

Four new boats will be added to the fisheries patrol fleet in British Columbia waters this summer by French Theatrical Precedent to be the federal department of fisheries the new boats will go in duty in the Parisian theatres. The Tofino-owned seineboat Aliema is now operating in local waters purse-seining herring to supply fresh bait to the halibut fleet sailing out of here. Karl Arnet and Hubert Eik, the two owners, brought the vessel north from the West Coast of Vancouver Island, accompanied by a crew of three other fishermen.

The International Fisheries Commission plans to commence operation of a vessel as a principal feature of the year's field work about the middle of May.
