Balkan War if D'Annunzio Carries Out His Campaign

London Papers All Speak of Danger and Unofficial Opinion is That War is Inevitable; Remarkable Interview with Poet.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) LONDON, November 26.—The growing fear of another Balkan war with Italy and Jugo-Slavia playing the leading roles is expressed in the British press today.

The situation created by Gabrielle D'Annunzio in Fiume and Dalmatia has brought the Allies nearly to the end of their patience, in the opinion of some newspapers.

LONDON, Nov. 26.—(Non.) British unofficial opinion is that war in the Balkans is inevitable if D'Annunzio attempts to occupy Shalato.

REST CURE FOR COCAINE FIENDS

Jail-Birds Tired of Serving Time—Want to Go to Hospital.

The two brothers, Joseph and Frank Bennett, appeared before Magistrate McMordie charged with vagrancy.

On the charge being read to him, Joseph spoke up and asked the magistrate if he could not be sent to a hospital for cure of the drug habit to which both brothers, it appears, are almost hopelessly addicted.

The brother, Frank, who has just finished serving a 30 days' sentence, also stated that he would like to have the "rest cure." The magistrate adjourned the case until tomorrow morning to look into the question.

LARGER VOTE ON BYLAWS EXPECTED

Railwaymen Discuss the General Strike Question; Favored by Many Cities

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) CHICAGO, November 26.—Reports that national leaders of the four railway brotherhoods in session at Cleveland were holding secret discussions as to whether a strike should be called on December 1, were denied by W. G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Firemen and Engineers.

Lee, however, admitted having received a telegram in answer to the city local saying that the trainmen and car men had decided to strike.

Buffalo, Detroit, Pittsburg and St. Louis are declared to have been among the cities where the locals were particularly insistent that a strike should be called.

TWENTY PER CENT PROFIT ON BACONS

That is Order of Board of Commerce Issued to Retailers; Further Restrictions Later.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.) OTTAWA, Nov. 26.—Retailers of bacon and boiled ham are limited to a gross profit of 20 per cent, with an additional 2c. per pound for slicing, under an order issued by the Board of Commerce bearing date of November 24. The order contemplates its future application to retail sales of all kinds of pork and pork products.

LOCAL VESSELS ARE INSPECTED

Representatives of Lloyds and of Canadian Government Well Pleased with Quality of Work.

R. Pemberton, representing the Dominion Government as supervisor under the Marine Department, and W. A. Wallace, representing the British Corporation Registry of Shipping, the second largest firm of marine underwriters in the world, left for Vancouver last night after an official visit to this port.

Mr. Pemberton, whose duty it is to inspect all ships as they are being built, says that the work done here is first rate. He is very well pleased with it. Within a few weeks there should be a great many more men employed and work should go ahead fast.

There were two ships laid down in Victoria a month or two earlier than the ones here and they are not very much ahead of these. What he fears is that good men will find difficulty in finding housing accommodation here.

Mr. Wallace also expressed himself well pleased with the quality of the work being done here. He and Mr. Pemberton will be visiting the place from time to time in connection with the work of inspection.

AGRARIAN TROUBLES AGAIN IN IRELAND

Coal Situation is Very Critical Now

U. S. Cabinet Deadlocked on Wage Increase and Ratio of Dividing Increased Cost.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) WASHINGTON, November 26.—Like the miners and operators, President Wilson's cabinet seemed hopelessly deadlocked today on the question of a wage increase in the coal industry.

Another attempt, with the aid of Fuel Administrator Garfield, will be made today to agree upon a wage scale that will satisfy the mine workers and the owners.

The proper basis of calculation of the proposed wage advance and the ratio of dividing the consequent increase in the cost of production of coal between the operators and the public, it is understood, have been the points of difference among cabinet members.

Drastic steps to curtail coal consumption is contemplated by officials here. An order permitting to manufacturers the use of coke has been prepared. The coal situation is considered to have reached a crisis. Action of the cabinet today is awaited with anxiety.

CURRIE GETS FINE PRESENT

People of Victoria Present Him With Silver-Mounted Cabinet Filled with Victory Bonds.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) VICTORIA, Nov. 26.—A committee of citizens headed by Col. Prior, J. J. Shallerross and A. C. Flumerfelt, presented General Currie with a silver trimmed mahogany cabinet filled with victory bonds last night.

Accompanied by Lady Currie, the general left this afternoon on the boat for Ottawa to take up his duties as Inspector General of the Canadian forces.

LOCAL NEWS ITEMS

At the meeting of the Trades and Labor Council last evening the action of the telephone girls in striking if an increase of wages was not granted was endorsed.

J. P. Hawkinson left for Langara Island on the "Siren" this afternoon. He will return in a day or so and leave for Alice Arm where he will spend the winter looking after his stock at that place.

The Utilities Committee of the City Council will meet this afternoon at 5 and will consider the request of the telephone girls for increased salaries. It seems likely that the wishes of the girls will be met sufficiently to avoid a strike.

F. W. Welsh, the president of the Vancouver Trades and Labor Council, addressed the local council on union subjects at a meeting held last night. He has been in the city for the past few days organizing the Plumbers and Steamfitters' Union.

A committee of the Board of Trade, consisting of W. E. Williams, G. W. Nickerson and H. F. Pullen met the mayor and council this morning and laid before them a proposal to send delegates to Ottawa, the delegation to consist of the member for the district, the president of the Board of Trade and a representative of the city council. The matter will be decided finally on Friday and the delegation will leave on Saturday.

DELEGATION TO VISIT OTTAWA

Col. Peck, President of Board of Trade, and Another to go to the Capital.

At a meeting of the Board of Trade yesterday afternoon it was decided to send two or three delegates to Ottawa to interview the Government on the matter of the development of this port and the opening of the salmon fisheries to the general competition and to have the use of gas boats permitted on the Skeena River in the fishing industry.

Lieut.-Col. Peck is to head the delegation and M. P. McCaffery, president of the Board of Trade, will represent that business section of the community. In addition to that the city is asked to send a delegate. This delegation, it is thought, would be thoroughly representative of the district.

There are a number of other questions to be taken up with the ministers, such as the fishermen's dock here. The delegation, it is understood, will inform themselves thoroughly on the needs of the community and deal with the matters individually with the ministers as well as meeting the cabinet.

It is the opinion that this would be a favorable time, now that the railway is being taken over to take up the question of ocean docks and better service, and the general development of the port.

IRISH HOME RULE

New Bill for Setting Up Parliaments in Dublin Expected in British House of Commons.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) LONDON, November 26.—A new Home Rule Bill, with provisions for the setting up of two Parliaments in Ireland, with a Council or Senate of forty to be chosen from the two bodies, is expected to be introduced into the House of Commons within two weeks.

Buy in Prince Rupert And Save Your Money.

Buy in Prince Rupert. That is the way to save. Reports are coming in continually from all parts of the extortionate prices asked for goods. We sometimes take exception to prices here but when we get away we find the prices higher. In nearly all staple lines this is true.

There is another good reason for purchasing at home. If we have any civic pride, any desire to see the place prosper we must support our own merchants. There is plenty of choice among them. If there are any we do not like, we can cross the road and buy at the other place. To send money away out of the province, however, means that it is gone for ever. It means that our local merchants are handicapped, that the local employees find themselves with too little to do and that, as a rule, we get no better value and nothing like such good service as in our own city and province.

Shop Early and Avoid the Rush.

"Shop early" is a good rule to remember. The Christmas rush is coming and it will be difficult to secure the attention that we all like when we go shopping. The Christmas goods will be culled over and the early shopper will get the best. The time to purchase Christmas presents is within the next week or two.

Those who wish to send presents to the Old Country should get them away this week, if possible. After that there is a risk that they may arrive late. The correct thing is to send them so that they will arrive as near Christmas Day as possible. The mail service is not as good as it used to be and early mailing should be the rule.

Labor Organizing in United States.

Apparently labor has been slow in organizing politically in the United States. In Australia a labor party was formed many years ago that eventually captured the reins of government and administered the affairs of the country. In England there have been labor parties for a number of years with a number of representatives in Parliament and the party is now very prominent there. In Canada there have been little bursts of enthusiasm from time to time, but in the United States there has never been anything like a general movement. It will be interesting to notice now whether the newly formed party amounts to anything.

We are strongly of opinion that Labor should be well represented in the political life of the country and that, if it can do so, it should take its turn in administering the affairs of the country. We believe that the labor leaders of the country will act sanely if given the power. Nothing sours a man or a party like responsibility.

AMATEUR ATHLETIC CLUB IS GAZETTED

Current Issue of Official Government Publication Gives Notice of Incorporation.

The current number of the British Columbia Gazette gives notice of the incorporation of the Prince Rupert Amateur Athletic Association as follows:—

We, the undersigned, Michael P. McCaffery, merchant; Howard S. Wallace, merchant; G. Percy Tinker, agent; and William O. Fulton, solicitor, all of the City of Prince Rupert, in the Province of British Columbia, being desirous of incorporating the above-named "Societies Act," chapter 19, R.S.B.C., 1911, and amending Acts, declare as follows:—

1. The corporate name of the Society shall be the "Prince Rupert Amateur Athletic Association."

2. The purposes for which the Society is formed are:

(a.) The promotion and encouragement of amateur athletics of all kinds, including the organization of a gymnasium;

(b.) For purposes of social intercourse, mutual helpfulness, mental and moral improvement, and rational recreation;

(c.) To raise funds for all purposes of the Society by fees from members, by obtaining public and private grants, and by various forms of amusement, entertainments, and instruction, and otherwise, as the Society may determine;

(d.) To do all such other lawful acts and things relative or incidental to the said objects as may be found necessary or expedient.

3. The names of those who are to be the first directors of the Society are: Stewart P. McMorris, police magistrate; Michael P. McCaffery, merchant; Henry McCall, railway superintendent; G. Percy Tinker, agent; Howard S. Wallace, merchant; Clifford G. Clementson, clerk; and William O. Fulton, solicitor, all residing at the said City of Prince Rupert.

CHARGE THAT O. B. U. BEING FINANCED BY THE INTERNATIONALS

To discover to just what extent funds of the legitimate international labor organizations are seeping through to the coffers of the One Big Union for the advancement of their propaganda which is opposed to that of the international unions, is to be the object of an investigation by the executive of the Victoria Trades and Labor Council.

A. S. Wells, of Vancouver, of the B. C. section of the Defence Committee for the Winnipeg strike leaders now on trial, sent a letter to the Victoria Council explaining the plan of raising a "Liberty Bond" issue of \$75,000 for the Winnipeg defence. Under this scheme, Eastern Canada is expected to contribute \$50,000 and the four Western Provinces \$25,000. But of this \$25,000, British Columbia is set down for \$20,000.

Christian Sivertz, secretary, wanted to know why British Columbia should be allotted \$20,000 out of the \$25,000 for the whole of the Western Provinces.

Opposes Propaganda.

E. S. Woodward, president, said he was in favor of supplying money for the defence of the Winnipeg men and for the support of their families while the breadwinners were held in jail. But he wanted to know whether it was proper when these men were allowed out on bail and were travelling through the country propagandizing for the One Big Union that they should carry on this work on funds supplied by international organizations.

"As a matter of fact I believe this O. B. U. propaganda is thus being actually financed by the international unions," said Mr. Woodward. "This and similar information the Victoria Council is entitled to receive before further subscriptions are asked for." The matter will be investigated.

Alex. Munro, chief engineer of the Prince Rupert, returned here last night on the train after having spent three months visiting in Scotland. Mrs. Munro is still in the Old Country.

RODE THROUGH BERLIN IN TAXI

Lieut.-Col. Pete Anderson, D.S.O., Due to Arrive in Edmonton Yesterday.

WONDERFUL CAREER THROUGHOUT THE WAR

Lieut.-Col. "Pete" Anderson, D. S. O., distinguished by long, remarkable and diversified war experience, and a soldier of whom all citizens are proud, was due to arrive in Edmonton yesterday, after more than five years of war service.

He is the Canadian soldier who set English military critics agog by performing the feat of making his way right through to Berlin and riding up the Unter den Linden in a taxicab, after he had donned the uniform of a German officer of the line, and made his escape from a German prison camp.

The story of Col. Anderson's daredevil feat spread like wildfire through Great Britain and Canada in the spring of 1916, and it was some considerable time before the authorities recovered from the almost unbelievable feat performed by the gallant Albertan. As a reward for the feat performed, Colonel (then Major) Anderson was promoted to the intelligence branch of the Imperial army, and later awarded the D.S.O.

Of Danish Birth.
Colonel Anderson, who is well known in Edmonton, being owner and manager of the Anderson brickyards in Edmonton, enlisted in the original 9th battalion. He was given the rank of major, and having been born in Denmark, he could speak the German language better than some of the Germans themselves. On his arrival in England, he was transferred to the Third battalion at Salisbury Plain.

When the Third battalion left for France, Major Anderson accompanied it as second in command. Due to his absolute fearlessness, he was given command of a squad of picked men and nightly the major and his gallant band raided the German trenches, inflicting great losses upon the enemy. One night, while the second battle of Ypres was raging, Major Anderson became separated from his squad and was taken prisoner.

The squad returned and reported the loss of their commander, and some weeks later a telegram arrived at his home in Edmonton stating that Major Anderson had been reported "missing."

It was nearly a year later when a man, dressed in a ragged suit of field grey, staggered into the British lines and stated that he was Major Peter Anderson, of the Third battalion of Canadians.

He was fed and clothed, and later returned to England, where he reported to the authorities. It was indeed a strange story that this officer poured into the ears of his superiors. He related the story of his capture, his life in the prison camps, his escape, and successful visit to Berlin, and the return journey to the British lines and safety.

major was commanded to appear before the king, where he told his story and was highly commended for the part he played.

The military authorities, as a reward for his bravery, then did almost an unknown thing in the history of the army, that of allowing an escaped prisoner to once more don the uniform and do duty on a fighting front. Major Anderson was promoted to the rank of colonel on the intelligence staff and was of great value to the authorities.

When the Russian expeditionary force was organized, Col. Anderson was given a command, and was awarded the Distinguished Service Order for capturing a Bolshevik armored train in the Archangel district.

MAN MARRIED TO THE WRONG LADY

LONDON, Nov. 24.—The extraordinary mistake at a Nuncheon gypsy wedding, through which the bridegroom, who thought he could marry by proxy, found himself married to a sister of his bride elect, has been widely discussed in legal circles.

Discussing the position, C. G. Talbot-Ponsonby, the well known legal expert in Divorce Court procedure, said: "It has been laid down in a leading case that it is necessary for a valid marriage that the parties should consent to marry one another. If, therefore, there is a mistake in the person with whom the contract is made the marriage is void.

"If in this case the man acted in the belief that he was marrying by proxy, and can satisfy the court on that point, he would probably be granted a decree of nullity.
