



Too many of the champions seem to prefer vaudeville and pictures to fighting and this, it is said, is unfair to the sport and also to the public.

Should the heavyweight title be vacated as seems imminent, there would probably be another elimination contest held to decide a new champion although no details as yet have been settled upon.




