INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC IS SPREADING

VOLCANOES OF WEST ALASKA AND ALEUTIANS ACTIVE

Sheets of Flame and Clouds of Smoke Are Issuing from Mounts

Shushalton is Sending Forth Tongues of Fire With Clock-like Regularity—Cleveland, Heretofore Inactive is Also Belching Now

SEWARD, Alaska, Jan. 28.—Word of renewed activity among the volcanoes of the Aleutian Islands and the Alaskan Peninsula was brought here by Capt. C. E. Anderson of the steamer Starr on his return from a trip westward. Mount Shushalton, Capt. Anderson said, is hurling sheets of flame and dense clouds of smoke with clocklike regularity at five minute intervals.

TO PROBE FISHERIES

Inquiry of Federal Minister to Open in Vancouver on Tuesday Next

VICTORIA, Jan. 28.—Inquiry into every phase of commercial fisheries throughout Canada will be undertaken by Hon. Edgar N. Rhodes, federal minister of fisheries, opening in British Columbia next Tuesday with a conference between the provincial commissioner of fisheries, Hon. S. L. Howe, and J. F. Day, associate professor of economics and trade at the University of British Columbia.

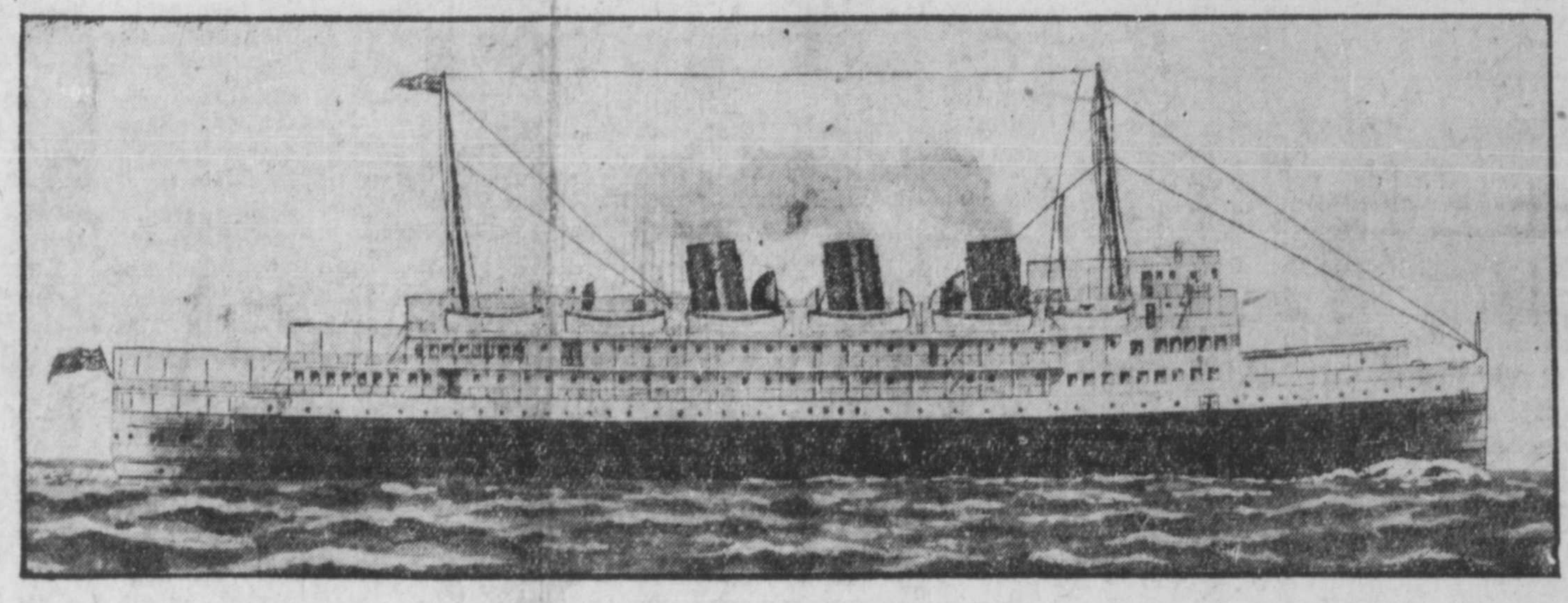
Lady Lucy Houston of Mersey Keen to Have Great Britain Represented in Air Race

Several Thousand Are Now Ill With Malady In U.S. Reports Say

Disease is Rapidly Spreading With More Than Twice as Many as Last Week Ill, Health Service States

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—Rapid spread of influenza was reported by the public health service today with a total of 7,275 cases now as compared with 3,867 a week ago. The health service estimates that the disease is about five times as prevalent as shown in the report. The malady, it is expected, will not be as fatal as it was in 1918 particularly if care is taken to guard against taking the disease and in treating it once it is contracted.

ALASKA TREMOR

Heavy Earthquake Felt Yesterday in Seward and Anchorage

SEWARD, Jan. 28.—The heaviest earthquake to strike this district in fifteen or twenty years was felt at 4:35 yesterday morning. Aside from a few walls cracking, there was no particular damage reported. The tremor lasted about 25 seconds with an apparently north to south movement.

SPLIT IN POLITICS

Cleavage in Australian Labor Party Over Re-Appointment of Theodore

CANBERRA, Aust., Jan. 28.—A split of serious proportions has developed in the Australian Labor party over the Prime Minister's decision to take back Hon. E. G. Theodore into the cabinet as commonwealth treasurer. Yesterday Hon. J. E. Fenton, minister of trade and commerce, resigned from the cabinet despite pleas of the Prime Minister that his resignation would weaken the government's prestige and, perhaps, lead to an early general election.

Hon. J. A. Lyons, acting treasurer, and Hon. Frank Anstey, minister of health, backed up Mr. Fenton's protest but did not resign.

SIR HENRY OPTIMISTIC

Conditions Are Serious But Better Than They Were, Says Thornton

MONTREAL, Jan. 28.—"I do not deprecate the serious conditions prevailing in Canada today as in the rest of the world, nor the necessity for vigilance and wisely planned action but, in judging the times, let us use a reasonable yardstick," said Sir Henry Thornton, chairman and president of the Canadian National Railways, in addressing the annual meeting of the chartered institute of secretaries here last night.

It was not fair, he said, to measure with the "elongated yardstick of 1928" as 1928 was an altogether exceptional year brought about by a peculiar set of circumstances. Speaking of the Canadian National system, he declared, that the real test was a comparison of its position today with its position in 1922. Sir Henry rapidly and vividly sketched the situation as it was before the amalgamation of the various conflicting units into the national system outlining the task of piecing the diversities together into an efficient instrument of repairing the ravages of neglect in lines and equipment and this in the face of a general feeling that the Canadian National was a liagall stones.

POSITION OF GOV'T RE PEACE

Province Not to Finish P. G. E. Into North, It Is Definitely Decided in Victoria

According to a Victoria dispatch to the Vancouver Province, the provincial government has decided definitely that, on account of the financial situation, it cannot undertake a policy of completing the Pacific Great Eastern Railway into the Peace River country.

The government, it is pointed out, is emphatically in favor of a Peace River railway but it must be built by one or the other of the transcontinental systems or by other capital.

The provincial government is, indeed, counting heavily on Premier R. B. Bennett's definite pledge to give the Peace River country a Pacific outlet. This pledge creates a definite hope of solution of the Pacific Great Eastern problem, the provincial government feels.

Premier Tomlin intends to go to Ottawa after the legislature rises in the spring for Premier Bennett's interprovincial conference and, it is expected, will discuss the whole Peace River railway situation with federal authorities at that time.

IS ON WAY TO RESCUE

Alberta Plane Off to Yukon to Assist in Salvage of Burke Machine

EDMONTON, Jan. 28.—Leaving Fort McMurray yesterday morning, Pilot Stan McMillan of the Commercial Airways in en route to Atlin and Whitehorse in the Yukon Territory to assist in salvaging the airplane of the late Capt. E. J. A. Burke.

At Whitehorse, McMillan will be joined by Pilots R. I. Van Der Byl and W. A. Joerss of Vancouver who will take the Burke machine out to Vancouver where it will be given a thorough overhaul.

DOLE FUND PUZZLING

British Government Leaders Looking For Scheme to Make Insurance Self-Sustaining

LONDON, Jan. 28.—With the dole fund already indebted to the treasury of Britain in the sum of \$300,000,000, government leaders are giving serious thought to possible means of putting unemployment insurance in this country on a self-sustaining basis.

PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT DOCK

For several years there have been rumors that the C. P. R. was about to take over the provincial government dock. Now the minister of public works in the provincial government announces that he has been looking over the dock with a view to making some change in connection with its conduct. Local people will at once jump to the conclusion that the C. P. R. is taking the dock. Although we are assured that up to the present no definite step in connection therewith has been taken, it is not unlikely to occur.

We have maintained for a long time past that the C. P. R. would come here, and with a friendly government at Ottawa and another at Victoria it seems bound to happen before long. If they take over the local dock it will be the first step toward greater interest at the port and we feel sure Prince Rupert people will welcome their advent.

RELIEF WORK

It is satisfactory to know from the minister of public works and his deputy after spending several days in the city and investigating thoroughly, that the relief work in the city and on the highway is being carried out in a satisfactory manner, so far as results are concerned. The minister is interested in the city work because of his government's contribution to it and all the records were made available to him and his deputy. Members of the city council who came in for some criticism at the recent aldermanic election will be glad to know that their work has been passed on by a competent outside engineer and found to be very satisfactory.

The minister of public works mentioned to a Daily News representative that they were particularly pleased at the manner in which their money had been handled by the city.

IMPROVING IN HEALTH

It is satisfactory to know that the minister of trade and commerce, Hon. H. H. Stevens, who is well known in Prince Rupert, is not so seriously ill as to cause uneasiness among his friends. He has started out pretty well in his capacity as responsible head of one of the most important departments at Ottawa and it would be a calamity if anything should happen to him. We hope he will be back at his work in a very short time.

Ancient Tangiers and Quaint Genoa Visited By Local Citizen; Many Things of Interest Are Found

(By Morte H. Craig)

Up this morning and saw Tangiers, four miles away on the Moroccan coast, rising out of the coiling fog. It is very strange and novel over there where much adventure and romance can be had. Passing through the Pillars of Hercules, one lands in Tangiers as on another planet. Camels, elephants, turbans, mosques and covered features, all the

ful creations here, on canvas and in marble.

Genoa is fairly decorated in statuary, both bronze and marble—but the cemetery! Ah, the cemetery, that is where the statues may be found—thousands of them, so very life-like that like Galatea, one could almost expect them to step down and speak. The one great palace of the dead, built of marble covers blocks, all under one vast high ceilinged roof with long vistas of spacious halls. The bodies of the rich lie there on both sides, in niches on the wall or underneath the marble floor. Space is allotted to the families according to their means and wishes. And in an arched alcove back of each space is where the statues stand, where the story of the dead is told. And the statues do not stand as symbols but in actually reproduced features and clothing of the mourners represented. In one alcove, the sculptor has carved of life size mourners around the bed of a dying mother, out of one vast block of marble, expressions of grief with falling tears, and clothing so life-like that one easily distinguishes its quality—lace, silk, wool, etc. The money spent and the devotion of the people to their dead is beyond all comprehension, with burning lamps and flowers everywhere.

My natural reticence in the presence of ladies made it impossible, but I had a longing to step over and whisper in her ear:

"Not the black eyes of Juno, "Nor Minerva's of blue, no, "Could rival yours you know, "You exquisite thing."

Her knitted rope girdle and her white frock were like a symphony in music. I mention this incident because one would hardly expect to meet with such beauty among the cloistered women of the world.

Now back to Genoa, where the old part is the very embodiment of former pagan existence and ancestry.

To such as dwell in the New World, and have never visited the old, it seems impossible to convey any true conception of the wonder-

OPPONENT OF DRYS

Late Senator Edwards Opposed to Prohibition But Never Drank Himself

United States Senator Edward I. Edwards, whose death was reported yesterday, was one of those men in public life whose stand on prohibition was somewhat anomalous.

On that issue he was one of the most vigorous and outspoken opponents, yet he did not use intoxicants.

Although holding liberal views concerning the use of intoxicants, the senator's opposition to the prohibition amendment and the Volstead Act was based primarily on his opinion that both were an invasion of the liberties of the people.

He was elected governor of New Jersey in a campaign conducted on the issue of personal liberty, and in his inaugural address attracted national attention by his bold denunciation of prohibition and the Volstead law.

Three years later when Mr. Edwards made the race for the United States Senate against Senator Joseph S. Frelinghuysen, he again injected the personal liberty issue into the campaign and was elected by the unprecedented plurality in New Jersey of 89,000 votes.

Throughout his service in the upper house of Congress, Senator Edwards never lost an opportunity to express his views opposing prohibition and he frequently made them the subject of addresses at public and private functions other than of a political nature.

Wettest of Wets

By his consistent stand against prohibition, he came to be known as "one of the wettest of the wets." This was the cause of one of the amusing and surprising incidents of the Democratic National Convention at Houston in 1928.

The Houston Democrats named as a reception committee for the New Jerseyites, made their plans along lines which they deemed proper for the entertainment of delegates from a putative "wet" state. After the preliminary welcome and at what the chairman of the reception committee deemed an opportune time, he invited Senator Edwards to have a drink.

"I do not drink," the senator replied, emphasizing the declination by the serious manner in which it was made.

Senator Edwards was born at Jersey City, December 1, 1863. After his public school education he entered New York University in the class of 1884, but quit at the end of his junior year to study law in the office of his brother, William D. Edwards.

After determining that the legal profession did not appeal to him, he obtained a minor position in the First National Bank of Jersey City and while there devoted himself to the study of banking and taxation. He left the bank to form a partnership with his brother in the construction and building business, but in 1903 returned to the bank as assistant to the president. He was advanced to cashier in 1911, to president in 1916 and became chairman of the board in 1925.

On November 14, 1888, Senator Edwards married Miss Jule Blanche Smith of Jersey City. They had a son, Edward I. Edwards, Jr., and a daughter, Mrs. Edwards died August 3, 1928.

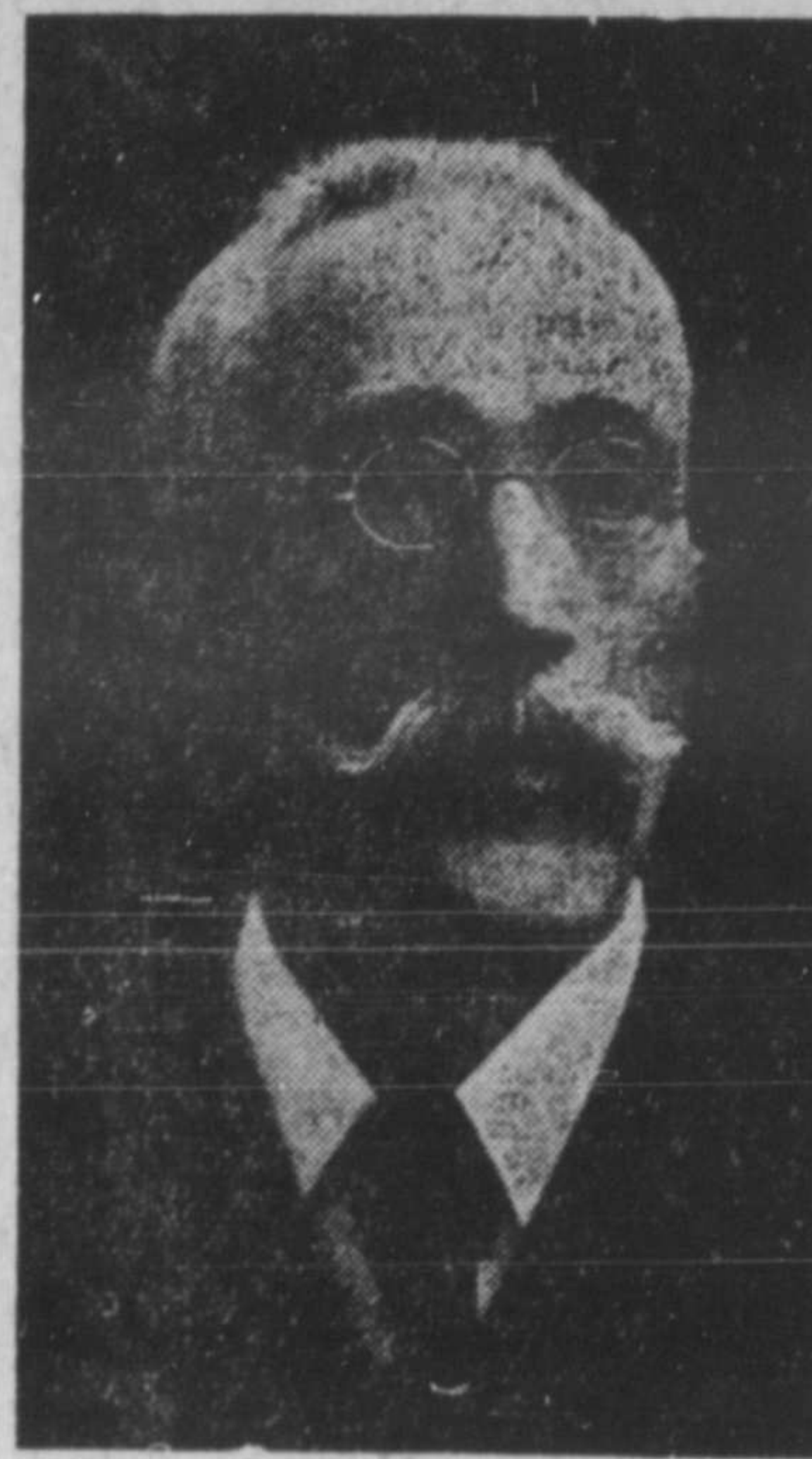

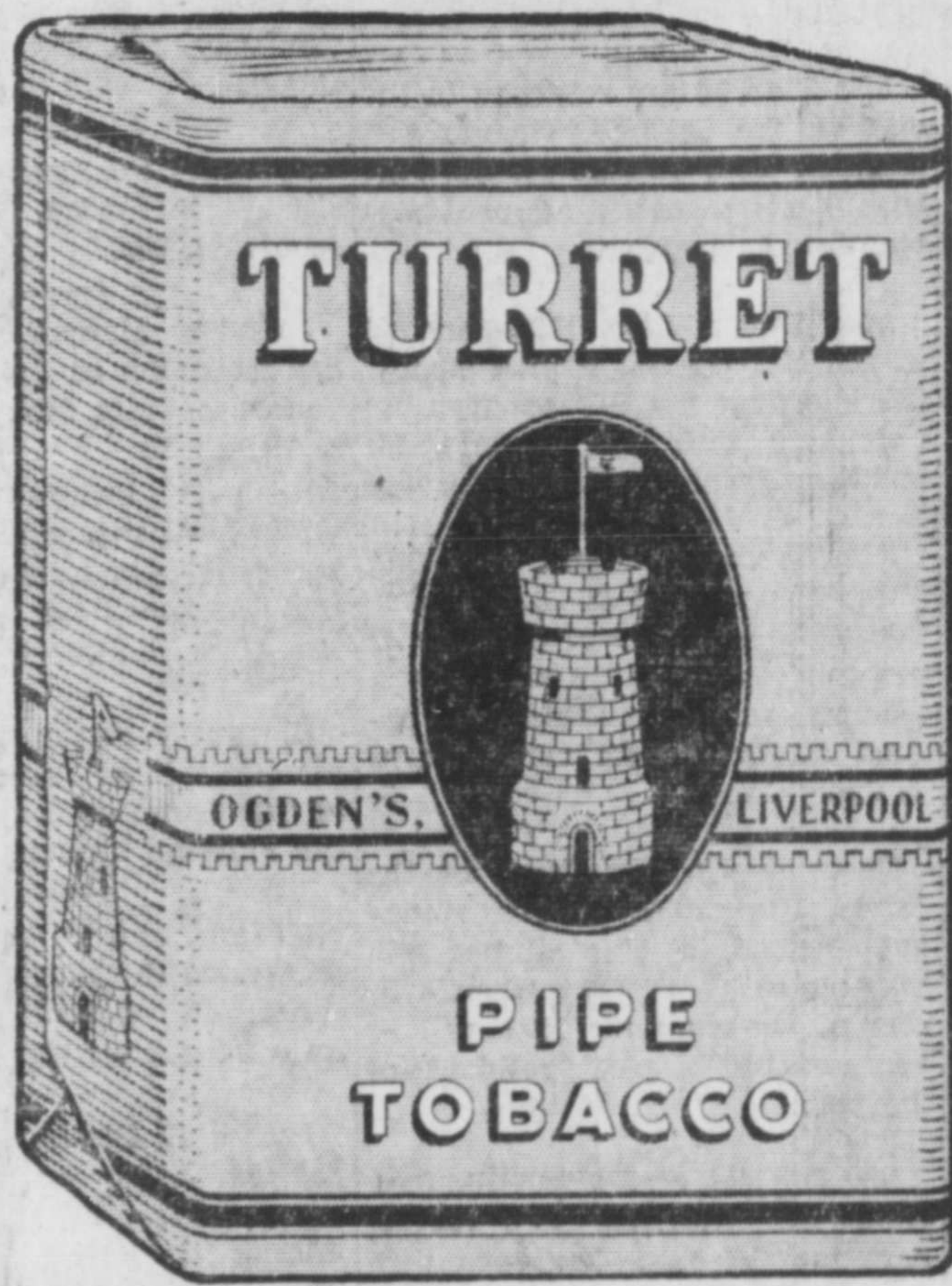

Three gold trophies, one silver trophy and \$3,325 in cash prizes will be at stake when the leading dog mushers of the world compete in the three-day Eastern International Dog Derby at Quebec on February 19, 20 and 21 for the sled-dog racing championship of the world. The winner of the famous classic derby over the hundred and twenty one mile course will receive \$1,000 in cash, the club's silver championship cup, a right to one-third permanent ownership of a gold cup, a miniature replica of the same trophy and the blue championship ribbon, according to the list of prizes, rules and regulations issued recently by Louis Hudon, chairman of the board of directors of the Dog Derby Club.

Nine additional cash prizes amounting to a total of \$2,000 will be awarded to the nine mushers following the winner crossing the finish line. The red, yellow, white and gray ribbons will be given to the teams finishing second, third, fourth and fifth place. Leonhard Seppala, hero of the dash to Nome, who captured the derby honors in 1929 and Emile St. Goddard, recognized as King of the dog drivers, who won the derby last February, already hold one-third permanent ownership of the gold trophy donated by R. S. Coltart to be won three times before it becomes the property of the holder.

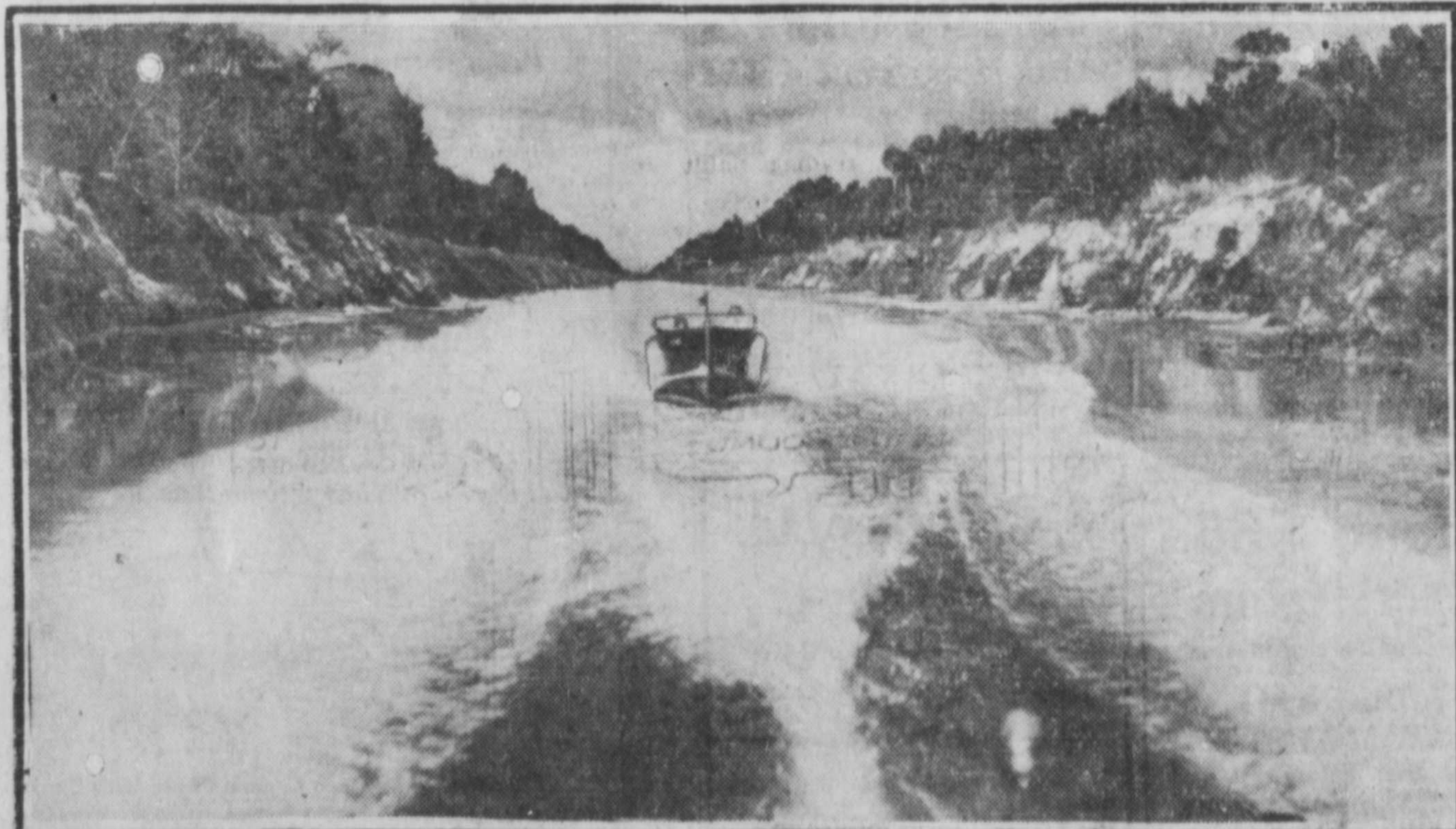

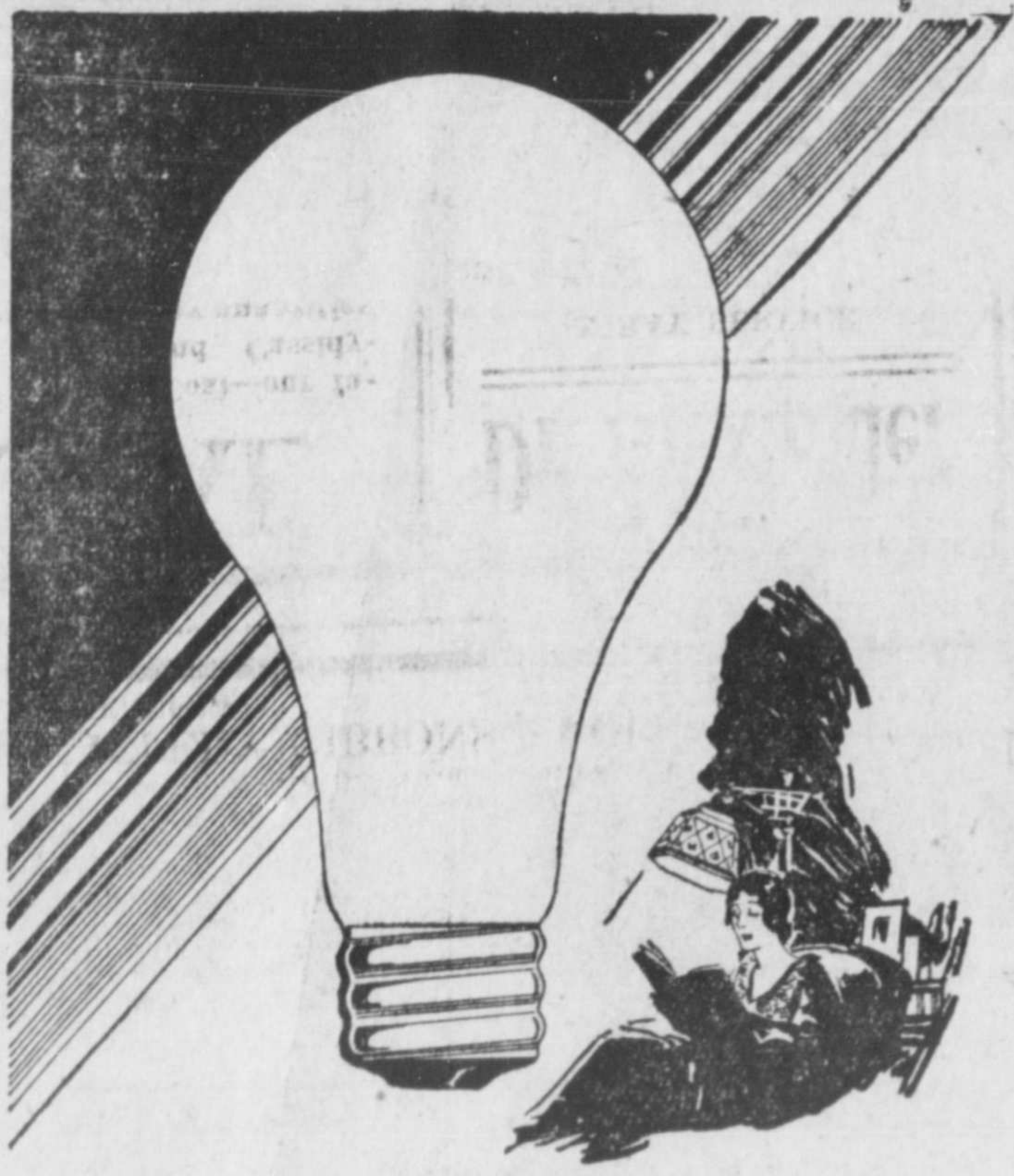

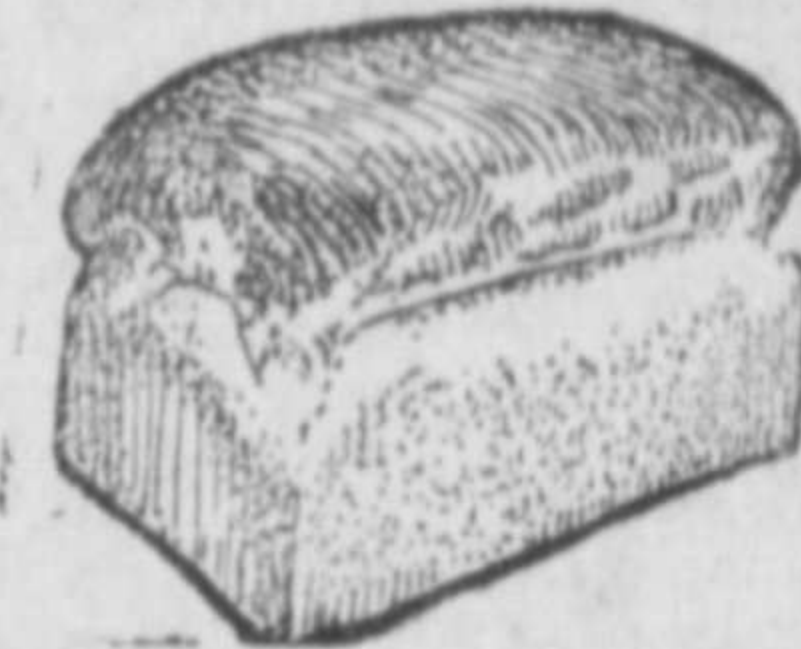
