

### Ton of Radium, Worth \$8,600 Found on Great Bear Lake; Deposit May Be Widespread

EDMONTON, April 15:- Canada's Far North holds abounding wealth for the Dominion and possibly the greatest radium deposit in the world. One ton of this rare mineral which has been discovered at Echo Bay on Great Bear Lake is worth \$8600.

Geologists reveal that radium bearing pitchblende is not peculiar to the Great Bear district but might also be found in pre-Cambrian shield that extends over two million square miles of Canada.

# Judgment Is Given In Supreme Court Against Department Officials

Mr. Justice D. A. McDonald Finds in Favor of Somerville Cannery Co.—Sum of \$70,000 Was Claimed— Now to Be Assessed

VANCOUVER, April 15:-Judgment has been handed down by Mr. Justice D. A. McDonald in Supreme Court in favor of the Canadian Credit Men's Trust Association, trustees for the Somerville Cannery Co. Ltd., against officers of the federal department of marine and fisheries in which the plaintiffs claimed some \$70,000 for the loss of profits through restrictions placed on operations of the floating can-

nery, Laurel Whalen. Counsel for the plaintiffs stated that the next move will be to assess damage against the defendants. The defendants cited are: Alex Johnson, former deputy minister of marine and fisheries; William A. Found, former director of fisheries; Major J. A. Motherwell, chief inspector of fisheries, and Adam Mackie, the latter formerly fisheries inspector at Prince Rupert.

It is an understood thing in the British Empire that the King shall be out of politics and that he shall treat every party good samples of ore. He is on his alike. It is because the kings of England have so faithfully adhered to this rule that their throne has been so secure.




