School Children Entertained By Prince of Wales

Budding Yankees Received on Board Battleship Renown; Wreath Laid on Grave of Roosevelt

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

NEW YORK, November 22.—The Prince of Wales yesterday laid a wreath on the grave of Theodore Roosevelt and later presided over a function which would have had a particular appeal to the former president. For the entire afternoon the Prince of Wales was host to school children on board the great British battleship Renown.

There was great excitement among the children as they trooped aboard the big vessel and were shown the big guns, the machinery and all the intricacies of the warship. They were received by the Prince in person and His Royal Highness seemed to enjoy the event as much as his youthful Yankee visitors.

ACROPOLIS SCHOOL SITE ADVOCATED

L. W. Patmore Gives Reasons Why He Considers Vote Should Favor School on Hill.

When the vote is taken on the school by-law Wednesday, the ratepayers will be asked to state which site they would wish, Hays Cove Circle or Acropolis Hill. In a letter to the Editor, L. W. Patmore says:

On Wednesday next the ratepayers will vote again on the School By-law. In addition to voting on the by-law they will be asked to express their preference of the two sites—Acropolis Hill and Hays Cove Circle. I would like to urge upon the ratepayers the importance of supporting the Acropolis site for the following reasons:

- Great Saving.** 1. Mr. Potter, the school architect, states that it will cost \$12,000 more to erect the proposed school at Hays Cove Circle, because of the muskeg and consequent greater masonry for foundations. This is after making all allowances possible in favor of the Hays Creek site. I need not urge the necessity of saving this \$12,000.
 2. We can never have as good a play-ground at Hays Creek as at Acropolis, and none at all without a big expenditure. This has not been included in the \$12,000 referred to above, which pushes the balance still further against the Hays Creek site. We have a ready made \$35,000 play-ground on Acropolis, the only real play-ground in the city.
 - Secure Grounds.** 3. We are short of school grounds, and it is easier to get the grant of one on Acropolis Hill now than years hence, when we may find it altogether impossible to secure one here when the Hill has been more developed. Hays Cove Circle is already a school site, and should be utilized for a high school in the future.
 4. We need a large school building, which will, for years to come, serve sections one, two, four and five. The Hays Creek site is too near the present King Edward School, and school children from sections one and two will have too far to go. At the present time, three-fifths of the school children live to the west of McBride Street.
- In conclusion, let me remind all those in favor of the new school building to be sure to come out and vote because of the narrow majority we won by last time. Let us make a good job of it this time and pile up a big majority for this very necessary school building.

HANCOCK REPORTS ALICE ARM DEALS

Is Authority for Statement That Royal Is Sold and North Star Being Negotiated.

D. J. Hancock, the Alice Arm mining man, arrived in town on Thursday night from the Observatory Inlet silver camp. Mr. Hancock reports that big mining deals are still being consummated. He is authority for the statement that the Royal Group, consisting of eight claims adjoining the famous Dolly Varden mine, have been sold to interests represented by H. McGuire, of New York, for \$100,000. J. Miller and C. R. Betts, of this city, are associated with Mr. Hancock in the ownership of this group, having bonded it last September.

The North Star mine, now owned by Jas. McAleenan and D. Zarelli, is also reported by Mr. Hancock to be under negotiations for sale for \$250,000. In the past season this mine has made a wonderful showing under development by these two men. Mr. McAleenan, who is now travelling in the United States, is being communicated with and Mr. Zarelli is at present in Prince Rupert.

Mr. Hancock always has some interesting samples to show and this time he has specimens of native silver from the new lead in the Dolly Varden, which are probably richer than any shown here before.

JACK JOHNSON IN FIGHT TO FINISH

Will Meet Carl Morris at San Luis, Mexico.

Yuma, Nov. 21.—Jack Johnson, former heavyweight champion, is matched to fight Carl Morris of Tulsa, Oklahoma, at San Luis, Mexico, in December. It is to be a fight to a finish.

The contest has to be conducted in Mexico as Johnson cannot enter the United States for fear of arrest following a conviction under the Mann Act.

VETERAN CAPTURED A BRIDE IN SOUTH WALES

Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Collier and daughter and Mrs. P. Smith and baby left Thursday evening to spend a few weeks in Vancouver, accompanied by Pte. Fred Iggulden who has been visiting with Mr. and Mrs. Collier.

Pte. Iggulden was formerly in the home guard here. Later he joined the overseas forces and went to the front with the 72nd, with whom he served two years in France. He was gassed and wounded several times.

While on furlough in Wales Pte. Iggulden captured a bride and it is probable that Mr. and Mrs. Iggulden may return later and make Prince Rupert their home.

TRAFFIC ON ATLANTIC IS DISORGANIZED

Walkout of Freight Handlers Following Failure to Agree With C. P. R.

ST. JOHN, Nov. 22.—Ocean traffic is tied up owing to the walkout of the freight handlers. A strike was precipitated as a result of the failure of negotiations between the C. P. R. and the union.

HALIFAX, Nov. 22.—A partial tie-up of ocean traffic occurred today through a walkout of members of the freight handlers. The action was taken following the failure of negotiations between the C. P. R. and the union to culminate in a settlement of the wage dispute before the old agreement had expired.

COAL EMBARGO BY THE STATES

Fuel Administrator Makes Announcement Following Failure to End Strike.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—An embargo effective yesterday was placed on all shipments of coal except to Canada, it was announced last night by United States Fuel Administrator Garfield. His action followed the failure of the conference to settle the coal strike, as speedily as was expected.

Arrangements Being Made for Great Singer to Come Here For a Sunday Concert.

Coal Strike May End Soon in Compromise If Suggestion Accepted

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—A compromise arrangement suggested by Secretary of Labor Wilson to the conference of coal operators and representatives of the United Mine Workers of America may bring about the end of the strike. The nature of the proposal was not disclosed but it is believed here that he suggested a wage increase of 31 per cent.

Yesterday the operators offered 15 cents a ton advance, but that was refused.

In view of the critical condition of the industries of the country and the certainty that a continuation of the strike would eventually result in much suffering before the winter is over, Secretary Wilson has been making strenuous efforts to effect a compromise.

MAKE TREATY A POLITICAL ISSUE PERHAPS

Developments in the United States Point to Delay in Signing

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—Compromise efforts to ratify the Peace Treaty were thrown in the background yesterday by developments strengthening the possibility that the whole controversy might be transferred to the political arena by a decision by the people of the United States in 1920.

The threat to make the Peace Treaty a political issue at the next election and possibly to run Wilson for a third term is the strongest card the administration can play. It is thought to be the only chance of re-electing the Democratic party.

PROPERTY CHANGES HANDS IN STEWART

One of the Founders of the Town in the City Today and Tells of Activities.

James Stewart, of the Stewart Land Co., the founders of the well-known mining camp bearing their name, arrived in the city this morning on his way south to remain until after Christmas. He says that the prospects at Stewart are excellent.

Speaking of the land situation Mr. Stewart says that about one hundred city lots have changed hands recently. He predicts a much greater activity in the spring and says that there is absolutely no doubt about Stewart becoming a good town. The mines are there and they are being developed so nothing can stop the place.

Mr. Stewart says that the road connecting Stewart with Hyder is practically finished and with the opening of business in the spring will be in good shape. This will mean the business coming to Stewart. As all the mines are on Canadian territory, the business will be done in the Canadian town.

ADDRESS GIVEN BY SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

Principal McDonald, superintendent of the Public Schools, addressed the Corner Club of the Baptist Church at the regular meeting last evening. Pauline Johnson, the Indian poetess, was the subject of the talk and Mr. McDonald recited several of her poems. The address was very interesting, and the evening was enlivened with several musical numbers given by Mrs. Lindsay and Mr. N. L. Rose. Refreshments were served and Principal McDonald congratulated the Corner Club on its success, its live spirit and its good attendance.

Jellicoe's Chief of Staff Was Visitor

Commodore Dreyer and Other Officers Visit Port in Fisheries Cruiser Stadacona and Go East on Train.

Sailing into Prince Rupert harbor last evening at 6:30 the Fisheries Protection cruiser Stadacona, flying the naval ensign brought Commodore Dreyer, R. N., Lieut.-Commander De Salis, R. N., and Commander Stevens, R. C. N., to this port. It had been hoped that Admiral Jellicoe would have been able to include Prince Rupert on his itinerary but, this being impossible, the city was visited by Commodore Dreyer, as the Admiral's Chief of Staff.

Advantage was taken of the G. T. P. route to Ottawa and the Stadacona left Vancouver on Wednesday night with the naval party to catch this morning's eastbound train for the capital. This gave Commodore Dreyer an opportunity to see at first hand coastal conditions in the north.

Arriving last evening the party received an impromptu reception as no word had been received before their arrival that the city was to have such distinguished visitors. Commander Stevens, R. C. N., who is travelling with the Chief of Staff, is a member of the Canadian navy, which he represents, while Lieut.-Commander De Salis, R. N., is acting as an aide.

The Stadacona.

The Stadacona, which returned to Esquimalt at noon, was built for the Fisheries Protection Service to replace the Galiano which was lost off St. James Island last fall. She is 180 feet long and is of 1,100 tons. She is a very neat craft and is much larger than her ill-fated predecessor. She is mounted with one small gun, so is a fighting ship. Although she has been only out a few months this is not her first visit to Prince Rupert. She carries 58 men and the following is her list of officers: Capt. Thomas, First Lieut. Maude, Second Lieut. Lablance, Third Lieut. Freeman, Chief Engineer Jones, Second Engineer McLaurin and Wireless Operator Northover.

Carrying Naval Party.

The Stadacona has been kept busy since November 8 taking the naval officers to various points of interest on the Canadian Pacific Coast. Admiral Kingsmill, director of Canadian Naval Service, made the ship his headquarters for two weeks while on the coast and during that time Admiral Jellicoe was aboard for three days when Seymour Narrows and Alert Bay were visited. Admiral Kingsmill was taken on a voyage of inspection around Vancouver Island before Admiral Jellicoe arrived. Admirals Kingsmill and Jellicoe are leaving Vancouver today for Ottawa.

Going to Palm Beach.

The New Zealand, on which Admiral Jellicoe is making his world's tour, leaves Vancouver on the 25th for San Diego. After calling at the California port she will go through the Panama Canal and will wait at Palm Beach to pick up the Admiral. These are the present arrangements.

ALEX. McDONALD IS BACK IN RUPERT

Was Injured at Vancouver Shortly After Return From Front.

Alex. McDonald, who was a member of the city police force up till the fall of 1915 when he went overseas, returned to the city on the Princess Mary at noon today. Mr. McDonald served with the Field Ambulance Corps for over two years in France and England and returned to Vancouver last August.

Before he had been in Vancouver for a week he was seriously injured in an automobile accident and is just out of the hospital. His many friends in the city will be glad to give him a welcome on his return. Alex. intends to remain in Prince Rupert.

Farmers' Advocate Proves a Knocker.

The Farmers' Advocate, a paper that circulates a good deal on the Canadian prairies, goes out of its way to knock the Bulkley Valley. Anyone who knows the Bulkley and who saw the article in regard to it in the October 22 number of the Advocate will realize that the whole thing is misleading. The impression it conveys is not pleasant, especially for a journal published in a province like Manitoba.

Anyone who set out to do so could describe the Manitoba climate and conditions in such a way that no one who read it would want to live there, and yet the Manitoba climate is enjoyable, approached with the proper mental attitude. The climate of the Bulkley is far superior to that of the prairies, yet to read the article it would be imagined that it was nothing like as good.

Now that prairie farmers are coming to the Bulkley in large numbers and are enjoying the change of climate and conditions, it is possible that the Advocate will be going to them for subscriptions in the near future. We trust, however, that the farmers will remember this and other attempts to knock the district and will keep the Advocate off their list of periodicals.

Music and Song at Methodist Church.

The Methodist Church of this city is advertising a program of sacred music and song for Sunday night. It is an attractive program and one that should appeal to those who like music. It provides an opportunity to enjoy a musical evening and to take part in the singing.

The movement is worthy of all commendation and it is to be hoped that many will avail themselves of the opportunity to attend. Sunday is apt to be a dull day for many people, but there is no excuse for it when a concert of sacred music and song is provided for that evening.

Members Seen Their Duty and Done It.

Discussing the fall session of Parliament which recently closed, J. K. Munro writing in McLean's Magazine says:

"This session was presumably called to approve the Peace Treaty. It could have attended to that little chore in the same time it took another Parliament to approve the declaration of war—about five days. As a matter of fact the Treaty was approved and the result cabled to England in just about that length of time. But you'll remember that in the spring session, when members were shying at the Budget and pretending they wouldn't stay put there was a promise of some kind of increased indemnity. Well, the increase did not come along. But an all-wise and discerning Government provided something just as good—viz. and to wit—a special session with an extra indemnity of \$2,500,000.

"Now be it understood that our Union statesmen, the common or garden variety of M. P., are paid by the session. But in order to count as a full session the House must sit for thirty-one days. If it sits for less than that time, members are paid at the rate of \$20.00 per diem. Consequently if the members 'worked' for thirty days they would get just \$600.00, while working for thirty-one days brings this well-earned reward up to \$2,500.00. Under such circumstances patriotism requires that any special session worthy of the name shall sit for the full period of thirty-one days. This one did its full duty. It was hard work but the members were equal to it. On many days there was no Government business, but the members crammed the order paper with resolutions on everything from bran and shorts to the shortcomings of the Government and, by meeting late and adjourning early, they managed never to entirely run out of conversation. It was the most mournfully dull session in all political history. But the members stood it like heroes, each man 'seen his duty and done it,' and all returned home carrying the fruits of patriotism in the shape of a \$2,500.00 check."

POSSIBILITIES OF FAR NORTH

V. Stefansson Tells Edmonton Audience of Rich Agricultural Lands Within Arctic Circle.

A new conception of the possibilities of the far north has come to about two hundred and seventy-five Edmonton men as a result of an interesting address by Viljalmur Stefansson, the famous explorer, at a joint luncheon of the Kiwanis and Rotary Club, at the Macdonald hotel, Edmonton. Mr. Stefansson, whom Col. Cornwall described as the greatest living authority on the north, punctured the belief entertained by most people that the northern fringe of Canada is a land of perpetual ice and snow and stated that he had experienced six weeks of unclouded skies, and this several hundred miles north of the Arctic Circle.

Mr. Stefansson's message was one of practical interest to business men because it was a plea for the development of the agricultural resources of this country. He held the belief that while the north is undoubtedly rich in mineral resources the development of that form of wealth may well wait until the agricultural possibilities are developed. The northern portion of Canada, in the opinion of the speaker, is the greatest grazing country in the world, the prevailing grass being the famed Kentucky blue grass, the value of which for pasturage is well known.

Reindeer Industry.

He cited the case of a Laplander, Mr. Lindenberg, who in Alaska had originated the reindeer industry on a commercial basis, and who is now selling reindeer meat in the big cities of the States at an average of 40 cents a pound higher than beef, as typical of what may be accomplished in Canada, where there are 1,000,000 square miles of grazing land, as compared with 100,000 in Alaska. Reindeer meat could be shipped to London from Baffin's Land as easily and with as short a haul as from Nome to Seattle, and he urged his hearers to give serious consideration to the possibilities of developing this very important industry and expressed the hope that the government would take the matter up vigorously and at an early date, before the Americans had secured control of the markets.

No Heroics.

Mr. Stefansson disclaimed any heroic exploits by reason of his ten years' experience in the north, where, for the most part, he lived as comfortably as those in the so-called centres of civilization, remarking humorously that contrary to general belief, the long period of darkness does not produce depression, and said he could prove it if anyone cared to visit him at his home near the corner of 42nd street and Broadway at one o'clock any morning.

Sport Briefs

Though considerable merit was shown by the girls playing in the Public School vs. the High School last Monday night, still their play could stand a lot of improvement. The youngsters are to be credited with the excellence they did show as it was the result of their own initiative and self-acquired training. If some of the seniors would step in and give them some coaching they would soon be whipped into a first-rate team that would be able to play under the full rules and penalties of the game.

Jim Driscoll, world's champion feather-weight boxer from 1909 till 1913, when he retired, was beaten by Chas. Ledoux (France) in a 20-round battle at Covent Garden, London, a short time ago. Driscoll's seconds threw up the sponge in the 16th round, although Jem had the fight all his own way up till the opening of the 15th. In that round he received a heavy righthanded punch on the jaw which seemed to completely weaken him. It was a memorable fight and a credit to the loser, who received a tremendous ovation at the end of the bout.

While in Salt Lake City on Monday Jack Dempsey personally confirmed his \$175,000 contract with Dominick Tortorich, the New Orleans promoter, to meet the winner of the Carpentier-Beckett

fight which takes place abroad December 4. The fight will take place at New Orleans on March 17th.

The meeting of the moguls of the Pacific Coast Hockey Association takes place today. At the meeting the winter schedule will be arranged and the line-ups announced. It is expected that the first games will be played between Christmas and New Year. The outlook is that all the teams will be stronger than they were last year and there is no doubt but that the race will be a tight one.

Reports from Hazelton, Smithers and Alice Arm say that skating is already being enjoyed at these points. If the frost strikes Rupert this place will also have the ice sport and local hockey enthusiasts are already making plans for games.

If "Babe" Ruth, the American League home run king, does not get his demand of \$20,000 for next season from the Boston Red Sox, he says that he will go on a tour, including Australia and Honolulu. Evidently the sensational pellet puncher can afford to be independent.

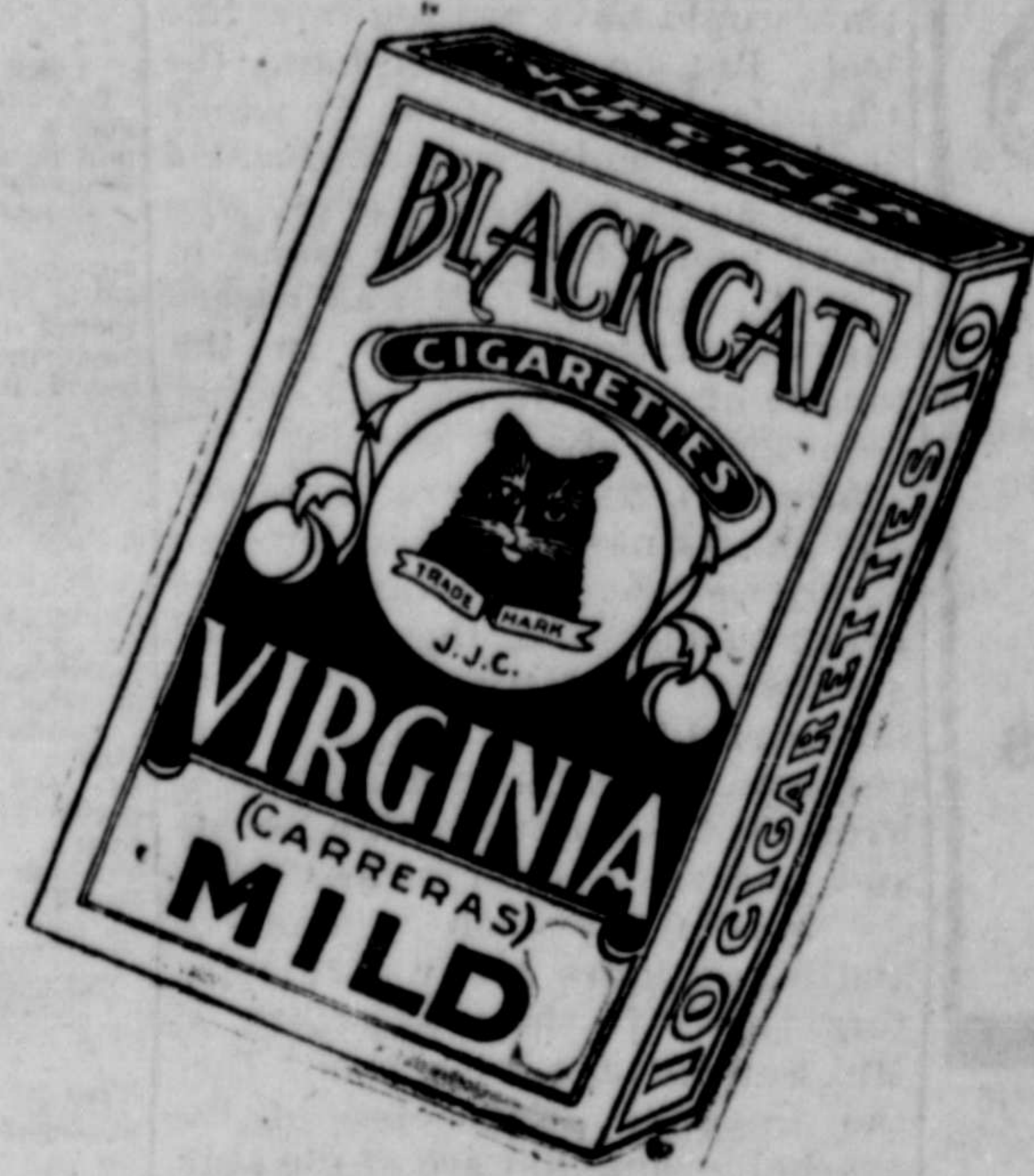

The Awakening of the Church

By J. E. Middleton.

Evangelism on a business basis is planned by five of the great churches of Canada. Perhaps they realize that the appeal of the old-time camp-meeting style has ceased to be effective in arresting the attention of a sophisticated and slightly cynical people. Certainly the last of the religious Mohicans, namely Billy Sunday, has been vigorously criticised despite the praise of his energetic supporters. No one doubts the sincerity of Mr. Sunday. No one questions his courage. But many sincere churchmen wonder if it is necessary to use the slang of the streets to awaken the tenderest and most sacred emotions of the soul.

Of course, to a theologian, the answer is obvious; namely, that St. Paul and all the inspired writers of the New Testament made use of colloquial and rough-hewn Greek in teaching spiritual truth. No literary artist of the time would have written in a dialect. But, on the other hand, the Christian Church of the Apostolic times was made up of uneducated folks, some of them slaves, who never would have been found in a poet's audience. It was necessary to write to them in the tongue of common life and depart from the nicety of literary convention. Yet such were the power and earnestness of the writers, so firmly were they possessed of the great theme, that they produced a body of literature superior to the work of any of their contemporaries. In like manner Chaucer wrote in the tongue of the people and became an immortal, while the Norman French romancers and troubadours of the period are forgotten. If the supporters of Mr. Sunday can give proof of the linguistic pungenencies of the baseball evangelist are of the stuff that will endure they probably have a case. If not

Not Sunday Method.
In any event, the Sunday method is not to be adopted in Canada in the Inter-Church plan for reviving the Christian people to a realization of their heritage and their opportunity. That a "revival" of some sort is necessary is made apparent by some startling facts. There has been a decline in the number of young people ready to devote their lives to Christian service, either in the ministry or on the missionary field. That was not wholly due to the war, although the eagerness of young idealists to have a part in the Great Crusade emptied the theological colleges for four years. Before the war came, comparatively few men were offering themselves for the Divinity course. Rightly or wrongly, the church leaders interpreted this condition as another manifestation of the materialistic wave which had been sweeping over the country and which caused grave concern to thoughtful intellectual leaders, clerical and lay.

Will be Organized.
During the latter part of the year, some 10,000 congregations will be completely organized to set all members doing something to stimulate their own spiritual life, and to interest the folk of their neighborhood in the work of the church. A series of special services of a reflective or evangelic nature will be held in January. The dying embers of Christian zeal will be blown into a flame. In the meantime, the people will be fully informed of the financial needs of the denominations, of the opening opportunities and the failing resources to meet them, of the state of the home and foreign missions for which that denomination is responsible. The requirements of pension and superannuation funds and the needs of the denominational colleges will also be set forth. Finally, an effort will be made to secure from each congregation the pledge of some young people for the ministry or the missionary field.

Civilizing Work.
At the same time the Central Inter-Church Organization will remind the general public of the relation of the church to the civilizing of the Dominion and the world. Since ethical concepts are the rock foundation of the social order and since the church is the only organization established to teach ethics alone, the citizen's individual happiness must depend upon the continued and zealous effort of the religious bodies to extend the influence of the Gospel.

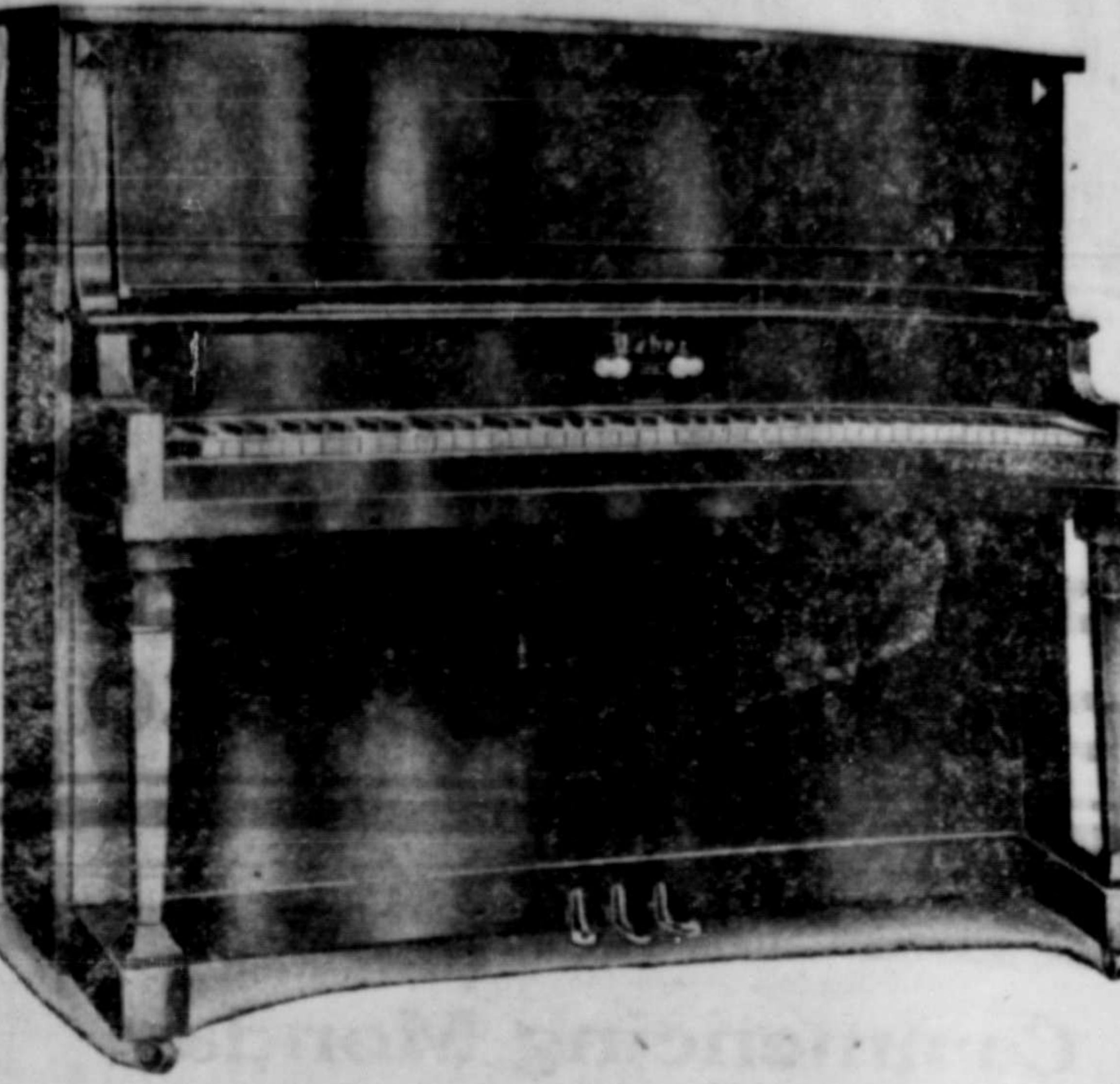

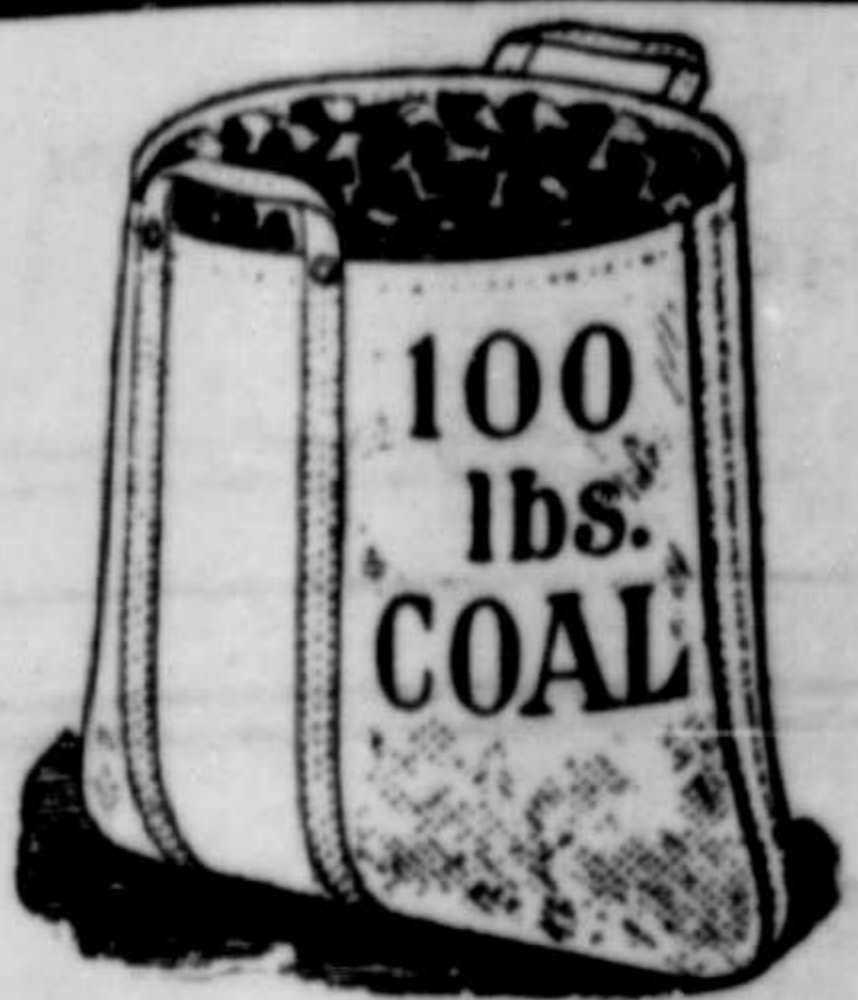
