LONDON, Jan. 29 .- The Mac-Donald Government won a division in the House of Commons late yesterday by 27 votes on a motion by Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin to reject the Trades Dispute Bill on second reading. The vote was 277 to 250.

The government was saved by the action of the majority of the Liberals in abstaining from voting by direction of their leader, Rt. Hon. David Lloyd George. A certain number of Liberals, however, headed by Sir John Simon, voted for the motion.
