

# Scottish City Had Bad Night as Mobs Smashed Windows in Main Area

Numbers of Police and Demonstrators Are Injured-Two Hundred Persons Are Arrested by Officers

GLASGOW, Scotland, Oct. 3.-Most persistent rioting and looting in years, extending intermittently over two days, came to a climax today when the police swept the streets and restored order. A number of police officers and demonstrators were injured and more than one hundred arrests were made.

In central Glasgow last night wild disorder prevailed as mobs smashed shop windows.
