
FLEET IS ASSISTING

WEST ORANGE, N.J., Aug. 25.—Charles Edison, son of Thomas A. Edison, the inventor, said yesterday that his father had not felt so well for the past two or three days, but he attributed this to a relapse due to Edison's too speedy recovery from his recent collapse.

WAR UPON GANGSTERS

Monster Mass Meeting of Citizens Determines to Rid New York of Gangsters

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—At a huge mass meeting last night in Madison Square Garden, New York citizens declared war to the death upon gunmen, racketeers and bootleggers. It was one of the great outbreaks of public indignation in the history of the city, having resulted from the incident on Saturday when six persons were killed in a pitched battle on downtown streets.

Vice-president Charles Curtis and Governor Frank Roosevelt were among those who were represented at the meeting, both pledging their support to the movement for the eradication of gangster activities in the city.

FOLK QUIT FIRE TOWN

Flames Drive 700 Residents Out of Corbin in Crow's Nest Pass

None Can Enter

Railway Property is Destroyed at Nearby Section Point

FERNIE, August 25—Seven hundred inhabitants of Corbin, coal mining town, 40 miles from here, evacuated the town last evening when a forest fire borne on a hurricane swept the town.

Wye, a section point about a mile north of the main town, consisting of a number of shacks and tents and a railway roundhouse, was destroyed.

The main town was given a reprieve when the wind lessened but it was still in peril and so smoke-laden that none can enter.

Women and children are encamped six miles from the danger zone at Cold Spring while men and boys are enlisted to fight the flames.

FLYERS IN NEW YORK

Boardman and Polando Back After Record Breaking Flight to Istanbul

NEW YORK, August 25—Russell Boardman and John Polando, who stirred the world of aviation a few weeks ago with their fine non-stop flight from New York to Istanbul, Turkey, slipped quietly into New York yesterday, bringing their famous Bellanca plane "Capt Cod" on with them on the same steamer.

Board and Polando were to fly today to their home town of Boston where a great reception awaited them.

Customs officers demanded that Boardman and Polando should pay duty on diamond emblems which were presented to the two flyers by the Turkish Air Club after their arrival at Istanbul.

TIMES ARE IMPROVING

United States Wants Hoover, Says Postal Chief

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 25.—Basing his statement on revenue of the gigantic department which he heads and on his close touch with conditions in all sections of the country, Postmaster General Brown said here that economic conditions are improving and that the nation wants President Hoover in office for another term.

"During the last two weeks of July, just before I sailed," he said, "the revenues of the Postoffice Department showed their first increase in a year and a half. I say without hesitation that I haven't a doubt in the world about the election of President Hoover."

DEVELOPING NEW TRADE

Steamship Service Between United States Ports and Valdivostok

SEATTLE, August 26.—Arrangements have been made with the Soviet government for development of a trade between Russia and Pacific Coast ports which may eventually assume quite extensive proportions.

The State Steamship Co. will send the first ship from here to Valdivostok in the very near future.

AVIATION POPULAR

Mexico Has Become Air-Minded, Figures Reveal

WASHINGTON, August 25.—Mexican airplanes engaged in commercial transportation flew more miles during 1930 than had ever been registered before.

That Mexican people are becoming more "air-minded" is revealed in figures which show that 20,200 passengers were carried during 1930, an increase of 193 percent over 1929 when 10,969 persons travelled by air.

Grizzly Bear Goes to Zoo

Three Months Old Cub Shipped From Jasper to England

JASPER PARK, Aug. 25.—Screaming defiance to the world and unbeknown to himself, bidding a last goodbye to the timbered slopes of his beloved mountains, a three months old grizzly cub, offspring of some mighty monarch of the Canadian Rockies, left here last night by Canadian National Express, en route to England and the confines of an English zoo.

The bear cub was captured last spring by the vice-president of Vickers Limited, famous English armament firm, who shot the mother grizzly while on a hunting trip west of here.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—Federal prohibition officers made known today that the use of women as aids in federal raids upon speakeasies thus far, has not been forbidden by official order.





Mr. Dybhavn says they are picking nothing but cohoes this year. There are no pinks to can, this being the off season. Trollers are averaging slightly better than thirty fish to the boat a day at thirty cents a fish. Some boats take one hundred, and one day boats took up to three hundred.

**DESTROYER IS MODERN**

H. M. C. S. Skeena Latest Word in Naval Craft—List of Officers and Armament

H. M. C. S. Skeena, Canada's new destroyer, due here on September 11 for a four-day visit to this port, is the last word in war vessels of her type. Design, equipment and armament are all of the very latest. The vessel was built during the past year in England.

The list of officers is as follows: Commander, Victor G. Brodeur. Lieutenant Commander, Frank L. Houghton. Lieutenants, Horatio N. Lay and Kenneth F. Adams. Engineer Commander, George L. Stephens. Gunners, Archibald H. Baker and Alexander R. Tunball.

The ship has a displacement of 1320 tons register and is 322 feet in length with beam of 32½ feet and depth of 12 feet. Her engines develop 34,000 horsepower, giving the vessel speed of up to 35 knots per hour. Armament includes 47 guns, four torpedo tubes and anti-aircraft gun.
