# LOSES CASE

Judge Says Apology of Newspaper Committee of Council Meets Fair Should Have Been Sufficient

OSHAWA, April 2-"We find At the meeting of the exhibition from the evidence of Charles Love, plaintiff, that he has suffered no monetary loss or defamation of character from the error made by The Whitby Gazette and Chronicle in printing the name of Charles Love wrongly in the sub-head ing of an article regarding an alleged theft of cattle, and that the apology, as printed and published upon the said paper's front paga ssued on January 15, 1931, to be rufficient, and recommend that his Lordship dismiss the case."

In the above words the jury in the action for libel brought by Charles Love against the Times he grant this year. Publishing Coming of Oshawa Limited, publishers of The Whitby Gazette and Chronicle, brought their verdict in the Supreme Court | the courteous manner in which at Whitby and presided over by he council had treated the board.
