## Coal Miners are No Nearer Settlement of The Dispute

### United States Government Offers Fourteen Per Cent Increase Which it is Declared will be Rejected by the Men; Idle Miners Sent to Jail.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
**WASHINGTON, November 27.**—A wage advance of fourteen per cent for all mine workers, the maintenance of Government control over coal prices, and no increase in prices at this time were the conclusions the Government had arrived at, as announced last night to the Operators and Miners Wage Scale committee. Declaring that Secretary Wilson, acting as the authorized agent of the Cabinet and of President Wilson himself, had offered an increase of 31 1-16 per cent, John Lewis, acting president of the Mine Workers, asked if the Government intended to repudiate the acts of Secretary Wilson.  
Dr. Garfield replied that Secretary Wilson had made his proposal as mediator only.  
Frank Farrington, president of the Illinois District United Mine Workers, asked Dr. Garfield if the miners would be regarded as outlaws if they did not return to work.  
"The Government has never attempted to compel men to work against their will, but every proposition will be offered miners willing to return to the mines," Dr. Garfield replied.  
Farrington said that he did not believe that any would care to return under the new wage conditions.

**An Insult.**  
**WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.**—All efforts of the Government to solve the bituminous coal miners' wage tangle have failed. Coal Controller Garfield's suggestion of a 14 per cent increase is characterized as an "insult" by the miners, while the operators declare that it would force them out of business unless accompanied by an increase in price.

**Work or Jail.**  
**SHERIDAN, Wyo., Nov. 27.**—Scores of coal miners who declined to return to work have been rounded up by United States soldiers at Carneyville, Wyo., and placed on interurban cars for removal to the county jail at Sheridan. All other miners in town were ordered by Major Warren, military commander of Northern Wyoming, to return to work.

**Inconceivable.**  
**WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.**—Secretary of War Baker said it was inconceivable that an army officer would order the arrest of coal miners for failure to return to work as reported from Sheridan.

## TORONTO WOMEN ARE STEPPING OUT SOME

Will Contest Every Ward in the Coming Municipal Elections and Have Candidate for Board of Control.

**TORONTO, Nov. 27.**—Women are to enter the lists against men in the coming municipal elections. The local Council of Women will put a woman candidate for alderman in every ward and one candidate for the Board of Control.

## LACK OF OFFICERS FOR COURTS MARTIAL

**TORONTO, November 27.**—The Committee which has been enquiring into Government Courts Martial and delays finds that the chief trouble is due to a lack of effective instruction on tribunals and the need of expert court martial officers. Officers should not be discouraged from appearing on behalf of prisoners, the committee decides.

## NO ACTION TOWARD A RAILROAD STRIKE

Five Hundred General Chairmen in Session at Cleveland Considering Proposal.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
**CLEVELAND, Nov. 27.**—No action looking towards a railroad strike by the four railroad brotherhoods was taken by the five hundred general chairmen now meeting here to act on Director General Hines' offer of time and a half for slow moving freight service. No vote was taken although the motion to vote was adopted.

## SHOE STORE PROFITS STRICTLY LIMITED

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
**OTTAWA, November 27.**—An order issued by the Board of Commerce fixes the margin or gross profit allowed to retailers of boots, shoes, rubbers, overshoes, gaiters and other articles usually sold within retailers' stores at 33 1/2 per cent of the sale price. The order states that sales of any of these commodities in contravention of this order shall be deemed to bear an unfair profit.

## METEOR FALLS INTO LAKE MICHIGAN

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
**DETROIT, Nov. 27.**—A meteor plunged into Lake Michigan last night causing earth tremblings in the nearby cities, and sending a pillar of flame hundreds of feet into the air. The pillar of fire was visible for a radius of fifty miles.

## ALLEN FORGERY CASE DISMISSED TODAY

Evidence Contradictory, so Accused Relieved of One Charge.

After having been adjourned several times awaiting arrival of witnesses from Queen Charlotte Islands, the Marvin E. Allen forgery case was dismissed this morning by Magistrate McMullin. The charge against the accused was of forging an endorsement to a \$6 check.

Accused was defended by L. W. Patmore and several witnesses were heard.

Irwin F. Neal, who was said to have given the check to one Monty McLeod who in turn gave it to Allen for delivery in Prince Rupert testified at some length. Monty McLeod told of giving the check to Allen to give to J. H. Burroughs.

James Gormley told of coming to Prince Rupert on the same boat as Allen and losing track of him there.

Jack Miller, who cashed the check, was not sure as to Allen's identity and J. H. Burroughs, to whom the check was to be delivered, told of never receiving it.

Allen testified on his own behalf and told that to his knowledge no check had been given him but he had understood that the contents of a parcel he delivered to Burroughs were O. B. U. ballots.

Allen awaits trial in the county court for a commitment on a charge of obtaining money under false pretences.

According to the figures it will be seen that both money bylaws obtained an easy majority over the 60 per cent required to pass them at the election yesterday. The Hays Cove school site was by far the more popular one but the votes it took even surprised its keenest supporters.

The vote cast, 288, was considered very light by those in charge, the total possible vote being 650. The smallness of the poll, which was even smaller than last time, showed that there was not a very keen interest taken in the matter. The polls closed at 7 o'clock and City Clerk Woods made the result known at 8 o'clock. Besides Returning Officer Woods in charge he was assisted by L. D. Kendall, William Brooksbank and Frank Morris, as deputies.

## PEACE TREATY SIGNED NOW WITH BULGARIA

Must Surrender All Valuables Stolen From Allied Countries and Pay Large Indemnity.

**PARIS, Nov. 27.**—By conditions of the Bulgarian Peace Treaty signed here this morning, Bulgaria will surrender all the valuables which were removed from the allied countries during war time, and will pay an indemnity approximating \$445,000,000. Compulsory military service in Bulgaria is abolished and their army is limited to 20,000 effectives.

## Col. Jack Leckie Back From Russia

### Holds Longest Active Service Record Among Canadian Officers. Had Most Adventurous Experiences in Northern Russia.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
**OTTAWA, November 27.**—Colonel Jack Leckie, D. S. O., and with several French and Russian decorations, formerly of the 16th Battalion and brother of Major General Leckie, commanding in British Columbia, is now en route home to Ottawa.

Colonel Leckie is returning with what is a longer record of active fighting than that of any other officer who served from Canada. He went over with the first Canadian contingent and was later transferred for Imperial service in Russia, where he commanded one of the most cosmopolitan crowds of adventurers ever gathered together. Their headquarters were at Soroka on the White Sea, where in September, 1918, Colonel Leckie had under his jurisdiction Russians, Japanese, British light artillery, French artillery with their famous 55s, part of a battalion of the Middlesex Regiment, British Stokes Mortar and machine gun units, part of the famous British regulars, the 60th Rifles, American railway troops, Canadian instructors, Italian mountain artillery and Serbian infantry.

Eighteen officers and seventy-four, sergeant instructors were sent from the Canadian forces on this adventurous expedition which was part of the Foreign Allied Expedition which the authorities sent north to instruct the Russian Reserves after the revolution.

At times when their supplies ran short, owing to delays to transportation, they had to catch fish in the rivers by throwing in Mills bombs. At one time the various international patrols were working with dog teams raiding the Russo-German posts and causing a general disturbance along the enemy front.

## PLEADS NOT GUILTY CHARGE POSSESSION

Kwong Chong Denies Statements of Police Constable in Police Court.

Kwong Chong, of Eighth Ave. W., was in the Police Court this morning charged with having morphine in his possession. Constables Duff and McGlinchy had investigated his premises and there were several exhibits of the drug to show for their visit. Constable Duff testified that all had been found on the premises of the alleged drug peddler.

Kwong Chong, in his evidence, disclaimed any knowledge whatever of the presence of drugs on his premises. He said that it was easy for Constable Duff to think that he had drugs but "it was tough on poor Chinese." The cause was adjourned till tomorrow morning when the corroborative evidence of Constable McGlinchy will be heard.

## EXPEDITION TO HERSCHEL ISLAND

**DAWSON, Nov. 27.**—The Royal North West Mounted Police expedition will leave here during the last week of December or the first week in January for Fort McPherson, Rampart House and Herschel Island with dog teams. The journey, which is approximately one thousand miles, will be accomplished in relays. Mail will be taken for explorers, missionaries and others known to be in the outlying places in the far north.

## PAN-GERMANISM

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
**BERLIN, Nov. 27.**—Huge pan-German demonstrations are reported from Potsdam, where the crowds cheered for Ludendorff, the former Emperor Wilhelm and militarism.

## ERNEST VALPEY DOES SHOOTING

Western Rooms Scene of Affair and Man on Arrest, Confesses.

This morning at 4:30 a call was received at the Police Station reporting shots at the Western Rooms, on Fraser Street. The report was rung in by J. Currie, baker, at the Rupert Bakery, which is close to this rooming house. Constable Baillie, then on duty, at once answered the call and found that a shot had been fired through the door of one of the rooms.

On further investigation it was brought out that the room shot into was occupied by one E. Andrews who at first would not disclose the identity of the person who did the shooting. Later he admitted that he could tell from the voice of the person. It appears that during the night someone came up to his door and demanded that he open. Andrews made no move to open the door, and then the threat was made that shooting would be done if the door was not opened. This was soon followed by a shot which passed over the foot of the bed and went through the window into the adjoining building.

## Suspect Arrested.

Constable Baillie soon had the name of the suspect, Ernest Valpey, whom he found aboard the tug McCulloch. Valpey was brought to the station in an intoxicated condition. He was cautioned but admitted after he was placed under arrest that he had done the shooting, using a double-barreled shot-gun.

This morning he made his appearance in the Police Court before Magistrate McMordie, charged with shooting to do grievous bodily harm. The preliminary hearing will commence tomorrow morning.

## IMPRISONMENT FOR BENNETT BROS., VAGS.

Frank Gets Six Months Free Board; Joe Draws 60 Days Hard.

Frank Bennett, the well-known tramp, who was arrested on Tuesday afternoon last for vagrancy, this morning was sentenced to six months "down on the farm" to help his laudable desire to cure the drug habit. His brother, Joseph, whose appeals for medical attention were heeded was yesterday attended by Dr. Cade and, during his next two months with hard labor, the doctor will be on hand at any time he takes another lapse.

### School Site Gets Very Large Majority.

The people of Prince Rupert have done a very wise thing in passing the school bylaw. The building is badly needed and it is to be hoped that an effort will be made to commence work on it as soon as possible. The matter of site was somewhat of a detail. While we are just as much as ever of opinion that Acropolis Hill was the best place for the building, the people, and especially the parents of the children, should be the best judges of what they want. We hope, however, that an effort will be made to level a playground there at once and not leave it for a year or two. The News is not interested in location, particularly, but it is interested in play. "Give the children a chance" is our motto.

### Delegation off To the Capital.

A delegation is to go to Ottawa to set before the ministers the claims of Prince Rupert as a port, as a fishing centre and as a manufacturing town. Two delegates have already been chosen by the Board of Trade and the city is asked to appoint a third.

This is a time when it would be most unwise to let our claims go by default. We should certainly back up our member to the fullest extent possible in seeing that we get fair play. A policy is now being evolved in regard to the operation of the railways and steamship services. Prince Rupert must see that she gets proper service. She must insist that the promises made by the G. T. P. when the townsite lots were sold, are made good now that the government has taken over the railway and the remainder of the townsite lands.

### Dominion Government Owns the Foreshore.

It must be remembered now that the Dominion Government owns a large part of the foreshore and much of the townsite, that it is to them we must look for help in developing the city and port and in making the large waterfront of value to the people of the city and country. It is possible now that we shall be able to get help from them to build the Morse Creek bridge. We have to get on intimate terms with the Dominion Government and there seems to be no better way of doing that than by sending an occasional delegation to Ottawa. The cost would be very small compared with the benefits to be gained.

### Johnson Appointment Very Satisfactory.

The appointment of Capt. Barney Johnson as superintendent of the B. C. Pilotage Authority will be most satisfactory to this port. Capt. Johnson knows the place well and is in sympathy with our needs and aspirations. This port being included in his jurisdiction, we can be sure that we shall get fair play, insofar as he is concerned. He is a capable man and he has earned everything that is coming to him through his services to the Empire during the war.

## HOOVER TELLS OF CONDITIONS IN RUSSIA

Says Socialist Ideas Are Being  
Abandoned in Order to In-  
crease Production.

Examining the results of Bolshevik Government in Russia, Herbert Hoover, in a recent address before the American Institute of Mining Engineers said: "Today two-thirds of the railways and three-fourths of the rolling stock that they control are out of operation. The whole population is without any normal comforts of life and plunged into the most grievous famine of centuries. Its people are dying at the rate of hundreds of thousands monthly from starvation and disease. Its capital city has diminished in population from nearly two million to less than 600,000. Prices have risen to fantastic levels. The streets of every city and village have run with blood of executions; nor have these executions been confined to the so-called middle and upper classes, for, latterly, the opposition of the workmen and farmers to this regime has brought them also to the firing squad in appalling numbers.

"If we examine the recent proclamations of this group of mixed idealists and murderers, we find a radical change in their economic and social ideas. They have abandoned the socialization of the land for they find the farmer will not produce for payment in highbrow and altruistic phrases. They have re-established a differential wage in an attempt to stimulate exertion and ambition of skilled labor. "They have established a State Savings Bank, in order to stimulate production through making provision for family and old age. They are offering fabulous salaries for men capable of directing the large agencies of production. In fact, while in the midst of flowery verbal endeavor to maintain that they are still Socialists, they are endeavoring to restore individual ownership of property and of the results of labor. The very High Priest of Socialism is today vainly endeavoring to save his people from their total destruction by summoning back the forces of production. The apologists of this debacle are telling us that it is due to the Allied blockade, and to various other oppositions, but any one with a rudimentary knowledge of Russia knows that they did have within their borders ample supplies of food, coal, oil, wool, flax, cotton and metals, and the factories with which to work them in abundance, and that their sole deficiency is human effort."

Charles Thomas, chief mechanic at the Pacific Box Co., was killed at Ocean Falls while on a hunting trip last week. He fell over a cliff and fractured his skull. A wife and two small children are left to mourn his loss.

## SALMON AND HERRING ARE DISCUSSED

Senator Heckman and Carl Foss  
Give Interesting Talks Be-  
fore Ketchikan Cham-  
ber of Commerce.

At a recent meeting of the Ketchikan Chamber of Commerce Senator Heckman and Carl Foss spoke on salmon and herring as commercial products.

Senator Heckman said, in part: "The only protective measures that will actually protect the humpback salmon, which is the only variety of commercial importance in Southeastern Alaska, would be to have an absolutely closed season for this variety of fish, a measure that would make a closed season for humpbacks from, say the 20th of August to the 25th of August, depending on the locality, after which closing it would be unlawful for anyone to have a humpback salmon in their possession."

"Make it impossible to sell humpbacks after that date and no one will care to fish for them for they will have lost their value to the fisherman and cannery as well."

**Salmon Traps.**  
"Some say that the traps are destructive and must be abolished admitting the destructiveness of fish traps, but you must bear in mind that if you abolish traps the cannery will use that many more seines, for they are bound to catch the fish as long as there is enough of them to make it a remunerative business. The only way to protect the fish is to make it unlawful to have them in your possession during the closed season after a certain date each year. It is out of the question to try to regulate the hours of fishing or the locality in which to fish as a protective measure."

The Senator also said that the hatcheries were making a big mistake in propagating red salmon in Southeastern Alaska as this was not a red salmon district and that they should try to stock the hatcheries with humpbacks, as they were the important fish in this district.

**Herring.**  
Senator Heckman spoke in glowing terms of the future of the herring industry and said that the consumption of herring was increasing three or four times as rapidly than the consumption of salmon did at the time they started to pack salmon. He also stated that the herring was a cheaper and more wholesome food for the consumer and that it was a much cheaper fish to pack.

**Diet of Whales.**

Mr. Carl Foss gave a unique and new idea of the herring habits that was discovered in Scotland and Scandinavia. Mr. Foss said in part: "The whale being very fond of herring as an article of diet, follows a school of herring, floundering around and driving them in close to the shore where there is shallow water where he can find a bight or bay to drive the school into. After coralling the school of herring in the bay the whale will lay with its mouth open and as the herring swim into it he devours them in great quantities. Now it was discovered that when the practice of killing whales near shore was practiced very intensively that the herring runs diminished to an alarming extent, the reason being that as there was nothing to drive the herring toward the shore they remained out in deep water. So the governments of these countries placed a restriction on the killing of whales near the coast line and the result was that the herring continued to come in greater and greater quantities until the herring fisheries of those countries surpass any in the world as a commercial product."

## TWENTY-THREE SHIPS BEFORE END OF YEAR

OTTAWA, Nov. 26.—Unless severe weather upsets present expectations the Canadian Government marine fleet will number 23 vessels before the end of the present year.

The Canadian Ruler, under construction at Wallace's shipyard, Vancouver, is expected to be completed before the end of the year, making the 23rd vessel of the Canadian Government merchant marine fleet in commission.

Utilities Committee Fail to Make  
Report at 6 and Operators  
Quit Work.

Promptly at 6 o'clock, according to their threat, the telephone girls ceased operations last evening. At 4 o'clock the Utilities Committee began a meeting to discuss the question brought about by the action of the operators. At 6 o'clock they had not concluded their deliberations, with the result that the strike commenced. At 6:45 the committee had come to a decision to recommend to the City Council that the Prince Rupert operators be paid at a rate 15 per cent higher than that prevailing in Vancouver. In the meantime rates and schedules are being obtained from the southern city. This action was accepted by the operators and they went back to work after holding up the telephone service for a little less than an hour.

OTTAWA, Nov. 26.—In order that the Department of Immigration and Colonization may have authentic accounts of the experience of successful settlers in various parts of Canada, an offer has been made of cash prizes for letters or articles not exceeding two thousand words written by settlers. There are to be three prizes, \$75, \$50 and \$25 given in each of the nine provinces. This is not a literary contest, the official announcement stating that "literary style, correct spelling, etc., will not be considered essential. Tell your story in your own words."

## DELEGATION GOING TO DES MOINES FROM THE B. C. UNIVERSITY

VANCOUVER, Nov. 27.—Eleven representatives of the University of British Columbia are being sent to Des Moines, Iowa, to attend the student conference there from December 30 to January 4. James Mitchell of Prince Rupert is chairman of the convention committee and he will be a member of the delegation. The University will raise part of the funds required to send the delegates and each delegate is expected to raise the rest. It is expected that the home towns of the students will do something toward sending their special representative. The conference is being held under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. student volunteer movement. There has not been a gathering of this kind since 1913, when it was held in Kansas City.
