

TWO PARTIES ONCE MORE

It looks now as if Britain will be again divided into two political camps. Presumably there will now be two parties, the Labor party and the National or coalition party. It is a condition that Labor has been seeking for many years.

For years the Liberal party has not amounted to much although Lloyd George has been virtually formulating the policies for the Labor government owing to the position he held as key man in the political structure. 




