SILVER RESTORATION IS ADVOCATED

FORCE OF BRUISERS ORGANIZED BY MOSLEY LABOR PARTY

British Banking Expert Urges Bi-Metallic Basis As Means of Restoring World Prosperity

Must Be Rescued From Morass of Economic Depression Into Which It Is Sinking—Imperial Conference May Discuss Proposal

OTTAWA, May 15.—The coming Imperial conference at Ottawa would be an excellent place to start restoration of the value of silver, J. F. Darling, director of the Midland Bank, told the banking and commerce committee of the House of Commons today. Something had to be done to rescue the world from the economic morass in which it is sinking, he declared. He outlined a scheme contemplating the formation of an Empire bank which would make possible a bi-metallic basis of currency, silver being restored to its place alongside gold with a value ratio of one to twenty in favor of gold.

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

Rev. A. E. Mitchell Named Head of United Church For This Province

VICTORIA, May 15.—Rev. Dr. Albert E. Mitchell, pastor of Shaughnessy Heights United Church, Vancouver, was yesterday elected president of the British Columbia Conference of the United Church of Canada.

Rev. A. D. Archibald was elected secretary of the conference and Rev. W. P. Bunt, treasurer.

WRECK OF AIRPLANE

Discovery Made in Northern Inlet—Reported to Have Passed Over Langara Island

SKIDEGATE, May 15.—The wreck of an airplane found recently at the head of one of the northern inlets, is believed to be that of a plane which fishermen report having seen pass over Langara Island last June.

According to last year's report, a large plane came in from the Pacific Ocean and passed over the trolly fleet which was at anchor. It was 11:30 p.m. The plane headed for the mainland and considerable mystery has since been attached to it.

Property of Oil Promoter Taken For Creditors

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 15.—Personal property of C. P. Julian, the notorious oil promoter, aggregating \$180,000 in value were attached yesterday to satisfy judgments against him in California.

RENO WAY NOT LIKED

LOS ANGELES, May 15.—Women's clubs and parent-teachers' associations of this city have joined in the movement against the new divorce laws of Nevada. They are in favor of a national divorce law.

CHANGE IS NECESSARY

Reconstruction of Economic System is Urged by Pope Pius in Pronouncement Today

ROME, May 15.—Reconstruction of the entire economic system by bringing it back to the requirements of social justice so as to ensure more equitable distribution of the united proceeds of capital and labor was urged in an encyclical letter issued today by Pope Pius, following a radio address.

The Pope condemned the concentration of wealth. On behalf of T. Ross Mackay, foreman, and nine other men, who carried out carpenter work in the preparation of a fish warehouse planned to be used in the co-operative marketing of halibut here, a writ was issued out of County Court here this morning by W. O. Fulton against the United Pacific Fisheries. The claim is for \$996 in wages. Judge Young granted an injunction restraining the United Pacific from transferring any of its assets.

TO CONFER ON SILVER

Meeting of Nations to Be Called, Washington Hears

WASHINGTON, May 15.—A conference of the nations will soon be called to go into the silver situation and, if possible, rectify the present depression in the metal.

Earnings of Nickel Down

MONTREAL, May 15.—The International Nickel Co. of Canada Ltd. reports net profits for the first quarter of the current year at \$1,659,637 as compared with \$4,616,144 for the corresponding period last year.

AGREEMENT ON SUGAR

LONDON, May 15.—Seven of the world's greatest sugar producing nations have signed an agreement whereby they will endeavor to control overproduction of sugar by limiting the export of the commodity.

England Not So Hot About New Customs Treaty

LONDON, May 15.—The proposed customs treaty between Germany and Austria, with which Italy is now reported to have become aligned, is being strenuously opposed by France and Czechoslovakia and it is not being greeted with much enthusiasm in England.

Defeat In Presidential Contest Yesterday Seen As End of Briand Career

PARIS, May 15.—Some political observers see in the defeat of Aristide Briand in the presidential poll at Versailles of the Senate and Chamber of Deputies yesterday the end of the picturesque career of the great French statesman. Briand withdrew from the contest after the first ballot returned 442 votes for Paul Doumer, Pacifist, against 301 for himself. The result of the poll caused a sensation in political circles.

That Briand was deeply affected by the result was evident. He fainted and was rushed to bed.

Wages For Forest Fire Fighters Is Reduced By Government; Will Be In Line With Lumber Industry

VICTORIA, May 15.—Compensation for fire fighters was reduced by the provincial government yesterday from 25c an hour with board to the same amount without board. Where fire fighters are unable to board themselves, the government will deduct \$1 per day from the wages for feeding them. The change is designed to make fire fighting wages in keeping with those prevailing in the lumber industry.

The government is also considering a proposal to introduce a half holiday on Saturdays in road work in order to effect economy.

REGINA CYCLONE

Power Lines Went Down and Entire City in Darkness For Three Hours

REGINA, May 15.—A cyclonic blast last night ended a heat wave of the past few days and levelled main power lines and 25 poles in Regina's east side. Scores of workmen struggled today to restore the city's power service.

The city was in darkness for three hours. No injuries were reported.

ABANDON COLONIES

Republican Government of Spain to Make Change

MADRID, May 15.—Reports have leaked out from the new republican government of Spain that it is the intention to abandon the monarchial colonial policy.

The first step, it is said, will be to withdraw from Morocco.

Bill Reconsidered In California

SACRAMENTO, May 15.—The California state legislature voted yesterday to reconsider the bill substituting the lethal gas chamber for hanging in executions in the state which the day previous it had sent up to the governor for signature.

Two-Fisted Young Men Give Physical Support To Political Group

They Will Come Into Action When Opponents Threaten—Right of Free Speech Is to Be Actively Defended

LONDON, May 15.—Sir Oswald Mosley, leader of the insurgent Labor group which numbers in its strength nine members of the House of Commons, today announced the organization of a force of two-fisted young men who will give physical support to his program when opponents threaten violence at meetings and elsewhere. "We are going to defend the right of free speech," Sir Oswald declared.

SPAIN ALL QUIET NOW

President Zamora Blames Monarchists for Recent Trouble in New Republic

MADRID, May 15.—President Zamora stated last night that all Spain was quiet again following disorders of the past few days.

The president laid responsibility for the recent anti-clerical disturbances at the door of the monarchists and communists and said that former King Alfonso probably had a hand in it too.

Total damage as a result of the riots is placed at \$50,000,000.

Martial law, however, continues in many Spanish cities. Armed guards have been ordered to shoot to kill if it is necessary to do so in order to protect property.

A run on the Bank of Spain was prevented by armed forces.

It was reported yesterday that an application of Leon Trotsky, exiled Soviet leader, to enter Spain had been denied by the Spanish ambassador at Constantinople. The republican government announced that it has seized property of former King Alfonso pending an investigation of his activities since 1923.

WHITE FLAG SHOWING UP

Austro-German Customs Treaty May Be Abandoned, Geneva Hears

GENEVA, May 15.—Such a barrage of protest has developed against the proposed German-Austrian customs treaty that the two nations are already beginning to show the "white flag."

WELLAND, Ont., May 15.—Joseph Kovacs, aged 45, was hanged here this morning for the murder last September of Constable J. A. McNicholl.

SHERBROOKE, May 15.—Albert Vincent, aged 28, was hanged this morning for the murder last fall of Edmond Trodeau, a farmer.

DENIED BY GOVERNOR

General Smedley Butler Has Not Been Asked to Organize Washington State Police

OLYMPIA, May 15.—Governor Roland H. Hartley has issued a statement to the effect that, contrary to reports, General Smedley D. Butler of the United States Marines had not been invited to organize a state police force in Washington.

PORTLAND, May 15.—General Smedley D. Butler, who is organizing a state police force in Oregon, arrived here yesterday from Salem and will be the guest of Governor Julius Meier. He will spend some time here in contact with his organization work.

NEGLIGENCE IS CHARGED

Officials of Renton Coal Mine Held Responsible For Death of Miner

SEATTLE, May 15.—Officials of one of the coal mines at Renton are to be charged with criminal negligence following the verdict of a coroner's jury which yesterday investigated the death of George Simon, a miner, who was killed as a result of coming into contact with electric wires in an 800-foot shaft.

CONVERSION LOAN IS OVERSUBSCRIBED

OTTAWA, May 15.—Premier R. B. Bennett announced in the House of Commons last night that the new \$250,000,000 conversion loan had proved an unbounded success. He said that applications had been signed for more than \$300,000,000.

**SMALL TOWN STUFF**

It's wonderful how difficult it is for people to live together peacefully and happily, especially in a small place. The smaller the place the worse are the enmities.

There are country districts in Northern British Columbia where half the inhabitants are not on speaking terms with the other half. They have nothing much to quarrel about but they are exceedingly bitter at each other and nothing can reconcile them.

In Prince Rupert things are different. The town is big enough so that if two people do not agree they can associate with different people, mind their own business and keep away from those they dislike. Larger cities are even better in that respect. There, neighbors often do not know anything about each other. They meet often and occasionally say "Good Morning," but that is the extent of their acquaintanceship.

In Canada we have many kinds of people. College men are often hidden away in country places, eking out a scant livelihood on the farm and the next door neighbor is a person who can hardly read or write or who cannot speak English properly. Conditions are rather difficult. All are struggling to make a living and a good deal of tact is necessary if all are to live in peace and harmony.

**CHANCE TO INVEST WELL**

Only recently forty men are said to have set out from here bound for Ontario where they hope to work on the Welland Canal construction. A few thousand miles seems nothing when they travel without paying fares.

Many men have been induced to come to Prince Rupert by a yarn that something big was about to commence here. In that they have been disappointed. They have simply flooded an already much over-saturated labor market.

## DEATH OF SHOWMAN

**David Belasco Dies in New York At Age of 77**

NEW YORK, May 15—David Belasco, one of America's great showmen and dean of the country's theatrical producers, died here yesterday afternoon at the age of 77 years. He passed away painlessly in his hotel apartment in the presence of his daughter, Mrs. Morris Gest, her husband, and two physicians.

Last winter, Belasco had a serious illness with pneumonia which left him with a weak heart. Despite this, he had refused to give up active work though he had been far from well in recent months.

During his life time in connection with the drama, Belasco wrote no less than 400 plays.

His inherent love for his work and his infinite capacity for painstaking in every detail made Belasco one of the most successful men in the theatrical world.

That subject brought a vigorous outburst from him when it was mentioned on the occasion of his 75th birthday anniversary.

"I shall retire when I am carried feet first out of the theatre," he said. "I expect to be working hard and producing plays when those who say I should retire have passed away. Why, I've been on and off the stage ever since I was eight months old. My first appearance was with my mother in a mother-and-infant part."

Mr. Belasco's honors came from the artistic details with which his dramatic productions were embellished.

While building his reputation along those lines, Mr. Belasco at the same time was equally successful as a leader of a school of realistic acting, many of whose pupils became stars on their own account. Among them were Mrs. Leslie Carter, David Warfield, Blanche Bates, Lillian Gish, Milton Sills, Ina Claire and Jeanne Eagles.

Of ancient Portuguese extraction, Mr. Belasco was born at San Francisco, July 25, 1854.

The early ancestors of Mr. Belasco were forced to flee to England before the Moors. His father was among those who later went to Vancouver, B.C. where he accumulated some wealth and was elected mayor. Later, when he met with reverses, he moved his family to San Francisco about the time of the California gold rush and that city became the birthplace of David.

The latter was educated at Lincoln College, California, and about the time he was graduated married Cecilia Loverish. Mrs. Belasco died several years ago. Their daughter, Reina Victoria, was married to Morris Gest, the theatrical producer, in 1911.

## WHO'S WHO

**A. E. Whitmore**



IN addition to being associated with many other public activities in Western Canada, A. E. Whitmore, of Regina, is vice-chairman of the Executive and Finance Committee of the World's Grain Exhibition and Conference.

He was born at Dunville, Haldimand County, Ontario, in 1876, but when quite young came to the west with his parents. He received his preliminary education in the Regina and Moose Jaw schools, later attending Upper Canada College, Toronto.

Ranching in the district west of Yellow Grass, Saskatchewan, was Mr. Whitmore's first introduction to the agricultural industry of the West, since which time he has become interested in a practical manner with several large farming undertakings. He has donated the use of one of his farms near Regina for the purpose of conducting growing tests of grain entered for exhibition at the 1932 world-wide event, to be made under the supervision of the cerealsists from the federal experimental farm branch of the Department of Agriculture.

In 1905 Mr. Whitmore, with his brothers, entered the business field in Regina. From 1908 to 1912 he was a member of the Saskatchewan Legislature. He has also occupied the position of president of the Regina Board of Trade and is head of the Regina Agricultural Exhibition Association. ## LECTURES INTEREST

C. P. Balagno Speaks on Dahlias, Wm. Millar on Roses, W. E. Funnell on Bedding Plants

Members of the Prince Rupert Flower Society had an evening of much interest last night when, after a business session, three lectures on subjects of general interest to all Prince Rupert gardeners were given by well known local horticulturalists. After each lecture, there was general discussion and numerous questions were answered to the satisfaction of all.

The first lecture was a short talk on dahlias by C. P. Balagno. Mr. Balagno went fully into the various types and kinds of dahlias. Quoting some of the most prominent authorities, he developed the fact that dahlias were no respecters of country or location and were grown in almost all parts of the world. They had become one of the most popular flowers among horticulturalists.

William Millar's subject was the rose. He dealt with planting, pruning and winter protection. After describing the proper methods of planting, Mr. Millar gave some suggestions as to the care of roses between the planting and the blooming seasons. He described methods of winter protection and some of his own experiences with roses in Prince Rupert, all of which information was most valuable for beginners. He stressed the fact that one of the most general mistakes among amateurs was a reluctance in applying the pruning knife. It should be applied very freely and without consideration to every bud, Mr. Millar asserted.

W. E. Funnell spoke on bedding and general gardening. He covered the subject of annuals, which grew so freely in Prince Rupert, and gave valuable information as to seeding. The care of young plants and transplanting were also discussed. Mr. Funnell made the interesting statement that some plants seemed to do even better with frequent transplanting.

The meeting was well attended. At the business session, only routine matters were taken up. M. A. Burbank, president of the society, was in the chair.

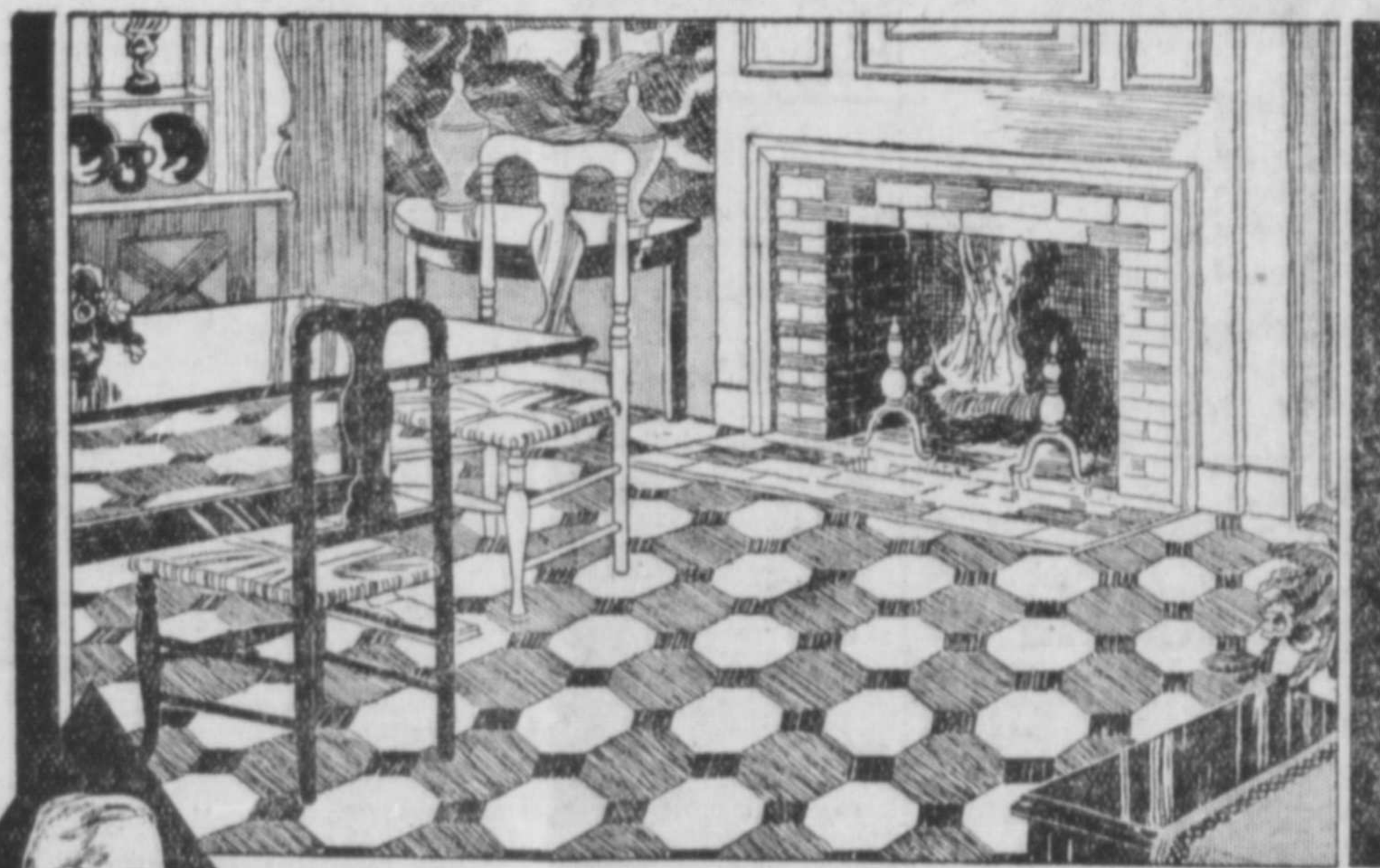
