

# Liberal Leader Flays Tolmie Administration For Its Extravagances

Describes New Income Tax as "Charge Against Poor and Working Classes"-Shelley and Pooley Should Have Resigned After Watt Case

VICTORIA, March 7:-Citing \$111,000,000 as the sum spent by the Conservative government in two and a half years as against \$184,000,000 expended in eight years under the former Liberal regime, T. D. Pattullo, Leader of the Opposition, told the Legislature yesterday that he would predict a deficit of \$5,000,000 for the fiscal year ending March next and a furthery deficit of \$3,000,000 for the next

fiscal year. Mr. Pattullo roundly scored what . he called the extravagance of the government which, by profligate expenditures last year, had exhausted its revenues and necessitated wholesale increases in taxation. The new additional income tax, the Opposition leader said, was a charge against the poor and the working



After the church service, interment was made in Fairview, a long procession following the cortege to the last resting place. Pallbearers, all old native friends of deceased in Metlakatla, were H. G. Clifton, William Leighton, Peter Haldane, Peter Ryan, William Leask and Henry Prevost.

The late Miss West, who died here Thursday morning after a lingering illness, had been a resident of this district since 1891. 


