CONSERVATIVES WANT ACCOUNTING

ASSIZE CASE IS HALTED WHEN ACCUSED IS FOUND INSANE

Provincial Convention At Early Date Request Vancouver Executive

No Later Than End of Year For Gathering is Suggested In Resolution Passed by Central Association in Southern City

VANCOUVER, May 7:—A provincial convention at as early date as possible and not later than the end of the present year was the request in a resolution passed last night by the central executive of the Vancouver Conservative Association. The resolution was passed, it is stated, in view of dissatisfaction which the Vancouver Conservatives have been manifesting for some time so far as the present Tolmie administration is concerned. Reorganization of the administration or a general election will, it is understood, be demanded by Vancouver members of the party.

Terrace Coroner's Jury Urges Permanent Watchman For Cuts Along Canadian National Line

TERRACE, May 7:—At an inquest held at Terrace by Coroner W. Robinson on the body of William Berg, a Norwegian who was killed by being transfixted between a fish car and the cliff when the train was derailed one and one-half miles east of Amsbury Station, Monday afternoon, it transpired that the watchman had been taken off the point on April 15 and that two rock slides had occurred there since.

The jury found that deceased, who was riding on the tender, came by his death accidentally while trespassing, owing to derailment of the engine and two cars by a rock slide and urged that, for the better protection of the travelling public permanent watchmen be maintained at this and similar points. The jury also called for a thorough examination of the rock cuts along the Skeena division.

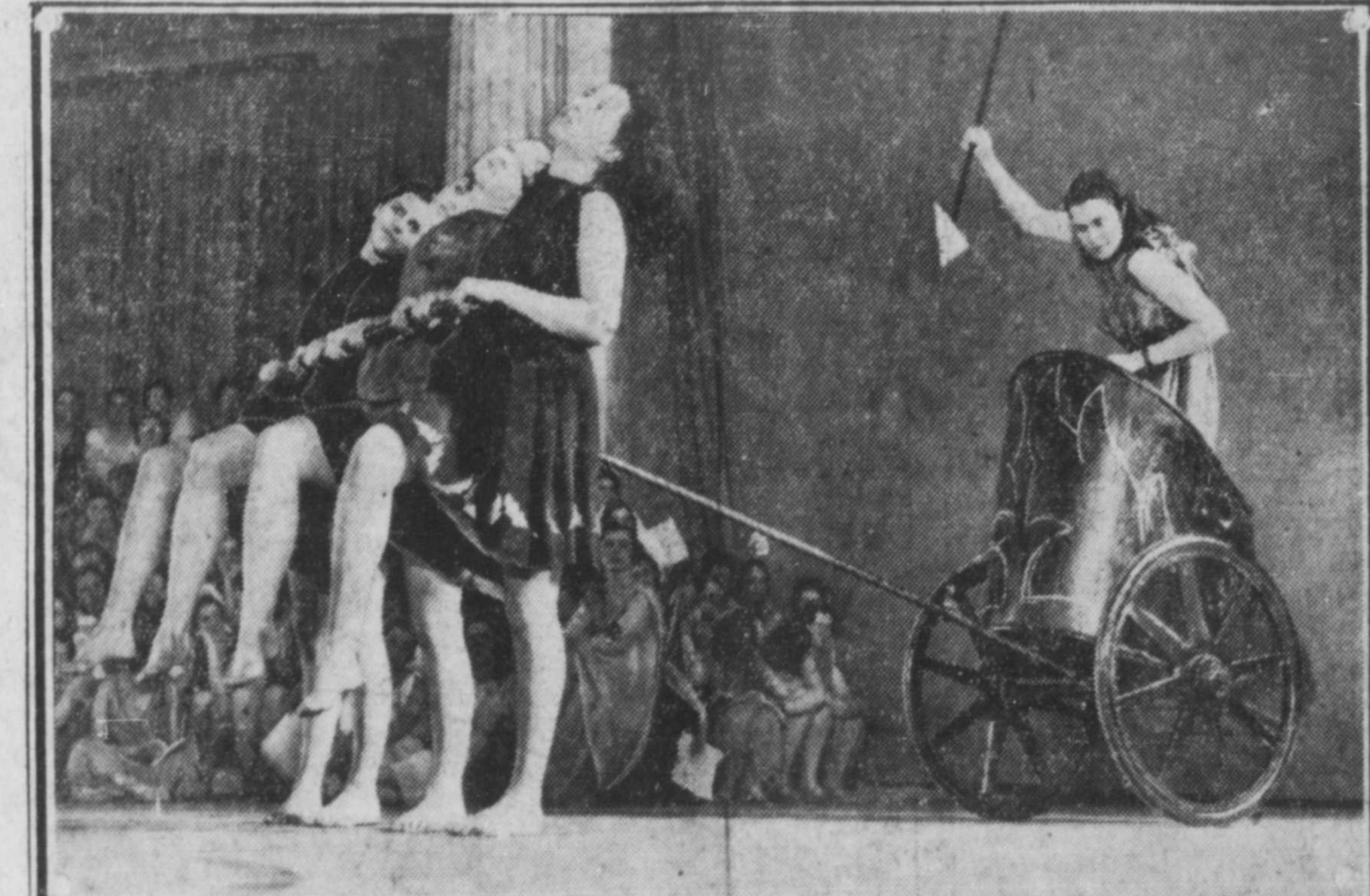
WAS NOT RENAHAN'S

Air Boat on Missing Plane Was Grey and Not Yellow Like One Found Here

SEATTLE, May 7:—Joseph L. Carman, president of the Alaska-Washington Airways, said last evening that he did not believe a yellow rubber air boat, found on Zayas Island near Prince Rupert by an Indian, belonged to the plane of Pilot Robin Renahan which became missing on the evening of October 28 last. He said that Renahan's rubber boat was grey, not yellow, and was packed in a bag.

The air boat, which has been found, might have come from a yacht, fishing vessel, steamer or a number of other sources.

SNOWDEN LAND TAX BILL GOES THROUGH

LONDON, May 7:—The British House of Commons last night adopted the plan of Rt. Hon. Philip Snowden, Chancellor of the Exchequer, for a penny per pound land tax.

The new tax is planned to become effective in 1933.

The resolution was adopted by a majority of 59. Rt. Hon. David Lloyd George, Liberal leader, supported the proposal which has a rough road to travel yet.

MINISTER IS HEARD

Educational Affairs in British Columbia Subject of Address

Country Schools

New Legislation is Explained by Hon. Joshua Hinchliffe

"If we give a child training enabling and inspiring him to make the most of himself in life, then that child has had an ideal education," declared Hon. Joshua Hinchliffe, minister of education, before a public meeting last night in the auditorium of the Booth Memorial School under the auspices of the Prince Rupert Teachers' Association and the Prince Rupert Parent-Teachers' Association. The minister was speaking on the subject of Educational Affairs in British Columbia, treating the topic first in a more or less academic way, upholding more practical methods in the educational system and, finally, voicing an appeal for more experienced teachers in the undertaking of the arduous work in the country schools.

Education was not anybody's work but everybody's, Mr. Hinchliffe declared. There must be co-operation and co-ordination and the active interest of teacher's school trustees, parents, other members of the community, officials of the government and the children themselves was needed. He welcomed the effort at co-operation and co-ordination which was marked by the establishment of the parent-teacher association.

The definition of education was a matter for much difference of opinion, the minister declared. Education was something more than merely "going to school," he asserted. If a person learned things that would be of use to him in later life, he was educated. A man who was an excellent workman in any craft was not uneducated. On the other hand, the speaker declared that any subject taught solely for examination purposes was almost entirely useless. The speaker stressed the fact that different children might require altogether different forms of training and might be fitted for much different lines. The old practice had been to treat all alike and attempt to turn out

JAPAN HAS BAD FIRES

Fourteen Persons Dead and Much Damage Done in Series of Conflagrations

TOKYO, May 7:—Fourteen persons, all Japanese, were burned to death and property valued at \$2,000,000 was destroyed in a series of fires which swept various Japanese communities today. High winds hindered the work of firemen.

The most destructive fire was at Yamanaka Hot Springs where four lives were lost and 39 hotels wiped out. One hundred persons were injured and four thousand were made homeless.

Sigurd Jussila Found Insane By Jury and Unfit For Trial On Charge of Murdering Yoch

The trial of Sigurd Jussila, alias John Emilson, young Finlander, was halted yesterday afternoon when a jury assigned at the Supreme Court Assizes to determine the issue of whether or not he was unfit, on account of insanity, to take his trial, found, after deliberation of only 12 minutes, that accused was insane. The issue was directed by Mr. Justice W. A. Macdonald after both defence and crown counsel had agreed upon accused's apparent insanity. The trial lasted little more than an hour. Owing to Jussila's poverty, W. E. Fisher was directed to conduct his defence. A. M. Johnson K.C. acted as crown prosecutor. The jury consisted of John Manson, foreman, David Bennett, August Brandon, Robert C. Mutch, William H. Pettman, Thomas McLennan, A. B. Armstrong, Thomas H. McCubbin, William L. Newell, C. C. Mills, Robert Arthur and V. Basso-Bert.

The Grand Jury reported a true bill in the case. The crown prosecutor then intimated that Jussila had no funds and that he had no counsel. His Lordship advised that W. E. Fisher had been appointed by the department as defence counsel.

Before the plea was entered, Mr. Fisher submitted that accused was incapable of instructing counsel with respect to his defence. He asked His Lordship to direct that accused be tried as to his sanity.

Mr. Johnson stated that the crown had been advised by its alienist that Jussila was incapable of instructing counsel for his defense. He agreed that accused should be tried as to his sanity.

Mr. Justice Macdonald thereupon ordered that accused be tried as to his sanity. The empanelment of a jury for this purpose then followed. The issue was "whether accused was or was not unfit on account of insanity to take his trial on the charge for which he stood indicted."

Conduct Described
Sergeant Andrew Fairbairn, provincial police, Smithers, testified that, while in a cell at Smithers from October 13 to 25 last, accused would wander up and down and raise what he called "his good house, referring to his cell. He was also afraid of getting wet because he thought the lattice work on the wall of his cell was the roof. He took his blanket and tried to stuff the lattice work so as to keep dry. When he saw a car in a magazine, he would claim it was his. Such was his conduct whether or not police officers were in sight. Even in the middle of the night he would be carrying on such a performance. His talk was also peculiar. At meals he would follow the officer carrying the food like a dog. In answer to the judge, the officer expressed the belief that accused was not feigning such conduct.

At the request of His Lordship, Provincial Constable Tait of Smithers described how he had arrested Jussila. Witness saw a pair of legs in a rough dug-out and a rifle pointed directly at him. The officer covered accused and the latter finally laid down his gun though he tried to get it again. Finally, as witness kept Jussila covered, Special Constable Macdonald was able to get hold of the gun which accused had had.

IS KILLED IN CRASH

Lieut. Col. Kidston and F. A. Gladstone Lose Lives in Africa

LONDON, May 7:—Lieut.-Commander Glen Kidston, holder of the flight speed record from London to Capetown, was killed in a crash of his plane in Natal, Africa. His companion, F. A. Gladstone, famous South African flyer, was also killed. The plane crashed during a heavy storm in the mountains in the course of a tour of Africa.

Heretofore, Lieut.-Commander Kidston was said to have had a "charmed life." He served during the Great War in the British Navy and twice boats which he commanded were torpedoed but he was rescued from the water in each case. These were only two of many narrow escapes during the conflict.

REPORT OF PROBE DUE

Findings of Sir Josiah Stamp Commission to Be Presented to House

OTTAWA, May 7:—The report of the Royal Commission headed by Sir Josiah Stamp, eminent British economist, on trading in grain futures in Canada is expected to be made public in the House of Commons at any time now.

It is understood that the commission is unanimous in the finding that trading in grain futures is of benefit to the farmers but that certain regulation of such trading is necessary.

BOLAMA UPRISING

Revolt Against Portuguese Government in West Africa

LISBON, May 7:—Revolt against the Portuguese dictatorship has broken out in Bolama, Portuguese West Africa. The government has dispatched a warship from Madeira to Bolama to put down the uprising.

New Pacific Coast Steamship Manager



Col. J. Carleton Brown, who has been appointed Pacific Coast Manager for the Canadian National Steamships, with headquarters at Vancouver, vice Mr. B. C. Keeley, resigned. Col. Brown, who for some years has been Assistant to Sir Henry Thornton, Chairman & President of the Canadian National Railways, giving special attention to matters relating to the West Indies Trade, will arrive in Vancouver to assume his new duties on Saturday, May 2nd. Col. Brown, who was born in the Maritime Provinces, is a Civil Engineer by profession and saw extensive service during the Great War with the Royal Engineers in France, Salonika and Egypt. After the War, Col. Brown made an intensive study of the trade possibilities between Canada and Australia, New Zealand and the West Indies. He has been actively engaged in the development of traffic for the Canadian National Steamships for several years and comes to the Pacific Coast well equipped to take over his new duties in Vancouver.

NO REASON TO WORRY

No less an authority than Sir Henry Thornton states that Prince Rupert has no reason to worry over the western outlet of the Peace River Railway. That is equivalent to saying that Prince Rupert will be the outlet. He also intimates that this port may also be the outlet for the C.P.R. on the north coast.

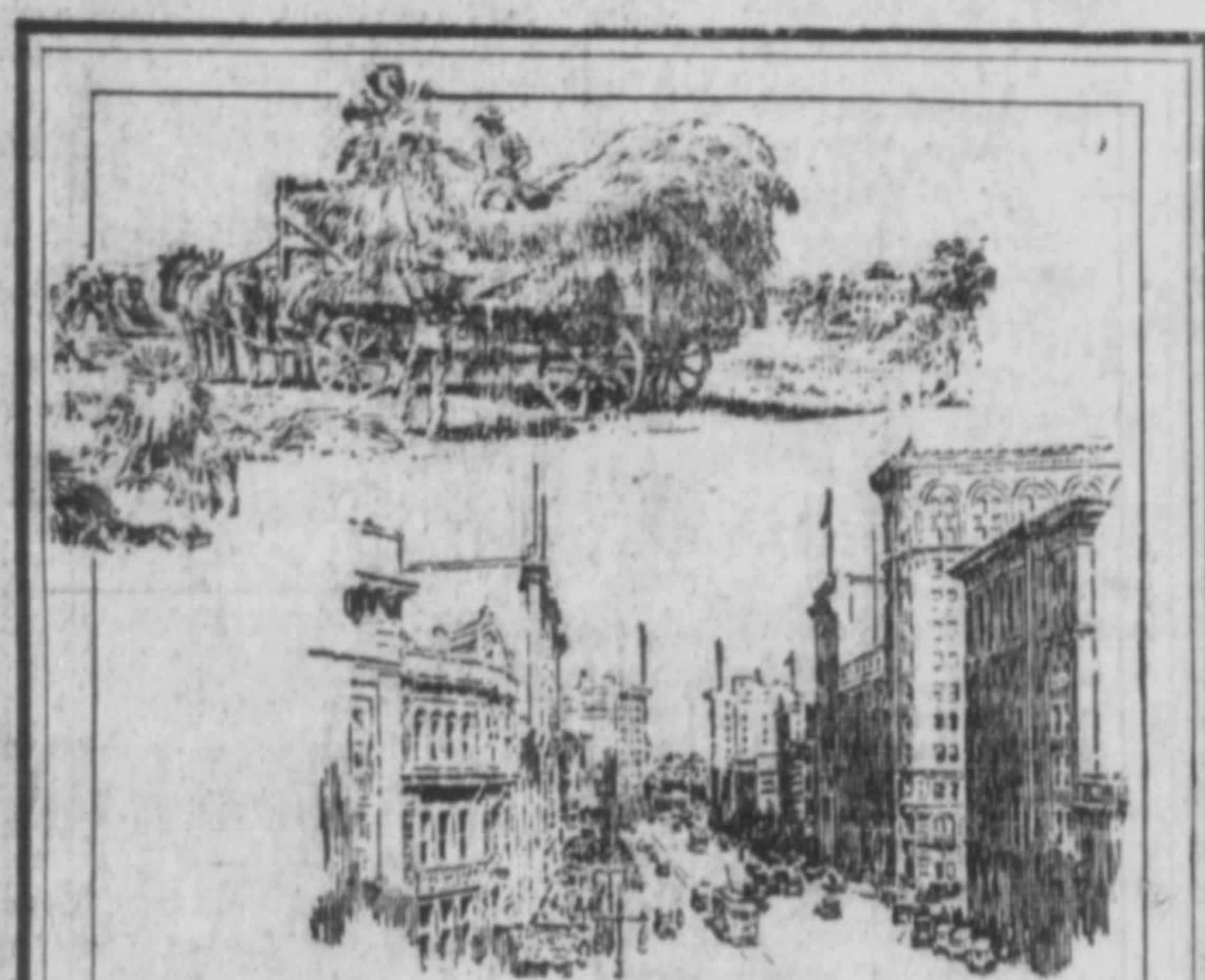
It is very much to be desired that Sir Henry's intimations may be correct. We admit it is very likely to be true and we also believe that Sir Henry expects them to be true. For years we have urged that the outlet for the C. P. R. be at Prince Rupert in order to avoid duplication of unprofitable lines and to help make the C. N. R. profitable. The days of useless duplication are past because it is found that in the end the consumer has to pay all useless costs. Rates are set high enough to provide a profit, no matter how high the cost.

It is to be hoped that the western outlet for the Peace River will be built in such a way as to give the best possible results to the farmers of the Peace. That will undoubtedly bring it to Prince Rupert. It now looks as if the railways realize this and are about to utilize the natural route to the ocean, the one down the Skeena Valley to Prince Rupert.

THE MAYOR'S MISSION

When it was decided to send the mayor to Ottawa it was realized that it would be no picnic party and that in a time like this it would be difficult to secure definite promises from those in authority at Ottawa. The mayor made good use of the brief time he was away and with the aid of the sitting member, Olof Hanson, was able to see a good many prominent men there including Premier Bennett and Hon. H. H. Stevens, both of whom expressed themselves as being well disposed toward the city of Prince Rupert.

The visit cost the city a very small sum and the results we think fully justified the move. Useful contacts were made that may prove valuable at some later date. It is only by constant urging that it is possible to secure those things necessary to commercial progress. A good effort has been made this year and we never can tell what the results may be. If only we get some of the aids to navigation or action in regard to the lode line which has troubled the Chamber of Commerce recently, it will be well worth the visit. Incidentally the thanks of the community is due to the mayor for giving time and money in making the trip.

SIGURD JUSSILA FOUND INSANE BY JURY AND UNFIT FOR TRIAL ON CHARGE OF MURDERING

iousness of the crime with which he was charged. He (Jussila) would be unable to instruct counsel in his defense. Witness did not know accused's present condition.

Dr. James Gordon MacKay, Vancouver alienist, told of having examined accused on numerous occasions at Okalla. These examinations started on January 10 and had taken place every ten days or so since. Witness declared that accused was insane. His case was quite characteristic with some periods of improvement and some remissions although there was a continued mental deterioration. "He will not recover," asserted Mr. MacKay. Accused knew what killing meant but did not appreciate the seriousness of such a crime. The examinations had been conducted at the instance of the crown and not of the accused, explained Dr. MacKay.

This concluded the evidence and His Lordship then proceeded to instruct the jury. All witnesses had asserted that they did not think Jussila had been feigning insanity. The evidence of Dr. MacKay, a disinterested witness, had been heard. The jury should have no difficulty in determining the issue, the judge asserted.

Twelve minutes after retiring the jury returned with its verdict, finding Jussila insane. The judge thereupon ordered Jussila to be held in custody until the pleasure of the Lieutenant-Governor in the case became known. Jussila will be committed to the asylum.

Jussila, a young Finlander, was roughly dressed in check mackinaw and dark grey trousers. He displayed little interest in the proceedings during which he would bow his head and occasionally chuckle foolishly to himself. He displayed no emotion when the insanity verdict was made known to him. John Bergman was sworn in as his interpreter in Swedish which language Jussila speaks.

At the conclusion of the Jussila case, the petit jurors were excused until 10 o'clock this morning. The case of Samuel Douse of Kitwancool, charged with the murder of Silas Brown, is proceeding today, a true bill having been brought in by the Grand Jury yesterday afternoon.

Rev. Dr. F. W. Dafeo, pastor of First Baptist Church, delivered an impressive address to the members of the graduating class.

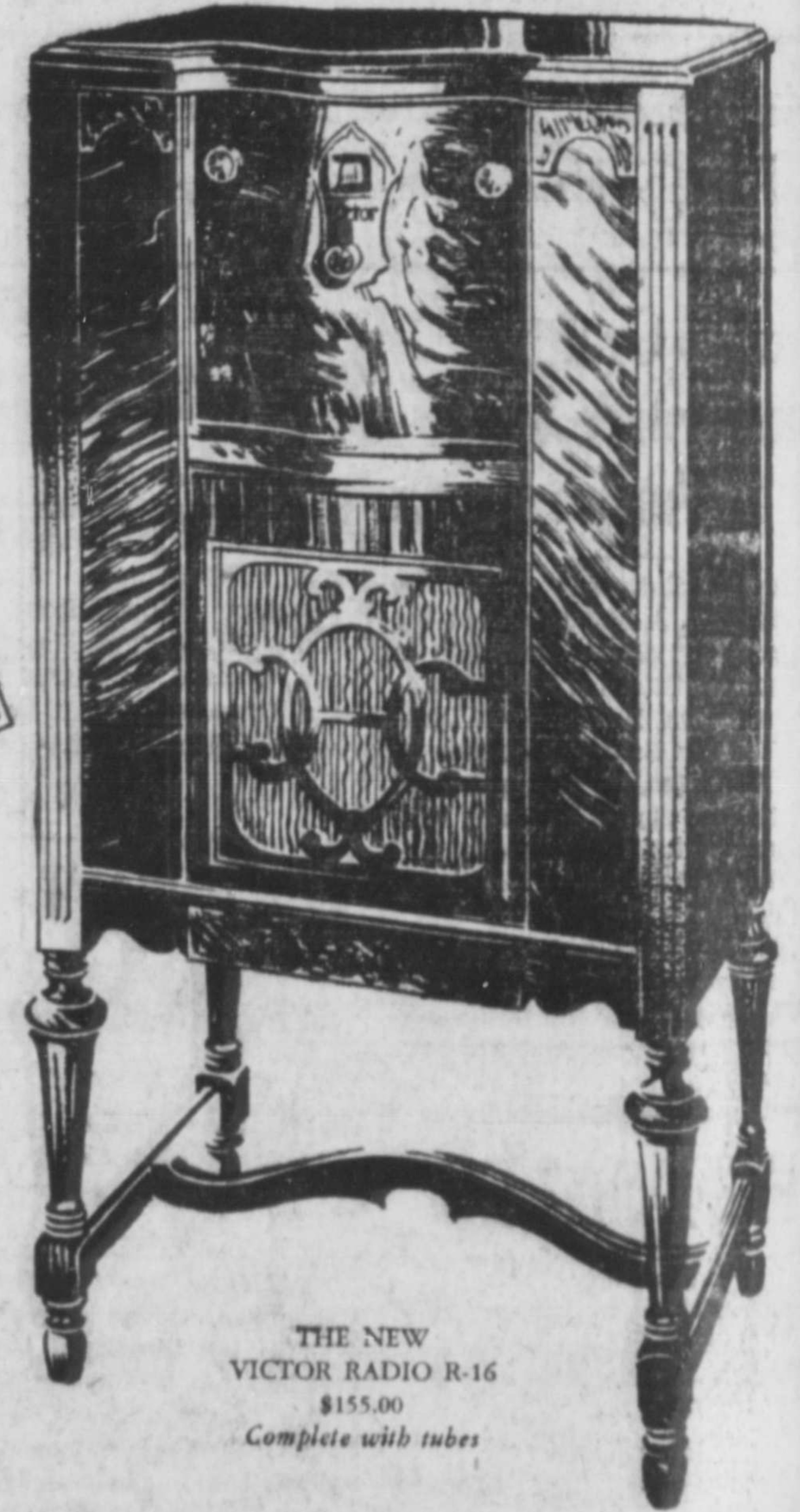

TWO CASES CONSIDERED

Grand Jury Deliberating on Arson and Wounding Charges

Two cases went to the Grand Jury this morning at the assize court presided over by Mr. Justice W. A. Macdonald. The first was that of Fred Wiggins, general merchant of Southbank, who is charged with attempting to set fire to a store owned by John Henry Keefe and operated by Philip Brunell.

The evidence, as outlined by His Lordship showed that a man named August, living in the back of the store, awoke to find a fire in the store on the night of January 10. It was extinguished. Later it was found that an augur had been used to bore a hole through the walls of the wooden building and that cotton batting saturated with coal oil had been inserted through the hole and ignited.

Later a raid had been made on the Wiggins store under a charge under the Game Act. An augur was

found that had recently been used and that just fitted the hole. A sweater was found corresponding exactly to a shred of wool left behind by the supposed perpetrator and cotton batting taken from an old quilt was also of the same texture as that found in the hole. Later when an order was secured to seize these goods the quilt had disappeared and Wiggins disclaimed having had one.

The second case was that of Charles Olsen who is charged with wounding Warren Scott in October last in Prince Rupert. The judge pointed out that a dispute followed a jollification and ended in blows during which a razor in the hands of Olsen inflicted wounds on Scott.

NEWS OF THE MINES AROUND PRINCE RUPERT

Placer Operations on Skeena Tidewater Molybdenum Close Down—Black Sand Gold Extraction

Water in the Skeena River has been unusually low this spring and a number of amateur placer miners have been taking moderate amounts of gold from the river bed. While there is no stampede and results are by no means exciting, it is reported that the men are securing at least enough of the precious metal to keep them independent of relief schemes. A good many men about Hazelton and elsewhere who got out of work, went panning.

Work has been started on the Lucky Luck mine near Usk. As soon as the camp is ready, development work will start.

The Premier Gold Mining Co. has taken an option on the Plomo group of claims in Colorado where there are stated to be extensive deposits of low grade ore that can be mined at low cost. With interests also in Ontario now, Premier operations seem to be widening out quite extensively.

The Dalhousie Co. has closed down development operations on the Tidewater Molybdenum property at Alice Arm and Angus McLeod, who was superintendent in charge, has left for Victoria in which city are located the headquarters of the company. Although there is apparently plenty of ore in sight, all the men have been laid off. It was reported some time ago that the company contemplated building a mill and this may have had something to do with the closing down, it is thought.

Douglas Lay, Hazelton, resident mining engineer for the northeastern mineral survey district has recently inspected the mining property of J. M. Johnston of Vanderhoof on Tsankut Mountain.

Samples of gold recently arrived in Vancouver from an initial run of the centrifugal machine which is now operating at Cape Fife on the northeastern shore of Graham Island, says the Mining and Industrial Record. This gold is of an unusual fineness and texture due possibly to the constant beating of the flakes by the action of the tide. The results shown by this initial run may be taken to show that the efficiency of the new Lorentsen patent centrifugal force amalgamator in the recovery of fine gold from black sands is now definitely proven. The machine is now in use by the Golden Star Mines Limited on their leases between Tiel and Rose Spit on Graham Island, the most northerly of the Queen Charlotte group. MURDER HEARING

Trial of Samuel Douse is Now Proceeding at Assizes

WITCHCRAFT SUGGESTED

Jury Hears Evidence in Connection With Killing at Kitwancool

The trial of Samuel Douse, Kitwancool Indian, on a charge of murdering Silas Brown, Kitwancool Indian, at Kitwancool on the early morning of January 10 last, is now under way at the Supreme Court Assizes. The only witness heard this morning was Matilda Brown, widow of deceased, who gave her version of the shooting which resulted in Brown dying on February 15 in the Hazelton Hospital from the effects of an infected arm which was amputated before he died.

That accused had been suspected of practising witchcraft was revealed under cross-examination by the widow who also said that Douse had accused her (Mrs. Brown) of being the cause of his being blamed for practising witchcraft. While Mrs. Brown was giving her evidence, the court adjourned until 2:15 this afternoon when the court continued.

The jury consists of John A. Morris, foreman, E. R. Kiel, William Gilchrist, C. C. Mills, Herbert Morgan, J. W. Chapman, James McGlashan, J. H. Birnie, G. C. Arsenau, Victor Basso-Bert, Thomas McLellan and Thomas Brandon. On selection of this jury, the remainder of the petty jury was excused until 2:15 this afternoon.

Mrs. E. R. Cox of Hazelton is acting as interpreter. A. M. Johnson K.C. is acting as crown prosecutor and R. L. Reid K.C. as defence counsel.

After briefly reviewing the crown evidence, Mr. Johnson introduced Mrs. Silas Brown, the widow, as the first witness. Mrs. Brown testified that there had been a feast at Kitwancool on the night of January 9 in connection with the raising of a family totem pole there. Deceased and his wife, who were at Kitwancool for the feast and were staying at the home of Ernest Smith, the wife's brother, were aroused after they had gone to bed in the front room by dogs barking. Matilda went to the window and saw Samuel Douse wandering around. She went out and suggested that he go home. She took him as far as the gate of Walter Derrick's house and he left in the direction of his home.

Aroused Again

On towards morning, Mr. and Mrs. Brown were similarly aroused again. They both went out this time and finally complied with a request of accused that the couple take him home and put him to bed. This they went to do and had just got inside Douse's house when he struck Mrs. Brown on the mouth and proceeded to get a gun. Accused then chased the couple back up the road shouting his intention of shooting Silas. Finally there was a shot and Silas said, "Sam has shot me." She (Mrs. Brown) took her husband on home. He was taken to Kitwancool and thence to Hazelton where he died in the hospital.

Under cross-examination by Mr. Reid, Mrs. Brown denied having taken a barrel of home brew to the feast of having brought one from Kitwancool to Kitwancool. She was put to some considerable examination by defence counsel as to times, etc. She had not been sure of these at the time of the preliminary trial as she had been "full of trouble at that time." Her recollection was more clear now.

Finally witness admitted that the reason she wanted Douse to leave was that she was afraid, not of his being bitten by the vicious dogs, but because she knew him as a sorcerer and, from his actions in the front of the house that night, she feared he was going through incantations which would have the effect of taking somebody's life by a miserable and prolonged illness.

Mr. Johnson objected to the witchcraft matter being introduced but Mr. Reid explained that, as

Minister Is Heard

all on the same level which could not be done. If a child were given such training as would enable and inspire him to make the most of himself in life, then that child had an ideal education.

The government alone, Mr. Hinchliffe pointed out, could not give an ideal education. After all the teachers had the children in their hands a comparatively short time. The years before school age were of great importance from an educational standpoint and the children were entirely in the hands of their parents during those years. No child that was a trouble with the teacher after going to school had been properly brought up at home during those first six years, the minister assented. Ninety-nine times out of one hundred the trouble was at home. Even after going to school, the parents had oversight over their children. There were many limitations placed on education by the government.

Government's Obligations
When was the government's obligation ended in regard to education was another important problem which nobody seemed able to solve, continued Mr. Hinchliffe. That was a question he would leave to his hearers to thresh out. He, personally, believed that in years to come the principal of limit of ability would be recognized as marking the government's responsibility. In this connection, Mr. Hinchliffe contended that the poor child should have the same opportunity of obtaining education as the rich. The minister told of how he had succeeded in getting a fund voted in this province to aid meritorious but poor pupils in getting advanced education. Something the same was being done to help deserving children of returned men through High School.

Speaking of the subject of recent legislation, Mr. Hinchliffe asked the teachers not to worry about salaries. No existing contracts or salary schedules would be interfered with and the increments would come along the same as planned. There had been no general fixed principle in the past in regard to this. The new system was designed to be more equitable. The government had no intention but to continue paying reasonable and just salaries. The intention was to devise a more equitable and fair plan to meet the requirements of different communities operating under different conditions.

Declaring that he was keenly interested in the country schools, Mr. Hinchliffe charged that the cities had been selfish in always demanding teachers with experience. Personally, he thought it would be more fitting if the teachers were given some experience under principals in city schools before being called upon to carry

out the sometimes very arduous work in the country schools.

Before closing, Mr. Hinchliffe referred to the matter of cost of text books. He told of a new scheme which had been devised where text books could be bought from the department at fifteen percent discount for retail sale at a fixed maximum price. If books were not obtainable locally, they might be purchased from the text book branch. The whole idea was to make the books less costly. The department was also endeavoring to eliminate all but necessary changes in text books and to use only Canadian books.

At the opening of the meeting Mayor C. H. Orme and Mrs. Robert Blance, president of the Parent Teachers' Association, directed brief remarks of welcome to Mr. Hinchliffe.

At the conclusion of the meeting, H. C. Fraser, inspector of schools, with a fitting speech, moved a hearty vote of thanks to Mr. Hinchliffe, this being seconded by Mrs. T. M. Spencer, chairman of the board of school trustees.

The meeting, which was well attended, was presided over by J. S. Wilson, president of the Teachers' Federation. Miss E. A. Mercer played the piano for the singing of "O Canada" at the start and "God Save the King" at the closing.
