Premier Bennett Under Fire Of Liberal-Prairie Members For Attitude With Farmers

OTTAWA, May 6:-Premier R. B. Bennett was under fire in the House of Commons yesterday afternoon by Liberal and prairie members for his attitude toward the farmers.

J. L. Brown, member for Lisgar, Man., was one of the principal critics of the government for its stand in regard to agriculture.

Hon. W. R. Motherwell, former minister of agriculture in the Mackenzie King government, took the Premier to task, charging that he was trying to bully the house just as he was trying to bully the farmers. This bullving would not be tolerated.

Mr. McMillan, another Liberal member, declared that the Premier had gone to the relief of the bankers rather than that of the farmers in his action in regard to the Wheat Pool.

Radio Association Requires Felix Batt to Close Down

Considerable Discussion at Meeting-Toronto Expert is Speaker

A meeting of the Prince Rupert Radio Association was held in the city police court last evening, being presided over by President F. W. Wesch.

A matter of considerable importance to Prince Rupert was up for discussion, namely the application of Felix Batt for the Association's endorsation of his project of a broadcasting station for the city. Mr. Batt had already asked the city council, the Chamber of Commerce and the Trades and Labor Council to endorse this project and, in every case, the matter was left in abeyance until such time as the Radio Association passed on

the matter. Mr. Batt outlined his proposition to the meeting and, when asked if the station would cause any interference to local reception, he explained that he did not thin't so. He said he was applying for a station to operate on a wave length of 870 k.c. and it was his opinion that, by using a crystal set, he would not interfere with any other station. His Lordship indicated that the two murder cases would be tried first by sending out the Grand Jury first with these bills of indictment One case is that of Rex vs. Sigurd with the murder of Charles Henry Yoch, Houston farmer, on or about September 3 last. The other is that of Rex vs. Samuel Douse, who is charged with the murder of Silas Brown at Kitwancool Indian village on or about January 10.

In the Jussila case, the judge pointed out that evidence was of circumstantial nature. The body of Yoch was found badly beaten in his cabin and later accused was found by the police in a rude sort of dugout nearby in possession of deceased's rifle, clothes and watch. His Lordship commended the bravery of police officers in this case in capturing Jussila after they had been faced with a gun in his hands.

In the Douse case, evidence is more of a direct nature. Crown wit- 8c nesses, the judge pointed out, would testify that accused was in possession of a gun at the time Silas Brown was shot early one morning at Kitwancool. Eye witnesses of the affair would give evidence.

The case of Rex vs. Jussila will be heard first and will be followed by that of Rex vs. Douse. Less serious criminal cases will be heard at the conclusion of these.




