Lack of Fuel May Cause Decrease in Number of Trains

Canadian War Board Gives Notice of Probable Reduction in Service if Shortage of Coal Continues.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, November 25.—Unless the coal situation in the United States improves very considerably in the next few days it is very probable that there will be a curtailment of the train services all over Canada. Notification to this effect has been given by the Canadian War Board.
A good deal of the coal supply of Eastern Canada comes from United States and this supply has been cut off through an embargo placed on coal export by the United States Government. The result is that coal stocks are very nearly depleted both in Canada and the United States.

PRINCE LEAVES FOR EUROPE ON BIG BATTLESHIP

Declares He Will Come to Canada Again Soon and Often.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
HALIFAX, Nov. 25.—Promising to return to Canada soon and often the Prince of Wales concluded his lengthy visit to Canada and the United States, taking his final leave last night at a banquet given here in his honor. He came here from New York on the battleship Renown, accompanied by Sir Robert Borden, who made the trip at the invitation of the Prince.
The prince was given a great ovation before leaving and his final leave taking was just as spontaneous and genuine as was the triumphal tour throughout the country.
The Renown has sailed direct for England, the newspaper representatives, including E. C. Cotes of Prince Rupert, going along.

A GREEK PLOT IS DISCOVERED

Plan to Assassinate Premier Venizelos and Overthrow Monarchy.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
LONDON, Nov. 25.—A plot to assassinate Premier Venizelos of Greece and to overthrow the monarchy has been discovered at Athens. A number of arrests have been made.
Venizelos has been Premier and virtual dictator since the failure of the effort of Constantine to hand the country over to the Germans and the consequent retirement of the monarch. At that time the influence of the Allies became supreme and has continued so until the present in spite of German efforts to cause trouble.

MAIL SERVICE IS CRITICIZED

City Council Thinks That Letter Strengthening Hand of Postmaster Would Help

Alderman Rochester at the City Council meeting last night brought up the question of the very poor mail service at present being given the public at the Prince Rupert postoffice. He said that the matter should be taken up by the Board of Trade but no action had ever been taken, to his knowledge, so he thought that a letter to the Postmaster would not be amiss. This would strengthen the hands of the postmaster in appealing to Ottawa for an improvement. As far as Mr. McIntosh was concerned he was always courteous and careful and there could be no fault on his part as the service had been much better when he was conducting the office on grant. Ald. Rochester stated that one day recently he had gone for his mail two and a half hours after the arrival of the boat and finding none in the box had gone to the wicket and asked if it was sorted yet. He was answered in the negative in a tone of voice which as much as asked him what he expected.

Retail Merchants.

Ald. McMeekin said that the retail merchants had written to the Post office inspector in the matter but had yet received no reply. Ald. Casey told of taking the matter up, personally, with the postmaster. He has received every courtesy from Mr. McIntosh and had noticed a great improvement in the delivery of his own mail thereafter.

Ald. McRae suggested that perhaps the trouble lay in the fact that the mails came in so irregularly. The post-office staff were probably overworked one day and had nothing to do the next. Also the inauguration of the 8-hour day in the postal department would require more staff to handle the same work.

The resolution to have a strong letter written to the local postmaster to assist him in his dealings with the department at Ottawa was carried unanimously by the council.

HUNGARIAN CABINET FROM ALL PARTIES

Majority of Cabinet Members are Christian Nationalists.

BUDA PEST, Nov. 25.—In the new Hungarian cabinet all the parties in the country are represented in an effort to work a coalition of all the interests in the country. The Christian Nationalists have, however, a majority of the portfolios and that will give them the real power in the government.

Try Wilhelm of Germany Next Year in London Says The Daily Mail

LONDON, November 25.—The British Government expects the trial of the former German Emperor to begin in London early in the new year, according to an article appearing in the Daily Mail yesterday.

The ex-Kaiser is still living in Holland, but it is expected there will be no difficulty in inducing the Dutch Government to hand over Wilhelm to the Allies for trial.

In all probability the trial will be a long one, and it promises to be the most spectacular in history.

MORE VIOLATION PROHIBITION ACT

Jack Gurvey Charged With Having Liquor Illegally in Possession.

Jack Gurvey was up in the Police Court this morning charged with having liquor illegally in his possession. It was brought out that he had spent a couple of nights in a downtown rooming house and during that time had met one Jack Bishop, who brought liquor, obtained by prescription, into his room.

The police testified against the accused while Bishop said that, as far as he knew, Gurvey had never taken a drink out of the bottle. Bishop had spent the night with Gurvey and in leaving the room in the morning had forgotten to take the bottle away. The police, the next morning, in looking up some dope fiends, happened across this liquor in Gurvey's room. He was arrested and let out on \$50 bail. After hearing all the evidence this morning, the magistrate reserved his decision till tomorrow at 10 o'clock.

A charge against Jack Bishop of supplying liquor illegally to another person was dismissed.

Marvin E. Allen, charged with forgery, was again adjourned till Thursday morning.

SCHOOL OPENS IN BAPTIST BASEMENT

School Superintendent Announces Temporary Arrangement Until Hays Block Reopens.

The school class under Miss G. Macdonald which has been in the Hays Block room will resume session in the Baptist Church basement tomorrow morning. A. M. McDonald, in making the announcement, stated that this would be only temporary and it is expected that the class will be back in the Hays Block in about a week. None of the furnishings have been moved.

At last night's council meeting a letter was read from District Engineer A. L. Carruthers asking for some new arrangement in the matter of supplying light to Cow Bay floats. At present the Dominion Government is paying \$6 a month for these but is deriving no revenue, which was unfair. The letter was referred to the utilities committee for report.

A National Labor Party is Formed

Big Convention at Chicago Formally Launches Movement with View to Entering Politics in United States.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
CHICAGO, Nov. 25.—A new national party to be known as the Labor Party of the United States was created at a convention held here yesterday. This was the culmination of a general movement towards the creation of a political party which would become a factor in the next presidential election. It has been stimulated by the movements in Europe where the labor elements are becoming very powerful, so much so that there is talk of a labor cabinet in England in the near future.
A labor platform will be drawn up at once and preparations made to embark on a campaign of education.

GOLD MINE FOUND ON CHICAGO ISLAND

Average Value of About \$240 a Ton Shown in Assays.

J. H. Cann and associates who have just completed the staking and recording of twelve mining claims on a gold-bearing ledge extending from Lisianski Inlet to Stag Bay on Chicago Island, have uncovered a great gold property. The discovery was made September 22, and the staking has been done since that time. Assays from 13 samples of ore taken at intervals of 12 feet along the ledge show an average value of \$239.95 per ton, running all the way from \$16 to more than \$2,200 to the ton. Another sample sent to the States by H. R. Shepard, one of the locators, produced \$166 a ton. It was not a selected sample.
Associated with Mr. Cann are Mrs. J. H. Cann, who is the real discoverer, H. R. Shepard, Clyde Kimball and Ed Davies. Walter Johnson and Al Wilson, who were in the staking have sold their interests to J. H. Cann and Clyde Kimball. The claims have been filed as the Apex Group.

FORT FRASER

Nelson Spencer, M. P. P. of Medicine Hat, has been in Fort Fraser for a few days looking after the interests of English capital that he represents in the district.

A farewell party was given in honor of Billy Demque at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Myers on Saturday evening. Mr. Demque has left for Burns Lake where he expects to spend the winter.

Local people are looking forward to greeting the German gun for the Victory Loan campaign. The quota of Fort Fraser was \$1,600 and with 25 contributors a total of \$14,500 was attained.

Despite the wintry weather, horse dealers, fur buyers and land seekers are still coming in on every train. The fur dealers report this winter one of the best seasons yet.

FAVOR HAYS COVE CIRCLE

Meeting Held Last Night and Recommendation Made to Property Owners.

At a meeting last evening of representative citizens interested in the passage of the school by-law and the selection of the most suitable site, it was decided to recommend to the property holders in the vote to be taken on Wednesday that passage of the Hays Cove site for the following reasons:

1. Its central location between the two extremes of the townsite.
2. Hays Cove Circle has already been set aside for educational purposes, while difficulties have arisen in attempting to float debentures on account of Acropolis being a leased property.
3. Making the new school a high school, using a portion of it for the present to relieve the congestion at the King Edward and Seal Cove School, using the 8-room Borden Street School exclusively for public school purposes, with new school soon for Section 2.
4. Safer and cheaper fire protection can be had at the Hays Cove site.
5. The Hays Cove site does not overlook an undesirable locality.
6. Bus communications will always be available to Hays Cove right to the very doors.
7. The additional cost, if any, will be more than saved through the Hays Cove site not requiring the construction of an expensive roadway and the cheaper method of delivering the building materials.
8. Teachers are opposed to the climb-to Acropolis, so what about the little children, twice a day, in all sorts of weather, even with the assistance of a hand rail?
9. The hauling of fuel to Acropolis for all time to come will cost \$1.00 per ton more than to Hays Cove.

Vote Tomorrow on School Bylaw.

Tomorrow is the day to vote on the school bylaw. It is the clear duty of every ratepayer to express himself or herself for or against the building and to give an expression regarding the site. We strongly advise that the bylaw be supported and that the site be Acropolis Hill. At the same time we are free to admit that there may be other honest opinions and that the other site may be chosen in preference. We cannot, however, think that considering the present need, the bylaw will be turned down.

The architect says that the cost of building at Hays Cove Circle will be many thousands of dollars more than at Acropolis Hill, largely on account of the poor foundation at the former site. That extra amount does not have anything to do with the playground. If a playground is added at Hays Cove, the cost will be twenty to thirty thousand dollars more than on the other site. That is as we are informed. It is up to everyone to find out the facts and to vote accordingly.

Hays Cove Circle is a suitable site for a school. We admit that, and eventually a high school should be built there. It is near the centre of the city and the best site for a high school. Just now it seems we can get the Acropolis Hill site. Perhaps later we may not be able to do so. From every viewpoint we think the place to build now is Acropolis Hill, but, as we said before, the voters are the judges. As long as they consider the best interests of the children, there will be no mistake made.

Famous Singer Coming on Sunday.

It is very seldom that a town this size can hope to hear a singer of the same standing in the world as Jennie Taggart. She is to be here on Sunday next and will sing at the Westholme Theatre.

The Symphony Orchestra would like to have arranged for the concert a week later, but owing to the Prince Rupert Musical Society having their big event on the day following it was thought inadvisable to do that. There is close co-operation between these two societies and the orchestra has magnanimously given the other the right of way.

Just what arrangements will be made to avoid the rush on Sunday evening we cannot tell. What we do know is that everyone will want to hear Jennie Taggart sing and that the theatre seats considerably less than a thousand people.

Value of Unity in Public Affairs.

There has been no time in the history of Prince Rupert when unity of effort has been so necessary as today. There need not be unity of opinion. That we cannot get, but there can be a general desire to co-operate at all times. Just now there are many problems to be tackled. Not only have we the annual event of choosing mayor and council, and the passing of the school bylaw, but we have confronting us the need of real unity of action in meeting the authorities at Ottawa.

There is no political campaign on just now, nor is there likely to be one for some time to come. The Ontario election laid the ghost of a possible election. That being the case what we have to do is to forget politics and get down to business. Colonel Peck is the present representative of this district and we can get behind him and use all our force to see that this city and district gets proper treatment.

"In unity is strength" is a very old saying, but it is as true today as ever it was, and it applies to the present situation. Let us get together, work together, and use our united effort to place this city on the map as a seaport worthy of the name.

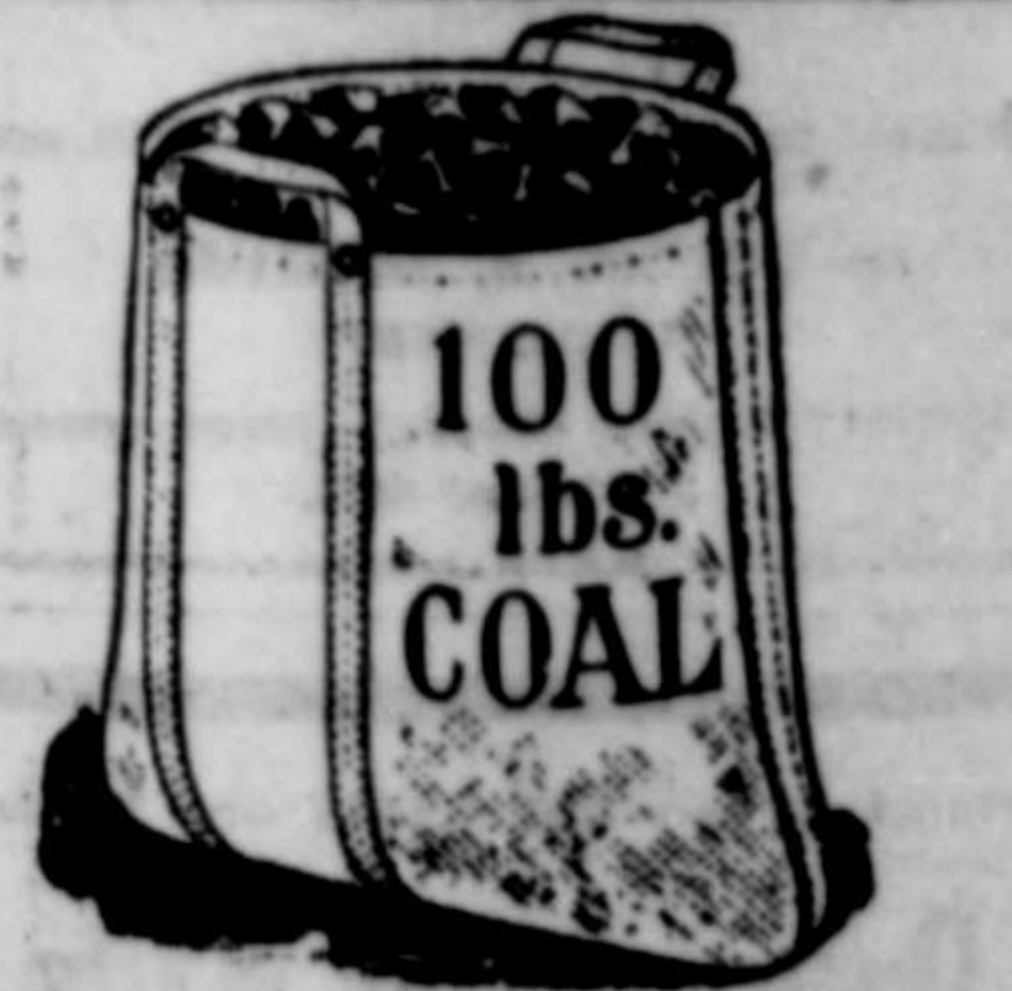

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CITY WILL ASK FOR NEW GRANT

Delegation from G. W. V. A. Meets
Council Asking for More
Money for Housing.

A delegation from the Great War Veterans' Association made up of D. S. Cameron, S. D. Thompson, H. Wearmouth and J. Atchison were present at last night's council meeting to present the request of the Association that the city endeavor to get an additional \$50,000 for the soldiers' housing scheme in Prince Rupert. D. S. Cameron, the secretary, spoke, telling that there were many returned men in the city who were finding it almost impossible to get accommodation for themselves and families. Thus the request of a further grant to the returned men for housing.

S. D. Thompson, another member of the delegation, spoke, assuring the council that if this grant should be obtained it would be used judiciously and carefully. With the present condition existing in Prince Rupert it was hard to think that this money was laying in Victoria. The getting of a further grant would be an accommodation to the city as well as to the returned men and it would keep a desirable class of residents in the city.

Mayor Explains.

The mayor replied to the delegation touching on the matter as compared with other cities. The city's grant, according to population would have been \$17,000 already \$75,000 had been obtained and used. Still there were many applications, so the city had applied for \$25,000 further, making up an even \$100,000. Each soldier, the mayor thought would have to be granted \$3,000 rather than \$2,500 after this to make it possible for them to build decent houses.

Pass Resolution.

After some discussion it was moved by Ald. Casey, seconded by Ald. Perry, that an additional grant of \$50,000 be asked for to augment the \$75,000 already granted. After this resolution had been passed Mr. Cameron in thanking the council said that the Association would not rest satisfied with this but that when it was used up the G. W. V. A. would go after the Federal Government until every man, who so desired, was housed.

In the Letter Box

FOR HAYS COVE CIRCLE

Dear Sir:-

As the property owners of Prince Rupert are asked to vote on Wednesday, November 26th (tomorrow), on a bylaw authorizing the construction of a 12-room school at an expenditure of \$100,000.

A choice of sites is available—namely, Hays Cove Circle and Acropolis Hill.

The people will vote on the site entirely independent of the bylaw. Since no public meetings have been held, and arguments have been put forward in favor of the Acropolis site, I would respectfully ask that you publish a few facts with reference to the respective locations.

I propose that the building be erected at Hays Cove as a combined high school and public school, and serve the same purpose as does Borden Street school at present.

Hays Cove site was originally set apart by the Provincial Government for educational purposes.

Borden Street School would then be used as an 8-room public school, which would serve the western portion of the city until such time as Section Two commands a public school. By this arrangement all parts of the city would be amply provided for.

Hays Cove site is situated in Section Six and, therefore, central on bus line.

Fire protection, which is imperative in schools, will be safer and cheaper at Hays Cove, as it is proposed to build tanks, and install machinery to pump water at Acropolis.

Acropolis site overlooks an undesirable locality.

The storms of late again remind us that little children should not be forced to climb the big Acropolis Hill twice a day to school.

Extra charges for hauling coal to Acropolis Hill site would be a

permanent one, to say nothing of hauling material for construction.

Before school construction started at Acropolis it would be necessary to build a roadway.

Hays Cove site is ours for educational purposes. Difficulties have already arisen in attempting to float debentures for Acropolis site, as it is leased property.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$1.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and evidence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 50 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title may be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 160 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years. Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1915, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions. Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enactment to March 21, 1920.

GRAZING. Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchaser does not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING. Provision made for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
