## Enemy Warships Will Nearly All be Destroyed by Powers

France and Italy will Get Few, But use of One Each for Year is all Other Countries will Receive; Division of the Spoils.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

PARIS, November 29.—The Supreme Council has decided that all enemy warships shall be destroyed except those to be turned over to France and Italy in compensation for war losses. The Council will order delay in the distribution of a number of ships now being used temporarily.

The Supreme Council also has under discussion the distribution of materials and docks to be delivered by Germany as compensation for the sinking of the interned German fleet at Scapa Flow. France and Italy, whose shipbuilding yards have been idle since 1914, will receive certain units as compensation for tonnage lost during the war.

Although the percentage of tonnage of warships to be allotted to the different powers has not been finally decided by the Council, it was agreed yesterday that the units to go to France and Italy would be at least five light cruisers and ten torpedo boats each. Each of the Allied and Associated Powers will receive a large battleship and a torpedo boat for experimental purposes, these units to be destroyed within a year from the time of delivery.

BERLIN, November 29.—It is stated in authoritative quarters that Germany will not comply with the demand of the Entente for 400,000 tons of docks, dredges and tugs as compensation for the German warships sunk at Scapa Flow.

## COAL MINES WILL NOT BE ALLOWED IDLE

Government Will Prosecute Anyone Interfering With Production in United States.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—The Government has served a blunt notice on soft coal operators and miners that interference with coal production will not be tolerated. The warning states that legal prosecution will be employed to thwart conspiracies and that 80,000 troops will be sent wherever necessary to protect miners willing to work. The notice came from the Department of Justice after members of the cabinet had considered every phase of the fuel situation which is admittedly critical following the breaking off of negotiations.

It is not the intention of the Government to let the mines lie idle in any part of the country, which is in the grip of cold weather with coal stocks steadily diminishing. WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—Noon—Operators are preparing to reopen the bituminous coal mines. The Government has notified them they will be protected if mining is resumed and that the mines will be taken over by the Government if they permit them to remain idle.

## WANT REPUBLIC

Movement Against Monarchy Grows Stronger in Both Italy and Romania.

GENEVA, Nov. 29.—The anti-dynasty movement, which has been fanned by the Socialists recently, is gaining rapidly in northern Italy.

Balkans Too. PARIS, Nov. 29.—A movement looking towards the establishment of a republic in Roumania is under way and is headed by Averesco, the former minister of war and Take Jonesco, former minister without portfolio.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 29.—John Hart, minister of finance, is considering altering the law to remove the tax of two per cent on the output of the gold mines. The output value of gold has remained stationary while silver and other metals has advanced.

## LOCAL DELEGATION DID NOT LEAVE TODAY

Hon. C. C. Ballantyne Going on Trip with Admiral Jellicoe and Cannot receive it.

A wire received by Col. Peck, V.C., M.P., last night from Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, stated that the minister would be unable to see the Prince Rupert delegation on December 5 as had been arranged. The minister is leaving for a trip with Admiral Jellicoe and will not be back in the capital until December 15. The delegation consisting of Col. Peck, Mayor McClymont and M. P. McCaffery, that was to leave this morning to interview the minister on local port development will not leave till a later date.

M. P. McCaffery left for Maine this morning where Mrs. McCaffery and family are at present holidaying.

## IS TRY TO PROVOKE STATES INTERVENTION

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—Officials believe that President Carranza is trying to provoke American intervention in Mexico to prevent the country being torn by revolutions again, feeling that intervention would solidify the country for a time.

## Mayor Gray of Winnipeg Is Elected By Majority of Over Three Thousand

Council Evenly Divided Between Radicals and Citizen Representatives; Very Large Vote in Manitoba's Capital.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

WINNIPEG, Nov. 29.—The new council is practically an even division between radical labor members and straight citizen representatives, is the net result of yesterday's municipal elections. The vote was the heaviest on record, being nearly double that of 1917 when 15,000 votes were polled. The actual vote

yesterday was 28,144. It was in many respects a case of North Winnipeg versus South Winnipeg, with the South having the better of the argument in actual count. Mayor Gray won over S. J. Farmer, his radical labor opponent, by a majority of 3116. The radicals won one seat on the school board.

## Restrict Liquor Sold Under Prescription to Eight Ounces at Time

New Scheme to be Given Six Months Trial Before Referendum is Submitted by Provincial Government.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

VANCOUVER, Nov. 29.—Announcement was made by Attorney General Farris that next session of the Legislature an amendment to the British Columbia Prohibition Act will be presented to reduce the minimum amount of liquor that can be legally sold at one time to any one person through Government dispensaries from two quarts to eight ounces. The regulation will be tested for six months at the end of which time the Government would submit a referendum to the people in which they would be asked to say if they were in favor of the sale of liquor in quantities up to one quart through the Government liquor stores.

## CANADIAN RIOTERS RELEASED FROM JAIL

Five Soldier Convicts are Turned Over to Canadian Authorities for Discharge.

LONDON, Nov. 29.—The Home Secretary has announced that the five Canadian soldiers convicted of rioting at Epsom a year ago will be released on December 1st. They will be handed over to the Canadian military authorities for discharge in Canada.

## L. W. W. MEMBERS ARE ALLOWED TO STARVE

## IXION SAILED WITH CHINESE COOLIES

VICTORIA, November 29.—The steamship Ixion sailed for the Orient today with 4,000 Chinese coolies aboard. After refusing to go aboard they were finally induced to do so by their Vancouver Consul.

## SPAIN BREAKS WITH RUSSIAN SOVIET GOVT.

MADRID, Nov. 28.—Because of attacks made upon the Spanish Embassy at Petrograd, Spain has broken off all relations with the Russian Soviet Government.

## Immense Sums Paid To Legislators and Ministers of Crown

Leader of Opposition Drew no Less than \$19,000 which is \$4,000 more than was Paid to Premier Borden.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, November 29.—During the present year legislators drew salaries for sessional duties at Ottawa amounting to nearly \$1,800,000, exclusive of the yearly salaries drawn by twenty-odd ministers of the crown which adds to the total about \$140,000. Nor does this amount include the \$10,000 a year salary of the Prime Minister and two sessional allowances of the leader of the opposition, D. D. Mackenzie, of \$7,000 each.

Private members are entitled to sessional indemnities of \$2,500. Each member and senator drew \$5,000. Ministers are allowed \$2,500 a session as representative of their constituencies. This year each minister drew a total of \$12,500 and the Prime Minister got \$15,000. Leader of the Opposition Mackenzie drew down no less than \$19,000, representing two \$7,000 allowances as leader of the opposition and two sessional indemnities of \$2,500 each, or \$4,000 in all more than the Premier.

## TIME RIPE FOR A STEEL WORKS

Nicol Thompson Says Capital is Satisfied Time Ripe.

## SUNRISE MINE IS BONDED BY GUGGENHEIMS

Mine on Nine Mile Mountain at New Hazelton Taken by Big Concern.

HAZELTON, Nov. 29.—The Sunrise mine on Nine Mile Mountain near Hazelton has been bonded to the American Refining and Smelting Co., an arrangement having been entered into and the papers sent to New York for signature. A large sum is involved.

Chinese Demands  
Right or Wrong?

Are the Chinese right or wrong in asking for the same pay and treatment as British subjects who fought in the war? On the face of it there seems no good reason to say that they should be paid less or denied any of the other privileges which have been granted to men who served the Empire.

It must be remembered, however, that China was at war with Germany just as much as was Britain. She did not do very much fighting, but had she lost there would have been an immense bill for them to pay. They would have been taxed almost out of existence and they would certainly have lost much territory. Germans would have been in power at Hongkong, Shanghai, Shantung and other places and practically the whole country would have been subsidiary to the Teuton empire.

If the Chinese soldiers are to be rewarded for fighting in France, and no one would deny them that right, it should be the Chinese Government that would reward them. They are the gainers from the winning of the war. They gain much more than does Japan.

British Soldiers  
Coming to Country.

Many British soldiers are being sent to this country to recuperate following the war. We have a climate that is good for men with chest and lung trouble, so a colony is to be formed at some suitable point. We are told also that many women are coming to Canada who have for several years been engaged in war work. We should welcome all these people. We have so many undeveloped resources that it should not be difficult to provide for half a million or a million men and women. It will be part of our contribution to the war, that we can look after some of those who have been fighting.

Need of Wharf  
At Stewart.

A wharf is needed at Stewart just now. Both the Dominion and British Columbia Governments are fully aware of the facts and have expressed themselves as ready to do their part in providing it. Unfortunately, however, there is a disagreement over some detail. We do not know which is at fault. We do not care which it is. What we know is that there is a great need and the work has already been held up many months while the red tape is being unwound.

While Stewart is waiting, Hyder is having a boom. The Americans are taking advantage of the situation. They are, with their usual energy, building up the American border town while the Canadian town is asleep. At a time like this and under the peculiar conditions that exist it is to be hoped the Governments will get together quickly and see that a suitable wharf is erected at once and that everything is done to give Stewart a chance in the fight for existence as a mining town and supply centre for the Salmon River and other mining points up Portland Canal.

## BURIED TREASURE

Valuables Hidden from Hungarian  
Communists Now Confiscated  
By New Government.

BUDAPEST, Nov. 28.—The twenty-first case, containing 100,000,000 crowns has been found buried deep in the cellars of Count Karolyi's palace. The treasure consisted of stocks, bonds, silver and gold. The Communists searched for this hidden wealth in vain during the regime of Bela Kun, and it has now been confiscated by the Hungarian Government.

## SWEEPING VICTORY

LONDON, Nov. 29.—The Government won a sweeping victory in the Commons when the motion of William Brace, labor leader, calling for the appointment of a committee to inquire into the cost of production, output and prices of coal was rejected. The Government received 254 votes as against 59 for the measures.


