GOVERNMENT HAS BEEN REPUDIATED
SASKATCHEWAN TOWNS WRECKED; BIG BLOW LAST NIGHT

Estevan and Arcola Swept By Hurricane And One Life Taken

Many Buildings Were Unroofed and Trestle Bridge Was Demolished—Man Was Killed By Flying Timber

ESTEVAN, Sask., Aug. 27.—When a tornado struck this town and district last night buildings were wrecked, and Robert Henderson of Calgary, aged 50, a bridge contractor, was instantly killed by being struck on the head by a flying timber. Two other persons were injured while many residents were cut by flying glass from store fronts and windows.

DO-X IN NEW YORK

Giant German Flying Boat Due at Gotham at Noon Today

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—The giant German flying boat DO-X was scheduled to arrive at New York at noon today from Miami, Fla.

Plans were for the machine to land first on the lower harbor and discharge her passengers before proceeding to Glen H. Curtiss airport on Long Island to find a mooring place.

The DO-X left Germany on November 5 and had an eventful trip here via West Africa, South America and the West Indies.

WILL ASK DISMISSAL

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 27.—District Attorney Fitts announced last night that he would move when the case is called again next Monday for the release of David Clark, former assistant district attorney, on the charge of murder of Herbert Spencer and Chas. Crawford. New evidence which purported to break up Clark's defence had not proven up Fitts said.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Clark received an anonymous letter yesterday declaring that her husband would be "put on the spot" if he were released.

The jury in Clark's trial disagreed on Sunday.

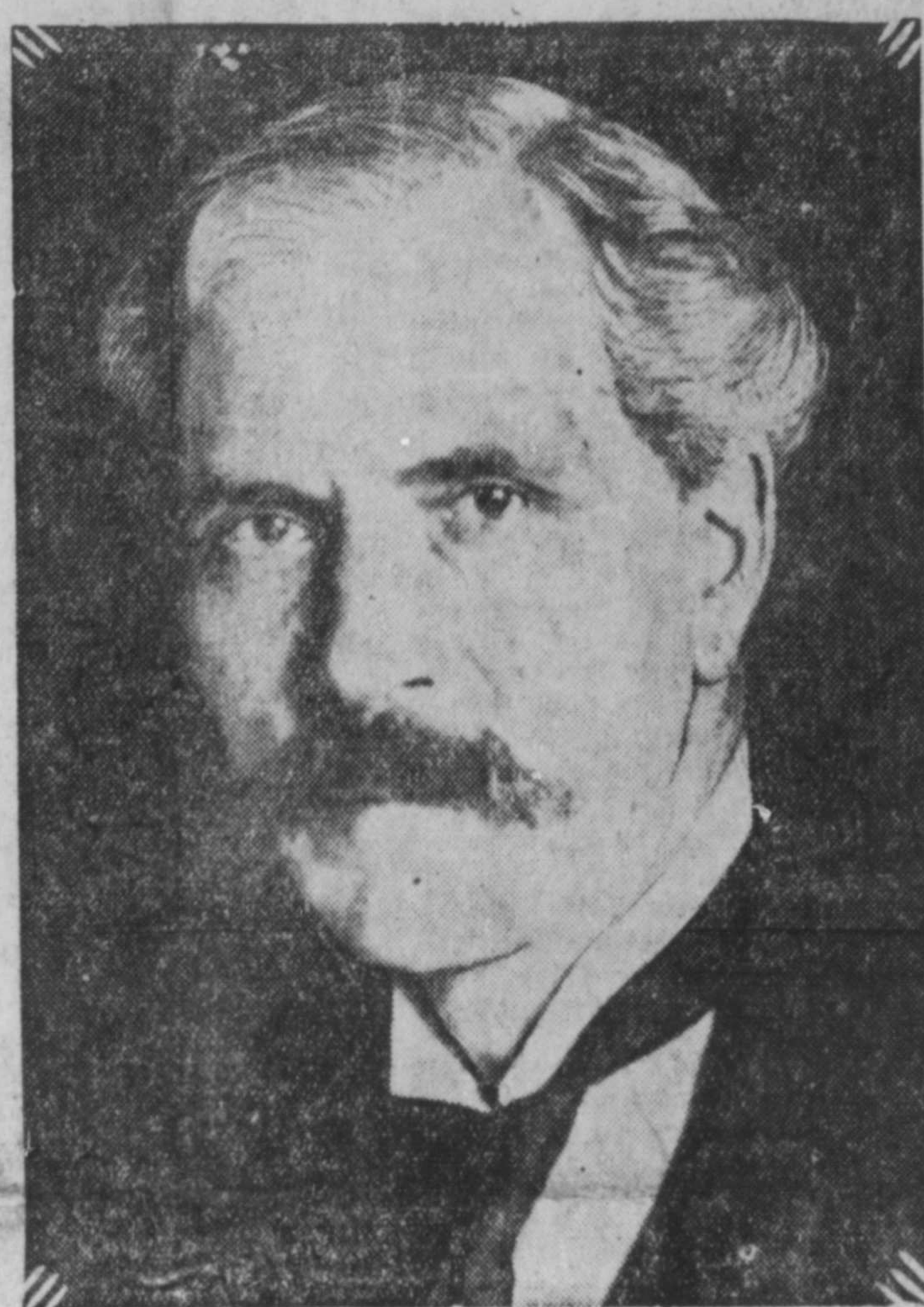

Prominent Japanese Exporter Pleased With Island Timber; Is Willing to Send It Over

K. Nakata, one of Seattle's most prominent exporters of lumber, logs and wheat, passed through the city aboard the steamer Prince Charles today after a week's visit on the Queen Charlotte Islands to inspect timber stands and investigate export possibilities. Mr. Nakata was accompanied on the island trip by John R. Morgan, well known pioneer logging operator.

Mr. Nakata was greatly impressed with the excellence of the timber and declared that he was willing to do business if the necessary shipping arrangements could be made permitting of the taking of such cargo from here. Mr. Nakata, however, realized that there were difficulties. There should be some means though of surmounting these, he felt.

Mr. Nakata would have remained longer on the islands only he was called to Seattle on account of business. He expects to be back in the district soon.

APPROVE CABINET

All London Papers With Exception of Herald Seem Pleased

LONDON, Aug. 27.—Except for the Daily Herald, Labor organ, the new coalition cabinet of Premier J. Ramsay MacDonald is heralded by all the newspapers as an "eminently strong team."

The Herald declares that the new administration is an "enemy of labor" and it is feared that the activities of this paper may bring about some difficulty in the industrial fields.

It was revealed yesterday that only three members of the former Labor cabinet were actually opposed to any cut in the dole.

Meantime Premier MacDonald is going ahead with his budget plans and the new cabinet held its first meeting yesterday.

Militia Called Out to Assist In Fire Fight

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 27.—The National Guard has been called out to assist in the fighting of tremendous forest fires which continue to sweep through the central part of the state of Idaho.

Trades Union Congress and Parliament Labor Party Express Censure

Charge That "Private Banking Interests" Precipitated Financial Crisis and Ensuing Charge of Administration in Great Britain

LONDON, Aug. 27.—Organized labor in Great Britain has definitely repudiated Premier J. Ramsay MacDonald's new national government. Today a joint manifesto was issued by the Trades Union Congress and the Parliamentary Labor party charged that "private banking interests" had precipitated Great Britain's financial crisis and change of government.

The next development will, it is expected, be the expulsion of Premier MacDonald from the official Labor Party.

Balagno's orchestra was engaged to play for the coronation ball.

The services of Mrs. E. P. Jenner, formerly home economics teacher in the local schools, have been obtained to judge the fancy work and cooking at the Exhibition.

Arrangements were reported complete for the use of the Emad Hall during the entire week as a headquarters and club room for native visitors for the fair. The hall will be open for this purpose from Monday to Saturday inclusive.

SIMLA, India, Aug. 27.—Mahatma Gandhi will sail from India on Saturday for London to attend the second round table conference on Indian affairs.

AL CAPONE IS SOUGHT

Chicago Gangster Wanted in Connection With Abduction

CHICAGO, Aug. 27.—Police are seeking Al Capone, Chicago gangster leader, for inquiry in connection with the recent disappearance of John J. Lynch, professional gambler and race horse owner.

Capone's friends declare that Al had agreed to pay \$50,000 ransom on Lynch and that, with this assurance, his release had been promised. Capone, however, is nowhere to be found.

MAYOR TO OPEN FAIR

Official Event Will Take Place on Tuesday Evening Next, It Is Decided

President Glassey of the Fair Board announced this morning that Mayor Orme has consented to officially open the fair. The ceremony will take place Tuesday evening at the Exhibition Building by which time it is expected all the exhibits will be in place and much of the judging completed.

The opening day is when the flowers all look their best and a large attendance is expected for the occasion.

NORAH HAS GROUNDING

C. P. R. Vessel Went Ashore This Morning on West Coast But Was Soon Refloated

VICTORIA, Aug. 27.—The Canadian Pacific steamer Princess Norah, on the West Coast of Vancouver Island service, grounded at 4 o'clock this morning in a dense fog on the west side of Port Renfrew harbor but refloated without assistance at 9 o'clock and proceeded to Victoria under her own power.

WILKINS IS NEAR POLE

Preparations Made For Last Perilous Lap Under Ice

SPITZBERGEN, Aug. 27.—The submarine Nautilus, with the explorer, Sir Hubert Wilkins, on board, is now nearing the North Pole in the course of its Arctic explorations and preparations are now being made for the final hazardous dash under the ice.

## GOOD AND BAD TIMES

A visitor to Vancouver tries to refute the fact that times are not good in that city. What he ignores is that there are in that city a large number of men who are unable to find employment. That indicates bad times.

Businessmen sometimes try to ignore the men who earn their living by the sweat of their brow. The reference is not to Prince Rupert businessmen, who are not that kind of people. They are too close to the real situation to be unaffected by it. We in Prince Rupert realize that a large section of the community have little to look forward to this winter except the relief offered by the government. That means hard times. It is useless to try to deceive ourselves. We have to face a situation which is anything but pleasant.

The Daily News likes to be optimistic and we even now feel optimistic in regard to the future. We know that Canada has the wealth and we believe the people have enough good sense to see that all share in that wealth, but as long as there is any considerable part of the population unable to earn sufficient to provide them a reasonably good living we cannot admit that times are good, even though a few people may seem to be making money.

## TWO PARTIES ONCE MORE

It looks now as if Britain will be again divided into two political camps. Presumably there will now be two parties, the Labor party and the National or coalition party. It is a condition that Labor has been seeking for many years.

For years the Liberal party has not amounted to much although Lloyd George has been virtually formulating the policies for the Labor government owing to the position he held as key man in the political structure. Some Liberals have been waiting an opportunity to throw in their lot with Labor and others have sympathized more with the Conservatives. From the formation of the coalition it seems as if Liberalism would disappear and the two old political names would pass from general use.

May I encroach once more on your valuable space for the following reply received from Victoria to the correspondence you published on August 15. We are very much indebted to you and appreciate the privilege.

### Copy of Reply

"Dep't. of Public Works, Victoria, B.C., August 20, 1933.

"Dear Sir:—

"With reference to your letters of the 12th and 14th instant, I note the resolution passed unanimously at mass meeting held in the Eagles' Hall at Prince Rupert on the 31st July last. In this connection I would point out we are advised there are some forty-four thousand unemployed persons in British Columbia who need assistance between now and next summer. A very much similar position pertains throughout the whole of Canada and is much worse in many foreign countries. Many industries, through no fault of their own are closed down; the farming this year has not been good and consequently sufficient revenue to meet the situation along the lines you suggest is simply not available.

"I may say that the unemployment committee of the Provincial Government has been going very thoroughly into the whole situation and has quite recently had an opportunity of discussing same fully with representative of the Federal Government. Plans are now being made by which it is hoped some measure of relief will be afforded at an early date and until we are formally advised by Ottawa as to what Federal aid will be forthcoming we are not in a position to make any public announcement as to what we will be in a position to do.

## CHECKING GLACIERS

Governor Parks of Alaska Guest Recently on Canadian Public Works Boat

JUNEAU, Aug. 26—Will the retreat of Grand Pacific Glacier eventually give the Dominion a Canadian port in the heart of the Alaska panhandle? This has been the principle topic of conversation among glaciologists who visited the territory this summer and the point has not been relegated to the discard yet. Rumors that Canadians contemplate the establishment of a tourist resort at the head of Grand Pacific Inlet have been rife of late.

The question was put to J. P. Forde, divisional engineer for the department of public works of Canada, who arrived in Juneau recently aboard the Canadian yacht Walronda, Capt. H. Aldren, from Victoria, B.C.

"We have had our eyes on Grand Pacific for some time—since 1925, at least," Mr. Forde said, "but just what use we can make of the three-quarters of a mile of land which retreating glacier has left for us is yet to be determined."

### Glacier Quits Alaska

During the summer of 1925, a party of surveyors found that Grand Pacific Glacier, which has been trying for a good many years to decide whether it wanted to be an Alaskan or a Canadian glacier, had finally made up its mind to change its nationality. It has now withdrawn almost a mile from the International Boundary Line, giving Canada a port of entry into Northern British Columbia.

"The Canadian government has withdrawn this strip of land from the public domain," Mr. Forde said.

"We don't know what use we can make of it, as the country beyond it is practically unexplored. It is doubtful, however, if we can ever use it as a means of ingress to the Whitehorse country—there are too many ice fields and high mountain ranges."
