Join in Merging of Parties

First Duty of New Regime Will Be to Balance Budget

Following Financial Crisis Which

Lloyd George Ill So Active Grit Leaders Are Called Into Conference Today

LONDON, Aug. 24:—Premier J. Ramsay MacDonald's government resigned today in the face of the national financial crisis and Mr. MacDonald was asked by King George to form a temporary national non-party government whose first duty would be to balance the budget. The new government will include both Conservatives and Liberals as well as Laborites.

Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin, former Premier, and Liberals who have taken over the active management of their party during the illness of Rt. Hon. David Lloyd-George, the war-time Premier, were asked at Buckingham Palace in the presence of the King to participate in a cabinet in which Mr. Baldwin will serve under Mr. MacDonald.

There will probably be a special session of Parliament and, after the nation's finances have been straightened out, there will, doubtless, be a general election and the political situation clarified.

Premier MacDonald's immediate plan is believed to be the formation of a small national cabinet of some twelve or fourteen ministers. The retiring cabinet had twentyone members. There will probably be in the new cabinet Rt. Hon. J. H. Thomas and Rt. Hon. Philip Snowden and some half-dozen other members of the retiring cabinet. At least nine retiring members, including Rt. Hon. Arthur Henderson, who are opposed to some of Mr. Mac-Donald's economy measures will probably have no place in the new government. These will probably also include J. R. Clynes, Tom Johnston, Arthur Greenwood, George Lansbury and William Adamson.

The Labor party is split over the economy program that has to be adopted to overcome a threatened budget deficit of \$600,000,000. The section of the cabinet breaking with the Premier will find itself in opposition.

Premier MacDonald obviously has assurances from the Conservative and Liberal leaders of their willing assistance in following a definite policy which was formulated during the last twenty-four hours and agreed upon by the three party leaders.

The new government will probably not last beyond the close of the year if that long.





Notable Ice Beds Are Found By Measurement to Be Shrinking

Mount Robson One

Scientists Recently Visited Ice Beds In Rocky Mountains

(By Arthur O. Wheeler) Following up observations pre viously made of glaciers along the Canadian Pacific Railway, at the close of the Alpine Club's camp at Prospectors Valley, this month, the president, H. E. Sampson, of Regina, and the honorary president, A. O. Wheeler, of Sidney, went to Mount Robson to ascertain the amount of recession of the Robson Glacier. Observations were first made in 1911, at the time of the Alpine Club of Canada's expedition to explore the Mount Robson region. The expedition was then accompanied by a party from the Smithsonian Institue of Washington, D.C.

IS DEAD

Hon. Sanford J. Crowe Dies in Vancouver-Was Pioneer of Province

VANCOUVER, Aug. 24:-Senator Sanford Johnston Crowe, a member of the Senate since 1921, died in his sleep at his home here last night. He was 62 years of age.

The late Senator Crowe was born February 14, 1868, at Truro, N.S., and was educated in that town. He came to British Columbia in June. 1888 and for years was a partner in the firm of Crowe & Wilson, contractors, retiring in 1909. He was an alderman of the city of Vancouver for seven years from 1907 to 1913 inclusive.

Senator Crowe first entered Parliament in 1917 when he was elected as a Liberal-Unionist. He was summoned to the Senate on December 1, 1921.

Senator Crowe was married in 1890 to his first wife, Annie C. Smythe, of Bathurst, N.B. They had three children-a daughter, now dead, a son. Harold, who was killed in action in the Great War, and another son, Elmer, who served three years overseas. Deceased was married again in 1914 to Laura C. Mc-Leod of Charlottetown, P.E.I., who survives him.

The late Senator Crowe was an active member of the Canadian Club and also belonged to the Terminal City Club, Shaughnessy Golf Club, Terminal City Lawn Bowling Club. He was a life member of the Vancouver Exhibition Association and belonged to the Presbyterian Church.


