NEW BRITISH CABINET IS ANNOUNCED

NEW RECORD IS SET UP FOR LONDON-CAPETOWN FLIGHT

Ramsay MacDonald Remains at Head of Government; Baldwin Is Still President of Council

CLASH IN MANCHURIA

Eighty Chinese and One Japanese Lost Lives Yesterday as Entry Continues

CANTON, Nov. 5.—Eighty Chinese and one Japanese were killed yesterday in a clash in Manchuria between Japanese troops and Chinese bandits.

In spite of reports earlier in the week to the contrary, Japanese troops are continuing their advances into Manchuria.

PARIS, Nov. 5.—Aristide Briand, French foreign minister, declared that China had met five demands which had been imposed upon her and that it was now up to Japan to get out of Manchuria.

NO CHOICE YET MADE

Appointment of Vancouver's Chief of Police Still Pending—Three Mentioned

VANCOUVER, Nov. 5.—Although it was intimated that selection of Vancouver's new chief of police might be expected this week, the police commission up to last night had made no appointment.

The names of Inspector George Sutherland, Acting Chief John Murdoch and Chief John Cameron of New Westminster are most prominently mentioned in connection with the appointment.

DRUG RING UNCOVERED

Narcotics Also Involved in Conspiracy Believed to Be Uncovered in Seattle

SEATTLE, Nov. 5.—A vast counterfeiting and narcotic ring which has been operating in the northwest is believed to have been exposed as a result of an investigation by officers which has followed the shooting of a man named Long who was allegedly murdered because he refused to accept counterfeit money in payment for a consignment of narcotics.

WHEAT PRICE WAS STRONGER

Increases Yesterday on Both Winnipeg and Chicago Exchanges

WINNIPEG, Nov. 5.—Wheat prices gained from 1 1/2c to 1 3/4 in yesterday's trading on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange. May futures averaged 74 1/2c. to 74 3/4c., December 70 1/2c., and November 70 3/4c.

CHICAGO, Nov. 5.—December wheat closed at 74 1/2c., 74 3/4c. on the Chicago Grain Exchange yesterday. March closed at 68 1/2c. to 68 3/4c., May at 69 1/2c. to 69 3/4c., and July at 70 1/2c. to 70 3/4c.

Surprising Appointment is That of Sir John Simon as Foreign Secretary in Place of Lord Reading; Snowden to Peerage?

LONDON, Nov. 5.—The new British cabinet following last week's general election was announced today and the members will be sworn in at once. The appointments are as follows:

Prime Minister, Rt. Hon. James Ramsay MacDonald. Lord President of the Council, Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin. Chancellor of the Exchequer, Rt. Hon. Neville Chamberlain.

Foreign Secretary, Sir John Simon. Lord Privy Seal, Rt. Hon. Philip Snowden. Secretary of State for India, Sir Samuel Hoare.

Home Secretary, Sir Herbert Samuel. Secretary for Dominions, Rt. Hon. James H. Thomas. Secretary for Colonies, Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister. Secretary for Air, Marquis of Londonderry. Secretary for Scotland, Sir Archibald Sinclair. President of the Board of Trade, Rt. Hon. Walter Runciman.

Minister of Health, Sir H. Hilton Young. First Lord of the Admiralty, Sir Bolton Eyres Monsell. Minister of Education, Sir Donald McLean. Minister of Agriculture, Sir John Gilmour. Minister of Labor, Sir Henry Betterton. First Commissioner of Works, Rt. Hon. William Ormsby-Gore.

Secretary for War, Lord Hailsham.

The most surprising appointment was that of Sir John Simon, one of the Liberal leaders, to Foreign Office which had been held until the present by Lord Reading.

It is understood Rt. Hon. Philip Snowden will be made a peer.

TRIP FOR SICK MAN

Pilot D. Murphy Going North of Stewart to Bring Out Ailing Telegraph Operator

Pilot Desmond Murphy was awaiting a clearing up of weather conditions this morning before taking off in the Northern B. C. Airways De Havilland Moth plane for Stewart where he will attempt to fly to Echo Lake on the Government Telegraph line to bring out for hospital treatment a lineman named Robert Quinn, who is believed to be seriously ill.

Echo Lake is situated near the headwaters of the Naas and Iskut Rivers about ninety miles as the crow flies north of Stewart, the flying distance being about 114 miles each way from Stewart. A good deal of overland flying is involved. A permit has been received from the government to make the flight. Murphy would refuel at Stewart if necessary, the plan being to bring the sick man through to Prince Rupert. Quinn's relief is reported to have arrived at Echo Lake yesterday.

ROOSEVELT IS FAVORED

Democrats Have Majority of Two in Next American House of Representatives

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 5.—Success in three of five special congressional elections on Tuesday definitely gave the Democratic party a majority of two in the next House of Representatives.

As a result of the special elections, political observers believe that Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt stands in a better position to receive the Democratic presidential nomination next year than Ex-Governor A. E. Smith.

Pretty British Girl Lowers Time by Full Day for Long Flight

Peggy Salaman, London Society Belle, Lands After England to South Africa Trip Which Took Only Five and a Half Days

CAPETOWN, Nov. 5.—Peggy Salaman, pretty nineteen year old British society girl flyer, landed here today from England after a flight in which she lopped a whole day off the record of the late Glen Kidston for a London to Capetown flight. She made the distance in five and a half days. She was accompanied by Gordon Store, her co-pilot.

COMMUNIST DISCLOSURE

Object Was to "Overthrow Existing Institutions By Force" Says Sergeant Leopold

TORONTO, Nov. 5.—Sergeant John Leopold R. C. M. P., who caused a sensation yesterday by his declaration at the trial of nine Communists here that for seven years he himself had been secretary of the Communist party at Regina from 1921 to 1923 in order to secure evidence, disclosed that Soviet Russia had given \$3,000 to start the Red movement in Canada but, after 1922, had shut down so far as donations were concerned, holding that the movement should be self-supporting.

The principal object of the Regina branch of the Communist Party of Canada, as of others, Leopold declared, was to "overthrow existing institutions in Canada by force."

Lloyd George Is Eliminated

Announcement Yesterday Dissolves Possibility of Him Becoming Opposition Leader

LONDON, Nov. 5.—The possibility of Rt. Hon. David Lloyd-George being the new leader of the opposition in the British Parliament was eliminated with the announcement yesterday by the former premier that he would not accept any office in the Liberal Parliamentary party. Continued ill-health of Mr. Lloyd-George is understood to have been one of the reasons for his announcement.

Pilot of Death Plane is Buried

Army Machines Soared Overhead During Funeral at Seattle of John Blum

SEATTLE, Nov. 5.—Army airplanes soared overhead as the funeral took place here yesterday for Pilot John Blum, who was in charge of an airplane which crashed in Snoqualmie Pass on Sunday, members of a hunting party of four being killed in addition to Blum.

COUPLE ARE NOW WEDDED

Marriage of Nelson C. Bowles and Miss Irma Loucks Announced

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 5.—Announcement was made yesterday that Nelson C. Bowles, young Portland broker, and Miss Irma G. Loucks, his former secretary, are now married. Loucks and Miss Bowles were last winter acquitted of the murder of the former's wife but were convicted on an immorality charge.

PROVINCE AND DOMINION

Tomorrow Hon. R. W. Bruhn will be in Ottawa to back up the efforts of the minister of finance in trying to convince the federal government that British Columbia needs special consideration in the matter of relief work. Doubtless he will tell the members of the Ottawa government how the people from the prairies drift toward the coast because of the milder climate and that the western province has not yet benefitted to any appreciable extent from the protection and monetary depreciation which it is claimed is helping to build up industries in the east. When it is decided just what help B. C. is to get, it is expected that many of the men will be put to work once more. In the meantime all the road camps are idle although the men are being kept there at the public expense.

MANY GOOD EXAMPLES

While some manufacturers have been drawing in and helping to accentuate the depression in Canada and the United States, others have been plunging forward with faith, building for the future.

A few days ago we published an interview telling of a Canadian firm that was building factories both in Winnipeg and Regina this year. Today we hear that the Anheuser-Busch people of St. Louis have just completed a two million dollar yeast plant in New Jersey, the largest of its kind in the world.

This is the sort of action that gives us all faith in the future of business on this continent.

ANOTHER GUESS

During the past two years many people have been trying to figure out what caused the world depression. A local professional man, who poses as somewhat of an economist, and who, at any rate, has given a good deal of thought to world conditions, declares that the whole world slump was caused by the advent of a labor government in Great Britain. He says that London is the financial and trade centre of the world and, the moment it was announced that Britain was to be in the hands of the socialists, Europe was paralyzed and United States, depending on Europe for its sustenance, at once felt the reflex. Gradually things went from bad to worse and then to the very brink of Hades until the people of Britain repented of the sin that they had committed and once more elected a Conservative government. Even before the election when it seemed sure what action they were about to take, there was an improvement. Since the election the improvement has been more marked and throughout Europe and United States confidence has been restored and by spring the wheels of trade will all be turning and the mills of industry grinding out prosperity.

If anyone has a better story to tell than this, let us hear it. Keep it down to a reasonable length and we shall be glad to publish it.

ROTARY HAS TAKEN SHIP FOR ALASKA

Steamship Chartered Already for Big Excursion North Next Year From Seattle

KETCHIKAN, Nov. 5.—The steamship Alaska has been chartered and a whole shipload of Rotarians will make the round trip to Alaska after the 1932 convention of Rotary International, to be held at Seattle June 20 to 24, according to letters read at the regular meeting of the Rotary Club of Ketchikan.

The Seattle club is making big preparations to make next year's convention the biggest and best of the 25 already held and the biggest event in the convention history of Seattle.

APPEAL IN VANCOUVER

Karl Fredericks to Make His Fight Against Death Sentence on November 16

The appeal of Karl Fredericks, under sentence of death for the murder of Max Westphal and Herman Peters near Tremblur Lake in June of last year, will not be reversed to Victoria as was at first intended but instead, will be heard by the British Columbia Court of Appeal in Vancouver on November 16.

The appeal has been entered on behalf of Fredericks by the John Howard Society which was approached by the chaplain of Okalla Prison to whom Fredericks expressed a wish to appeal from his conviction.

Fredericks was convicted at the fall session of the Supreme Court Assize in Prince George and December 3 was set as the date of execution.

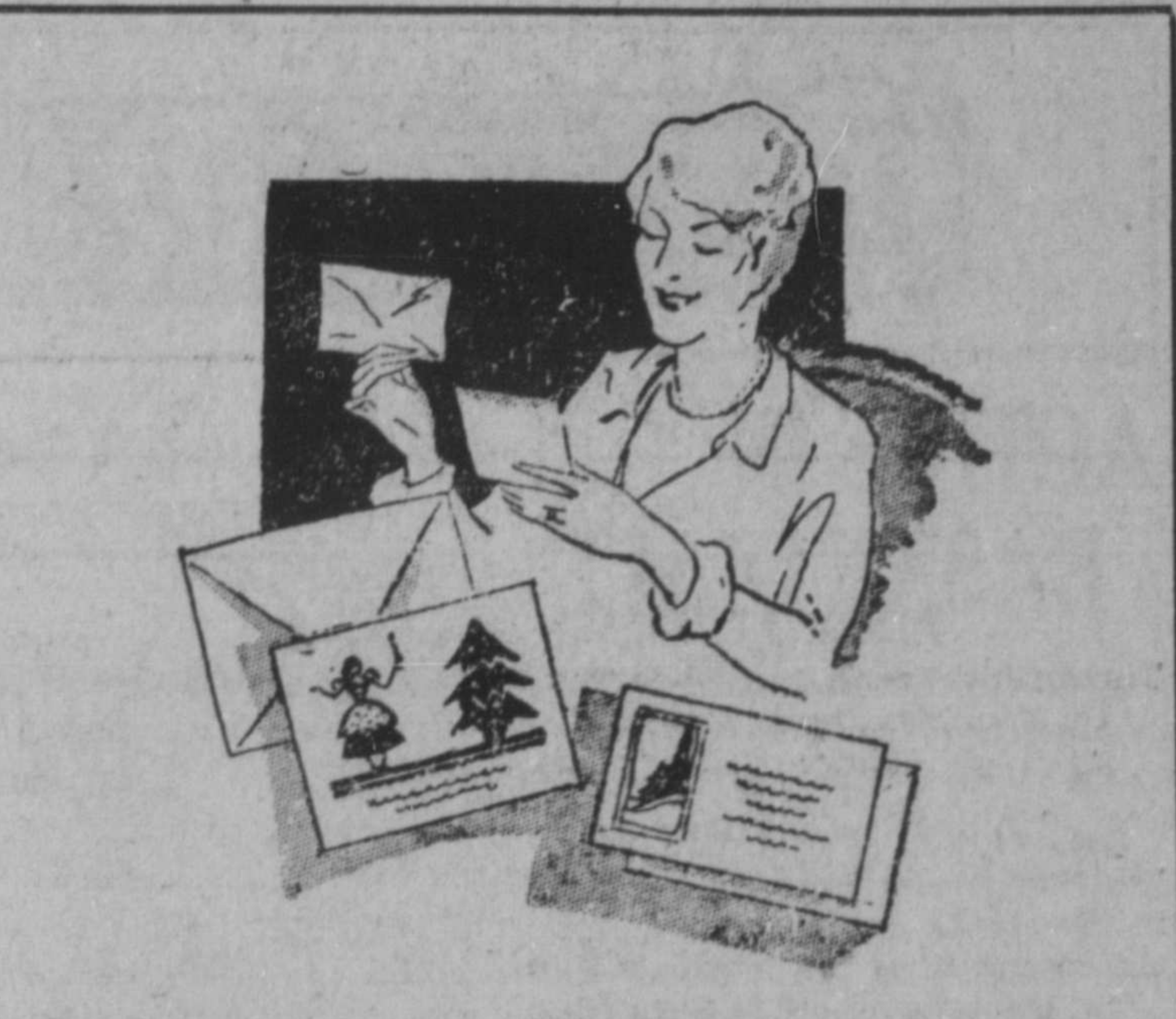

URGES PEACE OUTLET WAY OF HAZELTON

In the Financial Post just to hand is a letter signed by S. M. Code of Winnipeg in which he urges the Peace outlet to Hazelton as follows: Editor, The Financial Post:—

In an article in The Financial Post of October 17 mention was again made of the extension of the Pacific & Great Eastern Railway from Quesnel to Prince George.

In the last eight years much engineering work has been done on the Peace River outlet. Some of the plans were tabled at the last session of Parliament at Ottawa.

For over a hundred years the Peace River country has produced wheat and is the garden spot of Western Canada this season. The elevator people at Grande Prairie this fall have been buying wheat by the load at 31c basis No. 1 Northern, which amount includes the 5c government bonus. Freight from Grande Prairie to the Pacific Coast is 28c a bushel.

The men making the economic survey for the British Columbia government believed that Finley Forks was a key position, as it was believed that the great development of the future in that country would be on the north side of the Peace River.

It appears logical that the line should run west from Finley Forks to connect up with the Grand Trunk at Hazelton instead of Prince George and save a haul of two or three hundred miles on Peace River wheat. Premier Bennett at election time last year supported railway relief for the Peace River country. If the Dominion Government spends \$1,500,000 south of the Grand Trunk which will not help these thousands of settlers it will be an outrage. These settlers need encouragement.

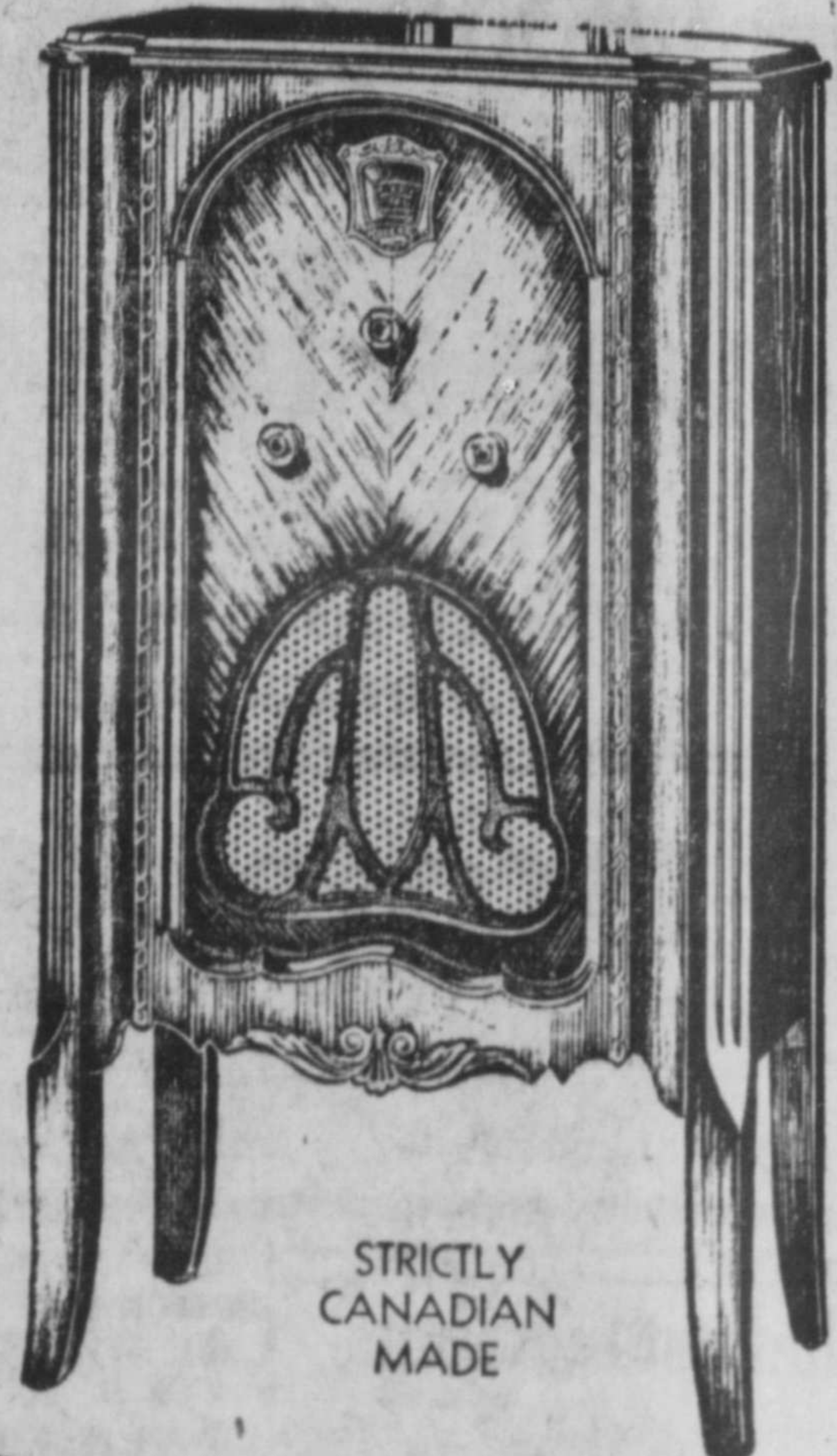

DEMOLISH LANDMARK

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—The old Empire Theatre, where some of this country's most celebrated actors and actresses won their stardom, is going to be sold at auction soon. The Empire and the Metropolitan Opera House, glamorous relics of the Nineteen

ties, are the last survivors of the playhouses that once lined Broadway from Forty-Second Street down to Herald Square. The theatre district now lies in the upper Forties and lower Fifties.

First night audiences in the old days applauded Maude Adams at the Empire, and Viola Allen, John Drew, Margaret Anglin, Henry Miller, William Gillette and the youthful Ethel Barrymore. More recently Charles Frohman opened the house in 1892 with a melodrama by David Belasco called "The Girl Left Behind Me." The critics panned it, and it lasted only two performances. But later it was produced again and became almost as famous as David Belasco himself.

 Singing of a hymn and benediction by the pastor brought the evening's proceedings to a close.

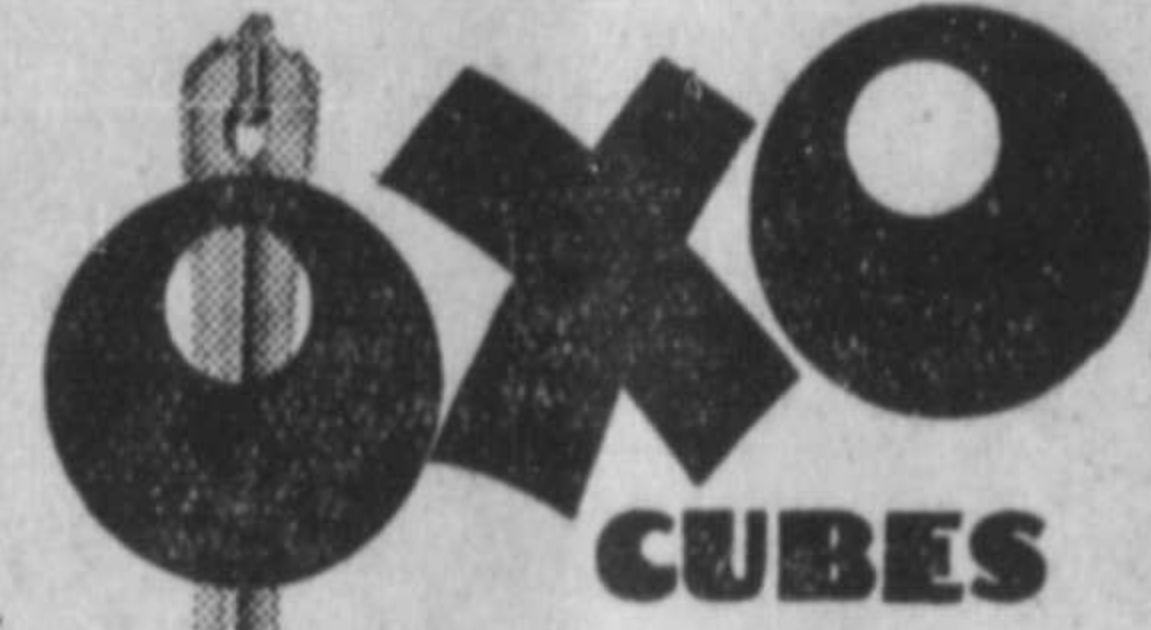
Twenty Years Ago

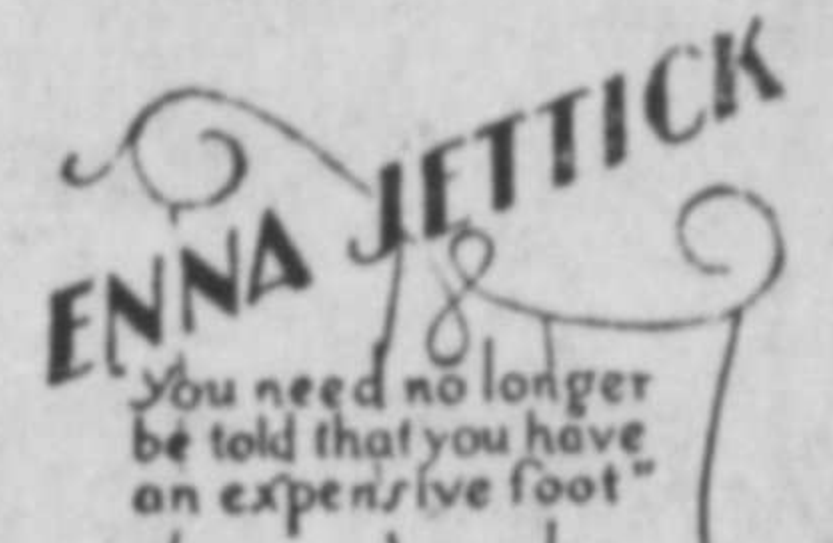
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
