorily replace Douglas fir.

"The Conservation Committee of 1912 estimated the annual growth of timber at 5,000,000,000 feet. There could not be a more misleading statement. A forest grows to maturity and stands there. It may stand for a million years but there would be no increase in the board measurement available after the maximum capacity of the soil has been attained," he pointed out.

"We need trade extension to prolong the life of our stand of Douglas fir. If we can push hemlock into the foreign market we can extend the life of our Douglas fir reserves. There is nothing surer than that these Douglas fir forests are going to disappear unless we push other woods into consumption," he warned.

FISH GLUE DISCUSSED

Vancouver Province Writes Editorial About Research Work Here

Of what use is a fish head or a fish skin? Not very much, when the fish needs it no longer, one is apt to say, though those who have been about canneries will remember seeing the Indian women carrying choice heads home to be turned to account by frugal cooking, says the Vancouver Province editorially.

From Ottawa, however, comes word in a fisheries news bulletin that fish heads and skins are finding a place in industry. Research is showing the way. In Nova Scotia, 3465 gallons of glue were made last year from cod, cusk and haddock waste. In British Columbia there is no manufacture of fish glue on a commercial scale, though experiments have been made with the heads of salmon and halibut. So far, the greatest success has been obtained from the halibut. A glue made at the Fisheries Experimental Station at Prince Rupert showed a sheer strength of 2500 pounds per square inch when tested in the Forest Products Laboratory at the University of British Columbia.

British Columbia fisheries produced about 26,000,000 pounds of halibut and 216,000,000 pounds of salmon last year. How many halibut heads there were we do not know, but there were probably enough to make a good many gallons of glue. The fisheries department says 37,000,000 salmon were caught. As for the prospective market, Canada imports something over 2,000,000 pounds of glue a year.

GOLD KEY TO SITUATION

Value of Prospector in Economic Life of Country is Stressed
By Dr. Mandy

Gold holds the key to the present economic situation and the discovery of new gold mines is that key, according to Dr. J. T. Mandy, resident mining engineer, who addressed the Prince Rupert Rotary Club at its weekly luncheon yesterday afternoon. According to the same authority, the prospector is the man on whom the country depends and every encouragement should be given him in his work.

Dr. Mandy gave a most interesting and, at times, humorous sketch of life in the wilds of B. C. in connection with mining. His stories of prospectors were intensely amusing. After getting his audience into a good humor, he proceeded to quote mining figures to show how important was the mining industry. He stated that there was a world shortage of gold and Canada was "the bright and scintillating star" in the mining firmament and the prospector was the man to whom they looked to relieve the situation.

In South Africa, Dr. Mandy said, there was a reserve supply of gold bearing ore of about 500,000,000,000 tons of which 31,000,000,000 tons was being mined yearly. Very soon this would be depleted and the world would look to Canada for a supply.

British Columbia had the mineralized area although it was difficult to prospect. Because of the difficulty, there was hope that eventually mines would be found that would become world famous. The department of mines at Victoria was centering on gold at present as one of the great factors that might relieve the present depression. Production was on the increase and this year Canada should be second only to South Africa in gold production, passing the United States in the race for supremacy.

Again and again Dr. Mandy reverted to the plea that the prospector was the man to whom to look and urged that he be given every consideration.

In a special industrial supplement to last Monday's issue to mark the sail to the coast of Canadian Manufacturers' Association delegates to the convention in Victoria, the Vancouver Province describes many industrial enterprises in the province. The pulp mill at Ocean Falls and mining and smelting plant at Anyox are among the industries described and pictured.

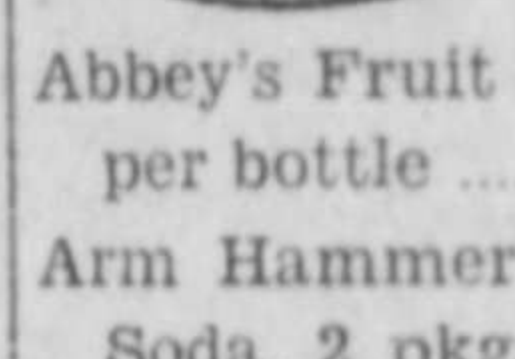
