

## Would Mean Economic Ruin to Accept Trade Overtures Which Are Now Being Made by Soviet

MONTREAL, Feb. 26:-If Canada were to accept the overtures from Russia which are now before the Dominion government and exchange her machinery for Soviet coal and gold she would, in the opinion of Sir Herbert Holt, president of the Royal Bank of Canada, simply be expediting her own economic ruin since she would be supplying Russia with the means to become a more formidable competitor than ever.

"Emphatically we should not allow Russian coal and wood to penetrate our markets," Sir Herbert said. "It's produced by conscript labor which is worse than convict labor. The Soviet allots a number of workers to agriculture and lumber enterprises and says to them: 'Unless you work, we will give you no

### INCREASE TAXATION

It is semi-officially announced that there will be increases in taxation this year. This is very greatly to be regretted because already the burden of taxation is heavy and just now people can ill afford any addition to that burden. However, the bills have to be paid and the people. have to pay them. The budget must be balanced, whether it be in the state, the business or the home or trouble will soon be brewing.

### ORIENTAL PROBLEM

Practically every legislature that has been elected in British Columbia has taken a shot at the Oriental problem but so far little if any change has been made by legislative action.

Many years ago slavers brought Negroes to the southern part of what is now the United States and since that time there have been racial difficulties in that part of the country. The effort to provide the cheapest kind of labor provided a thorn in the flesh that will persist throughout

the ages. In Prince Rupert railway builders and others imported cheap labor from the Orient in order to increase their profits. For years most of the manual work and also domestic work in many homes was done by Orientals but, chiefly through the influence of labor organizations, the impor-

tation of the cheap labor was stopped. Today many people claim to be suffering from Oriental competition. This is the direct result of the sin of our fathers who brought them here to flood the labor market and secure larger profits. They are now settled in the country and cannot be removed any more than can the Negroes be moved from the southern states. They are Canadian citizens in everything but the right to vote. If they had the right to vote the agitation against them would at once cease because all politicians would be looking for their support.

It may be remarked here that the very people who objected to Oriental competition in the labor market are the ones that today take advantage of the opportunity to deal with them, now that they are in business. At one time the Oriental problem was a labor problem. Now it is a business problem. Eventually it will solve itself.

### OMINECA AND MANSON

Just as Pooley was to be banished from the Legislature a few years ago by doing away with his seat, so Manson is to be climinated by abolishing his seat. We prophesy that one effort will be just as successful as the other. The former Attorney General is too good a man to be left without a political home. He could have the nomination in a number of ridings in the province and doubtless after the next election will be found, either resuming his position as first lieutenant to the leader of the opposition or holding one of the most impotrant portfolios in a new administration. At any rate he will be there.


