Railwaymen Sign a Working Agreement

C.N.R. and G.T.P. Employees Join in Arrangement with Canadian National Railways; Two Thousand Men Affected.

(Special to The News via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—Though the operators and miners of the central competitive fields remained hard locked all day yesterday in the negotiations for a new wage scale contract, the prospects for an agreement that would settle the coal strike were considered brighter than at any time since the strike was called.

The operators offered the miners a flat increase of fifteen cents a ton on coal mined and twenty per cent increase for day workers.

John L. Lewis, acting president of the mine workers' organization, outwardly stamped the concession as wholly inadequate but both sides plainly took the offer as the breaking of the ice and an opening for trading with the Government to hold off. Fuel administrator Garfield took no steps openly to ration or restrict coal consumption.

TWO HUNDRED FOR RUNNING OPIUM JOINT

Others Are Shown Mercy by Magistrate and Fined Ten Dollars.

SECOND OFFENDERS GET SEVERE PENALTIES.

The Chinese charged with offences under the Drug Act came in the Police Court this morning for sentence.

Chong Kee pleaded guilty to being the keeper of an opium joint and got a fine of \$200 or the alternative of two months hard labor. Chew Seh, Lem Saut, Lee Sing, Chow On, Chai Tick and Chong all pleaded guilty to being inmates of an opium den and were fined \$10 or twenty days.

W. Patmore appeared for the defendants and asked for leniency. The magistrate was inclined to give that it was really hard for Orientals to get lodging where they are not being smoked, but advised any who did not want to be arrested for being inmates of an opium den and then would not be liable. If any of the Chinese before him appeared in court again they would get no mercy.

PREMIER TO SAIL WITH THE PRINCE

Return to Canada From New York on the Battle Cruiser Renown.

OTTAWA, Nov. 21.—Sir Robert Borden has accepted the invitation of the Prince of Wales to accompany him on the Renown from New York to Halifax, where the Prime Minister will be present at a farewell dinner to His Highness on Monday, November 24.

The Premier will remain in Halifax until the Renown sails, after which he will return to Ottawa and resume his official duties.

The health of Sir Robert has greatly benefited during his trip to the south.

MAKES TRIP IN GALE'S HEIGHT

Leila Falls to Get Anchorage at Metlakatla and Makes Rupert at 2 a. m.

Howard Birnie, engineer of the Department of Indian Affairs' gasoline launch, the Leila, probably had one of the most exciting experiences due to the windstorm of yesterday. On Wednesday afternoon he started out to take Indian Agent Perry to the Indian village on a trip of inspection. Landed safely at the "City of the Good" plans were made to stop overnight and return to town in the morning so the boat was tied up. About two o'clock in the morning Mr. Birnie visited the boat to see that all was well, and found that she was beating against the wharf rather badly and had already broken a couple of her planks. He took her out from the wharf to anchor, but failed to get anchorage and was unable to get back to the Metlakatla wharf. The only alternative was to bring the boat right to the city in the dark and during the height of the gale. This was done successfully, but the navigator says that it was just as thrilling a trip as he would wish to make. On landing here he found that his tender had gone, but he congratulated himself that that was all.

Mr. Perry returned yesterday afternoon, having been brought over by one of the Metlakatla boats.

ENCOUNTERED GALE MAKING FOR RUPERT

Fish Boat Republic Bucks Big Gale Coming South for Fish Sale.

There was only one boat in for this morning's fish sale. This was the Republic with 35,000 lbs. of halibut which she sold to the Atlin Fisheries at 18c and 12.2c. The Republic came south from the Yakutat banks and was not outside at the time of the big blow, but encountered it in the narrows between Petersburg and Ketchikan.

The big fish boat made hard going for about four hours on Wednesday night. It took her four days to come south from Yakutat.

Nich Gurvich's liquor case again appeared before the Magistrate this morning. Ed. Mann, of Orme's Drug Store, took the witness box and testified that no test could be made locally to differentiate between brandy and rye whiskey, on which the case hinges. The case was adjourned till the 29th to allow the samples to be sent to the Government Analyst at Victoria.

Conference of Powers To Consider Russian Situation to be Called

LONDON, November 21.—An Allied conference will probably be called to sit in London soon to consider the Russian situation, Premier Lloyd George announced yesterday in the House of Commons.

The condition in Austria is also causing anxiety. There is no hope of ameliorating the economic situation in that country without aid from the allied powers, Lloyd George declared.



Coal Strike May be Settled Very Soon

Operators Offer Flat Rate Increase of Fifteen Cents a ton which is Declared Inadequate.

(Special to The News via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

WINNIPEG, Nov. 21.—The Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees signed a new schedule yesterday with officials of the Canadian National Railways. The contract covers 2,000 men on the Government railway system between Port Arthur and Vancouver on the C. N. R. and between O'Brien and Vancouver on the G. T. P. line.

The C. N. R. and the G. T. P. systems formerly had separate committees and it is understood that the consolidation of the two committees and the making of a single agreement to cover both systems has had a great deal to do with the protracted negotiations which lasted for several months.

The schedule applies to all men employed as freight handlers, clerks in all offices, storemen and round house employees. The brotherhood is also negotiating in Montreal with the Canadian Express Co. for an agreement respecting its employees in all territory between Halifax and Prince Rupert.

A substantial increase in wages is obtained as well as several beneficial changes in working conditions. Among the latter is time and a half in excess of eight hours, and for all Sunday and holiday work. The men who are paid a monthly salary are to be given two weeks' holiday with pay each year.

The agreement is to be retroactive to July 1 of this year.

NIGHT WORK FOR WOMEN ABOLISHED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—Without a dissenting vote the international labor conference referred to the drafting committee a recommendation that night work for women employed in industrial establishments be abolished.

Unemployment Pay Cut off in England

120,000 Men are Affected by the Stoppage of Donations; Many Ex-service Men still on Unemployed List.

(Special to The News via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, November 21.—The Government's decision to completely abolish unemployment donations to all civilian workers next Friday and to reduce those to ex-soldiers to five dollars a week, has taken the laborites by surprise. It was thought that only the reduction of civilian doles was contemplated.

The latest unemployment figures available show that 120,000 workers will be immediately affected by the stoppage of donations. To this number must be added many thousands normally engaged in engineering trades, who have been thrown out of work through the ironmongers' strike since the last official unemployment return was completed.

Some 336,000 ex-service men were still on the unemployed list. The complete total of civilian and military without work in London is 124,000.

STEPHENS' LAUNCH BADLY BROKEN UP

Now Resting on the Sand at the Mouth of McNicholl Creek.

M. M. Stephens' boat, the Aileen, is now resting on the sand near the mouth of McNicholl Creek. Yesterday Fred. Stephens and C. P. Riel went across to see what damage was done. The hull of the Aileen evidently was beaten against the rocks before finally landing on the sand, as it is badly smashed up. It will cost some hundreds of dollars to repair her and she will probably be out of commission the rest of the winter.

C. P. Riel's boat, the Imperieuse, is unharmed by her forced trip across the bay.

M. M. Stephens is at present in Vancouver, but is expected home next week. Both boats will be brought across this afternoon or evening.

FEARS EXPRESSED FOR THEIR SAFETY

Paul Aivazoff and Scotty Reid are Overdue on Hunting Trip.

On Wednesday of last week Paul Aivazoff and Scotty Reid set out on a hunting trip to Campania Island, about a hundred miles south of here. They went on Mr. Aivazoff's boat, Helen B., and were expected back before this time. If they do not turn up soon a search party will leave to look for them.

TRIPLE ISLAND MEN SAFE FROM STORMS

J. H. Hilditch's boat, the Tide, came in from Triple Island on Wednesday afternoon with the report that the cement machinery floor is up for the new lighthouse and the men working out there have moved into it from the old camp sites. Although they have been storm-bound for a week and have been unable to work because the materials could not be landed they are in condition to weather any kind of storm. The Tide is going out to Triple Island this afternoon.

REMEDY SITUATION FOREIGN EXCHANGE

International Financial Conference May be Called by President Wilson.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—The calling of an international financial conference to remedy the situation in the foreign exchange market is under consideration by President Wilson. Financiers and Government officials are alarmed at the swift depreciation of European money and the president has been urged to use his influence to halt the drop.

WELL KNOWN VANCOUVER MAN PASSES

F. L. Carter Cotton, Newspaperman, Finance Minister and Educationist, Takes Steps Into the Beyond.

(Special via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

VANCOUVER, Nov. 21.—Francis Lacy Carter Cotton, for many years owner and editor of the Daily News-Advertiser of this city, died following an apopleptic stroke of six weeks ago.

He was a well known figure, not only in Vancouver but throughout the province. He was born in Yorkshire in 1847, came to Vancouver in 1886 and until 1910 was head of the pioneer morning paper of the city. In 1900 he became minister of finance in the Provincial Government. Four years earlier he had won an election while in jail in New Westminster on contempt of court proceedings in a civil suit. He directed his campaign from jail and was elected by a handsome majority.

Mr. Carter Cotton was a conservative of the old school. He was usually looked upon as a safe man, and it was for that reason he was given the position of minister of finance in the McBride Administration. He took a prominent part in the formation of the University of British Columbia and was the head of its first governing body.

Dawson, where a silver tea service was presented to Mr. and Mrs. Phillips from the members of the Bible Class, of which Mr. Phillips was leader. General regret was expressed at the departure of Mr. and Mrs. Phillips from Prince Rupert, where they had endeared themselves to a large circle of friends.

Jellicoe and Militarism.

Admiral Jellicoe says that he is not going to suggest militarism, but we must face facts. The existence of the Empire depends on her sea power.

Very many people would like to be living in a time when there would be no war or preparation for war. Unhappily, however, we come of a fighting race in a fighting world. Our ancestors were trained in the school where the survival of the fittest obtained and where the one that did not fight was sent into oblivion.

There is a lot of fighting to do in private life as well as military and the man or woman who cannot fight is not worth much in this life. Perhaps the same is true of a nation.

London Times And Spiritualism.

Discussing Spiritualism the London Times says editorially: "The Church Congress, debating spiritualism, and the Archbishop of Canterbury promising an inquiry into its pretensions by Bishops, were on dangerous ground. Human longing for continuity of existence beyond the grave, for communion with the dead, and for piercing through phenomena into reality is perennial. The Christian religion offers a satisfaction of its own to these cravings. But it rests its proud claim not on a utilitarian adaptation to the needs of the human heart, but on revealed truth. It is derogatory to Christian theology, and a weak tribute to the pretensions of mediums, that the vogue of spiritualism should have been discussed from a competitive standpoint. Nor, unless it be admitted that the claims of the Church and of spiritualism are of the same order, do Bishops form a suitable court of inquiry. We do not think that any special court of inquiry is necessary."

"We have no wish to burn Sir Oliver Lodge or Sir Arthur Conan Doyle lest they beguile the weak by substituting asseveration for evidence. They proclaim the existence of people with two powers, the power of raising spirits and the power of foretelling the future. We cannot go far enough back in history to find a period in which these claims were not made, believed in by many foolish and a few who passed as wise, or supported by a cloud of witnesses. In fact, despite what was said at the Church Congress, the real fact is that the farther back we go the more general the belief and the more assured the evidence in support of it."

"The spirits raised by contemporary methods are no more impressive, give no more illuminating glimpses of the supernatural world or more certain predictions of the future, than those raised by primitive or medieval rites. Moreover, notwithstanding the apparent opinion of Mr. Banks, we think it probable that, while there were many fraudulent witches, there were plenty who honestly believed that they had sold their souls to the devil and had been paid the price. What is new is the theory that there is a new method, the method known as spiritualism, dating from Swedenborg, as Canon Edmund McClure reminded his audience. We are disposed to think the spiritualistic theory logically inferior to that of inspiration by the devil, especially in the matter of telling fortunes or predicting the future. If evidence be ever available that a medium can, with fair regularity, beat a good racing tipster or advise us beforehand of one or two important and apparently improbable events, we shall be ready to consider a grave metaphysical opinion on the probable source of the information. In the meantime, on the matter of evidence as to alleged phenomena, we should have little confidence in the judgment of Bishops, and should prefer that of conjurers with regard to fraud, of pathologists with regard to the 'sub-conscious self,' and that of average men with regard to telepathy."

NAVY LEAGUE AT ATLIN, B. C.

Commander Mathorn, R. N., Ad-
dresses Gathering in Court-
House, Telling of
Wonderful Deeds.

Advantage was taken of the
visit of Captain Sidney R. Bailey,
R. N., and Bryan Williams to hold
a special meeting of the Navy
League at Atlin. A goodly gather-
ing assembled in the court
house and Commander Wm. Ma-
thorn, R. N., presided. In open-
ing the meeting the chairman re-
ferred to the satisfactory work of
reconstruction that was going on
and the necessity for still main-
taining the famous password of
the navy "Keep Watch." Although
the war has had the immediate
effect of forming the British Em-
pire into a mighty League of Na-
tions yet we must "keep watch,"
to sail the good ship of State clear
of rocks and shoals and to up-
hold and fight for our King's
motto "Dieu et mon Droit."

Trade Follows Flag.

You know it is a trite saying
that "Trade follows the Flag,"
said Capt. Mathorn. The pros-
perity of Canada depends on her
ability to carry agricultural, for-
est and mineral products to all
parts of the world, and conse-
quently shipbuilding is becoming
of vast importance in our national
life. It employs thousands of
skilled workmen and contributes
immensely to the wealth of our
Dominion. On the Atlantic and
Pacific coasts on the St. Lawrence
and on the Great Lakes there are
great shipbuilding plants con-
structing a Canadian navy to be
manned by Canadians and to com-
pete in the trade of the world.
Our American cousins—all honor
to them—are also rushing ships
into Blue Waters, and you will
be pleased to hear they are nobly
raising a fund of \$50,000,000 for
British seamen in recognition of
their bravery and self-sacrifice in
face of constant danger during
the war. We must remember
nearly 20,000 of our sailors lost
their lives and nearly 30,000 more
were crippled or injured. Our
merchant service is truly loyal
and contributed splendidly to
winning the war, and, to its great
credit be it said, not a single ship
was held up for want of a crew
to sail her.

Scapa Flow.

"Scapa Flow is a big black water
subject to a succession of gales
throughout the winter months
and everything is wet, cold and
miserable there," said Captain
Bailey. "It contains no gun bases
and yet it was the best place in a
war with Germany for the Grand
Fleet to rendezvous. There were
four or five entrances to the an-
chorage in Scapa Flow, these were
blocked with the exception of one
entrance which was kept open.
The Portland Firth is one of the
worst pieces of water in the British
Isles."

"For the first five months of
the war the fleet was engaged in
constant patrol work all across
the North Sea, close on to Heligo-
land. When our ships with the
Canadian army arrived we hoped
for an action, but the enemy did
not attack, and at last we realized
the Germans did not want to fight.
The crews of the Grand Fleet were
kept continually exercising and
training whilst sweeping the
North Sea. The ships were gen-
erally relieved—one week at sea
and one week at anchorage. The
destroyers and cruisers experi-
enced particularly hard times in
the cold, wet, foul weather."

Small Craft.

"An enormous number of small
craft were built which were em-
ployed in mine-sweeping and
patrolling. These vessels had to
be manned by the fleet, and in-
tensive training of the crews was
necessary. It would be rather un-
fair to criticize the action off the
Dogger Bank, or the battle of Jut-
land, until Germany issues her
official report of the engagements.
The battle served some good pur-
poses and it found Admiral Lord
Beatty, who, by hanging on to the
German fleet enabled the Grand
Fleet to join in the fight. Shortly
after the battle of Jutland the
first mutiny broke out in the
German fleet and that mutiny was
responsible for the eventual de-
feat of the enemy."

In the beginning of the war
the submarines were a somewhat
unknown factor. It took Germany
a long time to find out what the
submarines could do. One of
them got near our fleet and was
sunk. They never attacked again.
Scapa Flow was protected by

mine-fields connected by wires to
the shore. The German subma-
rines never made a systematic
attempt to sink our battle fleet.

Merchant Seamen.

"The conduct of our merchant
seamen was cause for great ad-
miration. The man working be-
low only has his first notice of
being in action by hearing the
explosion. It was also wonderful
to see how men and officers came
forward to man the ships. At one
time in England it was thought
we could not last another six
months, and then new methods
were adopted by the Admiralty
and things improved. Convoys of
50 ships were formed and pro-
tected by cruisers and destroyers.
The submarines were more ac-
tively employed. They took the
place of the old privateers in the
Napoleonic wars. The hydroplanes
proved a wonderful invention.
They were fitted in the trawlers.
If one of them heard a submarine
she would hunt for her until she
got over her and then drop mines
or bombs. Some of the subma-
rines were rammed and others
sunk by shot. They were some-
times difficult to sink, damage to
the conning tower was not suf-
ficient to send them down. Depth
charges of 200 lbs. of gun-cotton
were very destructive."

The meeting concluded with
three cheers for Captain Bailey,
the Royal Navy and the Mercantile
Marine.

LECTURE AT ST. ANDREW'S LAST NIGHT

E. A. Wakefield Talks on "American Wit and Humor" Before Scotsmen.

The opening lecture of the St. Andrew's Winter Syllabus was held last night when E. A. Wakefield, American Consul, addressed a large audience of both ladies and gentlemen in the society's parlors on the subject "American Wit and Humor." The evening's entertainment was well interspersed with musical numbers, both instrumental and vocal, which were very much enjoyed by everyone. After a few remarks by President S. D. Macdonald, who was in the chair, the society orchestra rendered the "Thunder March." The orchestra consists of Dr. Bayne and Mr. Peyton, cornets; Jas. L. Lee and Robt. Arthur violin; J. Brough, cello, and F. Stephens, piano. During the course of the evening songs were given by Mr. Fraser, Mrs. D. S. Cameron and J. Sinclair. Mr. Peyton played "Ye Banks and Braes" as a cornet solo, answering to an encore with "Bonnie Mary of Argyll" and Jas. Lee played "Bonnie Lass of Bon-Acord" as a violin solo. During the interval in which refreshments were served a presentation of a cabinet of silverware was made to Mrs. Robt. Wiggins who has just recently come from Glasgow to join her husband.

Mr. Wakefield's Address.
S. D. Macdonald then introduced the speaker of the evening and mentioned the privilege it was for the society to have a person address them with such an enviable record as a public speaker as Mr. Wakefield held.

Mr. Wakefield said that during his twenty years in the consular service he had been associated with Scotchmen all the time and had made many good friends among them and it was a pleasure to make a second address before the local St. Andrew's Society. He dealt at some length on the definition and causes of laughter which was produced by wit and humor and stated that, although laughter was generally attributed to surprise or incongruity it was impossible to explain the true physiological reason. Mirth was also felt in animals but the expression could not be seen. It was regretted when people could not enjoy laughter and it was only the educated who could. Barbarians were generally very dignified and austere and idiots were the epitome of solemnity.

American wit and humor was an offshoot of English humor but it had been very considerably changed by widened views and cosmopolitan population. Mr. Wakefield then gave several examples of different forms of plebeian American humor. One example was that of General Noah Johnson and a private soldier during the Civil War. The general was strolling along the road when he spied the private in the bushes alongside the road: "What are you doing there?" gruffly, from the commander. "Eating 'simmons, sir," meekly.

(Now it is a well-known fact that persimmons are a very sour and drawing fruit.) "Why are you eating persimmons?" again. "To shrink my stomach to the size of the rations, so I will not starve to death," was the private's witty reply.

The speaker also stated that although President Lincoln's life was full of hardship and sorrow still he showed humor at all times and some very good examples of the great president's witty remarks were given. The two great American humorists, Mark Twain and Artemus Ward, were also mentioned with many examples of their peculiar art. In closing Mr. Wakefield said that the wit and humor of any nation should advance with its development commercially and educationally, in fact this was necessary to its intelligence.

Farewell to Mr. Dennis.
Before closing the evening, President Macdonald made a few complimentary remarks on the departing second vice-president, W. G. Dennis, who was called upon for a speech. After a short and witty speech "Scotty" gave two recitations and the gathering closed with the singing of "He's a jolly good fellow," "Auld Lang Syne" and "God Save the King."

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

INDIANS HOLD BIG CONFERENCE HERE

All Tribes Unite in Support of Claim in Connection With Lands of Province.

There was held in Prince Rupert on November 17 and 18 a conference between representatives of the Indian tribes of British Columbia allied in support of the petition of the Nishga tribe now before the Privy Council in England, and the united tribes of B. C. consisting chiefly of Tsimphean and Kitikshean tribes.

To the Indian tribes of British Columbia and particularly to those of the northern coast, this conference was of outstanding importance as it resulted, not only in the settlement of differences which had existed for a number of years between the Nishga and neighboring tribes, but also in the alliance of the two organizations through a resolution passed, by which the United tribes pledged themselves to support the allied tribes in carrying forward the Indian case, until either they have obtained a judgment of the judicial committee of the Privy Council or the governments have arrived at a basis of settlement with them.

George Matheson of Sardis, B. C., was chairman of the conference and some of the northern places represented by delegates present at the conference were Kincolith, Greenville, Port Simpson, Meamskinisht, Kispiox, Hartley Bay, Kitimaat, Kitkatla, Kitlope, China Hat, Kitselas, Kitsumgalum, Kitwengool.

The Petition.

The Nishga petition is a direct petition presented by the Nishga tribe to the Privy Council in the year 1913 for securing independently of the governments a decision on the land question. Ever since 1915 the interior Indians have been allied with the Nishgas and have actively helped them. At the conference held in June, 1916, between the allied tribes and the Indian Rights Association the Nishga petition was accepted as a test case for all the Indian tribes of British Columbia.

In carrying on their agitation the allied tribes have been helped by the "Friends of the Indians of B. C.," the "Social Service Council of Canada" and the Aborigines Protection Society" of London, England.

Act Independently.

There has been prolonged discussion between the Allied Tribes and the Government of Canada with a view to agreeing upon an arrangement for referring the Nishga petition to the judicial committee and afterwards to secure an adjustment of foreshore rights, fishing rights, hunting rights, and all other general rights and finally the adjustment of lands to be reserved and compensation for lands surrendered.

It is understood that the Indians claim all the lands of the province as theirs and that they have been unjustly deprived of the same without compensation.
